#### **CAROL'S CORNER**

Friends,

It seems that people don't know how to talk to each other anymore. Especially about difficult topics. Some people are afraid it will cause division. Some people are afraid that they won't be heard. Some people's minds are so made up they don't see the need to listen to a different opinion. Some people are afraid that they won't be able to say their point well. Some people are afraid of getting hurt. Some people react defensively.

This isn't new. There have been challenges and conflicts happening in societies and churches since the beginning of creation. It's something Paul dealt with in his letters. He spoke to churches that were divided over theology and doctrine. There were times he'd have liked to spit. But he engaged. He spoke his truth and his understanding of God's truth in love.

Colin Patterson suggests: "If we could ask Paul "How do you respond to conflict in churches?", he might well say, "I weep at the damage done by contentious people. I pray for them and urge them to live up to their calling, responding to God's grace by being themselves gracious. I once believed sternness was the only way to put people right. Now it is only my last resort." His response comes from receiving an outpouring of God's grace.

If we could ask James, "How do you respond to conflict in churches?", he might well reply, "I know only too well that anger, bitterness and envy work against the purposes of God. I urge people who find themselves caught up in such attitudes to pray for wisdom, mourn over the state of the church and learn to listen to God and to each other."

Colin is the Assistant Director of Bridge Builders, a mediation service that works with churches.

We live in a world where we tend to avoid conversations that might make us feel uncomfortable or might lead to conflict.

Yet we only need to read scripture to know that it's nothing new. And in our world today we need people to learn techniques to have uncomfortable conversations. To listen, really listen and to wonder when we feel uncomfortable and not react too quickly. The reality is that this a skill we all need to work on and learn.

The upcoming conversations around Open and Affirming may be uncomfortable, may make you want to spit, but it is a good opportunity for us to work on the skills that will help us, not just here, but in any difficult conversations we may have.

So how do we start? We start from holding up the belief that each person is coming to these conversations in good faith. We come remembering that we are all God's beloved children We come realizing that the topic isn't the person. We come speaking our own truth and not speaking for others. We come willing to listen. We don't always have to agree, but we can learn to disagree agreeably.

And if we can learn this skill just think how valuable it is in our world today with all the challenging discussions going on.

#### **Mission Committee News**

The Mission Committee met on January 19 in the Church Fellowship Hall. The Committee set goals for 2023 based on what was accomplished and sponsored in 2022, which we will continue. The Little Food Pantry has been put on hold until one is constructed and installed. The next Drive-By Food Drive for Rowan Helping Ministries Food Pantry will be Saturday, February 4 from 10-12 noon for regular food items. The food pantry was greatly depleted over the holidays. We will continue with Little Red Wagon items through May for the Food for Thought Backpack program with RHM. An RHM Shelter Meal is scheduled for Saturday, February 18 at 7 p.m. If you would like to volunteer to help with the meal, please contact Millie Campbell. Desserts and volunteers are needed.

The collection of scarves, hats, gloves and socks for RHM Shelter guests and Family Crisis Center was dedicated on January 15. Several boxes of these items were packed after our meeting and were delivered on January 23. A special "Thank You" to all who participated in this winter project.

Thank you also to all who contributed to the Annual Christmas Offering (\$1635) for the Veterans of the Cross for UCC retired clergy and their spouses who have special financial need.

Inquiry has been made to help a family of four whose home was destroyed by fire several weeks ago. They were first housed in a local motel with funds from American Red Cross. They have received a voucher for first month's rent beginning February 1 from RHM. Donation of clothing, furniture and household items are being coordinated by Kristen Valles of Salisbury Pediatrics Office Community Outreach. Clothing and a \$50 gift card have been donated and a \$100 gift card was donated for food items. Also, the committee designated \$100 gift card for items they can purchase from Habitat Restore. A queen size bed and mattress are yet to be donated.

The Lenten/Easter Offering will be designated for One Great Hour of Sharing and will be received on Easter, April 9.

The Committee discussed new projects. One was to assemble Church World Service Kits once the need is identified as to how we can respond. Another idea was to investigate how folks who have auto mechanical issues may be helped to restore transportation which is essential to get to work.

The next meeting will be Thursday, February 9, at 7 pm in Fellowship Hall

#### **FIVE-ALIVE HELPING FAMILIES IN OUR COMMUNITY**

Our Five-Alive program contributes monthly to Rowan Helping

Below is a First Quarter Report of the 2022-2023 RHM fiscal year, many area donors like Our 5-Alive Fund have impacted local citizens in the following ways:

- -728 individuals received \$ 156,624 in financial assistance for rent, utilities, medicine, and other critical needs;
- -296 different guest were provided a safe place to spend the night in our Shelter:
- -16,212 meals were served to the hungry in Jeannie's Kitchen;
- -1,511 households visted our Food Pantry, receiving 235,077 pounds of groceries:
- -1,043 individuals received new or gently used clothing from our Clothing Center;
- -5,596 Food for Thought food bags are given to Rowan County children each week so they would have enough food to eat on weekends.

#### **ONA Committee Notes**

In response to a question from one our members regarding what ONA actually is and means I hope this helps. ONA stands for Open and affirming and is an official designation of congregations and other settings in the United Church of Christ affirming the full inclusion of lesbian, gay, bisexual, transgender and non-binary persons (LGBTQ) persons in the church's life and ministry. Over a year ago some members of our church brought this to the council and that is what has led to the first town hall which will be held February 5<sup>th</sup> at 3PM in the fellowship hall. There will be cookies and beverages. An invitation was extended to Rev. Elizabeth Horton and she and some members of her church will be here to share their journey through the process of becoming ONA. This is an opportunity for all here to come and ask questions about the ONA. The ONA Committee hopes that you will all come and ask questions and listen with an open heart. If you have any questions that you would like to ask you are invited to write them down, place them in the box at the back of the sanctuary or ask them that day. The ONA Committee will report back with questions that were asked and answers. The ONA Committee consists of Leslie Dent and Donna Odrosky, co-chairs. Members include Ann Teague, Mark Schiemann, Bobbie Troutman, and Don Whitfield.

A reminder that just because we are having these conversations does not mean that we will automatically become Open and Affirming or even vote on becoming open and affirming. All it means currently is that we are having conversations and are open to the possibility. All members are encouraged and invited to come with an open spirit and an open heart to listen, bring questions and concerns.




This is an invitation to be open to the spiritual practice of seeking. As this is an opportunity to look at our assumptions, soften our hearts, widen our vision, and go deeper.
