Carol's Corner

Dear Friends,

I've just started a book called **The Forgotten Desert Mothers**. These are women who were early followers of Jesus. In the early days of Christianity women had many roles to play within the community of faith. They followed Paul's words, "There is no such thing as Jew or Greek, slave or free, male and female-for all are one in Christ" (Galatians 3:28). Both women and men were involved in evangelization and works of mercy to the poor, orphans and prisoners. Women held leadership positions. Evidence can be found on old tombstones. Even as Christianity gained acceptance women still played roles within the church especially as ascetics. However, as men grew less comfortable with women leaders and as Christianity became the state religion, women often chose an ascetic life within monastery walls or even in caves. Often, they would find a teacher they called an amma, another woman to disciple them.

I wanted to share with you the sayings of one of those women- amma Syncletica. She was born in Alexandria and grew up in a Christian family. Two of her brothers died young, her sister was blind. Upon her parent's death she sold everything she had and gave it to the poor. She then cut her hair as a sign of consecration and moved with her sister to the family tomb outside Alexandria. There she began her life as a desert ascetic.

Women came to her and listened to what she had to say; she reluctantly became their teacher. Some of her sayings still survive to this day. She said "In the beginning there are a great many battles and a good deal of suffering for those who are advancing towards God and afterwards, ineffable joy. It is like those who wish to light a fire; at first they are choked by the smoke and cry, and by this means obtain what they seek (as it is said, Our God is a consuming fire-Hebrews 12:24); so we must kindle the divine fire in ourselves through tears and hard work."

She knew that things changed. She knew that life could be and often was difficult. But she also knew that patience and endurance are qualities that are needed to live the life of discipleship.

And isn't that like life? There are times when life seems pretty easy but there are always changes that happen that make life challenging and sometimes downright difficult. We see things that are happening around us and we'd like to see them change but we don't even know where or how to begin. We feel that we can't make a difference. As followers of Jesus it is even more difficult because so often we feel as we are swimming against the current. What Amma Syncletica might do is remind us that we are not in this alone. We swim with others, we can rely on our fellow travelers on this journey to lead us in the path of love and compassion. When it feels as if we can't go on, we can hold onto one another and to God's presence, trusting that they will give us the strength we need. Whatever challenges you might be facing at the moment, it may not be today, and it may not be tomorrow but we do know with certainty that joy does come with the morning.

A client came in seeking assistance to stop eviction from his apartment. The client is a veteran living only on disability income. The client had been receiving rental assistance from the VA and was unaware the assistance had stopped. This put him behind on his rent. The client applied for rental assistance from the Community Acton Agency, but did not meet the income guidelines and was denied rental assistance from them. The landlord verified this information and is willing to work with him. The landlord will accept partial payment to avoid eviction. Rowan Helping Ministries wrote a voucher for that amount to keep the veteran in his home.

The Five-Alive Fund is **not** part of our church's budget. We rely entirely on your contributions each month to sustain this fund to aid families in our community and our church.

What a joy it is to bring you all a report on behalf of the youth from this past month's mission trip. We had an absolute blast in Asheboro during July 5th-8th. A total of five youth and three adults attended the trip which was filled with service, retreat and enrichment. Special thanks to Ken Clapp and Black Lake Retreat Center for their hospitality and opportunities that they provided. Also we would like to thank the Church for the support that they provide to the youth and their mission trip. This year our activities included two enrichment sessions, volunteering at the local Christian Outreach Center, visiting with the kind folks over at Crossroads Retirement Community, maintenance at Black Lake, planting a garden, and we capped it all off with Sunday morning worship.

At the Christian Outreach Center we did some work for the thrift store that is operated by the ministry. It seemed that we came at the right time because many of the workers there seemed relieved when they saw us coming. At lunch that day we fed two homeless men that were at the park. With a smile on their faces they expressed their thankfulness for the food as well as their appreciation for our work at the COC. The same night we visited a local nursing home called Crossroads where we made many friends. One of the seniors that night told me that it was not very frequent that they had visitors. Our coming there really meant something to the people there. We had a pianist, a guitarist, some nappers, a former city councilman, and some other highly extroverted friends that we met that night. (You could tell that there was some excitement for us to be there.) It was really humbling to meet these seniors. You could tell they were excited at our being there! Many had no mobility, some had no family, and some were just in dire need of someone to talk to. We all take these basic everyday things for granted. It was comforting to know that for an afternoon some of those anxieties were relieved.

We also planted a flower garden at Black Lake. We turned a rocky, clay area into a wonderful area to pray, reflect, or simply look at some pretty flowers. For the rest of the summer and in the future, groups will be able to look at that area and appreciate it. We did some work on the Leonard Lodge where some upkeep was necessary. Some of the students did some things that they had never done before. The group became a bit handier, which I'm sure their parents were very thankful for. We capped off the trip with an intense 2 games of volleyball where team non-Leichman (with Kevin Sr.) defeated team Leichman. Despite being picked last, Kevin Sr's play was instrumental to their victory. He took home the game's MVP award.

While it was a trip with a mission to serve, the enrichment and togetherness of the group shown. The group showed its ability to cooperate and serve God. It was our first mission trip together, the first of laughs, sharing, and building relationships for a lifetime. Thank you to the Church for giving me the opportunity to be a part of this trip. Thank you to the parents for sharing your kids with us for the trip. Thank you to the volunteers for their time invested. Most of all thank you to the youth who made this an enjoyable experience.
