Dear Friends,

And so, we now find ourselves "in our new normal". In the midst of Pandemic. In the middle of summer when it is much harder to go outside, we find ourselves inside again unsure of what the future will bring. The students, teachers, custodians, bus drivers, and all the staff are waiting, doing their best to figure out the path for this fall. Parents wonder whether to send their children to school if the schools open or continue online...and they worry about how to do their job and parent, and teach, and do all the other things that they do.

We have not been able to safely gather in our church for months now. We are still not sure when it will be safe to be together. There are many faces and people we miss. We miss the meals that Bobbie has made, we miss the companionship of friends around us, we miss the choir, and we just miss the hugs and welcome, presence and support of one another.

We are blessed that we can worship online. Some churches cannot. We are blessed that we can touch each other virtually but to be honest it is not the same.

When this first started there was the thought that it would be for maybe a month, two at the most and now we are not sure about the "when". What we do know is that even in a time of Pandemic we are not alone.

I look to scripture and the experiences of our ancestors in faith. I think of the Israelites who struggled in the wilderness as they left the slavery or Egypt and headed towards the promised land. They too did not know how long that would take. Along the way they found God and they found community, they learned new ways and grew in their faith and understanding. They also messed up. They made a golden calf, they complained about hunger and thirst and they argued about Moses' leadership.

I think of our ancestors taken from Jerusalem, prisoners in Babylon not sure if they would ever go home again. It was a generation or more before they got to go home. I think of Palestinians today, living in refugee camps, hoping that someday they might go home. There are others too who are displaced from their homes wondering if they'll ever be able to go back.

In some ways we find ourselves in a time of exile. Yet even as I say that I know that it is in those dark times that we find our faith growing the most. At least this is true for me. I know that during those times of fear, sadness, grief, despair that this is where my faith helps me cling to the hope and promise of a future that is God-determined.

Right now, I know that there is discord all around us. Voices crying out in pain, anger, fear, sadness, other voices telling them to shut up and be silent. Some saying that this is all made up, others taking it seriously. Some even saying that we are headed to the end of the world. It's as if we have lost our tether to "normal" and we're not sure where we are going or what's going to happen on the way. And so, we lash out because of our fear, because of our anxiety, because of our grief.

Right now, we are tired. We don't like this "new normal". We don't like not knowing. We don't like it one bit. That's why I think about our ancestors in faith, I understand more about their complaints and their fears, and I receive their promises as promises that I can hold onto.

It has also occurred to me that God has been challenging me to become more patient for years now, well it may just be that this is the year that I finally learn patience, not because I want to, but because I have no other choice!

I don't know what the future holds. I do know, however, who holds the future. I continue to encourage us to hold onto our faith and follow Jesus for we may not know what the "new normal" will look like but we do know that we do not travel there alone.

Stay safe, keep your social distance and wear a mask.



In it we hear of one sent to "Prepare the way of the Lord" and of one who will announce, "The spirit of the Lord God is upon me, because the Lord has anointed me; he has sent me to bring good news to the oppressed,

to bind up the broken-hearted, to proclaim liberty to the captives, and release to the prisoners; to proclaim the year of the Lord's favor (Isaiah 61 and Luke 4)." All of these fixtures in our church year come to us from God through the Book of Isaiah. It is indeed a constant source of food for the faithful.

There is an additional good to be found here. As profound as these treasured and familiar verses are, in this study we will learn that the Book of Isaiah is not merely a source for good guotations. The spoken prophecies of this book helped the people Israel look for the life of God with them for the better part of two very turbulent centuries, and it has continued to help Jews and Christians do the same in the twenty-five hundred years since it became a book. Before we embark on that journey, here are a few words about the book's origin," according to the authors of the Bible study we are about to embark on in August.

Modern scholars have divided the book of Isiah generally into three sections although there are some who see a 4th write for the apocalyptic materials found in Isaiah 24-27. The section we will be studying is called 2nd Isaiah and includes material from chapters 40-55.

We will be journeying with Dr. Robert Wilson and Dr. Stephen Cook, who at the time that this Bible study created were professors at Yale Divinity School. Dr. Wilson was my professor for Hebrew Scripture, and he was awesome. The study involves a short video which I should be able to share with you in zoom followed by discussion.

We will begin our study on *August 19th* at 6:30PM. All are invited to join us as we journey through 2nd Isaiah.
