



# **Opening Prayer**


Let us pray..(pause)





# **Second Reading** A reading from the Letter to the Hebrews 5:7-9



Philip went and told Andrew; then Andrew and Philip went and told Jesus. Jesus answered them, "The hour has come for the Son of Man to be glorified. Truly, I tell you, unless a grain of wheat falls into the earth and dies, it remains just a alone; but if it dies, it bears much fruit. Those who love their life lose it, and those who hate their life in this world will keep it for eternal life. "Whoever serves me must follow me, and where I am, there will my servant be also. Whoever serves me, the Father will honor.

He said this to indicate the kind of death he was to die.

# Homily A New Covenant

As always, Good Morning and Welcome to the Fifth Sunday of Lent. Next Sunday we begin another Journey. First, Palm Sunday then Easter Sunday. Before we close out the contemplative period of Lent, we get to reacquaint ourselves with one of the great Prophets of Hebrew Scripture, Jeremiah. Jeremiah's life as a prophet and leader began when he was only 13. Close to the same time in Jesus's life when at 12 years old, He began His public life. Jeremiah spent a lifetime of trials, teaching, journeying, and yes, being murdered. He walked in the Footsteps of Christ 500 years before Jesus was born. The great oracle of Jeremiah announcing the New Covenant is sometimes referred to as "The Gospel before the Gospel."

The Second Reading today from the Book of Hebrews was written. Yes, that is the end of the sentence. It WAS written, but, in reality, no one knows who wrote it. Paul is often given credit but, it lines up more with Luke. Whoever wrote it was clearly a Hebrew Scripture scholar and a follower of Jesus. He felt the Passion, Suffering and Lament from Jesus's crying like he was standing next to Him.

John's Gospel today, as usual, has many players in a familiar story to us, but just so we take time to consider Bethsaida. It was a great fishing lake where many people gathered not only to fish but also to receive healing. We carry that name to hospitals worldwide. In the Gospel, Jesus is once again telling a story. This time about Falling Seeds. In order to fulfill its circle of life a seed must first fall on soil, die, and rise as the fullness of life as a wonderous creation. Jesus was not talking about starting a garden or talking about Johnny Appleseed, He was talking about Himself. Christ must die, Christ must be buried, and Christ will rise again. How can I take anything from this story? Am I supposed to die, get buried and rise again? Well, yes. But in a spiritual way.

I must die to Christ. How??? By being willing to take my faith seriously. To really follow Jesus as best I can. Bury??? Yes, be willing to place all of me in the hands of God. That takes Trust. Bury my ego into the Trustful hands of God.

And Rise??? Yes, each and every day, embrace the Faith, Trust, and Hope that has been so freely given to me that I am confident that I, like the ancient followers of Jesus, continue to Walk with Jesus the Christ now and forever. God Bless.

The peace of the Lord is always with you. *R: And also with you.* 



# **Preface**

The Lord be with you.

R: And also with you.

Lift up your hearts.

R: We lift them up to the Creator.

Let us give thanks to our Loving God.

R: It is right to give God thanks and praise.

It is indeed right to give you our thanks and praise, O God, for you put your saving word on our lips and in our hearts and strengthen us to endure times of trial. ## Eucharistic Prayer

Source of All Being, send your Holy Spirit upon these gifts. Let them become for us the Body and Blood of your Son, Jesus the Christ.

Gracious God, creator of the universe and giver of life, you formed us in your own image and called us to dwell in your infinite love.

All: You gave the world into our care that we might be your faithful stewards and show forth your bountiful grace.

You never ceased to care for us and prepared the way of salvation for all people. Through Abraham and Sarah, you called us into covenant with you. You delivered us from slavery, sustained us in the wilderness, and raised up prophets to renew your promise of salvation. Then, in the fullness of time, you sent your eternal Word, made mortal flesh in Jesus. Born into the human family and dwelling among us, he revealed your glory.

All: Giving himself freely to death on the cross so that we might know the depths of your love for us, he opened the way to freedom and life.

God of all, on the night before he died, Jesus took bread, and when he had given thanks to you, he broke it, gave it to his friends, and said:

All: Take this, all of you, and eat it: this is my body, which will be given up for you.

As supper was ending, he took the cup, gave thanks to you, gave it to his friends, and said:

All: Take this, all of you, and drink from it: this is the cup of my blood, the blood of the new and everlasting covenant. It will be shed for you and for all so that sins may be forgiven. Do this in memory of me.



Let us proclaim the mystery of our faith:

All: With our whole being, we affirm His birth. With our whole life, we proclaim His resurrection. With our whole presence, we live as disciples and await His coming in glory.

Accept, O God, our sacrifice of praise. Send your Spirit upon us, and grant that we who eat this bread and drink this cup may be filled with your life and goodness. Through the abiding presence of Christ, empower us to live the gospel of peace and bring reconciliation to the world in His Name. All this we ask through your Son Jesus.

R: Through Christ, with Christ, in Christ. In the unity of the Holy Spirit, all glory and honor are Yours, almighty God, Forever and ever. Amen.



Gathered together as Children of God, we pray as Jesus taught us:

All: Our Father/Mother in heaven, hallowed be Your name, Your kingdom come, Your will be done, on earth as it is in heaven. Give us this day our daily bread and forgive us our trespasses as we forgive those who trespass against us. Do not let us fall into temptation, but deliver us from evil.

Deliver us, O God, from every evil and grant us peace in our days, that with the help of Your grace, we may always be free in Your love and protected from all anxiety as we wait in joyful hope for the coming of our Savior, Jesus Christ, now and forever. *Amen*




# **Sending Forth**
