Schulz: A Family History

Paul Schulz can remember the funeral of his grandmother, Katherine, taking place in Greenwood Hills Cemetery. That's quite remarkable when you consider the fact that Paul is 92 years old. In all, there are 7 of Paul's family members buried in this 129-year-old historic resting place. Of the seven, one of them is Paul's son, David. Until last year, Paul himself has continuously taken care of the Schulz family plots. Hereafter, he is relying on Greenwood Hills volunteers—and for that he is forever grateful.

Paul's parents, Adolf and Millie Schulz, moved with Paul and his sister, Trudy (now Moore), to the Capitol Hills community. Their house was located just off Canby Street. The Schulz family lived in the Canby Street house until 1929 while the children attended Capitol Hills School. Their first move was to a 150-acre farm near Oregon City, and the family lived there until 1942 when they returned to Portland.

Paul's father, Adolf, was born in Germany in 1880, and his family came to the United States when he was just 11 years old. The family's first home was in North Dakota, but in 1900 they settled permanently in Portland. Paul's mother, Millie, was a Swiss immigrant. When she was 21 years old, she emigrated from Switzerland and crossed the Atlantic. She arrived in Salem where her brother lived in 1911.

How the couple met is vague. Most likely, they were introduced at the First Reform German Church which, at that time, was located at SW 12th and Clay. Other Schulz's in Greenwood Hills include Paul's brother, Alfred; grandfather, Daniel; uncles, Herman and Emil; and aunt, Lydia.

Paul retired as a Branch Manager of the U.S. National Bank after 40 years. He has lived in Portland all his life with the exception of five-and-half years in the Air Corps during World War II. Paul was a test pilot and later flew cargo planes around the Mediterranean. His most vivid memory is flying the Yugoslavian wounded partisan fighters out of that country.

Paul understands the work at Greenwoods is never ending, and he acknowledges that he could never quite catch up on cleaning all his family grave markers. Of note, Paul's parents are buried in River View Cemetery located next door to Greenwood Hills.



WOW! Takes on a Whole New Meaning


Did you know that Greenwood Hills Cemetery has treestones? What exactly is a treestone for that matter? Treestones are grave markers of varying sizes shaped like a tree stump. Up until the 1920s, the Woodmen of the World (WOW) fraternal organization used these early grave markers to identify members. Common characteristics of treestones include depictions of WOW relics such as the maul and wedge, an axe and, at times, a dove of peace with an olive branch.

Joseph Cullen Root first founded Modern Woodmen of the World in 1882. By 1890, he left the organization and formed Woodmen of the World. WOW's main purpose was charitable—act as a minister to the afflicted, provide relief for the distressed, cast a sheltering arm around the defenseless, and to encourage broad charitable views in the larger sense. Founded in Omaha, Nebraska, one of WOW's main offices stills stands today and, until 2002, was the tallest building in Omaha at just under 45 stories high.

With membership in the U.S. of over 800,000, WOW currently operates as a large, privately held insurance company while also providing several types of financial Another aspect of the organization's mission is patriotic in nature. WOW's program entitled, In Honor and Remembrance, pays tribute to the heroes and victims of the September 11th attacks. WOW is also one of the leading presenters of U.S. flags to schools and non-profit organizations. On top of that, there are approximately 2,000 community-based WOW lodges throughout the nation. Lodges conduct volunteer, patriotic and charitable activities that benefit individuals and communities. These lodges have presented more than 1.4 million U.S. flags.

So on your next visit to Greenwood Hills, bring a friend or family member, and look for one of the several impressive WOW markers. If you are lucky enough to spot one, you will gain a better appreciation for this impressive fraternal organization.
