


When to Visit

- By Sea: Cruise enthusiasts can dock at Bridgetown Port.










TOP THINGS TO DO IN BARBADOS

- Flying Fish & Cou-Cou: Barbados' national dish, dish made from cornmeal and okra, cooked together to form a smooth, polenta-like consistency
- **Pudding & Souse:** A Saturday special, pickled pork (souse) served with a spicy steamed sweet potato pudding.
- **Fish Cakes:** Deep-fried savory fritter made with salted cod, flour, herbs, and spices.

- Castaways: Fusion of Caribbean and international cuisine.


Best Nightlife Spots

Water Sports






Historic Exploration

However, keep in mind that driving is on the left side of the road, which may take some adjustment for those unfamiliar. Taxis are also easily accessible, but it's advisable to agree on a fare before beginning your journey, as most taxis do not use meters. Whether you're hopping on a bus, renting a car, or taking a taxi, getting around Barbados is straightforward and caters to different travel styles.

Practical Information

The local currency in Barbados is the Barbadian Dollar (BBD), though US dollars are widely accepted, making it easy for visitors to navigate transactions. While English is the official language, you'll often hear the locals speaking in the Bajan dialect, a colorful and unique way of communicating through shortened, broken words. Visitors will find that Bajans are generally warm and helpful, though you may occasionally encounter eager taxi drivers, street beggars, or people soliciting various services. In these situations, a firm but polite "no thank you" will typically suffice to avoid any unnecessary interaction. Staying aware and assertive will help you enjoy the island comfortably while experiencing its vibrant culture and charm.
