BLESS YOUR HOUSE THIS YEAR WITH THE EPIPHANY BLESSING

Every year, Catholics gather outside the front doors of their home, chalk in hand. Perhaps you've seen the chalking above a church door, or above the front door to a friends home. But just what does the chalking mean? What do the letters and numbers symbolize? Read on to discover the tradition of chalking, celebrated on the Feast of the Epiphany. It offers a beautiful opportunity to bless your home for the upcoming year.

What is the Epiphany home blessing?

The feast day of Epiphany (which you may hear referred to as the Twelfth Night, or Three Kings Day) celebrates the coming of the three kings, who visited Christ from the East. The feast also is a time for a Catholic tradition, the chalking of the doors. The phrase that is chalked above the door this year is 20 * M + C + B + 20.

The letters 'C', 'M', and 'B' have two meanings. In honor of the magi, they represent the initials of the three kings: Caspar, Malchior, and Balthazar. These three kings visited the Christ child in His first home in Nazareth.

But the words also abbreviate a Latin saying: *Christus mansionem benedicat*. Translated, this means: "May Christ bless the house."

Chalking the door of the home is a practice celebrated by Catholics for centuries throughout the world. However, the practice doesn't appear as much in the United States. That doesn't mean you can't adopt the tradition with your family this year! The easy ceremony reminds Catholics that their year is dedicated to God.

FOOD PANTRY/GIVING TREE

As 2019 comes to an end, the Food Pantry ministry would like to extend a very big Mahalo to all the devoted volunteers and our wonderful and generous parishioners without whom we would not been able to supply food items to the needy.

In December, we served 864 individuals for the year of 2019. Food was given to 6,679 clients.

The Keiki Back Pack program supplied 66 children with three days of food monthly during the school year.

The Food Pantry Giving Tree provided toys for 500 plus children.

The Kupuna Giving Tree distributed 29 gift bags. Also, additional toys and food was given to 17 Parish Giving Tree participants.



The Mass in the Extraordinary Form – part 1

The earliest Church documents that describe the Eucharist show differences in the way it was celebrated from region to region. Rome, Jerusalem, Alexandria, Antioch, Milan, Gaul—all of these centers of the Church had different ways of celebrating the Eucharist from the earliest days. And yet, there was never a question that it was the same Eucharist, the same Sacrifice, the same faith, and the same Apostolic foundation which underlay them all. Even within the area encompassed by the Roman Rite, there had been considerable variation in the celebration of the Mass over the centuries. The Council of Trent endorsed some of this diversity, as well as called for greater centrality in promoting uniformity. Popes from the fourth century through the twenty-first century have made changes for the sake of adapting or reforming the Roman Rite, but all of these changes must be seen not with "the hermeneutic of discontinuity and rupture" but within "the hermeneutic of reform, of renewal in continuity" as Pope Benedict XVI taught.

It is in this light that Saint John Paul II, with a special indult **Quattuor abhinc** annos, issued in 1984 by the Congregation for Divine Worship, granted the faculty under certain conditions to restore the use of the Missal promulgated by Saint John XXIII. He then promulgated the motu proprio, "Ecclesia Dei" in 1988 which established a Commission for the pastoral oversight of those Catholics who remain attached to the Mass as it was celebrated in the Missale Romanum of 1962. In 2007, Pope Benedict XVI issued another motu proprio, **Summorum Pontificum**, which expanded and simplified the permissions to celebrate the whole liturgy according to the norms of 1962. He clarified that the **1962 Miss**ale and **2008 Missale** are both legitimate forms of the one Roman Rite, respectively called the **Extraordinary Form** and **Ordinary Form**.
