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

HIGHLAND DANCERS AT THE BUNNY & BONNETS' PARADE



Contrary to its name, the San Jose School of Highland Dancing ("SJSHD") is located in Campbell. Norine Harmon founded the school in the 1960's in San Jose, and after her retirement in 2005, Susanne MacDougall took over SJSHD, moved the school to Campbell, and kept its name. The school's hardwood dance floor was sawed down the middle so that it could fit through the studio door, loaded atop a flatbed truck, transported, and reassembled in its new home in the MacDougall garage, thus converting the garage into a dance studio. Susanne says she took over SJSHD because

she felt it was important to keep the school operating, even though her family can no longer park their cars in the garage. Susanne's enthusiasm for the school is reflected in its numbers: SJSHD has grown from to six students to approximately 35. During the pandemic students attended via Zoom, and some students, particularly those away at college, still attend remotely.

Happily coincidentally with SJSHD's move to Campbell, Fred DeMarse, a certified Highland dance teacher and judge who has competed and performed throughout Europe and North America, was relocating to the Bay

Area and joined the teaching staff at the school. Susanne's daughter, Catherine Mac-Dougall, began Highland dancing when she was 6 and is a certified Highland dance instructor on staff at SJSHD. The third dance instructor is Katie Krull, who began dancing when she was 9 and earned her Highland dance teaching certificate in 2020.

SJSHD welcomes students of all ages beginning with ages 5 and 6 in its "Primary" class through adults with or without dance experience. Some students choose to enter Highland dance competitions; other students choose to dance for recreational reasons. SJSHD performs throughout the community, most recently at the Campbell School of Innovation. "Just contact us," Susanne said. Their website is www.sanjosehighlanddance.com.

When I asked about the kilts, Susanne informed me that she sews many of them. The wool is mainly from Scotland, sometimes in the wearer's family tartan. The purpose of the kilt



determines the weight of its wool: dancers prefer a lighter weight kilt vs. the heavier kilt a Highland band member would wear. In addition to being a seamstress and a Highland dancer, Susanne is also a knitter, a writer, and a singer in the Orchard City Community Chorus. She was born in San Francisco and has an interesting notation on her passport: "First Transatlantic Baby". Her mother, a sailor, put Susanne in a box at the age of 3 months and shipped her (via caring flight attendants) to Susanne's aunt in Denmark where she lived for 30 years before settling in the U.S. and marrying a musician. Susanne's husband is a drummer in a piping band, and their son is in the band as well.

Each November the San Jose School of Highland Dancing holds its popular "extravaganza" at the Starbright Theatre in the Kirkwood Plaza. This year it will present "A Scottish Nutcracker". After seeing last fall's delightful "Scottish Wizard of Oz", I can sincerely recommend buying tickets early to this year's production. When the 23rd annual Bunnies and Bonnets Easter Parade steps out onto Camp-

Parade steps out onto Campbell Avenue on March 30, it will once again be joyfully led by dancers from the San Jose School of Highland Dancing accompanied by The Pipes and Drums of the Santa Clara County Sheriff's Office. Come and see this parade!

Just a Little Bit of History

February's photo was taken of the decorative vent at the top of the Downing Building at 383-393 East Campbell Ave. This California Mission Revival style building was constructed in 1905 and is the second oldest commercial structure in Campbell. While waiting for this building to be completed, Mr. Downing sold fresh and salted meats at Downing's Meat Market, with fresh fruit and vegetables when in season.

The Downing building is typical of the stores built in small towns in early 1900's. Upper floors served as housing quarters with store fronts on the street level and originally this was a bakery and an ice cream shop. At one time the upper floor was used as the law office of Richard Wallace Morton,



who became the first mayor of Campbell in 1952.

mous KOME rock radio DJ Gene Mitchell passing away. For those of you who remember those days of the 70's and 80's, he was an iconic figure in the bay area music



The corner of 2nd street and Campbell Ave was originally built as a Stoddard's Brewhouse and Eatery that included Villa Ragusa's real estate upstairs as well. Stoddard's didn't last long, and most locals remember the location as the Sonoma Chicken Coup. That lasted several years, and later became the Campbell Brewing Company, once again utilizing Stoddard's large brewing vessels that had remained there. Not having much interest on the food side of things, the brewery owners farmed out the restaurant side to various food businesses that struggled there that included Iguana's, The Pit, (a variation of the old Hickory Pit) and later an Italian restaurant called II Sogno (Vin Santos in Willow Glen owner's creation), but couldn't bounce back after the pandemic and permanently closed. A couple years ago it was remodeled to become the now popular Wild Rose restaurant and eatery.

LOCAL PRESIDENT ROOSEVELT'S 1903

VISIT TO CAMPBELL...

You may have heard about the time President Teddy Roosevelt visited Campbell in 1903 — but unless you caught Campbell Historical Museum Supervisor Kerry Perkins and her talk at the 132nd Early Settlers Luncheon, you probably haven't heard the full story.

The Early Settlers Luncheon — now officially the longest continually-running event in California — celebrates the history and heritage of Campbell every year, while creating a welcoming community space for both familiar and new faces to come and take part. At this year's luncheon, which was held on Presidents' Day, February 19th, Kerry Perkins put together what is likely the most comprehensive account yet of President Roosevelt's visit.

Perkins contextualized the event by explaining that it was part of a whistle stop tour by the relatively new president. The Campbell community, led in particular by J. Fred Smith and the local Grange organization, invited Roosevelt to visit and plant a tree, in hopes of promoting a new site for a high school, which was needed as the community grew in population. For a president who prioritized youth, education, and nature, it was a perfect fit.

As Perkins shared, the logistics of inviting, and preparing for, a presidential visit were incredibly complex. Yet the day came, with Roosevelt visiting a dizzying array of cities from Santa Cruz county up through the Santa Clara valley.

At the conclusion of his brief remarks, Roosevelt shared what are still words we can all live by: "It is a peculiar pleasure to me to address the children. I have but just one word to say to you; it is something I should say to your elders also. I believe in play and I believe in work. I want to see you play hard while you play, and when you work do not play at all."



TAX SEASON

As the tax deadline approaches, there are a few of you out there who might be dreading the task of gathering all of your documents to hand over to your tax accountant.

It can really be a painful experience if you've been avoiding having a system that you keep up to date throughout the year.

The good news is that you don't need to have a sophisticated method to stay on top of things. A few simple changes in your habits, a central place to store your data, and consistent management and filing will do the trick.

Not only will having a good financial system save you time preparing for your taxes, it may also save you money. If you have a business, you could be missing out on some valuable write offs, which could affect your taxable income. This could result in tax savings and possibly even a refund.

What exactly do you need for your system?

Ideally, you want to give your tax accountant a summary of how much money you earned and spent for the year in predetermined categories. Spending categories should follow

the guidelines listed in the IRS instructions.

If you have your own business or side hustle, there will be more expense categories. Speak with your tax accountant or check it out at irs.gov.

The best way to track this information is in a spreadsheet, or if you have many transactions you can use a financial software such as Quickbooks.

If you are a W2 only employee and have no business income or expenses, track you're spending in a spreadsheet or using an app. Keep all of your documents in electronic files. You can create folders for each year and category and download your documents to the folders. You can also use paper folders if you prefer and keep the hardcopy documents there. The method itself is not as important as the consistency of doing it.

Create a method that makes sense to you, is not too time consuming, and ultimately gives your tax accountant what they need to file your taxes on time. It really should not take more than 20-30 minutes to prepare for your appointment.

If you're like me, you've noticed what appears to be an increasing divide amongst our fellow Americans. In recent years, it's gotten to the point of outright concern as I see members of my own family unable to sit at the same table, simply over who they might have voted for during the last election. No longer will you find two tables at Thanksgiving; one reserved for adults and the other children. Now it's more common to see those two tables separated by political party preference. I refuse to sit at either table and instead will take my plate of food piled heavily with mom's delicious green bean casserole out to the porch. I look across the street at my neighbors homes and my next thoughts linger on where this division began.

If we delve into the history of our nation you'd see that our Founding Fathers harbored apprehensions regarding the emergence of a two-party system, fearing that it could foster division and hinder effective governance. They warned against factions, as written by James Madison in Federalist Paper No. 10. The polarization and gridlock inherent within such a system were seen as threats to national unity and stability. They advocated for a diverse range of voices and viewpoints to be represented in government, fostering compromise and consensusbuilding. Despite their concerns, the two-party system eventually became the standard in American politics... god forbid you "throw your vote away" on a third-party candidate!

Over two centuries had passed since their warnings, as I found myself casting my very first ballot which happened to coincide with the controversial 2000 Presidential election. This is where I first felt the nation plunged into chaos and division, marked by the contested results in Florida. The dispute centered on flawed ballots, confusing voting mechanisms, and accusations of voter suppression. The contentious recount process, punctuated by legal battles and partisan fervor, polarized the country along political lines. Ultimately, the Supreme Court's decision to halt the recount in Bush v. Gore handed victory to George W. Bush, inflaming tensions and deepening distrust in the electoral process. The aftermath left scars on the American psyche which would only grow as the years passed and arguably even more contentious elections took place.

Technology played its part in driving a bigger wedge between us as the majority of the populace were now able to easily access the internet on their mobile devices. With the miracle that is instant global communication in the palm of your hand, also came the dangers of misinformation, disinformation, and the algorithm that keeps you in a bubble of your own thoughts and opinions. Emotions often run wild and empathy disappears because looking through that screen you don't feel like you're interacting with a real human being.

MARCH COUNTY UPDATE

A century ago, Santa Clara County acquired 400 acres of rolling foothills between Saratoga and Cupertino, laying the foundation for the modern-day Santa Clara County Parks system.

By the end of 1924, Santa Clara County had its first public park — what is now Stevens Creek County Park. Today, our parks system includes 28 locations encompassing more than 52,000 acres set aside for recreation and habitat protection.

At my request, the Board of Supervisors recently recognized Steven's Creek Park's centennial milestone, honoring a beloved park that grew to include more than 1,000 acres of woodlands, meadows, and canyons.

Stevens Creek Park truly highlights the West Valley's varied and natural beauty — home to a wide range of wildlife, including deer, bobcats, coyotes, and numerous bird species. It's also a great example of how our County parks are always evolving to meet the recreational needs of current and future generations.

In 1935, the Santa Clara Valley Water Conservation District purchased 171.5 acres adjacent to the County's initial purchase of parkland to develop a reservoir. The Stevens Creek dam was completed in 1936. Over the years, additional acreage and improvements meant that Stevens Creek Park today is a place where people go to picnic, connect with nature, tour historic sites, and participate in interpretive programs. There are miles of trails for hiking, bicycling, and horseback riding, and facilities to enjoy archery, disc golf, boating, fishing, and horseshoe tossing.

The Board's commendation honors this particular park — because it was the first, and also, because at its core, that wise and forward-thinking purchase of property blossomed into so much more.

In 1956 the County's growing population led to the establishment of our Department of Parks and Recreation. The acquisition of new lands and expansion of the regional parks and trails network accelerated when Santa Clara County voters approved the Park Charter Fund in 1972. This funding helped create one of the largest and most diverse regional park systems in California. That is a very, very good thing.

Our County's iconic viewshed — the sweeping ridgelines, emerald green this time of year — is valuable just in itself. Our protected lands also maintain a rich and diverse habitat for animals and plants, help safeguard our water supply, and give residents and visitors a place to recharge. Parks are integral to our County's identity and allure.

As we have come to learn all too well when it comes to land use, there will always be development pressures or some alternative use that someone proposes. Some are worthy and necessary — affordable housing for one. It's a balancing act. Constant vigilance may sound overly dramatic, but the history of our Valley is a reminder that once open space is gone, it's probably gone forever.

So, Happy 100th Birthday to Stevens Creek and our wonderful parks system! I hope you will soon find the opportunity to walk, think, picnic, or play in one of our County's many fine open spaces.

City Council & Planning Commission News

At the February 13 meeting, the Planning Commission approved a taproom with a roof deck and live music on the small lot at 48 Civic Center Drive. It's at the northeast corner of downtown, just across from the library. This oddly-shaped lot was created in the 1970s when the downtown loop streets were established, and has occasionally been used for parking, but has mostly remained as it is now, a small grass lot, for the last fifty years.

We received five letters on the subject (as well as having received in-person comment at preliminary meetings), three of which were strongly negative, one positive, and one neutral. Despite this, the Commission approved the development, and I voted to do so. The public might be wondering why.

The Planning Commission's duty is to integrate public feed-back, the city's rules, and the good of the city as a whole. Sometimes these things conflict; for example, the public response clearly wanted us to mandate more parking for the taproom. However, state law prohibits parking mandates within a half-mile of a light rail station, in this case the Downtown Campbell station

about seven hundred feet away. Apart from the fact that there's no room for parking on the site, and parking mandates would effectively force it to remain an unused lot, the city literally cannot comply with the public's wishes.

More broadly, these are three people who are quite motivated, but the taproom will serve much more than three people, the vast majority of whom aren't even aware of this process right now. We have to balance their interests as well, even though the public comment process naturally privileges the voices of incumbents over newcomers, and negative comments over positive ones.

None of this means that we don't take input from the public seriously. For example, this new building will create a pedestrian alley, and the Police Department is working with the owners of both buildings to make sure that there's lighting, cameras, and a safety plan there. The city will be enforcing time and sound-level limits on the live music. And the city's Capital Improvement Plan includes safety improvements for the crossing between Civic Cen-

ter and Harrison, to the north of the project.

Compromise is essential when juggling the needs and desires of multiple parties. There's no rote answer to these questions, but it helps to hear and empathize with people, even when you don't give them what they want.





out is played backwards, so it sounds like it's fading in - getting louder up to the point of the initial strum.



ALL WHAT'S GOING ON

What a soggy, wet, windy and wild couple of weeks we have had. Trees are down everywhere and our gardens show the wear and tear. As I look out my window, I see bright yellow daffodils poking out all around and brilliant red amaryllis ready to pop! The season seems as confused as I do.

Mother Nature is sure full of surprises. But what is a befuddled gardener to do? It is too early for spring but we want sun and clear days. Warm nights would be an added bonus. Not allowing for Punxsutawney Phil's observation, I am somewhat skeptical that Old Man Winter isn't through with us yet.

It is time again to evaluate. Where are we now? What

worked last year and what didn't? Did that new variety of tomato you planted meet your expectations or are you ready to return to your old reliable variety? My personal favorite is Ace tomato, so I planted about a dozen seeds in January, put them on a warming matt and am pleased to know that when the soil warms, the days lengthen and nights stay pleasant, I can plant those seedlings and once again recall the day my Father introduced me to his personal favorite.

My advice, put on some warm clothes and rubber boots, if you have them, and step outside. What exactly is going on? Are the snails and slugs making their way to your lettuce and spinach?

Are the earwigs raising havor with everything else. Too cold for aphids but be on the lookout.

Because I have lived in Santa Clara County for a very long time, I know that spring arrives when I start finding spittle bugs on everything. Spittle bugs are those white clumps of foam that cling to most everything in the garden, but especially the soft leafy perennials just making their way out of dormancy.

The easiest way to manage spittle bugs is with a blast of water from your garden hose. Inside that clump of foam lives a tiny green insect with a main goal to suck the life out of your plants. Once on the ground, they cannot

return to their perch and therefore, your problem is solved.

The other sucking pests, like snails and slugs, are just as easy to detect. Look for damage in the soft tissues of your tender plants. I have found that coffee grounds are a good deterrent when placed on the soil surrounding affected plants. Research has shown that caffeine can be fatal to slugs and snails. The old tried and true method of a shallow dish filled with beer is also an option, but I say, why waste the beer when a spoon of bread yeast in a basin of water will accomplish the same result.

Now as for those chewing insects such as earwigs, a

tuna-size can filled 2/3rds with soy sauce and a little cooking oil, will attract them, where they will promptly dive in for a drink and die. A little gruesome but this method will not harm your pets or wild birds.

Using rice hulls is a good way to manage water-logged areas in your garden. They can absorb a great deal of water as well as add organic material to your soil, a win win in my book. Make sure that those plants against your home and under eves are getting their fair share of water as well. Hold off fertilizing anything until the soil and daytime temperatures warm. Most fertilizers wont activate until then.

We can always be Irish for a day come the 17th. My mother always threw a big sitdown bash for 15-20. Amazing that she was half Spanish, half Italian. Green martinis. green beer, platters of steaming corned beef, cabbage, carrots, onions, and potatoes cooked in the corned beef iuices. Assorted mustards. horseradish, with Irish soda bread, Kerrygold butter, with a big platter of the first spring asparagus with evoo, and truffle aioli. Finish off with those little See's divinity potatoes, and mugs of Irish coffee.

I have had some magical times through the years at Harringtons, and Buena Vista, but none more so than the flamboyant celebrations through the years at CB Hannegan's, starting early and going well into the night. Oysters, clams, whole pigs, chickens, turkeys, ribs, sausages, and all the trimmings. Bagpipes and song going on forever. Sure miss John, Chris, and Bill Callahan.



During this festive holiday, support your local watering holes like Sushi Confidential, Katie Blooms, Courts, OCK, Be Steak A, Off the hook, Aqui, Vesper, Forthright, Capers, Wild Rose, 360ey6, Locanda Sorrento, Khartoum, Coach's, Cardiff, Distrito Federal, Water Tower, Cedar Room, Rock Bottom, Pacific Catch, Armellino's, the Garret, Little Lou's, Casa Lupe, Luna, just to name a few.

My friend Phil Cosentino, and his wife Jean, have a divine little 4 acre farm, that grows hundreds of varieties of the most explosively flavorful fruits, and vegetables ever. J and P farm, certainly worth a detour off Kooser. We were once in the garden, searching for fava beans, and discussed childhood kitchen memories. He spoke of a resplendent spring stew made with fresh picked vegetables from the garden in early spring.

COSENTINO FAMILY SPRING STEW

- A dozen or so fresh asparagus spears
- 2 dozen shelled fava beans
- 2 bunches scallions
- 1 cup baby shelled fresh peas
- 12 or so baby artichokes
- 6-8 cloves of garlic
- 1 Tbsp. fresh chopped herbs. (I love tarragon, thyme, rosemary)
- Olive oil of good lineage
- Chicken or vegetable broth (water will do)
- Salt and ground pepper
- 1 Tbsp butter to finish.

After artichokes are peeled down to light green, simmer for 20 minutes in salted water. Cool and slice in half vertically. Steam asparagus for 2 minutes, cool, and slice into 2 inch chunks. Sauté sliced green onion in olive oil. Add everything else, a splash of white wine if you desire, and simmer until vegetables are tender to the bite. Finish with butter and serve. Great with crusty bread, a chunk of good cheese like Toma, some olives, and a glass of vino. Cheers, and Slainte' ... Billy

STORMY WEATHER

Airline travel can still be full of mystery for many with its own unique language and terminology, much of it designed to confuse and fool you!

You may wonder why so many naval terms are used in aviation. This goes back to the early days of flight. Left and right are port and starboard and aircraft are referred to as ships. Distances are still calculated in nautical miles.

But it is in the world of airline marketing that has its own wonderful terms they use to try and convince us that a product is superior than it seems or a change for the worse is in fact one for the better.

A change due to "Passenger Demand" can often mean "We closed the route the passengers really liked to put them on the route we couldn't fill to make much more money"

"Increased Capacity" usually means they have cut the legroom to cram more seats in to the aircraft, and then offer seats with a little more space at an increased fee.

A simple economy class seat now comes in many sizes like Basic Economy, Economy, Economy Plus, Premium Economy etc. They'll charge you more for a window seat with no guarantee that the window will stay put, so keep that seat belt fastened at all times.

If an airline says they've increased the legroom for free they have probably taken out all the seats. Now, that's an interested concept to have all the passengers standing and strap-hanging. Just think how many they could cram in to a short flight.

If you hear of "A New Pricing Initiative" it probably means

that the fares are going up, and if "Restrictions Apply", yes the fares are still going up.

If an airline offered "Codeshare Convenience" they are doing it to make more money from you and then confuse you as to which terminal you do your check-in. Likewise a "Commercial Alliance" can mean you don't know who you are flying with or what you are flying in.

Beware of a "Fares War" because once the winner kills off the competition you can be sure they will put the fares back up. "Service Enhancements" usually means they have found a cheaper way of doing it.

"Special Fares" are ones with so many restrictions that you are bound to end up having to change your booking for a fee that can sometimes be more than the original fare. While most discounted fares are "non-refundable", in the USA changes can usually be made or the ticket canceled prior to departure and the money put to a future trip if booked at the time. However, with the change fee involved it may well be better to just throw away the old booking.

An "Improved Schedule" can mean they have made the flight time longer in the timetable so it improves their on-time performance.

Beware when an airline offers a "Direct Flight" to a destination. There is a fair chance that the aircraft will touch down somewhere en route and go through a change of aircraft so you have to get off. It is only the flight number that is direct.

I can never understand folk who pay for "priority Boarding". The aircraft is not going total off till everyone is on board!



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

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


