Just a Little Bit of History

April's photo was taken of a section of a Palladian window frame at 106 E. Campbell Ave. The part shown is a carved wood pilaster spiral decoration. Known as the Serafino Manfre House, this Spanish Colonial revival style home was built in 1925, by Italian immigrant Serafino Manfre who came to the U.S. in 1915. The Manfre family lived in the house for ten years.

This building is a great example of adaptive reuse. In 1935, the home was purchased by Dr. Frank Anderson, a general practitioner who had offices in the west wing. Later, the building would be transformed into a highly popular restaurant. It sat empty for a short time



until Dermatology for Animals opened its vet clinic in 1992.



Every afternoon the smoke filled the air and wafted throughout the neighborhood beckoning you to visit. I remember it as a rather small yet quaint place with a big brick oven and filled with as many tables they could fit inside that demanded a social experience. This pic shows Andy's being torn down in 2004. It later re-opened on El Camino Real, but like most classic restaurants after relocating wasn't quite the same and eventually (and sadly) closed. I had a few unexpected car expenses this past month that put quite a dent into my emergency fund. Thank goodness for the emergency fund.

There was a minor accident with one car resulting in a otal write off, resulting in purchasing a used vehicle for my daughter.

The transmission went out in another vehicle and there was major maintenance required for the third vehicle.

All in all, a very expensive month. Our cars are not new. We tend to pay them off and keep them for years. However, with all of this, I thought maybe, just maybe I would look at replacing one of them for a newer vehicle.

The cost of a new vehicle is really high. I considered lookng into leasing vs buying to save costs. It's been a while since I've purchased a car so I did a deep dive into the pros and cons. In the end I decided neither was the best choice for me at this time.

If you are considering purchasing a car and are unsure if leasing or buying is the best choice for you, do your research.

Below are a few helpful quesions to get started.

 Are you okay with monthly payments forever?

You will always have monthly payments if you continually lease. Unless of course you choose the buyout option at the end. If you are looking to eventually not have a car payment then this option may not be optimal for you.

How much do you want your payments to be?

The monthly payment on a lease is likely to be less than if you purchased the

car (unless you put down a hefty downpayment). This is because a lease is only paying down the depreciation and not a loan.

3. How far do you drive? Most lease contracts allow for 12K miles per year and then charge you if you drive over that amount. There are options to increase that mileage at a fee. Basically, if you don't commute much then this makes sense, but

BUILDING TRUST FOR WEST VALLEY MENTAL HEALTH CRISIS RESPONSE

Clearly, there's a time and place for law enforcement these are folks we depend on for our safety and wellbeing. But when we're talking about a mental health or substance abuse crisis, we've got to be smarter and more adept about getting the right kind of help to the right place in the right set of

That's what Santa Clara County's Trusted Response Urgent Support Team (TRUST) program is all about. Having a mental health professional available to assess, de-escalate, and connect individuals in crisis with counseling, mediation or mental health services instead of an emergency department or iail.

TRUST is designed to help residents who need assistance in resolving conflicts or stressful situations with one phone call. If an individual or their loved one is experiencing a mental health crisis, they can call 988 from local area codes 408, 650 and 669 (or 800-704-0900 from other area codes).

TRUST is our County's latest mobile response program, a partnership with Momentum for Health and Pacific Clinics, offering an intervention option with a 24-7 call center and in-person crisis support, without involving law enforcement.

Information shared on the call is assessed and eval-

uated by clinical staff in real time to determine if the situation can be resolved through de-escalation or counseling over the phone. or if it is necessary to dispatch in-person help.

Critically, teams are staffed by licensed professionals and individuals with first-hand experience with mental health challenges, which often results in a deeper connection to individuals in crisis.

TRUST started with three teams serving North Countv. East San Jose, and Gilroy. Between the program's launch in November 2022 and January 2024, these teams responded to more than 1,500 calls.

As Chair of the County's Health and Hospital Committee, I know it's important to provide this vital service more broadly — the pandemic significantly increased the number of people accessing existing mental health services in our County. I'm gratified that my Board colleagues approved my proposal for TRUST to expand to Campbell, Cupertino, Los Gatos, Monte Sereno, and Saratoga, as well as large portions of San Jose.

A new TRUST team dedicated to the West Valley and west San Jose communities was up and running starting in February, and is expected to be fully staffed and operational 24-7 by mid-summer.

Our neighbors, our friends, our family members are in crisis and need help. Obviously, when the police are needed, we want them there. But we've got to be smart about when and where. They're not mental health professionals. It's unfair and unwise — to expect them to be, and the risk of a

bad outcome is far too high

To keep the public and law enforcement officials safe we have to do more to provide an urgent and appropriate response for those experiencing a mental health crisis. It's not easy, but it can be done. We've made solid progress in having the right teams and the right tools to do it. Because that's what it takes to ensure the right re-

sponse in a moment of crisis.

The Variance was for a reduced setback; because the lot was narrow, standard setbacks would lead to an unusually narrow eleven foot wide house.

> The request clearly fit all five findings: (a) an eleven foot wide house is very difficult, (b) other owners can build an ADU and JADU, (c) this lot is exceptionally narrow, (d) they'd have the same privileges as other owners, and (e) there were no health concerns. By these rules, the Variance should have been approved. However, because it was discretionary, there was an opportunity

It's the thin end of a wedge. Even when clearly outlined, it can be used to delay or deny a project based on the opinions of the loudest neighbors. A change due to "Passenger Demand" can often mean "We closed the route the passengers really liked to put them on the route we couldn't fill to make much more money."

"Increased Capacity" usually means they have cut the legroom to cram more seats in to the aircraft, and then offer seats with a little more space

A simple economy class seat now comes in many sizes like Economy Plus, Premium Econmore for a window seat with no guarantee that the window will stay put, so keep that seat belt fastened at all times.

If you hear of "A New Pricing Initiative" it probably means if "Restrictions Apply", yes the fares are still going up

Beware of a "Fare Wars" because once the winner kills off the competition you can be sure they will put the fares back up. "Service Enhancements" usually means they have found a cheaper way of

"Special Fares" are ones with so many restrictions that you are bound to end up having to change your booking for a fee that can sometimes be more than the original fare. While most discounted fares are "non-refundable", in the USA changes can usually be made or the ticket cancelled prior to departure and the money put to a future trip if booked at the time. However, with the change fee involved it may well be better to just throw away the old booking.

An "Improved Schedule" can mean they have made the flight time longer in the timetable, so it improves their ontime performance.

Beware when an airline offers a "Direct Flight" to a destination. There is a fair chance that the aircraft will touch down somewhere en route and go through a change of aircraft so you have to get off. It is only the flight number that is direct.
