# CAROL'S CORNER

Friends,

This will be our last Lenten journey together. In some way that is appropriate. Lent is central to the story of who we are as God's people. It served the purpose in the early church of teaching the faith to new believers and to help others who had strayed find their way home. It was the time when a broad swatch of stories were told in order to deepen the faith of the faithful. And it was all in preparation of the joy-filled celebration of Easter.

It can be a time for us to renew and deepen our faith as well. To immerse ourselves in the stories of faith and ponder what it means to follow Jesus, to walk with Jesus to cross and beyond.

Epiphany ends with Jesus on the mountain in what we call the Transfiguration. There he met with God and with Moses and Elijah to ponder the next steps of his ministry. We are told that when he came down off that mountain, he turned his face towards Jerusalem. And the cross.

The message that Jesus shared with the people was not welcomed by everyone. Many on the edges of society saw it as good news, but to the ones who had power, who were in control, his words were an affront to all they thoughts, all they had been taught, and all they believed, and challenged the way they lived and treated others. He was attacking their very way of living.

He kept going because this was what he felt was what God needed for him to do, his purpose if you will.. He kept going because we needed to know how much we are loved. He kept going because of love.

This Lent we will be taking a journey with Jesus as he moves ever so closer to the cross. We start Lent actually a little bit back in time, to the story of Jesus temptation in the dessert. On the second Sunday of Lent we hear that already there are those who want Jesus dead. On the third Sunday Isaiah reminds us of God's providence and Jesus offers a parable of a fig tree and a watchtower. The Fourth Sunday we revisit the Forgiving Father parable that Jesus tells. An important one, on the way to Jerusalem that reminds us of our God's amazing love and the importance of grace and forgiveness. On the 5th Sunday we know that death is coming soon. At the home of Lazarus, Mary takes nard and anoints Jesus. The storm clouds are gathering. On Palm/Passion Sunday it becomes real. Jesus challenges the powers and principalities of the world as he enters Jerusalem on that donkey and we are reminded again of the arrest and the realities of Good Friday. We revisit that again during the week, as we gather at table to remember the final meal and the great commission that we are given as followers of Jesus. The week ends in darkness and despair.

But we know something they didn't. We know Sunday's coming. We know that no matter what happens in our world, whatever horrible things happen to us, we are not alone. We know that we walk through the darkness with the one who knows us better than we even know ourselves.

In the end we are not a people of the crucifixion. We are people of the resurrection, so the future that God holds for you is still there. Listen for God's still speaking voice as we journey. Learn from his life and ministry. And know Sunday is coming.

Hope to see you in church.

#### 5-Alive

Robert, a US Army vet who spent most of his post-military years working in construction, struggled with addiction and lived in a crumbling apartment with no water, heat or electricity.

On the brink of homelessness, he reached out to Rowan Helping Ministries where he enrolled in their VA GPD program and moved into transitional housing at Eagle's Nest III.

His case manager helped Robert connect with the VA to access military benefits he had earned but never fully received. He began attending substance use disorder support groups and working through recovery.

Through RHM's New Tomorrows program, Robert discovered more resources including computer and life skills classes.

He is now living in a new apartment and will enroll in community classes in the spring to earn his CDL license.

Your monthly contributions to 1st UCC's 5-Alive will help others like Robert find the resources they need to turn over a new leaf.

# Take a Blessing, Leave a Blessing, Be a Blessing

A Blessing Pantry has been placed on our church property as an outreach to the neighboring community. It is located near the driveway into the parking lot on Church Street, just north of Monroe Street.

Installed in November and initially stocked with items from the December drive-by food collection and donations from members through the holidays, the pantry needs ongoing support from members and friends to keep it supplied. Each month a member of the Mission Committee takes responsibility for checking it at least twice a week and keeping it stocked, but demand is great and it is usually emptied in a couple of days.

Popular items include:

Canned meats (chicken, tuna, ham, Spam)

Healthy soups

Beef stew

Chef Boyardee canned meals

Canned fruits and vegetables

Peanut butter

Dehydrated foods like noodles, cereals, and dry beans

Personal care products, including baby wipes

Inexpensive can openers for cans without pop-tops

Excluded items include those in glass packaging and fresh items that are perishable in the weather conditions.

How can you help? If you are able, place donations directly in the box whenever you're in the area. No need to bring items into the church.

Can't do that? Then bring your contributions to the church and place them in the box provided in the Narthex.

Or make a monetary contribution to help the Mission Committee to keep the pantry supplied.
