ONE WOMAN... TWO TRIPS ... 240 ORPHANS IMPACTED

"In a gentle way, you can shake the world."

This is a story of love. Not the romantic, hearts and flowers kind, but the kind of love that moves a person to leave their comfortable home in Illinois, travel 28 hours, navigate 2 airports, (not to mention the TSA), immigration, customs, use bathrooms with no western toilets, drive on roads jammed with honking drivers, cows, dogs, goats, and people trying not to collide, all so you can visit orphans impacted by AIDS - many living with HIV - in India. That takes a special kind of love,

the kind of love that Marie Roesler has for Agape. Her love has truly shaken the world and helped the lives of many children at Agape.

India was not on the list of places Marie wanted to go. But her husband Harry felt compelled to volunteer at Agape with a team from the Evangelical Covenant

Since then she has organized three major fundraising events, lots of smaller events, a big team of volunteers, secured dozens of child sponsors, and raised lots of money for Agape's needs. She went back to visit the children last March.

Marie says, "I went to Agape with the best of intentions of just loving on the kids. I thought I was going to work at the school and do whatever they needed." But she found that her plans were only a small part of what would take place in India. She learned that these children do not only need to be helped and loved, but they have a need to love and help others too.

Marie was touched to see the kids, who are so poor and with such health issues, so easily give away the little they have. "How can I ever not be thankful for every single gift I have? How can I ever go through a day without a huge smile? Agape's children have taught me about appreciation and how to be happy no matter what. Many of them are only alive because of the medical attention and care they get at Agape. They have been devastated by AIDS, but they are so grateful for all

that they have. They are so happy for the lives they now live thanks to Agape and its supporters. "

To some people, volunteering in India conjures up images of Mother Theresa working with the poorest of the poor and the dying in filthy, unsanitary conditions. That is one picture. Marie found something quite different at Agape. The school

alone has gone from two class-rooms to a 32 room building where lower kindergarten through high school is taught. It even has science lab and computer labs, a library and a study hall! The children learn English, which opens wide the doors of opportunity. And almost 20 of the students who graduated from the Agape school and are now being

sponsored through college.

Marie had a blast going from classroom to classroom, getting everyone to smile for their sponsor photos. This, along with building repair and painting at Agape's seven orphanages, helping the children with correspondence to their sponsors and other special projects are all part of what short-term volunteer work looks like at Agape. The incredible sights, shopping and Indian food are an added bonus!

Marie has committed to return to Agape again. She's been won over by the children and has seen firsthand how well the children are cared for, and how carefully every penny is invested. She knows that the more people who go, the more who will fall in love with Agape just like she did. Then they too can "shake the world" by offering life, hope and love to the 240+ precious children that call Agape "home".
