#### CAROL'S CORNER

Dear Friends,

What's the point? What is our purpose as followers of Jesus? This is the question Stephen Mattson suggests we, as American Christians, truly need to ask in his article, "Have We Forgotten the Point of Christianity?".

It's a question I think we've struggled with ever since the very beginning of Christianity or at the very least since the time of Constantine. Some theologians like John Dominic Crossen talks about how Christianity has been coopted by the "empire." Many have pointed out that there seems to be two images of God within the Biblical text. There's the God of anger and violence, retribution and demands, and then there's the God of love, justice, grace, compassion and non-violence, the God that is exemplified by Jesus life and ministry.

There has been a lot of discussion declaring many things under the umbrella of "Christianity" the past couple of years-what is right/wrong, how we should vote, who is good and bad...it has challenged believers to prioritize the role that Jesus plays in their lives, says, Mattson.

He suggests, and I would agree, that the reality of the good news, the gospel cannot be heard and accepted unless we truly follow Jesus. Unless we emulate his life and his ministry.

Mattson asks, "What is the point of people worshipping the Prince of Peace who support policies that vilify whole groups of people?

What can be the point of worshipping the King of Kings by people seeking wealth and privilege at the expense of the oppressed through corrupt systems that maintain and promote systemic financial, educational, and racial injustice?

What's the point of Christianity, if people who worship a Jewish Messiah from the Middle East, also discriminate and legislate against people who have different religious, cultural, and socio-economic backgrounds?

What's the point of Christianity, if Christians-who celebrate a man crucified on a cross by an authoritarian government partly for being an ethnic minority-refuse to stand up and defend those who are facing persecution because of their skin color, ethnic background, gender, or political beliefs?

What's the point of Christianity if we celebrate God as creator of the world, while subsequently destroying the environment and participating in wasteful consumer-centric practices?"

As Mattson points out the interests and passions of Jesus are often the exact opposite of mainstream culture. I've talked about it as kind of an upside-down view of the world. Where the world sees weakness, God sees strength.

Jesus was all about welcoming the stranger, feeding the hungry, forgiving the sinner. Did his life bring him a better standard of living? Did it bring him wealth? Or even power? (In case you aren't sure — the answer is "NO!")

As illogical as it seems to us at times, humble service, defending the powerless, fighting for the oppressed, welcoming the stranger, and radically loving all-as absurd as it sounds-this following Jesus-well-it's not for the faint of heart.

Hope to see you all in church!

### FIVE ALIVE FUND: HELPING FAMILIES IN OUR COMMUNITY

A resident came in Rowan Helping Ministries seeking assistance because her water had been disconnected. The household consisted of the 38-year-old client, her 17-year-old son and her two daughters, ages 7 & 15. Her father passed away in February and she went to Michigan for the funeral. Then her husband left at the end of February. She is employed and will be sustainable once the water is back on and the bill is caught up. The client brought in a receipt showing that she paid the City of Salisbury a portion of the water bill and the reconnection fee. Rowan Helping Ministries sent a voucher to the City of Salisbury toward the remaining portion of the bill. She was glad to know that her family could remain in their home.
