

Sunday Connection

Mark 7:31-37 Jesus restores a man's hearing and speech.

This is a story about Jesus' healing power, and in it, we find clues about our understanding of sacrament. The Church continues to celebrate the sacraments using physical means. In the Sacrament of Baptism, water and oil are used to show the power of the Holy Spirit. In the Sacrament of the Anointing of the Sick, we are anointed with holy oil on the forehead and the hands. In the Eucharist, bread and wine become the Body and Blood of Christ. We are a sacramental people who believe that God's grace is given to us through these physical signs.

In this Gospel, Jesus is seen proclaiming the good news while journeying through Gentile territory. Jesus was known there which explains why people brought the deaf man to him. Jesus also heals a Syrophoenician's daughter whose faith compels Jesus to heal her daughter. Jesus' mission affirms the early Church's mission to the Gentiles. The good news of Jesus took root and spread quickly among the Gentiles. In the story of healing Mark tells, Jesus gives a man the gift of speech but tells him not to reveal the news of his healing power. This recurring element in Jesus' healing powers is sometimes referred to as the "messianic secret".

Today's Gospel invites us to consider how we witness the healing presence of Christ in our care for and minister to those who are sick. We notice that the deaf man is brought to Jesus for healing by his friends. These people beg Jesus to lay his hands on this deaf man so that he might be healed. Jesus' healing power is shown in his opening of the man's ears and the restoring of his speech. When family members care for one another when they are sick, they bring Christ's healing presence. When we pray for those who are ill, we ask God to show his healing power. When health is restored, we share that good news with others.



COVID UPDATE From Keith Cabalis, Chairman of Covid-19 Task Force Diocese of Honolulu

To: All Pastors and Parishioners From: Covid-19 Task Force Date: August 13, 2021 Subject: August 2021 Covid-19 Update

Dear clergy and parishioners,

Governor Ige's August 10, 2021 Executive Order 21-05 did not change any restrictions for spiritual services of the Catholic Church. Please remain true to your 6' distancing, indoor mask mandates and all mitigation efforts.

However, the reinstatement of lower limits for indoor and outdoor social gatherings do apply. The limit for indoor gatherings has returned.

Social gathering restrictions apply to all events.

COVID-19 Vaccine: Please note that while the Diocese of Honolulu has not required anyone, including employees, to be vaccinated, vaccinations are highly encouraged. Pope Francis has made it clear that being vaccinated can be an act of charity toward the community in order to curtail the spread of the virus. While individuals may have differing opinions for medical or moral reasons, as of this memo, dated August 13, 2021, the Diocese of Honolulu will not be granting religious exemptions from vaccine mandates imposed by others.
