## What's been going on:

Spring is finally actually here! We've had a stretch of beautiful weather that has allowed us to get batch I of the broilers out on pasture and get the garden planted. Batch 2 is a whopping 100 babies, and they are in the brooder while the older broilers are mowing down our smallest pasture and putting on some size. They are getting the hang of moving with the tractors each day. It usually takes a couple of weeks, but eventually they anticipate the move and the new grass. They will actually walk to the front of the tractor when they see us put on the wheels and grab the guide rope. They look forward to moving up to fresh grass and catching any grasshoppers and bugs that they find. The egg-layers are loving their new egg-mobile and are moving around the other pastures bits at a time. Once we get the larger livestock (after the ongoing fence work is done), the layers will follow that livestock so they can help spread the manure that is left behind. Our primary focus and crop in this whole endeavor is grass...we are ultimately grass-farmers. This cycle of rotational grazing, fertilizing, and rest is necessary to ensure that our soil is as healthy as possible. All of these lessons and foundational elements were reinforced at the Advanced Grazing School that Quentin attended this past month. It was 3 days with Greg Judy and guest speakers at the Green Pastures Farm in Moberly, MO. We thought it was a good idea to have as solid a foundation as possible on how to approach healthy regenerative farming with larger animals, so attending this class was a no-brainer for us! Of course, we still have to make sure we take care of our chickens and chicken customers are taken care of. We have a Meet the Producer event up at One Farm farm store in Logan, IA on Saturday, May 21<sup>st</sup> so we can properly greet any customers that want to shake hands and say hello before our first processing in early June. Don't forget that we will be processing the first week of June and our pick-up day is on Saturday, June 11<sup>th</sup>. We look forward to seeing you there, and we appreciate your support!
