Medical Facility Ready To Go!



Agape has successfully rented and finished the build-out of our new medical facility, located within 15 minutes of all of our current orphanages. The building is currently serving as a temporary school for our children until we locate a new school building, but our hope is to have the hospital running soon. The building is three stories with room for 20 hospital beds. The first floor will deliver care to sick and dying parents, the second floor will provide Lab services and Dental care and the third floor is dedicated care for Agape children.

The new facility will allow our children to receive care in a convenient, comfortable and familiar environment versus the government hospital they had been traveling to. We also continue to lose some children who simply come to us too sick to recover. The hospital will allow these children a place to feel safe and loved. We are providing ARV (anti retroviral) medications to all HIV positive children where such treatment is medically appropriate. The new hospital also allows us to administer and monitor these treatments in a cost effective and convenient way.

Because of the low costs in India, we budgeted annual operating costs for the entire facility at \$50,000 a year. This includes hiring a full time doctor and nursing staff. The Edgerley family of Brookline have agreed to fund the first three years of operating expenses associated with the hospital. Thank you Edgerleys!



Dick reports that one little 3 ½ year old boy sat on his lap, held his hand, and would not let him go. Dick's eyes fill with tears as he relates his experiences at Agape. Dick sent a letter about his experiences at Agape to his Dartmouth friends, and they responded with checks to sponsor and help these beautiful children.







It is obvious that Agape is living up to its name—'unconditional love."

At one point, Pastor Joe and the CIC team washed all the children's feet as a gesture of love and service, telling them, "As we have served you, so should you love and serve others." "It was a very powerful experience; I can't even describe how moving it was for all of us, especially the children," commented Ellen.











Sam Rodgriguez washes feet.



More Kids Helping Kids





Maya Ambady (age 13) and Leena Ambady (age 10) of Winchester, Massachusetts first heard about Agape International from their mom, Nalini Ambady, a professor of psychology at Tufts University. Learning about the children that Agape serves—children with very few resources, options, or hope—inspired the girls not only to do something themselves, but to mobilize and involve the larger community in the effort.

Instead of simply asking people for money, they decided on a more entrepreneurial (and artistic!) approach. In true community spirit, a local artist who had heard about their aspirations happily donated a large assortment of natural and decorative papers. Maya and Leena then recruited a group of friends and neighbor children together. Sadie Zuch (age 12), Jacob Zuch (age 10), Eva Gaufberg (age 10), Sophia Gaufberg (age 8), Rachel Gaufberg (age 12), joined Leena and Maya to fashion beautiful handmade greeting cards from the donated papers. Matched with envelopes and tied into small bundles with raffia ribbon, these children had created a stationary line ready for sale!
