Sunday Connection

Matthew 5:17-37

I have not come to abolish the law and the prophets but to fulfill them.

Matthew continues the Sermon on the Mount with a three part instruction by Jesus on the Way of Life in the kingdom of heaven. Today's reading is part one and deals with the Law. Part two deals with worship and religious practice and contains the Lord's Prayer. Part three deals with trusting God and deeds of loving service to our neighbor.

When Matthew speaks of "the Law and the prophets" he means the whole Scripture. When the Messiah brings the fullness of the kingdom none of scripture will be done away with. Instead it will be fulfilled. Matthew's Jesus does not overturn the Law of Moses, nor does he set his followers free from the Law. He requires his followers to go beyond the Law by doing more than the Law requires.

The Law condemned murder. Jesus condemns anger. The Law condemned adultery. Jesus condemns even lustful looks. As Jewish Christians who had always been faithful to the Law Matthew's community need a way to understand the difference Jesus and the kingdom he brings have made. They affirmed that God had always been at work in history through "the Law and the prophets." But God's work goes beyond that to be embodied by the Messiah who reveals the definitive will of God. The written scriptures and their interpretation in tradition are surpassed by Jesus whose life and teaching are the definitive revelation of the will of God.

God's Law of love can be thought of as rules that we are to follow in order to show our love and respect for one another.

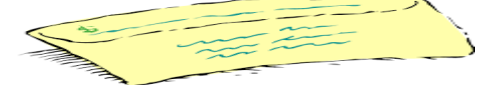

FOOD PANTRY

Sacred Heart Parish support two sites for food distribution every month. Every 3rd Thursday of the month at the Avery Hall and every 3rd Tuesday at Kalapana Star of the Sea grounds.

For the month of January, our Pahoa site gave out 144 bags of food to support 349 people, children, adults and seniors. At Kalapana, 80 bags were distributed feeding 145 people.

The bulk food items of protein and a variety of sundries are from the Food Basket. Our parishioners supply all of the paper bags to package the groceries and a good amount of various food items that help to give a wholesome bag of groceries to all our pantry patrons. Your contributions represent your stewardship, Gods call to feed the hungry.

A special thank you to all of you who give, the Food Pantry ministry is aware of the generosity of all our parishioners. Your continued support is appreciated. If you know of people who can contribute to help us with fresh produce, that will make our pantry patrons very happy. It could be fruit, vegetables, eggs or dairy.

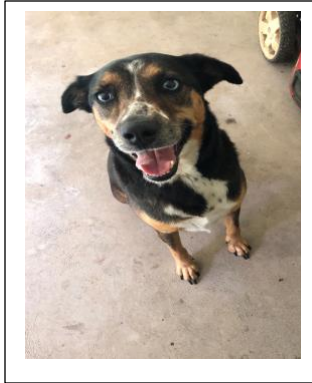
February 14 Feast Day

Their story began in Thessalonica, Greece, a territory first evangelized by Saint Paul. Seven sons were born to a Greek-speaking imperial magistrate and his wife of which two were named Constantine and Michael. Their mother was most likely of Slavic descent, and the boys learned her unwritten language. After his studies in Constantinople, Constantine decided to become a priest. His brother Michael, twelve years older than Constantine, became a monk, taking the name Methodius. Constantine embraced a life of prayer in his brother’s monastery. Emperor Michael III, asked Constantine to go on a mission to evangelize the Jews and Turks of Khazars, modern-day Russia, Ukraine, and Crimea. Methodius accompanied him on this mission, and they learned both Hebrew and Turkish so as to speak to the people in their native tongue Prince Rastislav of Moravia needed missionaries in the Great Moravia, today’s Czech Republic. His people had rejected paganism and embraced Christianity, but they didn’t have anyone who could explain the faith to them in their native Slavic language. It was this mission that would be the beginning of a new era and a new method of evangelization within the Church. Constantine and Methodius began to translate the Bible and liturgical books into the Slavic language. Since there was no written form of the language or even an alphabet, Cyril created one. The new alphabet developed into what is now known as the Cyrillic alphabet and is the basis of many Eastern European and Asian languages used by more than 250 million people today. It wasn’t until a millennia later that these brothers received the universal honor they deserved when the Western Church added them to its liturgical calendar.

A century after that, Pope Saint John Paul II, a Slav himself, honored these two brothers with the title of co-patrons of Europe and Apostles to the Slavs. These great brothers teach us that the Gospel must be personal and understood through the prism of our own language, culture, and human experience. They also teach us that we must work to share the Gospel with others in ways that they understand and to which they can relate. As we honor these great missionaries, ponder the ways that God wants to use you to reach out to others with His saving message. Though you might not be called to invent a new alphabet to do so, you will be called to step out of your comfort zone. Be courageous, creative, and zealous in this effort in imitation of these Apostles to the Slavs. My Catholic.Life

Guidelines for the Reception of Holy Communion

For Catholics

As Catholics, we are encouraged to receive Holy Communion devoutly and frequently. In order to be properly disposed to receive Communion, participants should not be conscious of grave sin, attend Mass weekly and normally should have fasted for one hour.

A person who is conscious of grave sin is not to receive the Body and Blood of the Lord without prior sacramental confession except for a grave reason where there is no opportunity for confession.

Confessions are available 30 minutes before Holy Masses, during First Friday Holy Hour and by calling the church office for an appointment. We encourage you to make the sacrament of Penance a regular habit.

For those properly disposed who receive Holy Communion at the Traditional Latin Mass, Communion is received on the tongue, while kneeling.

For our fellow Christians

We welcome our fellow Christians to the celebration of the Eucharist as our sisters and brothers. Because Catholics believe that the celebration of the Eucharist is a sign of the reality of the oneness of faith, life and worship, members of those churches with whom we are not yet fully united are ordinarily not admitted to Holy Communion. We pray that one day we may overcome the barriers separating us in being one in communion.

For those not receiving Holy Communion

All who are not receiving Holy Communion are encouraged to express in their hearts a prayerful desire for unity with the Lord Jesus and with one another.

For non-Christians

We also welcome to this celebration those who do not share our faith in Jesus Christ. While we cannot admit them to Holy Communion, we ask them to offer their prayers for the peace and the unity of the human family.

Understanding the Catechumenate Process

The Rite of Christian Initiation of Adults, often called **RCIA**, is an effort to restore the spirit of early Christianity that emphasized conversion as a participation in the passion, death, and resurrection of Christ. In addition, the role of the entire community is to pray, witness, and teach the new members of the Body of Christ, thereby giving support and shape to the journey.

RCIA, as a process, involves a series of rites, conducted in the context of learning about the faith and spiritual formation, through which a person is fully incorporated into the Body of Christ, the Church.

The Catholic Church, through the current Code of Canon Law, opens its doors to the admission of new members through the proper liturgical procedure as stated in **Lumen Gentium #14**: *“With love and solicitude Mother Church already embraces them as her own.”* Canon 851, §1, identifies the RCIA as the preferred form of preparation for adults seeking baptism:

“An adult who intends to receive baptism is to be admitted to the catechumenate and, to the extent possible, be led through the several stages to sacramental initiation, in accord with the order of initiation adapted by the conference of bishops and the special norms published by it.”

There are **four stages** in the RCIA process. The first stage is the **Precatechumenate**, or period of inquiry and evangelization; the **Catechumenate**, which is a time of serious and dedicated formation; the **Period of Purification and Enlightenment**, which coincides with the Lenten season; and **Mystagogy**, which lasts from Easter to Pentecost. All of these stages are marked by distinct liturgical rites.
