

Since its inception, Mule Day has grown into a oneof-a-kind event that honors the hardworking mules that played a crucial role in the development of our region and our Nation.



START YOUR



Start your day at one of our many coffeehouses with a handcrafted coffee and fresh pastry. In the mood for a larger breakfast? Try Puckett's Grocery & Restaurant to enjoy a classic southern breakfast with options like biscuits and gravy or their skillet cinnamon roll.

The estate played a significant role during the Civil War, particularly during the battle of Spring Hill on Nov. 29, 1864.

Not a history buff? No problem! Enjoy the beautiful, natural scenery of Maury County. Explore scenic hiking trails and waterfalls, paddle or fish along the serene Duck River or at the picturesque Williamsport Lakes, and savor fresh finds from our vibrant Farmers' Markets.





Festivities Begin

Mule Day festivities begin Thursday at 10AM. See Schedule of Events for complete list of activities.

Park Admission

Thursday, Friday, Saturday, \$10, 10am - 7pm, Sunday, \$5, 10am - 2pm. Weekend passes available for only \$25. All campers are required to have weekend passes whenever they arrive. Please get them when you make arrangements for camping. Price includes state amusement tax and are good for all in park activities, excluding rides.

Craft Fair

We have one of the largest craft fairs in the area! Stop by for a unique shopping experience. With over one hundred vendors we have something for everyone. Shop handcrafted jewelry, art, quilts, home decor, apparel, furniture, western tack and clothing, toys, and more. The event only happens once a year so don't miss it!

Concessions – Food

Italian sausage and peppers...roasted corn...pizza...philly cheese steaks... onion blossoms...kettle corn...hot apple fritters...funnel cakes...ice cream...nachos...lemonade...cotton candy...and of course hamburgers and hot dogs. As you enjoy the activities of Mule Day be sure to sample all your favorite foods. All food concessions are open until 7:00 PM, and are inspected by the Tennessee Health Department. There will be live music throughout the entire event. There will be a variety of musical entertainment ranging from bluegrass to hillbilly. Children's Entertainment

Be sure you take your children to the entertainment section, where they will find all kinds of rubber inflatable's to bounce around on, face painting, vendors with games etc. This section which is located to the left of the **Old Arena**.

Commercial Vendors

Limited vendor space is available at Maury County Park. Booth sizes range from 10' to 35' frontage and 10' to 20' in depth, depending on the location. Vendors with big rigs are encouraged to set-up starting Tuesday afternoon or all day on Wednesday, but everyone must be operational by 10AM on Thursday. Corporate Sponsors & equine related vendors will receive priority for new vendors.



Check-In Center

The Red Top Log Cabin at the entrance to Maury County Park will be used as a Check-in Center for exhibitors, concessionaires and people bringing equipment that need assistance.

Our visitors that know where they are going, have the correct paperwork, etc. need not stop at the cabin. The cabin will be open through Friday evening.

The Information Center within the park will still be open and is there to assist everyone with general information, official Mule Day pins, bumper stickers, etc.

Golf Carts/ATVs at Park

No Golf Carts or ATVs are allowed inside "the fenced-in area" at Maury County Park, except for those that have a "handicapped sticker" or Mule Day Officials. All operators must have a current drivers license.

Process For Vendor Registration

Vendors that had a booth at Mule Day 2024 will receive an application during early January 2025, along with other information, including insurance requirements for Mule Day 2025. Payment with completed application must be received in our office by February 15th or the space will be given to other vendors that have applied. New vendors may start calling during January, and will be placed on a waiting list until space becomes available. Contact us via email at: info@muleday.com

Riding After Dark

The Mule Day Committee strongly advises that when riding after dark (in or outside the park) please have something reflective on yourself, your horse and/or wagon and cart. This rule is for safety reasons.

Disclaimer

State Law requires that your animals have proof of an Equine Infectious Anemia (Coggins) Test, done in the last 12 months must be presented for verification before animals are permitted on the grounds or to participate at Mule Day functions.

Equine that are sold require the Coggins done within the last six months. Further, Tennessee State Law REQUIRES everyone from out-of-state to have a health certificate on equine entering Tennessee. The health certificate is only good for 30 days from the time it is issued.

Horseback and Muleback riding is allowed in designated areas at Maury County Park until 10PM. Riding at a walk except in the arenas.

Under Tennessee Law, an equine activity sponsor or an equine professional, or any other person is not liable for an injury to or the death of a participant in equine activities resulting from the inherent risks of equine activities pursuant to TENNESSEE CODE ANNOTATED, SECTION 44-20-103.

Camping

Limited camping is allowed in the Park. Spaces must be reserved by advance payment received by February 15th. First time campers should call ASAP in January to be placed on a waiting list. Rates: \$160.00 with electricity and \$60.00 without electricity. All campers are required to have a gate pass. No bus transportation to parade from Park is available. All reservations should be made through the Mule Day Office. No alcoholic beverages allowed in camping or Park area. No horse stock will be allowed in electric camping area. Original **Proof of Negative Coggins Test** Required for all animals entering the park. Dogs must be on a leash at all times. Your campsite must be cleaned up before you leave.

Stalls

Limited stall space is available for \$75, inside stall, \$50 outside stall (only 2 animals per stall, except miniature mules & donkeys that are separated by panels inside stalls). Reservations from last year's stall renters must be accompanied by advance payment which must be received by February 15th or stalls will no longer be held. First time stall renters should call ASAP in January to be placed on a waiting list. After February 15th, first time stall renters on the waiting list will be notified of stall availability. Stall renters receive one vehicle pass - a vehicle pass per each stall rented will no longer be issued. No jacks in portable stalls. No horse stallions allowed anywhere in **Maury County Park on Mule Day** weekend.

NOTE: The show barns (covered barns) will only be rented to persons having mules, Jacks or Jennies. Horses will not be allowed in show barns except those that have been grand-fathered in. Persons wishing to get stalls for horses will be allowed to use outside stalls.



FEED TIME RACE — 2 PERSON TEAMS TIMED INDIVIDUALLY AGAINST THE CLOCK AT A WALK OR TROT

A timed event in which there are 2 "lanes" with 4 pallets each equally space the length of the arena. The 2 pallets closest to the start line will have 6 bales of hay each stacked on them. Each team will leave the start line and load all 6 bales on their ground slide. Stop at each of the next 3 stations and unload 2 bales at each station. Make the turn around the final pallet and start loading the bales back on their ground slide. Stop at the final pallet and unload all 6 bales back onto the last pallet. IN THE FASTEST TIME! 

Most years we are blessed with weather good enough to allow for a net profit, which is used to produce the next Mule Day and support the charitable efforts of the Maury County Bridle & Saddle Club.

Did you know that for nearly 50 years funds raised from Mule Day

have supported local schools, civic organizations, multiple construction and site improvements at the Maury County Park? Plus, school programs, scouting organizations, Maury Magic Riders, the bath houses, arenas, RV hookups at the park and more have all benefited from the success of the Mule Day Festival.

2024 marked the 50th Year of the annual Mule Day Celebration and as a way to improve and concentrate our charitable efforts the Maury County Bridle and Saddle Club and Mule Day have elected to focus these efforts on providing scholarship support for CTE (Career & Technical Education) and



Vocational Training to the youth of Maury County. MULE DAY IS PROUD TO WELCOME THE MULE HEROES OF THE GREAT SMOKEY MOUNTAINS TO COLUMBIA. When hurricane Helene hit the mountains of East Tennessee and Western North Carolina causing catastrophic flooding, Mountain Mule Packer Ranch stepped into the chaos, saving lives and giving hope.

Mike and Michele Toberer were in the final preparations for another "training mission" when the devastating storm hit and immediately jumped to action. But, like every hero story there's always, "the rest of the story." Mike's packing career began in Northern California doing what packers there do, taking visitors into the mountains to enjoy the back country of the Sierra Nevada Mountain ranges that are only accessible by foot or atop a good mule. Kicking off each spring with a week at Bishop Mule Days followed by dudes and trail riders in the summer months and hunters in the fall and winter, their life as mule packers wasn't much different than the other packers in their area.

That all changed on 911, with the War on Terror. Through family connections to the military, Mike was asked to help train soldiers who would need to have a basic understanding of mule packing to operate effectively in the rugged mountains of Afghanistan. In 2012, Mike & Michele decided moving to North Carolina to be closer to the special forces teams they would be training was necessary. Mike is honored to assist in training some of the most elite soldiers to work in some of the harshest conditions on the planet. It was during

the spin up to another training mission in late September, 2024 when Helene struck with an unimaginable level of destruction to electrical transmission lines, roads, bridges, interstate highways and entire towns and villages wiped away.

Encased within the story of how the Mountain Mule Packer Ranch helped its fellow man were hundreds of other stories that showcase the giving nature

The number of generous volunteers who donated supplies, feed for the mules, offers to haul, sort and deliver to staging areas the items needed by those now trapped in remote areas would be impossible to list – suffice it to say – many a tough packer and soldier were brought to tears by the generosity shown.

This show demonstrates how well mules work to wagons and how well they are trained to both "lines" and voice command.

A lot of time and practice, along with driving skills make everything come together for this event. As you watch this show you will soon learn how the driver gets the mules attention and also how he gets them to go in the direction he wants them to go.

In the first two classes we have log skidding. This is with the driver using ONE line or NO line to guide the mules between the pilings. The best part of these two classes is when the driver uses only voice commands. This takes a lot of training and time between the driver and his mules. During the old days this was a much more common practice than today. The voice command is better with mules that are used for logging so as not to tangle lines in the trees.

Classes three through nine, the mules and horses are hitched to wagons or carts. In class five, the ladies show the men how to drive. In class six, notice how well the mules and drivers work together to back, cross obstacles, and turn in the correct direction. Please notice that the teams are matched in color, size, and uniformity. Now sit back and enjoy the afternoon show of skills and see how well these sometime stubborn animals show off just how smart they truly are.



I HAD COME TO GET A STORY...AND BOY DID I GET A STORY!


estern Mule Magazine published its first issue in February 1994. Armed with little more than a true respect and love for mules, mule history and All THINGS MULE, and maybe more importantly a loving wife who said she would follow me anywhere. At the time, there were a handful of people across America who were training mules, training mules for various disciplines, trainers with knowledge and an understanding of these wonderful mules. I have always been a curious guy, and I have always sought to know more. I wanted to hear from these folks who raised mules, used mules, worked mules, rode mules, and trained mules and I felt others did, too. Some of those trainers became contributors and others began to put on clinics, produced videos, and some produced well-trained mules offered for sale to the public. We have been blessed by all who have been willing to share their knowledge.

Thirty-one years ago, my wife Neta and I traveled to Columbia Mule Day; I had been versed on the event and was told of its long history with mules. I had come to get a story and boy did I ever get a story! I've been telling that story now for over thirty years about this part of America and its mules. Columbia, Tennessee is enthralled with a rich history of mules and their ways. Rich in agriculture, the timber industries and as a valuable commodity to the region and outside the region. In this part of Tennessee's history, the mule has very much affected the lives of its people; mules played a huge roll in the region's agriculture, commerce, and trade. Folks here knew a good mule when they saw one, not everybody does. They bred to produce good mules here, and raised good mules, not everybody could, and they knew how to handle them, train them, work them, buy, and trade them. Not all communities endorsed mules in American history...Columbia, Tennessee did, and today they celebrate it, calling it Columbia Tennessee Mule Day!

Thirty-one years later that girl (Neta, my wife) who came here with me, all those many years ago, will travel with me once again to Columbia Mule Day in Columbia, Tennessee. Mule Day has become a spring ritual for Neta and me. A time to once again see many friends we have made over the years. It's became a reunion, and we never fail to make new friends each year. We are always excited to experience the history here that is so embedded in this mule town. As a great bonus during this time of year we witness the beauty of spring exploding on those Tennessee Hills. The blooming Dogwoods and fresh mowed grass are a welcome sight and smell. Great mules gather here from Tennessee, Kentucky, Missouri, Alabama, Georgia, Arkansas, and many other states. Some of the best mules in all the world. It's truly something special to see.

Not a year has gone by that something NEW hasn't shown up at Mule Day. Just when you think you've seen it all, something we've never seen before comes along. I saw my first twenty mule team hitch here at Columbia Mule Day twenty-eight or twenty-nine years ago; the hitch was impressive enough, also impressive were those twenty mules tied around flatbed hay wagons with their harness and collars laying on the wagons in front of them. I thought they would have the harness eat up by morning and the wagons, too...they didn't. I've seen two of the biggest mules I have laid eyes on and the smallest mules I've ever seen. Mule colors of every description, good mules, and bad mules...

Today mostly good mules. At Columbia Mule Day, there will inevitably be a kid, boy or girl, coming down the street riding on one of a pair of some big team of big pretty mules with both hands on the hames and a smile from ear to ear. It will forever remind me of my childhood. I know that feeling.

I have so many stories to tell of Columbia Mule Day, of events, happenings, of mules and those who own them, stories of mule men and women who have left us, but their memories have not. From the late Mr. Glen Kelso, Johnny Kelso's daddy, when asked, "How many runaways you been in?" His answer I'll never forget, Mr. Kelso said, "Why mules don't run away...they'll run maybe a quarter a mile...That ain't away."

The late Mr. L. C. Tabor, Greg Tabor's daddy, I asked him, "Those that didn't use mules in the area back then, why didn't they?" His answers were always wise and simple, "Awww, horse folks like the horses, we mule folks liked the mules, and got along with them."

Mr. Leon Oliver, who is still with us, raised Jackstock, Jennies, Mules and Cremello horses. Back in 1995, Mr. Oliver was sittin' in his wagon waiting for the parade to start. Mr. Oliver had his wagon hooked to as fine a jack as you'll lay eyes on, hooked next to the jack was a fine gray dappled stud horse. I sat back and studied this for some time. Looked like a wreck waiting to happen to me. They stood dead still, never moved a foot, one never as much as looked at the other. I couldn't' take it anymore, I went to him and asked, "How do you get by with that?" On came the biggest ole' smile and he said, "Ahh, that's just the way they are...they've always got along." It wasn't the last time I saw them hooked side by side, I saw them many years in the Mule Day Parade. I remind him of it every year.

I have many more stories to tell of Columbia Mule Day. It's an event where you'll make a tradition yourself. Thirty plus years later, Neta and I still love Columbia Mule Day. If you're at Mule Day come by the *Western Mule Magazine* booth, located at MULE CENTRAL, in the big tent, on Mule Alley, across from the Mule Day Office. Please stop and say Hi! 

The Stockman packs 3 steel blades in a convenient but practical pocket knife.

The clip blade is commonly used as a multi-purpose blade and preferred for detail work. The second blade allows for added strength at the point making it great for carving, achieving a clear cut. The spade blade is commonly used as an all-purpose utility blade.

Each of the knives are boxed, serialized, and etched with the Maury County Bridle and Saddle Club logo. There will also be 100 non-serialized knives available for \$85 each, first come first served. Knives 1 through 10 will be auctioned off at the mainstage in the Maury County Park on Saturday, April the 5th, 2025 at 2:00. 



PARADE REQUIREMENTS

Anyone wanting to participate in the parade should send a brief description of their parade entry to the Mule Day Office 931-381-9557, or P.O. Box 66, Columbia, TN 38402 by March 1st. They will be notified by mail of their lineup number by March 22nd.

All entries must be in place and ready for judging by 10 a.m. Judging is in the assembly area before the parade begins and the entries will be judged on originality, and appropriateness to Mule Day, Judge's decision will be final.

No cars, trucks, vans or tractors will be accepted as entries except those decorated as floats, pulling floats, or carrying beauty queens, political figures, etc. No campaign signs, bicycles, motorcycles, go carts, dune buggies, lawn mowers or 4-wheelers permitted on parade route.

No entry in the parade shall wear or display any costume, flag, sign, banner, standard or insignia, which in the sole discretion of the Mule Day Committee of the Maury County Bridle and Saddle Club, is judged to be offensive according to community standards recognized by said Committee, or which in said Committee's sole judgment would be repulsive, or cause fear or anxiety to a large portion of the Community and/or might incite people to violence.

Alcoholic beverages are prohibited in assembly area, along parade route and at Maury County Park. Anyone who does not comply will be subject to arrest and will be PULLED FROM THE PARADE ON THE SPOT. Nothing is to be thrown from or passed out from parade entries or by anyone participating in parade. ABSOLUTELY NO BALLOONS OR BUBBLE MACHINES ALONG PARADE ROUTE. Likewise, parade entrants must be suitably dressed. Shirtless riders will not be permitted to participate in the parade. Dogs must be on a leash on Parade route.

State Law requires that your animals have proof of an Equine Infectious Anemia Test (Negative Coggins Disease) at all events during Mule Day. This test must have been done in the last 12 months. See disclaimer on page 14. Rules continue on next page.

Parade Rules

The Mule Day parade is one of the highlights of the festivities and is attended by more people than any other event or activity during Mule Day. Each year the parade grows and the organizers strive to make it bigger and better than the year before. We are at a point where for the time being we can no longer make it bigger, but we can continue to make it better. The line-up area is going to be shorter for the parade and therefore we ask only pre-registered entries show up on the day of the parade.

All parade participants should pre-register thru the Mule Day office prior to March 1st. The parade is for approved entries that are pre-registered and assigned a line-up number through the office. If you have not pre-registered, we ask you come out and watch the parade, but not attempt to be a participant.

All participants are asked to adhere to the parade rules.

- 1. Proof of current Coggins Test required for all equine
- 2. No balloons or bubble machines in the parade or along the parade route
- 3. No alcohol allowed in the parade or at the park
- 4. Horse and mule riders will ride four abreast
- 5. Shirts and shoes must be worn
- 6. No passing in the parade. You must stay in your spot.
- 7. No riding backwards in the parade
- 8. Nothing is to be thrown or given from parade entries to spectators. This includes candy, t-shirts, passes, tickets, trinkets, etc.
- 9. No bicycles, motor bikes or four wheelers in the parade
- 10. Mule riders will ride in front of the MCB&S Club wagon train
- 11. Entries should stay in the center of the street and follow the center line
- 12. Floats should adhere to the current theme
- 13. Entry number should be displayed on both sides of entry
- 14. Anyone not obeying parade rules will be asked to leave the parade
- 15. Mounted riders are asked to register as a group and will be assigned a parade number. Other mounted riders will be placed in the back of the parade and will be required to ride in an organized manner.
- 16. These rules are intended for everyone in the parade and are necessary to make a safe and enjoyable parade for both participants and spectators
