Dear Friends,



I have been thinking a lot about this question: "What does it mean to be the body of Christ in our community?" I want to invite you into the discussion.

During the season of Epiphany, we have been learning more about the revelation of the identity of Jesus. The Magi see him as king, at baptism the dove descends, and God calls him, "my son the beloved", at Cana we see him change water into wine, in his hometown we hear him telling folks that he has come to bring good news to the poor, to "proclaim release to the captives and recovery of sight to the blind, to let the oppressed go free, to proclaim the year of the Lord's favor."

Paul challenges us to accept our God given gifts but not to use them for our own advancement rather to help build the community. So, what does it mean to be the body of Christ in our community?

What are the needs here in Salisbury? Poverty, education, homelessness, domestic violence, child abuse, lack of employment, elder abuse, food insecurity? These are just some of the needs I've seen.

What are the gifts and graces we've been given, not for our use only but ones that can make a difference in our community? We've been told that we are a very hospitable church. Are there ways we expand our welcome? Our Foundation each year gives grants to agencies within the community who respond to the many needs here in Salisbury. Can we respond in other ways besides our financial gifts-like we do with our food collection for Rowan Helping Ministries?

What is your vision of who we can be as the body of Christ?

These are some of the challenges that all churches are facing these days. Attendance is down, younger folks are finding alternatives to church, and young adults who do come don't tend to attend regularly. There are lots of things that compete for people's attention and time. Some younger people don't come because they've been hurt by the church or because they feel that the church is out of touch with the world today. When younger folks do become involved it's usually because they are caught up in a cause, or a mission. Younger families that join the church are looking for churches that are more open to the inclusivity of God.

Churches used to be the heart beat of communities, but many churches stand empty throughout the week. How can we open our doors to meet the needs in our community? Who needs to know that they are welcome? There's a church in Hagerstown (MD), it's one of ours, but most people who don't know it's a church think it's a museum. It's a gothic structure and looks empty as people pass by. I've talked with a many people in Salisbury and when they ask where the church is I've gotten a quizzical look on occasion, "there's a church there?" Despite our size, people sometimes don't see us. How can we become more visible?

I know I've asked a lot of questions but if we want to remain vital, if we want to live out our calling as God's people here in Salisbury, I believe we need to question and listen. I believe we need to open our hearts and minds to the voice of the God who is still speaking.

Hope to see you in church!

Thanks was offered to Phyllis and Charlie Little for hosting the Christmas Eve Reception along with the women's circles who helped provide the food.



Five Alive Fund: A Thank-You Note From Rowan Helping Ministries

The following is copy of a letter with eye opening numbers from Rowan Helping Ministries thanking us for our continued support through our Five Alive Fund and the Little Red Wagon programs:

Because of your generous heart, basic needs will be provided, hope will be renewed and lives will be changed.

In the first three months of our fiscal year, our kind and caring donors, (including our own Five-Alive and Little Red Wagon programs), and volunteers made these things possible through their aifts:

- -3,479 individuals received \$77,049 in financial assistance for rent, utilities, medicine and other critical needs;
- -311 different guests were provide a safe place to spend the night in our shelter:
 - -22.626 meals were served to the hungry in Jeannie's Kitchen;
- -3,329 visits were made to our Food Pantry, where 114,037 pounds of groceries were distributed;
- -966 visits were made to our Clothing Center by people needing new or gently-used clothing.

Through your donations, you have allowed your heart to lead you in helping your neighbors in need. You are helping us feed the hungry, house the homeless and give hope to those working to build better lives.
