Giving, Receiving and Sharing the Spirit

Acts 2:1-11 Ps 104:1,24,29-30,31,32 1Cor 12:3b-7,12-13 Jn 20:29-23

Pentecost is a feast of giving and receiving. It is the Jewish feast that occurs 50 days after Passover and celebrates God giving the Torah to the Jewish people. We celebrate Pentecost as God giving the Holy Spirit to the disciples and to the whole Church. It is a celebration of the life and birth of the Church and the rebirth of all believers being continually filled and enliven by the Spirit.

Pentecost is not a celebration of a day long pass for the Spirit is ever alive, ever dynamic, ever giving, living and radiant. There are seven gifts of the Holy Spirit which we all received through Baptism: wisdom, understanding, counsel, fortitude, knowledge, piety, and awe of the Lord. These come to fullness at our Confirmation when we are called to be more Christlike in every way. These gifts actively bear fruit which aid us on our daily journey towards the perfection Jesus calls us to. All of us are to develop and grown in strength of character, in being charitable and generous, joyful, peaceful and peace making, patient and kind, modest, chaste, and to be faithful in all we do. Can't receive the Eucharist? Here's how to make a spiritual communion

Because of the Covid-19, Bishop Larry has suspended Holy Mass until June 30, 2020. In times like this, the Church encourages us to make an act of "spiritual communion," where we unite ourselves to God through prayer. It is a beautiful way to express to God our desire to be united with him when we are unable to complete that union in the reception of Holy Communion.

Countless saints incorporated this type of prayer into their daily lives, not being satisfied with receiving Jesus in the Eucharist once a week or even once a day. Making an act of spiritual communion for them was an essential part of life and drew them closer to God on a daily basis.

St. Josemaria Escriva encouraged everyone to make a spiritual communion as often as they could, "what a source of grace there is in spiritual communion! Practice it frequently and you'll have greater presence of God and closer union with him in all your actions."

Padre Pio also had a habit of making a spiritual communion throughout the day outside of the celebration of Mass. He desired to be always united with Jesus Christ in everything he did.

Below is a traditional prayer of spiritual communion that many saints have prayed over the years. The ultimate goal of our lives should be communion with God and an act of spiritual communion can help a person draw closer to that goal.

My Jesus,

I believe that You are present in the Most Holy Sacrament.

I love You above all things,

And I desire to receive You into my soul.

Since I cannot at this moment

Receive You sacramentally,

come at least spiritually into my heart.

I embrace You as if You were already there
And unite myself wholly to you.







The Season of Easter concludes with today's celebration, the Feast of Pentecost. On Pentecost we celebrate the descent of the Holy Spirit upon the apostles gathered in the upper room in Jerusalem; this event marks the beginning of the Church. The story of Pentecost is found in the Acts of the Apostles, today's first reading. The account in today's in today's Gospel, John 20:19-23, also recounts how Jesus gave the gift of the Holy Spirit to his disciples. Yet the event in John's Gospel takes place on Easter Sunday. There is no need to reconcile these two accounts. It is enough that we know that after his death, Jesus fulfilled his promise to send to his disciples a helper, an advocate, who would enable them to be his witnesses throughout the world.

We already heard today's Gospel proclaimed on the Second Sunday of Easter this year (Lectionary Cycle A). That Gospel passage, however, also included the description of Jesus' appearance to Thomas. In that context, we were led reflect on belief and unbelief.

In the context of the Feast of Pentecost John 20:19-23 reminds us about the integral connection between the gifts of peace and forgiveness and the action of the Holy Spirit. Jesus greets his disciples with the gift of peace. Jesus then commissions his disciples to continue the work that he has begun, "As the Father has sent me, so I send you." He breathes the Holy Spirit upon the disciples and sends them to continue his work of reconciliation through the forgiveness of sins. Jesus' act of breathing the Holy Spirit mirrors God's act of breathing life into Adam at the time of Creation. In fact, both the Greek and Hebrew words for "spirit" can also be translated as "breath."

This Gospel reminds us that the Church is called to be a reconciling presence in the world. The reconciling presence of Christ is celebrated in the Church's sacramental life. In the Sacrament of Penance, the Church celebrates the mercy of God through the forgiving of sins. This reconciling presence is also to be a way of life for Christians. In situations of conflict, we are to be agents of peace and harmony among people.
