Sunday Connection

Mark 12:38-44

Jesus notices a poor widow's offering and commends her great sacrifice.

In the first part of today's Gospel, we hear Jesus warn the crowds not to follow the example of the scribes in seeking honor and attention from others. He then observes how Jewish pilgrims are making their contributions to the temple treasury. Jews are expected to make pilgrimages to the Temple to offer prayer and sacrifices and make financial contribution to the temple treasury. Jesus observes that those who were rich contributed large sums to the treasury. Those with less means made smaller contributions. This is true even today in most of our parishes. Jesus calls attention, however, to a poor widow who makes the smallest of contributions—two coins of little value. Jesus upholds the poor widow's offering for his disciples' consideration, commending her because her small offering was an act of profound generosity, giving from her livelihood rather than her surplus.

To give from our livelihood is not only an act of generosity, it's also an act of trust in God. We can only give from our need if we trust that God will provide for us. Jesus himself demonstrates the ultimate act of generosity and trust in God as he gives his life for us on the cross.

Let us be mindful about our family's financial contributions to our parish community, the diocese, other Church-sponsored organizations, and other charitable organizations. Good stewardship invites us to share our treasure as well as our time and talent.

Let us pray, asking God to help us be generous like the poor widow in today's Gospel.

SYNOD Continuation from last week's Bulletin

KEY QUESTION:

How can all the members of the Catholic Church be more effective in proclaim the living Jesus Christ to the world?

Diocesan Phase in the Diocese of Honolulu
October 17, 2021-February 28, 2022

Synod prayers in last weeks' bulletin prepared you to answer the KEY QUESTION.

There are ten Themes to be used as starting points and guidelines. Themes will continue for the next few weeks. Have discussions in groups, in your home, in your workplace, the objective is to be inclusive as possible. Summarize responses and email to <https://bit.ly/SynodResponses>. Combined reports will be collated and sent to the Vatican in preparation for the October 2023 Synod of Bishops where representative bishops from throughout the world will convene and meet with our Holy Father.

1. **COMPANIONS OF THE JOURNEY** *In the Church and in society, we are side by side on the same road.* In our local church, who are those who “walk together”? Who are those who seem further apart? How are we called to grow as companions? What groups or individuals are left on the margins?
2. **LISTENING** *Listening is the first step, but it requires an open mind and heart, without prejudice.* How is God speaking to us through voices we sometimes ignore? How are the laity listened to, especially women and young people? What facilitates or inhibits our listening? How well do we listen to those on the peripheries? How is the contribution of consecrated men and women integrated? What are some limitations in our ability to listen, especially to those who have different views than our own? What space is there for the voice of minorities, people who experience poverty, marginalization, or social exclusion?
