

The Pastor's Pen | A New Year

Grace and peace to you!

Mission Committee

- The Mission Committee sponsored 30 One Church One Child Star Gifts in December, provided 8 Catawba Students with Study Packs during exam week, and sponsored The Annual UCC Christmas Fund, Veterans of the Cross Offering during Christmas Services. On December 23, a Rowan Helping Ministry Shelter Meal in Jennie's Kitchen was prepared and served to shelter guests, staff and volunteers, totaling 118 meals. Many thanks to all who volunteered their time, talent, and desserts for this very worthwhile project. The expense for the food was taken from First Foundation Grant Funds.
- During the end of December and in January, the Committee is collecting hats, scarves, gloves, and socks for RHM Shelter Guests to be dedicated on Sunday, January 11, 2026.
- The Blessing Pantry has been stocked and re-stocked several times each week in December by members of our congregation. Thanks to Linda Hauze who has been purchasing items to be placed in the Blessing Pantry in December.
- The Committee will meet on Thursday, January 8, 2026 at 1:15 pm (after Primetimers) to plan for the first several months of 2026.

Committee Reports

Transition Team

Catawba College has temporarily closed Omwake-Dearborn Chapel after an engineering assessment identified structural issues. Out of an abundance of caution, all public access to the sanctuary is prohibited until necessary remediation is complete. Catawba College remains committed to the safety of our community and the preservation of this historic campus space.

However, we would like to continue re-envisioning the future of First UCC. This change could help us continue to grow and serve in meaningful ways as we navigate the challenges of an aging building.

Summary of the Pilot Program Question & Answer Meeting on Dec. 14, 2025

Questions

Will we have an office at Catawba?

We would need to discuss office space needs and options.

Option: Rent office space on Catawba's Campus

Option: Contract office space on Horah St. with Lease/Buyer

If we have this space (Horah St.) why move to Catawba yet?

Chapel renovations

Robertson College Community Center renovations

What are we gaining by going to a temporary space at Catawba?

A program in partnership with Catawba means maintaining a relationship with Catawba: potential to interact with students and other opportunities that we otherwise would not have.

What options do we have besides Catawba?

Are we going to be a department there (Catawba)?

What happens in ten years if we don't grow?

Can we extend the period before we make a formal decision?

What steps can we take now to map out a 5 and 10 year strategic plan?

Is the list of needed maintenance available to the Congregation?

Yes, it will be included in Thursday Thoughts and available in paper copy in the Narthex.

This list is a starting point and does not encompass all needs.

The costs are estimated.

The current list is not in a specific order of urgency.

We have something to offer. How can we tell our story and get the word out?

May we move the Jan. 4th vote to Jan. 11?

If we vote "yes" to continuing our partnership with Catawba, what happens to our building?

We could lease the building.

We could list the building/property for sale.

If we sell the building/property, can we still come back here (Horah St.)?

If we sell, we could put provisions in to use the building.

Additional option: We could vote to use the money we have in the bank for maintenance. Currently, we have no debt.

If we vote "yes," we will be in a space at Catawba, one recommended by the Catawba team?

If this is a personal commitment with the Nelson's, what happens when they retire or transition away from Catawba?

The Memorandum of Understanding or other binding legal documents should account for a transition in institutional leadership.

What about our foundation?

Our foundation is a separate legal entity. It is not tied to the physical church plant.

Following Pastor Carol's transition, did we intentionally return to older E and R ways?

What is our identity?

How do we want to be seen?

This may be because the tradition and consistency has helped us maintain continuity with guest ministers and an interim minister.

Commentary

Change our language to "with Catawba" instead of "at Catawba"

In the context of personal investment- Larry Bolick and Ken Clapp have visited individually with members who are no longer able to physically attend church in our space, and they are okay with moving forward with other options because they understand changes will need to be made.

There is not appropriate space for our programming in the Chapel.

Accessible bathrooms on the main floor will be addressed with the renovations.

Location of potential office space- what are our options?

Ability/space to store our materials, program supplies, decorative items, etc.

Accessible space large enough for fellowship and meals

Next Steps:

Share the list of maintenance needs (urgent vs. important)


Transition Team will meet with Karen Ewen regarding alternate Worship spaces

Share the Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) from Catawba, when it comes available.



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Reflection on John 1:(1-9), 10-18 | Kathryn Matthews Huey

"...However, this season of Christmas does more than remind us of what God has already done; rather, it proclaims that God is active in the world today, in this setting of history. We might feel tired and relieved that Christmas is over, but it would be better to feel energized and renewed by the good news of the gift of Jesus Christ every day, not just on one morning each year. What is the new thing that God is doing in the life of your congregation, in your own life, in the life of the United Church of Christ? Barbara Brown Taylor suggests that we each can use our gifts to bring a word to life, to embody a word, whether that word is compassion, justice, generosity, patience, or love, so that it's no longer an "abstract concept" but truly a word made flesh, brought to reality and breathed with life. She makes the same observation about congregations (*Feasting on the Word Year C, Vol. 1*). What word or words does your congregation bring to life?

In this new day, in this brand new year, God is revealing God's own self in the life of your community. Hearing such good news, how is your church, then, "anointed with the oil of gladness"? How will we continue to sing the joy of Christmas, to proclaim in the days ahead the good news of "grace upon grace," of our coming home and of God making a home in our midst? Is this the way we frame, the way we speak, of the mission of our church? Perhaps Christmas morning is unlike all other mornings, but indeed it is like every other morning of our lives, too, because Jesus Christ is alive and God is at work in our lives, here and now. Richard Ascough recalls an image from Henri Nouwen's diary from Genesee Abbey, when he describes the Nativity set under the altar there, with small, humble figures that a light projects larger than life onto the wall nearby, and all the difference the light makes in this scene (*New Proclamation Year C 2000-2001*). What difference has the light shining on your life made in the life of the world?"
