

The is often the time of year for reflection, but the only one I see is my face in the large pond I have in my front yard! Now where did I put that sump pump?



Remembering Kelly Crowley: Her contributions to Campbell and the Community Toy Program By Kristen Frank

Since it was founded almost 40 years ago, the Campbell Community Toy Program has brought holiday joy to thousands of local families.

In addition to ensuring every local child-in-need has gifts to unwrap during the holidays, the program brings the community together to support a great cause, with numerous organizations and individuals donating their time and resources to promote the program, secure donations, put on events, and much more.

One of those extraordinary individuals was Kelly Crowley. She lived and loved Campbell, and it showed. Her enthusiasm, dedication, and infectious spirit spilled over into everything she touched, including the Campbell Toy Program.

Always involved in the community, Kelly became the Downtown Business Association (DCBA) president in 2015, after being on the board for years. She was the DCBA Member of the Year for 2016 and Citizen of the Year in 2017, much-deserved honors for all she did in and around Downtown Campbell. She donated her time and talents to Wine Walks, Halloween events, the Carol of Lights, and the Campbell Toy Program.

"Downtown Campbell is a culture of many hands joining together to do awesome things. If the people and organizations that make up our community were organs, Kelly would have been the heart. To a fault, she loved her community and had a bottomless desire to give to it. She was a joy to work with, cared for others, and was never too concerned about getting enough credit for the things she did, " says DCBA member, photographer, and marketer Sheldon Chang about Kelly in the post, Remembering Kelly Young Crowley, on Downtown-Campbell.com.

"When she became DBCA" President in 2015 we'd been part of the Campbell Toy Program for years, " shares Brooke Ramirez, owner of Bombshell Boutique and close friend of Kelly's. "She reached out to downtown businesses and organizations to secure their participation. She volunteered at toy sorting events and donated her time and energy in any and every way she could to ensure local children in need would wake up on Christmas Day with gifts to open. She elevated the Toy Program to new levels."

"Kelly and I joined DCBA in 2015. Kelly easily worked into the position of our president as her energy, drive and love for Campbell came out in everything she put her



forces into. She kept us all organized and on point with everything that the DCBA did, worked with the Chamber as the DCBA liaison, attending meetings and getting involved with Chamber events, especially the Toy Program! She dove into it with all her heart and dedicated many hours to this cause.

I have known Kelly for many years, and working with her to support Campbell was a pleasure. If you knew Kelly, she always had a smile, walked Campbell Avenue numerous times a day to just ensure all was well. It was an honor to know her, be her friend, and work side-by-side with her for so many years, "reflects Carol Pouya, DCBA member and owner of Tessora's Barra di Vino.

Carol continues, "It was a tradition to toast ourselves right before each event to a job well done. Kelly would always say to us, 'we are a small motley group that works selflessly hard, but we are so darn mighty!"

Kelly's bright light and spirit of giving continues to be part of the Toy Program. Since 2019, the "Kelly Crowley tree" is lit at the annual Making Spirits Bright fundraising mixer in her honor, with a new ornament adorned with her pictured placed on its branches.

Ken Johnson, Executive Director of the Campbell Chamber, affirms that "Kelly represented in every way the unselfish nature of a true community servant. A piece of her will always be a part of the Toy Program."

It's that time of year again to nominate the Chamber's Business and Citizen of the Year.



<u>Celebrating two Campbell</u> <u>heroes</u>

I'd like to start by celebrating two real-life heroes in the Campbell community: Ian and Molly Hanaray. The two teenage siblings are lifeguards at the Campbell Community Center pool. On the evening of October 24th, a youth collapsed in the gym at the community center. A coach ran out to the pool deck from the gym, and Ian and Molly stepped in to assist. Ian checked the youth's pulse and breathing, and began to administer CPR. Molly cleared the pool deck and went to retrieve a defibrillator. Eventually, Santa ClaraCountyFirearrivedand took over CPR. The youth was taken to the hospital and, after several weeks, had begun to make a recovery.

On November 15th, Ian and Molly were recognized by the City Council as well as their peers and community in the Council chambers – as well as receiving gratitude from the family of the youth who had collapsed, and was now in attendance at the meeting. I'm deeply grateful to the heroism and quickthinking of these two young members of our community.

<u>Campbell's Plan for</u> Housing

Later in the month, on November 29th, the City Council hit a key milestone on the way toward completing our Housing Element, or "Campbell's Plan for Housing." The decisions made at this meeting gave direction to staff which will allow them to finalize and submit to the state, in early 2023, "Campbell's Plan for Housing," which will guide housing development in our community for the next eight years.

In addition to finalizing the sites for potential de-

velopment (these stayed consistent with the locations discussed at prior meetings), a majority of the Council voted to move ahead with the final number of potential new homes or housing units (about 4,900, in keeping with the staff and Planning Commission recommendation). This will allow for a "buffer" from the minimum required, which will allow Campbell to plan for future housing decisions with the maximum amount of flexibility and in a way that fits the needs of the community.

The Council also gave direction to staff to pursue new housing programs to address a range of critical community needs, such as homelessness — the details of which will be brought back for future Council discussions.

Supporting local businesses and downtown vibrancy

Another major decision during November was City Council's step to finalize the parklets program. Up to sixteen businesses will be eligible to convert up to two parking spaces, and in turn eligible for between \$25,000 and \$40,000 in grants from this federal relief funding. (The grants would be prorated if less than two parking spaces are needed).

Since the parklets program has been overwhelmingly popular with local residents, this will allow the current parklets to be converted to a more permanent and structurally sound set-up which is both safe and aesthetically pleasing — as well as support the local businesses impacted by the effects of the pandemic.

Bidding goodbye

Working Together for the West Valley

One of the South Bay's best attributes is our diverse population. With so many different faiths and cultural traditions, this time of year is a feast of celebration. Diwali, India's festival of lights, started us off in late October. Hanukkah, Christmas, and Kwanzaa are now just around the corner.

The holidays are an apt time to reflect on our bounty, as well as give thought to those who are in need - to the good works and kindnesses we can offer, and to what we can do to make the year ahead an even better one, for all.

This is also a time when many ofusstoptoreflectontheyear past and what we've been able to accomplish, setting the stage to pursue exciting goals in the year ahead.

This year at the County, we've made lasting progress on issues related to public health and safety, affordable housing, food insecurity, education, and recreation – for folks in my district (District Five), as well as countywide. I'm grateful once again for the many civic and community partners who made it possible to tackle these, and many other issues too big for one person, one group, or one city alone. Highlights include:

• MedAssist: an essential and easy-to-apply-for program that covers the cost of life-saving medications for qualifying residents who have been diagnosed with diabetes, asthma, and severe allergies.

- Mental health: development of accessible and affordable outpatient mental health services for middle income residents, as well as a Mental Health Systems Navigator program to help people find the right path to treatment, and then stay on it.
- MetroEd: funding for the Metropolitan Education District's new programs in health care and electric vehicles will help prepare even more high school students and adults for college and in-demand technical careers.
- Montalvo Arts Center: funding to help the popular historic park and arts center expand community access.
- Park-It Market: continuing support for the West Valley Community Services mobile food pantry - the bright blue "bookmobile for groceries" – which stops in Campbell, Cupertino, and other locations, benefitting seniors, students, and families who have barriers to transportation.
- Wildfire protection: expansion of the Santa Clara County Central Fire Protection District's Pre-Fire Management and Wildfire Resilience program will help individual residents and communities in the district – the cities of Cupertino, Los Gatos, Monte Sereno, a portion of Saratoga, and unincorporated


lands in western Santa Clara County – create and maintain defensible space.

As I think about the accomplishments of 2022, I'm mindful that so much of the work we do at the County comes to fruition over time. In November, for example, the initial steps were taken to locate a health clinic on the west side - the first in the County's 172-year history. We'll spend the next year developing a formal proposal.

On so many fronts, we need to do more and we need to do it faster. There's much to look forward to in 2023! Wishing you and yours a healthy and joyful holiday season.

City Council & Planning Commission News



It's the end of the year, which is a great time to look back at the changes we've made, as well as what's coming up next.

Locally, we've sent Campbell's Plan for Housing to the state, gotten their comments, and should have sent our reply back by the time this goes to print. We've developed a lot of our Residential Standards for Multifamily Housing, and we'll be returning to developing our General Plan soon. All three projects are on target to be completed next March.

While we've made progress on our plans, the city's challenges have grown. The point-in-time count of homeless people in Campbell has roughly tripled since 2019. The median rent for a onebedroom apartment has risen nearly twenty percent, to over \$2,500. Home prices are up 7.8%, to \$1.7 million on average, bringing home ownership, or housing of any kind, further out of reach for people who aren't already housed. Campbell has issued building permits for few new homes this year, sometimes only one or two a month.

This has been a tremendous year on the state level. The state's Department of Housing and Community Development has applied a much stricter standard to cities, and the legislature has passed a bevy of new laws. AB 2011, the Affordable Housing and High Road Jobs Act, will enable the construction of affordable housing using well-paid labor in disused commercial areas. AB 2097 prevents cities from establishing minimum parking requirements near transit, which applies to roughly half of Campbell. If we want to regulate parking going forward, we'll have to do so by establishing permit programs, parking meters, or other management programs.

Regionally, the Santa Clara Valley Transit Authority is in

the process of planning their "Visionary Network" as well as their more-concrete Valley Transportation Plan 2050. Campbell is home to three light rail stations and three rapid bus lines (the 26, 60, and 61), so this is very relevant to us. They've also established a Bike Superhighway plan to design and build a set of bike paths and protected bike lanes crisscrossing Santa Clara County. Nearby cities like San Mateo have established master plans for bike networks to allow safe bike travel within the city. Campbell has the Los Gatos Creek Trail, some painted bike lanes, and some buffered or separated lanes.

Thank you to the City Council for appointing me, and thank you to everyone reading this for following along. I look forward to continuing to report on land use in Campbell.

Black Panther 2 – C

This was doomed from the start due to tragic real life circumstances. Wakanda is grieving from the loss of T'Challa when Namor and his underwater people rise up as potential adversaries. Centering the story around the death of the Black Panther and the grief that mirrored what was felt in real life was an understandable choice. Unfortunately, this sequel has many problems including weak writing, questionable story lines and Namor being significantly less interesting than Killmonger.

The Fablemans – **B**

Legend Steven Spielberg's personal coming-of-age story about a young boy who falls in love with cinema and film-making at an early age while growing up in the 1950s/1960s. The main character of Sammy Fableman no doubt represents a young Spielberg growing up with Michelle Williams and Paul Dano playing fictional versions of his parents and Seth Rogan as the funny and charming family friend. The acting and characterization are superb while the story is endearing.

Glass Onion: A Knives Out Story – B-

A marked improvement over the first but still plagued by predictability. The sequel to Knives Out sees Daniel Craig's detective attending a murder-mystery party hosted by Edward Norton's Elon Musk-like billionaire on his private island. The attendees are old friends of his and include Dave Bautista, Kate Hudson, Leslie Odom Jr., Katheryn Hahn, and Jessica Henwick. The premise and set up are fun but the payoff is disappointing.

The Menu – B-

A surprisingly entertaining dark comedy horror film that is greatly benefited by its strong ensemble cast. Nicholas Hoult plays a food enthusiast who takes his date (Anna Taylor-Joy) to a highly exclusive and expensive restaurant on a remote island run by Chef (Ralph Fiennes). Only the obscenely wealthy can afford this experience, and the Chefhas special surprises in store tonight for these guests which include rich businessmen, former actors, and top food critics.

Strange World – C-

A cliched family adventure animated film heavily inspired by Jules Vernon's

"Journey to the Center of the Earth." The story is bland, the characterization is thin and the humor can be cringe. Jake Gyllenhaal, Gabriel Union, Lucy Liu and Dennis Quaid provide their voice talents.

She Said - C+

Based on the real life story of the NY Times reporters (played by Carey Mulligan and Zoe Kazan) who broke the October 2017 Harvey Weinstein story that started the Me Too movement and led to his downfall. 
They had the words and music, but they needed a

DIG IT...with SAM

Getting ready for winter

As winter fast approaches, it is time to get everything in order so that when it finally does arrive, the garden is ready for whatever it brings.

First things first: Take an inventory - what is happening? Does it feel like fall yet? False falls and springs have tormented gardeners for centuries. Here are some simple vet practical ideas to get your garden ready to survive winter in Northern California whatever that brings.

CLEAN UP - It is important to remember that fungus hides and insects over-winter in decaying organic material. Put leaves in compost pile and keep the lawn and garden beds clear of debris and weeds.

FERTILIZE - Fertilizers containing higher percentages of Phosphorus and potash help plants recover faster from freezes. Winter crops use more of these nutrients. It is best not to fertilize anything after November, with the exception of winter plants and certain stone fruits.

LAWNS - thatch and aerate if needed. Fall is the best time to re-do lawns or plant new ones. It is also a good opportunity to eliminate grass altogether and replace with mulch and/or drought tolerant plants. Fertilize cool season lawns or plant perennial rye seed in existing warm season lawn for instant green all winter long. Other cool season grasses include tall and red fescue along with Kentucky bluegrass. A blend of both warm and cool season will provide good all year around green. Warm season grasses include Bermuda, St. Augustine and buffalo grass.

FRUIT TREES - Fruit for next year's crop was determined shortly after the last harvest. Trees are taking up nutrients NOW for next year's growth and regular watering will encourage fruit production. Remove the mummies from fruit and nut trees along with any leaf debris. Clean up under the trees to prevent peach leaf curl. Fertilize pear and plums. Deep water citrus and all fruit trees. The Master Gardeners have a free online f ruit tree calendar that is very useful that can be found at MasterGardeners.org. Summer prune for shape & size. Winter prune for fruit. Remember that apples produce fruit on "spurs" so avoid removing spurs unless absolutely necessary.

ROSES - prune lightly for shape and to control diseases. Roses grown in more severe winter climates appreciate a hard prune and mulch cover on roots but not in Santa Clara County. Do not feed roses now as they need to rest.

VEGETABLES – Winter crops seeded now will be ready to put into the ground in about 6 weeks. Direct sow lettuce, spinach and peas in succession to allow for a longer harvest. Purchasing

starts from your local nursery will give a head start on food production.

PERENNIALS - divide and cut back. It is not recommended that perennials be disturbed when they are in flower and cutting back in the winter will encourage more blossoms in the spring

ORNAMENTALS - Thin camellias for larger flowers this winter and spring. Keep plants free of dust to help eliminate habitat for spider mites.

TOOLS - Disinfect tools using household cleaners containing bleach or Lysol. A 10% bleach solution is recommended. To clean shovels and other large garden tools, fill a bucket with sand and mix in some used kitchen oil. Inserting the tools into the bucket will help remove dirt and provide a rust barrier . Never use motor oil.

WEED CONTROL - Use a pre-emergent such as corn gluten. Beware it will keep all seeds from germinating - including flower and vegetables. If laying down mulch, place a few pieces of newspaper or cardboard underneath to create a barrier to help prevent weeds.

It's a good time to sow California wild flower seeds, but not if a pre-emergent for weed control has been applied. It's not too late to plant daffodils or other bulbs.

She is known for her passion on environmental issues, and hasbeendeeplyinvolvedover the years with Silicon Valley Clean Energy, our local community choice energy agency which helps deliver clean renewable energy (at lower rates than PG&E) to Campbell and Santa Clara County residents.

Paul Resnikoff brought invaluable experience to the Council from his accounting background, keeping us honest by ensuring that the numbers added up. In his comments, he often brought up new questions and aspects which others had not considered. Paul was always hardworking, often taking on council committee assignments — such as negotiating contracts for garbage collection — which can be thankless, but are essential to the city's ability to provide basic services. He could often be found volunteering for many of the foundations and volunteer organizations which make Campbell a special place to live. Though I've used the past tense in describing their contributions, I know that both will continue to be involved with the Campbell community. In addition, their decisions will have an impact on Campbell for generations to come, through their voices on the Measure O project, our Housing Element, our park renovations, and many more.

Liz, Paul, and I — not to mention the other members of the Council — often came at issues from different perspectives and experiences. Yet I had many more votes in agreement with both Liz and Paul than in disagreement. This is not because we necessarily started from the same place, but because through their thoughtful comments, questions, and discussion, all of us arrived at – hopefully — a better and wiser conclusion than we would have individually. Both of them were thoughtful and open-minded, yet always passionate about serving the broader Campbell community. Though I will miss their contributions to the Council, I am grateful for their years of service from which we have all benefited.

CAMPBELL FIRE REPORT...



Type I

October 5 - Outside Fire -Area of W Hamilton Ave and Munster Dr Firefighters were dispatched to a report of a sofa on fire in front of a building. On arrival, Engine 81 found a sofa on fire, with Campbell PD officers using fire extinguishers to keep the fire from spreading. Firefighters extinguished the couch fire using a firehose and conducted an investigation of the scene.

October 8 - Structure Fire - Area of Winchester Blvd and Hacienda Ave Firefighters from Campbell, Los Gatos, and Cupertino, along with Campbell Police Officers, were dispatched to a report of a structure fire in a commercial building. On arrival, firefighters from the Sunnyoaks Fire Station (Engine 80) found a building with smoke coming from the Heating Ventilation and Air Conditioning System. A bystander reported that someone may have been inside of the structure. Firefighters worked aggressively to perform a rapid search of the fire occupancy and to control the fire. Firefighters were able to determine that there was no one inside of the building, and were able to save much of the fire occupancy as well as adjacent occupancies in the same building. Firefighters performed salvage operations during the firefight, then transitioned to overhaul and investigation.

October 11 - Hazardous Materials Incident - In the area of Railway and Kennedy Ave Campbell Firefighters were requested by Campbell Police Department to assist with identifying an unknown substance. On arrival, firefighters requested County Fire's Type I Hazardous Materials team to assist with safe identification of the substance. Firefighters assisted law enforcement without incident, no further information is available from SCCFD. **October 11 - Hazardous Materials Incident - In** the area of Union Ave and **Apricot Ave** SCCFD was dispatched to a request to support Campbell PD with a possible hazardous materials incident. Resources from Campbell, Los Gatos, and Cupertino responded, including County Fire's



fighters worked with law enforcement officers to safely address concerns related to this event. No further information is available from Santa Clara County Fire regarding this incident.

October 11 - Structure Fire - In the area of Millich **Dr and W Hamilton**

Ave Engine 81, responding from the fire station located at Duncanville and Union, was dispatched to a report of an extinguished fire in the pool house of an apartment complex. On arrival, firefighters observed smoke coming from the attic of a structure. The Engine 81 captain upgraded the response to a "full first", summoning additional resources from Campbell, Los Gatos, Saratoga and Cupertino. Firefighters initiated an aggressive attack of the fire and were able to prevent spread to neighboring buildings. Firefighters remained to perform salvage, overhaul, and investigation operations.

October 21 - Gas Investigation - In the area of Kennedy Ave and Winchester Blvd While providing station coverage to the City of Campbell, Engine 78, along with additional resources from Campbell and Los Gatos, was dispatched to a report of a gas leak in a public assembly building. On arrival, firefighters were met by an employee who assisted by providing access to the facility. Firefighters conducted a thorough investigation with atmospheric monitoring devices and determined that there was no hazard present. **October 31 - Vegetation** Fire- In the area of Bascom Ave and Hamilton Ave County Fire was dispatched to a report of a vegetation near a business. Responding from a fire station in Campbell, firefighters found a 20'x20' fire burning in vegetation. Firefighters quickly extinguished the fire and thoroughly overhauled the scene to prevent re-ignition. An arson investigator responded to conduct an investigation of the scene.

SANTA'S CHRISTMAS FLIGHT

As Christmas approaches air traffic control organisations around the world are making their preparations for "Santa One" and its round the world flight from the North Pole. If you plan flying this Christmas, then I do have some tips for you. First, let us look at Santa's preparations.

Despite the serious business of air traffic control, many organisations worldwide enter into the spirit of the season by making space on their websites for kids to find out how they give Santa a safe flight.

In Australia they advise that Santa's sleigh is fitted with Automatic Dependent Surveillance-Broadcast (ADS-B), a satellite-based technology that broadcasts its call-sign, position, altitude, speed and other information twice every second and allows air traffic controllers to know exactly where he is at any time.

Santa also flies 'User Preferred Routes' while in Australian airspace. These allow Santa to take advantage of tailwinds to conserve the reindeer's energy and avoid tiring headwinds that slow them down.

The authorities in Canada and the USA have cooperated in approving and certifying Santa Claus's new ultra efficient sleigh for his Christmas Eve flight. Technology advances have allowed the sleigh to be outfitted with new satellite-based NextGen technology which will provide more efficient routing and decreased traveling time, thereby reducing fuel use. Santa One will use far fewer carbon emissions than Santa's previous sleighs and what's more, and the new technology will ensure a faster delivery time than last year. Transport Canada is responsible for inspecting Santa's sleigh and its safety systems as well as administering regular medical tests in order for Santa to keep his Canadian flight license. Air Transport Canada claims the right

New technology allows air traffic controllers to see a more precise location of Santa One. This knowledge of Santa's exact location will allow the controllers to direct Santa much faster, cutting out inefficiencies in the flight plan. This means Santa gets to spend more time eating cookies and drinking milk and the reindeer need less hay to fuel their flight, thus reducing carbon emissions.

Rudolph's red nose has been outfitted with avionics that will broadcast Santa One's position via satellites to air traffic controllers around the world with improved accuracy, integrity and reliability. Santa will also have a new cockpit display to show his precise location in relation to other aircraft, bad weather and terrain, making his Christmas Eve flight safer all around.

The FAA gives Santa Claus and his crew special permission every year to fly thousands of short and long haul flights. The new NextGen technology will also allow Santa to maintain cruising altitude for as long as possible before making a continuous descent into cities and towns around the world. And as we all know, long-haul flights are much more efficient than short haul flights.

NORAD - the North American Aerospace Defense Command has a special tracking Santa website which is active throughout





SALVATION ARMY PROGRAMS By Benjamin Noel

The Salvation Army has served Silicon Valley since 1884. The locations and programs have changed through the decades, but the organization is always "Doing the Most Good". To learn more about this organization, Nancy, the editor, and I went down to The Salvation Army, on 4th Street San Jose to talk with Major Dan and Major Doreen, who run the Silicon Valley branch. We learned about the offerings of the organization as we toured their facility, and also learned that they need donations and volunteers to continue providing services to the community.

The Salvation Army hosts a daily senior lunch from 9am to 1pm, serving 155 meals on average. As part of the program, from 9am-12pm seniors participate in tai-chi classes, listen to program for working men, provides men with housing for two years while they attend programs, preparing them to move into their own room or house.

The 4th Street location for the Salvation Army, home of the worship center, senior lunch program, and home to the Emmanuel

House, was built in the 60s, for a 60s San Jose. Just over 200,000 called San Jose home then, and the Salvation Army's facilities provided sufficient support for those in need.

Much has changed in the six decades since. The deindustrialization of the 70s, Reagan's Section 8 cutbacks, and the rapidly

cars, or alongside creeks in the city of San Jose. The county is in need of more beds in shelters, as certain populations fall through the gaps in traditional shelters. On any given night there are currently only 6-10 beds available for single women.

Salvation Army Silicon Valley is running a capital campaign to fund projects to bridge the gap in offerings provided to the homeless

community. Major Doreen explained the projects the Silicon Valley Salvation Army has in store, but elaborated that "funding is huge," as without the funding, none of these projects are possible.

In the first phase, they will upgrade the Emmanuel house facility, allowing them to house families as well as single women. In the second phase, the Salvation Army campus will be upgraded, as they add job training facilities, including a culinary school to the facility. Their final project will be to add housing in their back parking lot aimed at serving aged out foster youth, and other groups that aren't served by other shelters in the area. The Salvation Army runs programs year-round, and with 25 employees, the organization needs volunteers to continue serving the community to the fullest. There are a wide range of volunteer opportunities, ranging from bagging donated goods, about volunteer opportunities with the Salvation Army, contact Liwayway Gimenez at *liwaywaygimenez@usw. salvationarmy.org* or (408) 282-1165.

guest speakers, but most popularly, play ping-pong. Many of the seniors bring their own paddles. They are not messing around. During the holiday times, this program feeds hundreds of seniors a day, with a grand 290 meals served on Thanksgiving day.

The Emmanuel House, run by the Salvation Army, has provided a sober living facility to the county for 50 years. The house provides overnight housing, and meals for homeless residents of the county. Emmanuels Bridge Program, a transitional housing increasing real estate prices left thousands unable to afford housing. In addition, the deinstitutionalization of mental health in the late 70s left many patients unable to seek or afford care on their own. All these problems have fed the growing homeless population

Today's San Jose is currently unable to support its at-need population. Home to north of 1,000,000 people, the needs of the city, and the larger area, are higher than they've ever been. As of 2016, 4,000 individuals lived in their
