Sunday Connection

Mark 1:21-28 Jesus heals a man with an unclean spirit and his fame spreads throughout Galilee.

Today's Gospel from Mark describes what some believe was likely to have been a typical day in Jesus' ministry. Jesus and the disciples that chose to follow him in last week's Gospel arrive at Capernaum, a small village on the Sea of Galilee. Jesus teaches in the synagogue on the Sabbath after which an astonishing thing happens. A man possessed with an unclean spirit calls out to Jesus.

We see throughout Mark's Gospel, that spirits and demons know Jesus and are fearful of him. In fact, they seem to understand Jesus' identity better than his disciples. As we see again and again in Mark, Jesus orders the spirit to be quiet and drives it out of the man. Jesus' ability to heal those possessed by demons is an indication of his power over evil.

In the prescientific age of Jesus' time, all illnesses were understood to be manifestations of evil and sinfulness. Possession by unclean spirits may have been a way to describe what we might call mental illness today and may have even describe certain kinds of physical conditions.

There is evidence that there were many kinds of exorcists and healers in firstcentury Palestine. While Jesus may first appear to be like these healers, he is unique in that he heals a with divine authority which connects his healing activities with the words of his preaching. In Jesus' cure of the possessed man the crowds see the greater affirmation and credence of both his authority and teaching. It is because of this that Jesus' fame spread throughout all of Galilee.

BISHOP LARRY'S DISPENSATION UPDATE

Peace be with you! One of the most difficult decisions I have had to make as a bishop was the suspension of public Masses due to the coronavirus pandemic from mid-March to late May, 2020. Since then, the obligation to attend Mass on Sundays and holy days has been dispensed. In light of the ongoing pandemic, I am extending the dispensation through Tuesday, February 16, 2021, the day before Ash Wednesday. While I am extending this dispensation for the sake of those who are at higher risk if they should be infected with the COVID-19 virus, I would like to urge all our parishioners who can safely do so to return to worship at Sunday Mass. Why does the Church put such great importance on our celebration of Sunday Mass that it is a serious obligation for all Catholics to attend every Sunday and Holy Day of Obligation? It is because the Eucharist is our unique physical encounter with our Lord Jesus Christ, who longs to be one with us and to strengthen us for our mission of living in his love and sharing his Good News with others. The Eucharist is not simply a series of rituals in which we engage, but it is the Memorial that Jesus himself left us in which he makes himself present to us. He offers himself to us in a physical manner, hidden under the guise of bread and wine, which by the power of the Holy Spirit invoked by the priest in the midst of his beloved Bride, the Church, become his Body and Blood. Jesus died on the cross for us, rose from the dead, and ascended into heaven. But he is the "living bread come down from heaven," who offers himself as real food and real drink to give us.
