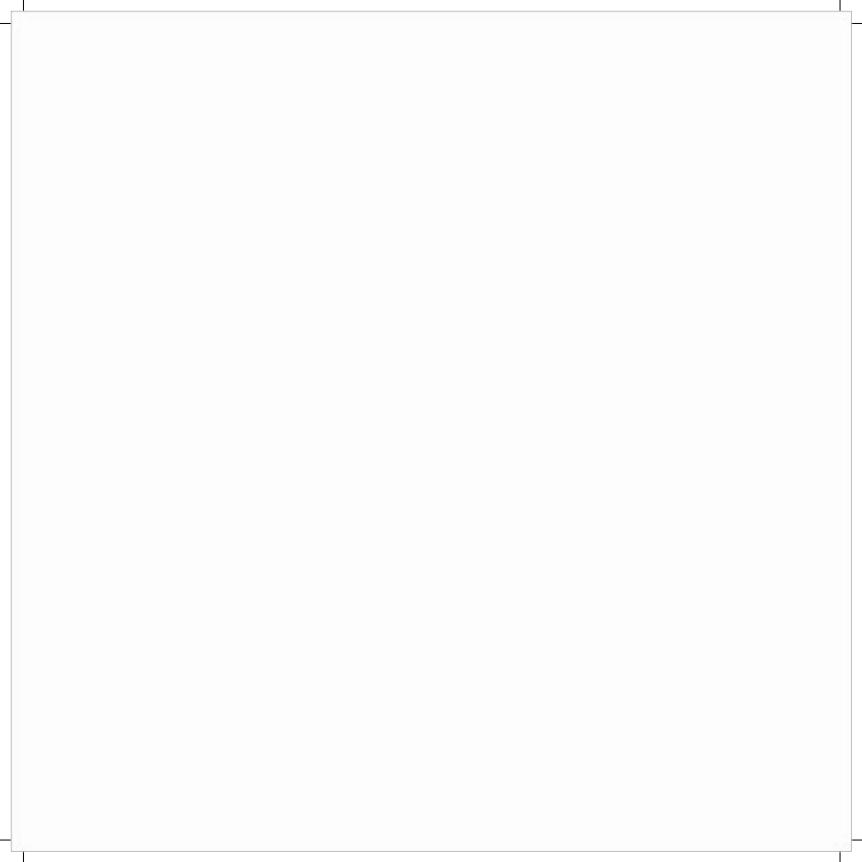

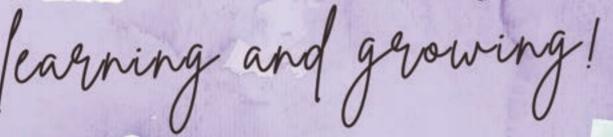

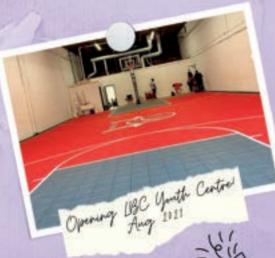

# MORE THAN JUST A GAME

For our LBC team, basketball is more than just a game. It has the power to break through race and gender barriers and provide a platform to empower and encourage Black girls and young women to lead. Over the past decade, we have seen a rise in basketball's popularity and, more recently, the phenomenal growth of the Women's National Basketball Association (WNBA). There has never been a better time than the present for basketball, which is very encouraging for our LBC team and its future potential!

#### CALL FOR EQUITY

It was an honour to host Pascale St-Onge, Federal Minister of Sport, Allison Sandmeyer-Graves, CEO of Canadian Women & Sport, along with MPs Lisa Hepfner, Pam Damoff and Iqwinder Gageer at our LBC Youth Centre. Founder & ED Toyo gave a powerful speech about ensuring everyone can access quality sports and recreation.





#### MENTAL WELLNESS

Young Dark & Anxious uses basketball as a segue to open up conversations around mental health in a culturally responsive and girl-friendly safe space while learning new strategies to improve mental well-being from health professionals. Year after year, our team sees the powerful impact our 12-week program has on our teen girls and instills a strong sense of belonging.

#### LBC STARS

We believe that the **best basketball**players should be playing in the higher ranks, not just those who can afford it. This is why we were so excited last fall to launch LBC Stars, our new U14 prep/rep initiative that offers free registration for low-income Black females and gender-diverse youth. Our goal is to ensure that real talent does not go unnoticed and opportunities to play college or university basketball are not lost for those who need it the most!

# WELLBEING INSIDE & OUT

Growing up has always been complicated. But today's world is making it even more challenging to navigate. Our team continues to see more mental health issues coming up, and unfortunately, not many supports are available. LBC is committed more than ever to supporting every child and youth seeking help, and our programming is intentionally designed to speak to the issues impacting our young people today.

#### DIAL-A-COUNSELLOR

Our Dial-A-Counsellor crisis and support line ensures that someone is always available to listen when a young person needs to talk. We have trained counsellors and psychotherapists ready to help via text or phone. In 2022, we received 231 calls and texts, a staggering 60% increase over the previous year. We've responded to disclosures of a serious nature. Otherwise, many reaching out are struggling with stress, anxiety, depression, loneliness and feeling unprepared for the future.



#### IN-HOUSE SUPPORTS

Year-round we deliver trauma-informed, culturally responsive mental health initiatives, including programs Young Dark and Anxious, Mind Over Matter, and Unlearn and Learn. Also, our in-house professional, Nurse Tic Tac, frequently runs workshops on developing coping tools and sleep hygiene, amongst other self-care topics, and is always available to support those in need, whether you are a child, youth, volunteer, staff member, parent or caregiver.



### PROMISING FUTURES

Over the past few years, we saw how COVID-19 disproportionately impacted low-income communities and marginalized populations, worsening pre-existing inequities. At LBC, we believe access to education and employment is foundational to a more equitable future. As Black youth continue to be underrepresented in higher education and the labour market, our priority is to provide targeted support to help our younger generation pursue their dreams without any limitations.



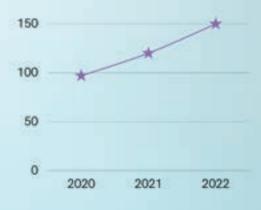
#### YOUTH LEARNING HUB

Many of the young people we serve lack the basic educational needs in their homes. This is why our team was so excited to open up our Youth Learning Hub at our LBC Youth Centre. Equipped with computers, high-speed internet, printers and stationery supplies, our children and youth have a comfortable, motiving and supportive space to do their homework and study after school.



#### HOMEWORK HELP & ACADEMIC SUPPORT

Launching shortly after the outbreak of the pandemic in 2020, demand for our online tutoring and homework support continues to grow. Serving primary to high school students in core subjects, our program helps students from underprivileged households for which academic enrichment and private tutoring are unaffordable. Over the course of 2022, we had to cap the number of students at 150, a 50% increase from when it was first launched!



#### STEPPING STONES

With the rising cost of living, now more than ever, getting a job to help pay the bills at home is essential for the youth we serve. However, youth lack the hands-on experience to transition into the labour market easily, and Black youth face additional barriers. Each year LBC provides paid training and employment to youth, where they gain skills and development, a stepping stone to help them advance forward as they pursue their studies towards their future careers.







#### PRE-APPRENTICESHIP PROGRAM

Efficiency Builders last summer. Our forward-looking initiative provides Black youth pathways to trade careers in green energy. Specializing in wind turbines and solar energy, our pre-apprenticeship program provided education, paid skills training, paid internships, professional coaching and wraparound support to eight youth. The program has generated a great deal of interest, inspiring many to break into the trades industry, which continues to have little Black representation and gender diversity. We look forward to opening more doors to well-paying trade careers while motivated to change the face of the sector and being part of the solution toward a greener future.

# INSPIRATIONAL YOUTH LEADERS

Over the past decade, one of the main priorities of our youth-founded, -led and driven organization has been to foster meaningful relationships with the young people we serve. We believe positive role models play a central role in what makes a community thrive. As positive role models, they inspire and motivate our children, youth, community and beyond! We have been fortunate over the years to have such phenomenal youth make up our team of staff and volunteers. Their effect on the impressionable young lives we serve is powerful, encouraging them to achieve their dreams and providing hope for the future.

I first started coming to LBC when I was nine years old. I loved it from day one, coming to their summer camps and basketball programs. I've always felt like I belong, and the staff have helped me grow into who I am today. I consider them my family with all the support and encouragement they've given me. Through LBC, I received professional training to be a certified basketball coach. And now, I'm paying it forward as an Assistant Basketball Coach at LBC.







I had the pleasure of working as a counsellor at Lady Ballers camp in 2013 & 2014. I graduated from the University of Waterloo with my Doctor of Pharmacy degree. Currently, I work as a pharmacist at Humber Piver Hospital on the general medicine floor. My role involves providing optimal medication therapy to patients who are admitted and, more importantly, empowering patients to take control of their health.

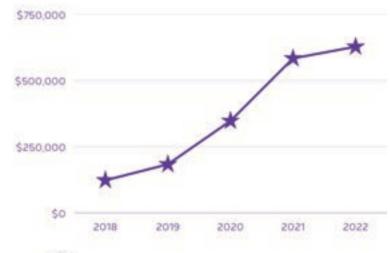

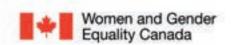




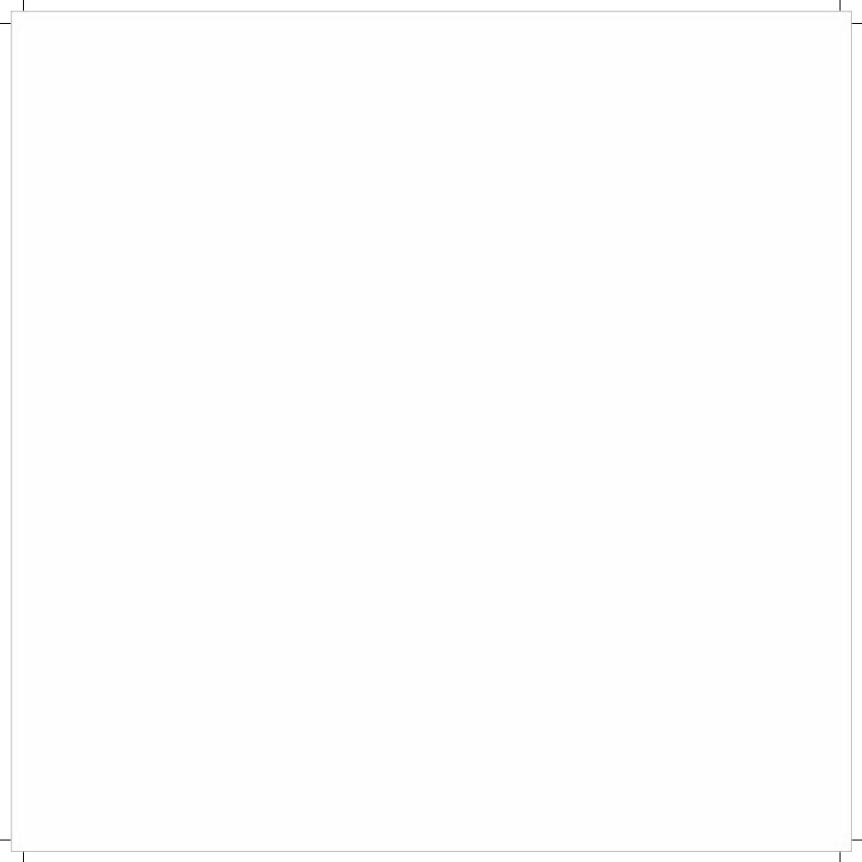
