


Just a Little Bit of History

October's photo was taken of some ornate ceramic tile work on the front of the Grower's National Bank, currently home to 7 Stars Bar and Grill at 400 East Campbell Avenue. The building is a great example of adaptive reuse as it has been transformed into several different businesses over the years.

This Neoclassical building was constructed by B. O. Curry in 1920 as part of a "business block" development which consisted of five connected buildings in a row. It became home to the Grower's National Bank. The Grower's Bank was formed in late 1919 by Curry. Ralph H. Hyde and Frank C. Nelson were some of the original investors. A sign on the front indicates that at one time, this was the Mercantile Trust Bank. The building housed three different banks in the 1920's and then became a movie



theater for a short time. In the 1960's, it became the Gaslighter Theatre which performed vaudeville and melodramatic plays. It was very popular.



FALLEN OFFICER MEMORIAL TREE

At Christmas in the Park – San Jose Plaza de Cesar Chavez

In 2023, we lost 147 law enforcement officers and 26 police canines in the line of duty. As of Oct 29, 2024, we have lost 116 law enforcement officers and 18 police canines.



On December 3, 2024 the Silicon Valley Fraternal Order of Police, Lodge 52 will honor law enforcement officers and police K-9's nationwide who have lost their lives protecting the communities they serve. We have dedicated a specially decorated Christmas tree at the park honoring our fallen. Custom made etched glass ornaments with the officer's name, agency, and end of watch are inscribed on each one.

Our December program includes an inspirational benediction, music, a K-9 special guest, Cub Scout flag ceremony, and a bagpipe procession. Community, government, and business leaders, along with people from all walks of life join together with families and friends of the fallen officers to honor and acknowledge their courage and

selfless sacrifice. Volunteer ornament holders will follow the bagpiper to the tree at the end of the program and hang their fallen officer or K-9 ornament on the tree.

The ornaments, a small token of our appreciation, are then mailed home to the families of the fallen officers and K-9's.

Campbell Community Toy Program: Bringing Holiday Joy to Local Families for 40 Years

The holidays are a time for joy, celebration, and generosity. For four decades, the Campbell Community Toy Program has embodied these values, brightening the holiday season for families in the Campbell area. Established in 1984 by then Mayor Jane Kennedy, this program has grown into a community tradition, making it possible for children up through age 14 from families facing financial hardship to receive new toys, games, books, and other gifts each December.

Since its inception, the Toy Program has brought holiday cheer to tens of thousands of children, distributing an estimated \$1 million worth of toys and gifts. Local businesses, residents, and community groups have been instrumental in helping the Toy Program thrive, donating countless items to spread seasonal cheer.

Community Innovation and Resilience During the Pandemic

In 2020, the pandemic posed significant challenges to traditional tov collection methods. However, the Toy Program adapted creatively, launching Amazon Wish Lists that allowed people to order items online and have them shipped directly to the program. Another pandemic-friendly innovation was drive-up and drop-off donation events, making it easy and safe for people to contribute. These have continued as Fill-a-Truck events, held at local schools where children donate items appropriate for their age group.

One of the standout events is Santa Claus is Coming to Town—a festive, mobile celebration that has become a beloved tradition in Campbell. Santa, accompanied by local police and fire departments, tours Campbell neighborhoods on his makeshift sleigh, collecting donations and spreading joy along the way. This initiative continues to be a fun and effective way to gather donations and bring the holiday spirit to residents.

Making Spirits Bright: A **Festive Fundraising Tradition** Since 2018, Making Spirits **Bright**, an annual fundraising mixer, has been held at Darling Fischer Memorial Chapel in Downtown Campbell. This event is much more than just a fundraiser; it's a joyful celebration of community, charity, and holiday spirit. Guests enjoy food and drinks, live music, and the excitement of auctions-all in support of the Toy Program. The event would not be complete without a special appearance by Mr. and Mrs. Claus, bringing an extra touch of holiday magic.

CITY NEWS By Sergio Lopez

This column is written by Vice Mayor Sergio Lopez in an individual capacity and does not necessarily represent the views of the entire City Council, city staff, or the City of Campbell.

The November 2024 general election saw several important milestones for the City of Campbell. (I voted at the Campbell Community Center and am grateful to the local volunteers who came out to ensure residents could exercise their right to vote).

Locally, Terry Hines was elected to represent District 1, replacing Susan Landry, who is termed out at the end of the year. I was re-elected in District 2. And finally, Campbell voters overwhelmingly passed Measure K, a sales tax and a transient occupancy tax (a tax on hotels and motels). As of the writing of this column, the vote totals reflected nearly 72% support for Measure K. The funds raised from this measure will be used to shore up the city's budget and can also be allocated toward critical services such as public safety and infrastructure.

Outside of Campbell, other local bodies also saw change. On the Valley Transportation Authority (VTA) Board of Directors, longtime Santa Clara County Supervisor Cindy Chavez stepped down for a new position in New Mexico. After serving the past year as Vice Chair and closely collaborating with Supervisor Chavez on the major issues and projects VTA is tasked with, I was unanimously elected Chair of the Board upon her departure. This will be the first time since 2003 — over two decades — that a Campbell City Councilmember has held the leadership of VTA.

As Chair of the Board, my focus will be on ensuring accountability and transparency. VTA is tasked with one of the largest capital projects in the country, the BART Extension to Silicon Valley. During my time on the board, I have worked to lift up the voice of West Valley residents, such as supporting noise reduction measures for local highway corridors and exploring creative ways to increase local service. VTA has also been a strong ally to the city on local issues, including by awarding grants to support Campbell's bicycle and pedestrian efforts and through the development of a 100% affordable housing project at the VTA Winchester station.

At the same meeting, San Jose Mayor Matt Mahan was elected Vice Chair of VTA. He and I have had a strong working relationship and are meeting frequently to coordinate and ensure that VTA is meeting the needs of all our county's residents.

However, the work of city business continues despite the changes brought on by the electoral cycle. For example, at its October 15 meeting, the Campbell City Council discussed how to allocate the remainder of federal American Rescue Plan Act (ARPA) funds which had been awarded as part of the recovery from the Covid pandemic. The end of 2024 represents a critical deadline by which all ARPA funds must either be allocated or else returned to the federal government.

Campbell's plan had been to use the awards conservatively. While most of the funds had been previously allocated, just over half a million dollars in funding remained. In October, the Council, with the support of staff, allocated funding to support repairs of city infrastructure, moving ahead

INVESTING IN WOMEN'S HEALTH FOR THE BENEFIT OF ALL

Women's health is so much | full-time OB/GYN and a more than a "women's issue"; it's a complex set of issues with widespread impact on families and communities — and merits attention and action from all of us.

Ensuring that women in our County have access to comprehensive health care has long been a priority for me. Most recently, I worked to make our County's OB/ GYN Urgent Care program, an innovative pilot program we launched for pregnant women during COVID-19, a permanent offering of Santa Clara Valley Healthcare.

Reproductive health care, including family planning services and preventative care, is at the heart of women's health. Yet, these services are frequently under threat and underfunded.

Following the Supreme Court's reversal of Roe v. Wade in 2022, I took action to protect access to reproductive health care by authoring a resolution that reconfirmed our County's continued support for reproductive rights and called on Congress to enact national legislation protecting those rights.

Back in 2018, when we learned that the MayView Community Health Center, which provides health care to low-income families and individuals, had been operating on reduced hours. I persuaded the Board of Supervisors to take action. The County's support enabled MayView to hire a

part-time nurse practitioner, allowing the health center to keep all of its clinics in Sunnyvale, Mountain View, and Palo Alto open and preserve accessible and affordable health care for women.

In 2020, I pushed for funding to support Pink Ribbon Good (PRG) and Cancer CAREPoint in their work with patients receiving cancer treatment at Santa Clara Valley Medical Center. Our county's support enabled these two organizations to provide vital services to patients during the height of the COVID pandemic.

Considering the profound importance of preventive care, I've pushed to expand opportunities for breast cancer screening for residents to ensure early detection of breast cancer, particularly those with dense breast tissue.

In September, a new federal law went into effect requiring mammography facilities nationwide to notify patients of their breast density in their mammogram reports. An overwhelming majority of women are unaware of their breast density, yet nearly half of women have dense breast tissue, and the risk of breast cancer for women with extremely dense tissue is about five times greater than for those with low density.

The new FDA mandate will help women make better decisions about additional medical screenings or care they may need. It's essentially what we did here in California more than a decade ago with Senate Bill 1538, legislation I authored (as a member of the California State Senate) to improve breast cancer detection in women with dense breast tissue.

To all the women reading this: I urge you to take charge of your health today. We often hear of women taking care of themselves last, missing a sign or symptom because they were busy taking care of others. Schedule your mammogram, and encourage others in your life to do the same. Listen to your heart and call 911 if you are experiencing a stroke or heart attack. It could be the action that saves your — or a loved one's - life.

SOME MAJOR DEVELOPMENT PROJECTS ARE COMING TO CAMPBELL! By Adam Buchbinder

The Hick'ry Pit site at the southwest corner of the intersection of Campbell and Bascom has been vacant for more than four years now. The city turned down an application to build a mixed-use apartment and hotel there in 2020, because it wasn't part of our General Plan. That plan has since been updated, and the developers have returned with another, preliminary, plan for a hotel and apartment building. At this point, because it complies with the General Plan and is two-thirds housing by floor area, our input is purely advisory; by state law, they're entitled to build the project.

It would be a seven-story 149room hotel along with 205 apartments. A parking podium would make up the center of the first three stories with about five hundred stalls, there would be a courtyard above that, and there would be street-facing activity along Campbell Ave, but not along Bascom; the developer believes that retail won't work without on-street parking.

Hotels and apartments are generally built by different contractors for different reasons, but putting the projects together makes sense because of the way the city measures density. On one hand, the density of

commercial buildings like hotels is defined by floor-area ratio (the amount of floor space divided by the lot size), not counting any residential component; on the other, the density of residential buildings like apartments is defined by units per acre (the number of apartments divided by the lot size). So by building these together on the same lot, both can be larger than if they were built individually, since the denominator in both fractions includes the other half of the project.

Perhaps most notably, the current proposal is about eightyfive feet tall. Back in the 1980s,

the city passed a referendum establishing a seventy-five foot height limit, which has been a given for the last forty years. However, the "Bankers Hill 150" court decision means the city cannot, in effect, make design decisions about a housing project, the developer can request that the height limit can be waived, and the city must grant the waiver. Despite this, it would still be less than a third of the height of the Pruneyard Tower across the street.

This project, by itself, will provide about a fifteenth of all of the new housing that Campbell has planned for over the current eight-year period. To keep up, we would be approving a project of this scale about every six months; on that note, staff informed us at the meeting that they had just received a preliminary application for the parcel directly to the south.



Cancer survivor Almut's (Florence Pugh, "Midsommar") chance encounter with Tobias (Andrew Garfield, "Silence") leads to a relationship and more. Mixture of conventional, banal, and uncomfortable realism with believable chemistry between its stars.

Here - C-

Robert Zemekis' (Back to the Future) experiment works for a stage play but keeping the camera entirely fixed in one place is detrimental to engaging storytelling. Based on a graphic novel focusing on a single spot of land and the inhabitants that occupy it over the course of time. Tom Hanks (Cast Away) and Robin Wright's (Wonder Woman) reunion with their "Forrest Gump" director is sadly a forgettable slog.

Pets and dangerous foods, plants and & household items

Family and friends, too much food and desserts along with too much to do. Shopping, cleaning, cooking, the list goes on. One thing you shouldn't have to worry about is your pets. But, especially during these busy times, it is important to think about our pets, whether they be dogs, cats or whatever.

First off, knowing the difference between dangerous, toxic and poisonous plants, food or household products is a good place to start. Dangerous may cause nausea and vomiting, while toxic reactions run the gambit: vomiting, diarrhea, anorexic and believe it or not, depression. Poisonous is obvious and trying to revive a pet | nibble on plants, especially

they shouldn't of, is usually not successful.

Some of the most obvious toxic plants include Amaryllis, holly and mistletoe. There is always the talk about poinsettias and while they are toxic, the toxicity is usually mild. It is always best to err on the side of caution and keep suspicious plants and foods safely out of easy reach.

Every part of lily is highly toxic to cats, including pollen and excess water from the plant basin. If any part of the plant is ingested by a cat, it can cause serious life threatening kidney damage. Beware of this issue if you have curious cats that like to

> Amaryllis are so much a part of the season, it can be hard to accept that both the bulb and flowers can be dangerous for your dogs. Holly and mistletoe are both toxic to pets and should be kept out of easy reach. Use caution is placing where they are easily accessible.

> While the focus of this column is plants and gardening, it is also important to mention foods that should never be given to pets, including chocolate. Some animals that have been eaten too much chocolate have perished.

According to the ASPCA, in alphabetical order, these foods should not be given to your pets: alcohol, avocado,

chocolate, coffee and caffeine, citrus, coconut and coconut oil, grapes and raisins, macadamia nuts, milk and dairy, onion, garlic, chives, raw/undercooked meat, eggs and bones, salt and salty snack foods and yeast dough. Xylitol is used as a sweetener in candy, gum and toothpaste and is also toxic. It is interesting that Xylitol can cause insulin release in most animal species and lead to liver failure.

The ASPCA has a very useful website and can help with more specific information. www.aspca.org. If you think your pet has ingested something they should not of. the ASPCA Animal Poison Control Center can be reached at 888-426-4435. Dogs seem to be more prone to eating things they shouldn't than other family pets.

Household items should also be kept out of reach. Why anything would drink a household cleaning product is beyond me, but it happens. Aspirin, including baby aspirin, Avon Skin So Soft, breath fresheners and grape seed oil, ibuprofen and naproxen, Pepto Bismol and Kaopectate and sorbatol should also be kept out of reach.

I sincerely hope this information is useful and not alarmed anyone. No one wants to spend their holidays worrying about their pets and an ounce of prevention could certainly help keep everyone safe. Have a safe holiday.

BILLYS SUMMER HARVEST CHRISTMAS CHUTNEY

- ½ chopped yellow onion
- Juice and rind of 2 tangerines, or 1 large orange
- 2 peeled, cored green apples chopped or grated
- 1 small coin finely chopped ginger
- 6 cups fresh or frozen pitted cherries
- 2 cups sliced fresh plums, chopped finely (I use Santa Rosa or Satsuma)
- ½ cup red wine vinegar
- ½ cup dark brown sugar
- ½ cup molasses
- 4 garlic cloves, chopped
- 3 bay leaves

- 3 fresh chiles, Serrano or jalapeno, chopped
- 6 whole cloves
- 1 Tbsp. green peppercorns
- 1 tsp. ground cinnamon
- ½ tsp. nutmeg
- 1 tsp. salt
- ½ tsp. fresh ground pepper
- 1 tsp. fresh sage

Combine all ingredients in a large pot. Cook covered for 30 minutes on medium low heat, stirring after 15 minutes. Uncover, and continue to cook, stirring often, until the mixture is the consistency of jam, about 30 more minutes. Always keep a small amount of liquid on top. If it starts to dry, add a splash of water or apple cider.


It appears that the last chapter in our lives is the one that does really show how well we ran the race. Do you smile enough? Laugh enough? Do you forgive freely?

IF YOUR FACE FITS

Airport and airline security is essential, but it is also one of the major irritants of today's travel scene.

It's not just security but the need to do identity checks at every stage of the departure process from check-in through security then departure control/immigration and on to the gate for access to the gate lounge area and finally boarding.

Each time you have to fumble for your passport and documentation for each of the checks. Wouldn't it be nice if you could do all the identity checks at one stage and then once each checkpoint knows it is you based on facial recognition you are clear to go.

The industry is now providing the solution through biometric screening which will aid all stages of your trip through security, boarding and immigration at destination.

It is relatively simple how it will work. All the processing will be done at check-in which will be full identity check and biometric facial screening. At this point all the relevant information relating to the passenger's trip will be logged against biometric facial recognition. This is likely to include all passport information required for immigration plus other key points from lounge entitlement to seating assignment.

This would have to be pretty thorough but once completed it means the passenger's

identity has been thoroughly checked and verified. A biometric photograph is then taken and stored in the data record, and it is that photograph – not the passport that becomes the verification of identity for all further checkpoints.

This means the passenger only has to show their passport once as they go through the six stages to get to their seat on board from checkin, baggage drop, immigration, security screening, and lounge access to boarding.

At each point there is a quick biometric scan and if your face fits you are on to the next stage.

This is now developed even further whereby the complete recognition data is stored for each passenger on the flight and sent on to the destination airport for an equally speedy processing by customs and immigration right down to baggage reclaim.

The one issue I do see will be the reliability of the facial recognition scanners at the various checkpoints. But I now have it for my Global Entry to the USA and it works superbly.

Naturally, there are the usual concerns about data protection, but it should be a pretty secure system unless you are prepared to go through the face swop operation carried out by John Travolta and Nicholas Cage in the 1997 movie "Face Off".

Anybody want to swop faces with me?


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There's a new paragraph in the California Association of Realtor's Listing Agreement that results in a new opportunity... or increased risk...for those buying or selling a home. Paragraph 4 is entitled "Compensation to Broker". This is where the negotiations for commission amount for services rendered is discussed. The amount paid is open to negotiation and every Agent will show their worth before giving it a value.

Within this major paragraph, though, is subparagraph 4C, 'Optional Additional Compensation for Unrepresented Buyer". An "Unrepresented Buyer" is someone without an Agent, lawyer or other party to represent them. In previous versions of the Listing Agreement this buyer wasn't identified and a "Dual Agency" was formed. In Dual Agency the one Agent is representing both parties.

The "Unrepresented Buyer" clarifies there is no Dual Agency being established if the seller's Agent locates a suitable buyer who wants to make an offer on the home. The Agent remains loyal to his client and fulfills his fiduciary duties to the seller. The Agent has no such duties to the Unrepresented Buyer. While the Agent still has the duties of honesty, reasonable skill and care as well as full disclosure, he doesn't owe the unrepresented buyer confidentiality, diligence, accountability or any of the other duties an Agent provides their client.

The addition of this new paragraph in the Listing Agreement is, in part, due to the recent changes in how our business is conducted in Real Estate across the country. Because it's relatively new, it's an area of unknown risk for the seller and their Agent. One concern is the emotional nature of home buying could lead to unreasonable expectations and disappointment for the buyer

with their purchase that could result in a suit after the transaction has closed. From an Agent's point of view there's more risk and work and thus paragraph 4C comes into play.

Previously, many buyers thought going to the Listing Agent would help them secure a home at a discount. Though this was, in practice, a mistaken belief. Some buyers may still believe it is true and go to the Listing Agent but, as shown above, the Agent remains an Agent of the seller. There is no agency between the buyer and the Agent so there is no confidentiality, no loyalty, no obedience, etc. Without someone on their side, they go through the transaction unrepresented and without the aid of an Agent to help them through.

Buyers, sellers and their Agents can all choose to accept the risk and enter into a transaction, but why? If you're interested in buying, selling or investing in Real Estate get an Agent. Troop 330 Celebrates Its 75th Anniversary

Since October 1, 1949, Campbell has been home to Boy Scout Troop 330. Chartered at various locations in the city, the troop currently convenes Wednesday evenings in the banquet hall of Saint Thomas of Canterbury Church. Scouts plan future outings, teach knot-tying and other skills. Besides their weekly meetings, the scouts host an annual pancake breakfast, run a coat drive to hand out jackets and other essentials on Christmas day, and monthly overnight camping trips. Every four years, Troop 330s summer camp takes them to British Columbia Canada, where scouts work to earn merit badges, run the camp themselves, and see the sights of Victoria Island.

Troop 330 is led by longtime scoutmaster Daraius Sorabji, and Maria Guardado, scoutmas-

ters of the boys and girls troops, respectively. The Troop has grown exponentially in the past years, and greatly more in 2019, when Scouting opened its doors to girls. Since the admission of girls into Scouting, the troop has already seen a handful of female Eagle Scouts, two of whom were part of the Inaugural Class of Female Eagle Scouts of February 8th, 2021. Scoutmaster Guardado had this to say, "Once girls were allowed to join BSA Scouts, I knew they would bring incredible energy to our troop—and they have exceeded all expectations. Their dedication to advancing in rank, stepping confidently into leadership roles, and connecting with all the scouts has been inspiring. Having girls as part of our troop has enriched our group and strengthened us as a whole."

The 75th anniversary festivities filled the banquet hall of San Thomas Church with current and former scouts, troop leaders and community members cherishing memories held dearly by all. Those involved with the troop in the past had a chance to share their favorite memory from their times in the troop. Former scouts regaled stories of hijinks on outings and fond memories as others listened on and reminisced on their own journeys in Scouts. In addition to members of the Campbell Scouting community, some local government royalty was also present. The celebration saw State Senator David Cortese share words celebrating the importance of scouting to the boys, who will become the next generation of leaders and family men in the community, and cutting the cake to congratulate the troop for its work in the community.

In its 75 years of troop-dom, 330 has made a name for itself as a staple of the Campbell community. You may find the tan uniformed scouts serving as color guard for Veterans and Memorial day ceremonies, State of the City addresses, and other city events throughout the year. Notable, representatives from Troop 330G (the girls troop), did the flag ceremony for the latest State of the City (which can be found on the front cover of the October edition). Moreover, the troop, well known for its high production of Eagle Scouts, has completed many an Eagle Project throughout schools, churches, and parks in Campbell and surrounding cities.

A few weeks after the event, I reached out to Scoutmaster Sorabji for some words to share with the community on behalf of Troop 330. He says,

"It's funny you ask me this on election day. With a country so divided. I think that the best we can do to help our youth navigate their future is something Lord Robert Baden Powell put together over a century ago. The Scout Oath and Law. If we could only have more scouts in the world, it would be a better place. It is my hope that the troop continues to grow and spread and share scouting's values in our community and then as adults, our scouts, whether having earned the rank of eagle or not, can take the values and share them within their sphere of influence. Here's to hoping to be present at the Troops 100th anniversary."

A mainstay of the community, as integral to the city of Campbell as the water tower, Troop 330 has grown with the city, continuing to serve and feed it with pancakes!
