# CAROL'S CORNER

Dear Friends,

On October 6<sup>th</sup> we will be having our first Blessing of the Animals service at 2PM. You are invited to bring your animals or pictures of your animals that day. This will be an outdoor service so you may also wish to bring a blanket or chair to sit on. St. Francis of Assisi is the reason that churches offer an animal blessing service.

Francis was born in Assisi, Italy in 1182. His family were quite wealthy clothing merchants and he grew up in privilege. His father wanted him to become a businessman like him. When he was 19 Francis went off to war but was captured and taken prisoner. He was held in a dungeon for a year before his father paid the ransom and he was set free.

Over the next several years he began to have visions from God. Those visions changed his life. At first Francis thought God was calling him to take part in the Crusade, but then another vision told him to care for the sick and then finally Francis heard God calling him to "repair my church which is falling in ruins.". Francis gave all his money to the church. This did not go over well with his father, so he left home and took a vow of poverty.

From then on, he lived a life of poverty, preaching about the life of Jesus. Along the way he gathered followers. His one basic rule was to "follow the teachings of our Lord Jesus Christ and to walk in his footsteps." He and his followers traveled to Rome and got approval for their religious order. They became known as the Franciscan Order.

Francis was known for his love of nature and animals. There are many stories about St. Francis and his preaching to animals. One day, it is said that he was talking to some birds and they began to sing together. It was also said that he could tame wild animals.

I thought I'd share one story, it's probably the most famous one.

"Francis loved animals of all kinds. Travel after rain was extremely slow because he stopped and picked up worms along the path so that he wouldn't step on them. He fed and named the mice that lived in his monastic cell. It is said that the larks all sang to him on the night of his death.

But the most famous animal in his life was a wolf that terrified the people in the town of Gubbio. This wolf killed other animals and even devoured human beings. Even though everyone carried a weapon they found that their primitive clubs and spears were no match for the sharp teeth of the wolf.

One day St. Francis made a visit to Gubbio. Upon arrival the citizens warned him about the wolf, "Don't go outside the gate they said, the wolf will attack and kill you."

Francis said to the people, "Jesus is the Lord of all creatures." Then without any weapon he and companion walked out into the country. Some folks followed at a distance. Others climbed trees and stood on roof tops to watch.

Soon the wolf appeared. When he saw Francis, he broke into a run with his mouth open. Francis made the sign of the cross Francis made the sign of the cross and called out, "Brother Wolf, in the name of Christ, I order you to not hurt me or anyone."

As soon as Francis had made the sign of the cross, the world closes its jaws and stopped running. When Francis called the wolf to him he lowered his head and lay down at the saint's feet, as though it had become a lamb."

Francis made a deal with the wolf, as long as the wolf promised not to hurt anyone the townspeople would feed him. The wolf kept his promise and two years later he died, and the people mourned the loss of their new friend because the wolf's peaceful nature and patience reminded them of the virtues of St. Francis.

On October 6<sup>th</sup>, Churches around the world will celebrate something that St. Francis of Assisi started almost 800 years ago: blessing our animals. So, come join us and celebrate the amazing gift of our animal companions at 2PM. All are welcome here!
