I have to be honest about something. For 24 years, I lived in Pomona. I even owned a business in Pomona. But for much of that time, I wasn't truly connected to the city. Sure, I occasionally supported local restaurants, got my hair cut here now and then, but I didn't explore all that Pomona had to offer. I rarely attended community events or worked with local non-profits. I wasn't engaged, and in many ways, I turned my back on the city I called home. Sometimes, I even told people I lived in Claremont when asked where I lived.

Then, everything changed during COVID. In the middle of the pandemic, Pomona showed up for me and my family in a way I never expected. My daughter turned eight on April 16, 2020. We were locked down, unable to celebrate her birthday the way we normally would. On a whim, I asked the city to help organize a drive-by birthday celebration. To my astonishment, Pomona showed up in force! The mayor, the Police Department, the Fire Department, and so many neighbors—many of whom I hadn't even met despite living on the same street for years—came together to make my daughter's birthday unforgettable.

That moment changed everything. The city I had distanced myself from for so long embraced me and my family with open arms. I realized how much I had been missing and decided it was time to show up for Pomona the way it had shown up for me.

I made a commitment to support Pomona businesses more intentionally. It wasn't just about spending money locally; it was about connecting with the community and recognizing the value of what we have here. Over the past few years, I've seen firsthand how much Pomona businesses and their owners care about their work and their city. Many have deep roots here, raising their families and contributing to our community's strength. These businesses stuck around and persevered through hard times, and they deserve our respect and support.

Since 2020, I've joined local service groups, created the Shop Pomona rewards card, gotten involved in Pomona politics, and launched this magazine. The Pomona Bulletin Facebook page is now the fastest-growing Pomona-related page on the platform, and our Instagram community is growing as well. All of this stems from one goal: to be part of the solution and help make Pomona an amazing and safe place to live and do business.

This magazine is my love letter to Pomona. Every month, we aim to highlight the best the city has to offer. We want to celebrate the resilience, creativity, and warmth of our community. But we can't do it alone. We need your help.

I challenge you to make the next year about supporting Pomona. Visit more local shops. Buy your flowers from a Pomona florist. Fill up your gas tank at a Pomona station. Grocery shop here. Join a gym in town. Every dollar you spend in Pomona helps strengthen our community and supports your neighbors. Together, we can make Pomona the jewel of the valley once more.





Fast forward a couple of days, and I found myself at Chapo Hats on Indian Hill, hunting for gifts. Naturally, I popped into the barber shop next door, El Punto, for a quick haircut. While chatting with the stylist about my upcoming article for The Pomona Bulletin, she paused and asked, "Wait, Ginza with a G or Jinza with a J? Because **Jinza** is way better!"

Before I could answer, the guy in the next chair chimed in, "No way, Ginza with a G is the best!" Suddenly, the whole barbershop was buzzing, and it felt like a scene straight out of a sitcom. Instead of debating politics or sports, everyone was passionately arguing about teriyaki bowls!

That's when I realized two things:

- 1. Living in Pomona is awesome.
- 2.1 had to do a deep dive into this Ginza vs. Jinza rivalry.

I took it to The Pomona Bulletin's Facebook page, and hundreds chimed in. The love for Ginza and Jinza was clear, but there was no winner. Then came a curveball: Kwon's. Suddenly, it was a three-way teriyaki showdown.

My family and I dove in to try them all. The verdict? All three are delicious, each with its own twist. We're now a house divided, but one thing's clear–Pomona's teriyaki game is strong.

- 1. Ginza Bowl | 4.5 stars on Google
 - **Known for**: Generous portions, freshly cooked teriyaki bowls, and a surprisingly good burger menu.
 - Family-owned and popular with employees of local businesses and loyal regulars.
 - Limited seating, but I've always found a spot easily.
 - 1495 W Holt Ave, Pomona, CA 91768. Closed
 Sundays. Drive-thru available.
- 2. **Jinza Teriyaki** | 4.5 stars on Google
 - Known for: Flavorful teriyaki, tacos, and even breakfast!
 - John, the friendly owner, works the front and is known for giving back to the community.
 - Tons of seating, but it gets packed during lunch, especially with Cal Poly students.
 - 3425 Pomona Blvd, Pomona, CA 91768. Closed Saturdays and Sundays. Offers meal prep and catering services. Online ordering available via jinzateriyaki.com for pick-up or delivery.
- 3. Kwon's | 4.4 stars on Google
 - **Known for**: Hearty portions—perfect for sharing or taking leftovers home.
 - Tons of positive reviews about their fried rice.
 - Seating is very limited and a bit awkward, but it works! Popular with the Stizzy crowd next door.
 - 1626 W Holt Ave, Pomona, CA 91768. Closed Sundays. Online ordering available for pick-up or delivery through Google.

Supporting Street Vendors in Pomona: A Resident's Perspective



long-time resident of Pomona, I have witnessed our city evolve in countless ways. From its vibrant cultural festivals to its tight-knit neighborhoods, Pomona thrives on diversity and community spirit. One aspect of our city's charm that stands out is our street vendors. These hardworking individuals bring life to our sidewalks, offering everything from delicious tacos to handmade crafts.

However, recent regulations have it harder for them to operate, and while I understand the city's concerns, I firmly believe that street vending should be allowed with proper oversight.



The Importance of Street Vendors

Street vendors aren't just small business owners-they're part of Pomona's culture. For many, grabbing a quick snack from a vendor is part of everyday life. They offer affordable stores.

Vending also opens doors for immigrants and low-income individuals to start businesses, support their families, and strengthen the local economy. When we back them, we're upholding the hard work and resilience that make Pomona special.

The Need for Oversight

Safety concerns are real. Blocked sidewalks, food handling issues, and tragedies like the 2022 fatal accident near a vending area highlight the need for better regulation. But banning vendors isn't the answer. Instead, we should create systems that let them work safely and @ @909Tacolandia legally-balancing safety with opportunity.

A Balanced Approach

Pomona can balance support for vendors and safety concerns with a few key steps:

- Simplify Permits: Cut through red tape and lower fees to make permits accessible and encourage compliance.
- Designate Vending Zones: Create safe, open spaces for vending to avoid sidewalk congestion.
- Educate Vendors: Offer workshops on food safety, permits, and business skills to set vendors up for success.
- Fair Inspections: Regular checks can ensure rules are followed without feeling punitive, fostering collaboration.

Thriving Spaces for Vendors

Street vendors are thriving in places where safety and structure come together:

- 909 Tacolandia: At 1444 E. Holt Ave., this weekend hotspot offers a vendor-friendly space away from traffic.
- 909 Open Market: Held Thursdays and the third Saturday of each month at 2201 N. White Ave., this market is safe, organized, and welcoming.

Both spots ensure permits are in place and provide free entry and parking, making them accessible to all.

Preserving Pomona's Character

Street vending is part of what makes Pomona special-its culture, diversity, and entrepreneurial drive. Thoughtful meals and unique goods, often supporting working-class policies and community support can help vendors thrive families who can't always visit traditional restaurants or without sacrificing safety. By working together, we can keep this vibrant part of our city alive and well.



The Mindful Advocate Mindfulness with a Purpose



Boasting a population of almost 152,000 (According to the 2020 US Census Bureau), one need only to lift their eyes from the gaze in front of them to take in the rich cultural diversity that is Pomona, CA. With nearly 79% of the population proudly claiming a race other than simply the

dominant culture in the US, you have found yourself in this beautiful Los Angeles suburb.

Deeply rooted within this city are the approximately 10,600 members of the Black and African American community, all who affectionately call Pomona their home. Many of whom in addition to residing here also have their place of work, find their education, and own businesses in some of the most popular locations in town.

The Library of Congress reminds us that 39 years ago Congress passed Public Law 99-244 designating February as "National Black (Afro-American) History Month", marking the beginning of the sixtieth annual public and private salute to Black History. In 1996 President Clinton issued Presidential Proclamation renaming the month "National African American History Month." Their encouragement to all is to celebrate in ways that would honor the many contributions made by members of the Black community to the areas of science, legislation, art, culture, and many others positively impacting the lives of all Americans.



PABSE works not only with the schools and educators, but involves the whole family and community in supporting and recognizing the achievements of our Black students and educators. 


