

The commitment and hearts of all of these youth are truly inspirational. We hope to feature several of their stories in this and future newsletters and at this year's annual dinner on October 13th.




US Youth...

Elizabeth Glenn, age 18, Boston University

The following is from an email update that Elizabeth sent in March of this year:

Natasha and I just returned from a week at Second Hostel (one of the homes for HIV positive children). We see most of the kids from that hostel every day at school, and we drop by the hostel to say hi to the other little kids, but it was so much fun to really live there. It has a nice rhythm. We slept on the floor of the girls' room, so we were in bed by 9:15 every night and up at an equally early hour. Yesumani, the large joyful cook, sleeps on the floor of that room too. She has established herself as the



mother of everyone at the hostel, and she took good care of us. We called her Amma (Mother). The staff at Second Hostel don't speak any English, but we were warmly welcomed into their community.

I think that my Telugu (the local language in Hyderabad) improved that week too, partly through my many conversations with Murali – a little boy who is quite a talker after he warms up. He is fascinated by so many things, and he's told me long enthusiastic stories about snakes that he's seen and people he has watched out on the road. I also really enjoyed talking (in English) with the students in my class – Lavanya, Shanker and Bhanu. I really like my kids, and I'm so glad that I can now really talk with them and learn what's on their minds.


Deepak – the severely malnourished 3 year old boy who came in a few weeks ago – is looking a lot better these days. He walks around a lot (he couldn't walk when he first came) and smiles when we come home from school. We have fun feeding each other grapes and playing hide-and-seek. He is still cranky at times, and whenever he sees food, he screams for it, even if he doesn't end up eating it. I guess he's just afraid he might not get another chance.

The kids at Second Hostel are always singing, always piling into our laps – I'm going back today for another week. I like life there.

This year, Matthew and Ian have decided to sponsor a little boy who is in an orphanage in India. His name is Parvej and he is living in the orphanage because both his parents died of AIDS. Unfortunately Parvej is HIV positive. It costs approximately \$650 a year to provide him with food, shelter, and medicine.

The orphanage that is caring for Parvej is called Agape International. Agape was founded by a woman from Massachusetts and is dedicated to caring for orphans and families devastated by AIDS. 
