Sunday Connection

Luke 12:49-53

Jesus has come not only to bring peace but also division.

Having reminded the apostles and the crowd that facing the coming judgment takes patience, Jesus now goes on to speak of how difficult it will be to wait. He tells them that he has come to set the earth on fire. The fire Jesus speaks of here is the distress caused by the coming judgment. It is also the fire of the Spirit that Luke, in the Acts of the Apostles, will describe descending on the disciples on Pentecost. That fire will strengthen them to go out to the whole world to preach the good news of Jesus' Resurrection. The coming judgment forces us to look at the implications of our commitments.

As Jesus warned in last Sunday's Gospel, a commitment of faith requires us to change our attitude toward material possessions and to take even more seriously our moral responsibilities. Here, he reminds the crowd that those who commit to him will find it affects the way they relate to friends and family members. A commitment to Jesus forces us to change the way we live our lives, and this can put strains on relationships.

It is good to be reminded once in a while that the decision to do the right thing, the good thing, is not always easy and without conflict. Jesus himself did not make easy decisions and avoid conflict. In today's reading, he reminds us to be prepared for difficult decisions and conflict as well. We are encouraged to pray to the Holy Spirit for the gift of courage (fortitude) so that we may do the right thing even if unpopular.

Marriage Preparation Requirements

1st meeting: The couple needs to meet and do an interview. Couple will meet together and separately with pastor or designated person.

You will be provided with Engagement Encounter registration information. Couples must procure from their church of baptism a new baptismal certificate with notations. Circumstances regarding couples' status for marriage will be discussed and proper steps initiated hence forth.

IMPORTANT: The date for the wedding is to be set after the Engagement Encounter class requirement is fulfilled.

2nd meeting: You get acquainted with the presider who will officiate. Completion of the following to take place: Premarital Inventory, discussions on marriage, quality of the relationship, spiritual and religious practices, and family.

Meetings to follow will depend on how much more discussion is needed for the couple and being sure all forms have been complete.

Engagement Encounter Certificate is a requirement and must be presented after completing the class.

Marriage license acquired before the wedding date.

FAITH FORMATION Year 2022-2023

Faith Formation is the new name given by the diocese of Honolulu for what was previously call the Religious Education Program. With this new title comes a new order of organization.

It is now established that all children ages 7 and above are confirmed and received 1st Holy Communion. These students will flow to faith formation under the direction of Maila Naiga. If the child/children is 13 or older they will be directed to the Youth and Young Adult with Anna Manalo as their leader.

If the child is 6 years old and older, he/she needs to receive lessons in order to receive sacraments of Confirmation and 1st Holy Communion. He/she will be in a class with Sharen Chaves and Janet Manion.

If you are unsure about what you should do and have questions regarding where your child should go, speak to Sharen Chaves.

The Assumption of the Blessed Virgin Mary August 15th, Monday

Many of the bishops cited [Genesis 3:15](#), in which God is addressing the serpent in the [Garden of Eden](#), as the primary confirmation of Mary's assumption:^[32]

Enmity will I set between you and the woman, between your seed and hers; he will strike your head, and you will strike his heel.

— [Genesis 3:15](#)

The Catechism of the Catholic Church affirms that the account of the fall in Genesis 3 uses figurative language, and that the fall of mankind, by the seductive voice of the snake in the bible, represents the fallen angel, Satan.^[33] Similarly, the great dragon in Revelation is a representation of Satan, identified with the serpent from the garden who has enmity with the woman. Though the woman in revelation represents the people of God, faithful Israel and the Church, Mary is considered the Mother of the Church.^[34] Therefore, in Catholic thought there is an association between this heavenly woman and Mary's Assumption.

Some scholars conclude that no messianic prophecy was originally intended,^[35] that in the Hebrew Bible the serpent is not satanic, and the verse is simply a record of the enmity between humans and snakes (although a memory of the ancient Canaanite myth of a primordial sea-serpent may stand behind them, albeit at a distance).^[36] But although the verse speaks literally about mankind's relationship with snakes, there is also a metaphorical overtone: a door has been opened to a dark power and there is no promise of victory, but rather a warning of ongoing conflict.^[37]

The [Latin Catholic](#) Feast of the Assumption is celebrated on 15 August and the [Eastern Orthodox](#) and [Eastern Catholics](#) celebrate the Dormition of the Mother of God on the same date, preceded by a 14-day [fast](#) period. Eastern Christians believe that Mary died a natural death, that her soul was received by Christ upon death, that her body was resurrected on the third day after her death and that she was taken up into heaven bodily in anticipation of the general [resurrection](#).
