Sunday Connection

Luke 4:1-13

In the desert, Jesus is tempted by the devil.

This Gospel highlights for us one of the central themes of the Season of Lent. We are dependent upon God for all that we have and all that we are. Anything that leads us to reject this dependency or to distrust its sufficiency, is a temptation from the devil.

Every temptation that will Jesus face offers insight into the spirituality we hope to develop as we keep the forty days of the Season of Lent. We can trust God to provide for our material needs. We worship God because God alone has dominion over us and our world. We can trust God to be faithful to his promises. Jesus' rejection of the devil's temptations shows that he will not put God to the test. Grounding himself on the Word and authority of Scripture, Jesus rebukes the devil by his confidence in God's protection and faithfulness. Jesus' responses to the temptations of the devil teach us how we can respond to temptation. As we start our journey through Lent, this Sunday's Gospel calls us to adopt the same confidence that Jesus had in the face of temptation: God's word alone will suffice, God's promise of protection can be trusted, and God alone is God.

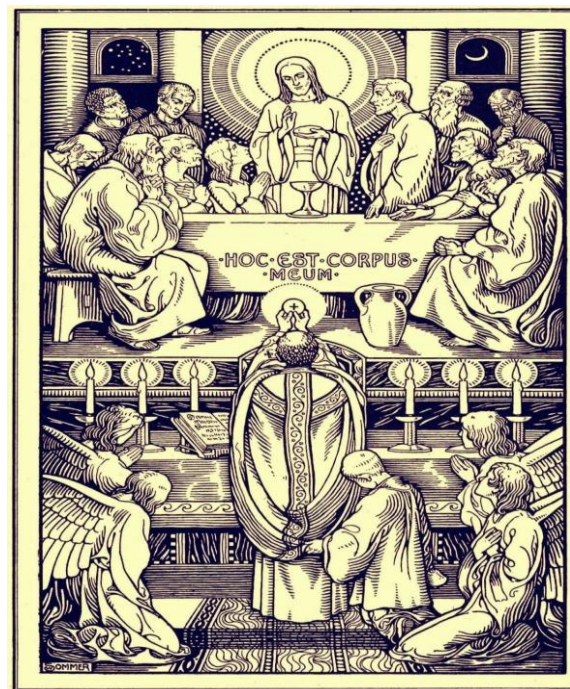

“Today’s Gospel tells us that

“Jesus was led by the Spirit into the desert, to be tempted by the devil” for forty days and forty nights(Matthew 4, 1).

Let us, then, follow the Spirit of the liturgy into the desert and confront our demons through fasting, prayer, and good works.

“The Collect then petitions God to obtain by good works what cannot be obtained by abstaining. The Collect does not stipulate what exactly the household of God is trying to obtain by either abstinence or good works, but the Post communion does: fellowship in the mystery of salvation. The operative logic is similar but not identical to “out with the bad, in with the good” -- the food from which we abstain is not bad, although the activity of abstaining is designed to correct an unhealthy attachment to food. The Secret puts it nicely: “refraining from flesh at our meals” helps us “refrain from harmful pleasures.” And once we have rid ourselves of harmful or vicious pleasures, we should fill the vacuum with the good. “Fasting, then, is an important activity, but it is not a cure-all. Our Lord mentions that some demons can only be exorcized by fasting and prayer (Matt. 17, 21); the two must go together. In the Collect, good works supplement the shortcomings of fasting or abstinence. And good works are supposed to be an integral part of Lent. Several Church Fathers taught that the money saved by fasting should go to the less fortunate. As Pope Saint Leo the Great put it: “May the abstinence of the fasters be the refreshment of the poor.” (Sermon 13)” (Michael P. Foley)

**UKRAINIANS IN HAWAII
Honokaa Museum**

Did you know that Ukrainians were brought to Hawai'i to work on sugar plantations as indentured labor? The first group arrived between 1897-1900 and consisted of around 600 immigrants. Many of them were in German ports waiting for transport to North America with sights on homesteading after their contracts ended. A second group arrived between 1909-1910 that comprised of recruits who had relocated to Manchuria, political prisoners that were sent to the far east by Russia upon their release, and those who saw Hawai'i as a possible ways and means for opportunities to live in Canada and North America in the future. A number of Ukrainians that were recruited worked for 'Ōla'a Sugar Company, most notably Michael and Annie Pszyk. Although many of the Ukrainian immigrants gradually left for the mainland, the Pszyks remained in Mountain View, where they farmed and developed a small herd of cows in addition to working at the plantation. Since the Pszyk's lived in an isolated area, Mr. Pszyk blazed a path to walk out to Volcano Road, which he then turned into a widened trail, and then a passable road. When the Council eventually assumed this road, it was officially named "Pszyk Road", which still remains today.
