

The Busy Season

Many of us in the WB&A have just gotten back our collective breath after hosting the TCA National Convention in Baltimore. Just in time for the busy season.

For many of us, trains are a year round hobby but there is the busy season, that time from fall-winter when train collectors/operators are busiest. This tends to peak around the holiday season when toy trains are a tradition. Run that around the tree! Have family and friends drop over to check out your layout, your collection, and run some trains!

Holiday time also heightens interest in trains for the general public (non-hobbyist). This is the ideal time for us to be ambassadors to the world of toy trains. Outreach is key to the survival and growth of the toy train hobby.

Outreach happens in many ways. During the busy season many clubs open their permanent layouts to the public. One of the first activities I went to during my rediscovery of toy trains was an open house held by an HO club in an old train station. While my tastes went to O scale, the experience was so positive, the scenery, the yards, the trains!

Modular clubs provide outreach year round but especially during the busy season. Modular clubs bring the fun and action closer to the public in a variety of venues train shows, museums, festivals, etc. The action, the sounds, the smoke, the variety of trains, cars, and accessories! THE FUN! Modular club members participating in shows spend a fair amount of time talking with the public and answering questions about the hobby. The favorite question to answer is, "how do I get started in the hobby?"

Outdoor G gauge displays are featured during the Holidays at various gardens, the National Arboretum, and on the south lawn of the White House. The National Christmas Tree Railroad consists entirely of volunteers that set up G gauge trains to run around the National Christmas Tree. Talk about being ambassadors to the hobby! Tens of thousands of people from all over the world come to see the Holiday festival that includes the trains. News groups from around the world have done stories on this annual display.

Some of you will be actively engaged in these outreach activities. However, we all can "spread the good word" about our hobby in so many ways. Been collecting for years? How about showing your collection to someone new to the hobby? This could make a lasting impression on a youngster. As an example, a member of the National Capital Trackers every now and then hosts a "train show" at his home for members of the immediate neighborhood. Kids of all ages can see his train collection and run some trains. He gets to show off his collection and layout, talk about his favorite hobby, and meet new folks. This is outreach at the grassroots level.

The busy season, it's an opportunity to share the fun, the wonderment, and the excitement of our hobby with others!

Growing Up With Trains (third in a series) Boxcar Brian Reilly

Dear Reader, we left off last time as my family and I were headed west to Omaha, Nebraska where we were destined to live half of my lifetime. We arrived during a late summer heat wave and in the middle of an Omaha and council bluffs [Iowa] Street Railway strike. My recollection was the skeleton of a street car, i.e., "trolley" that had been burned nearly to the ground.

The streetcar company had brought in strikebreakers, which inflamed an already difficult situation. Folks were getting to work via carpools and on foot until issues were settled and things got back to normal. Little did I know this would be my initial glimpse into the turbulent side of Labor-Management Relations, a field in which I'd earn my livelihood years later.

Omaha, being a crossroads east and west between Chicago and Denver as well as Minneapolis-St. Paul, north and south, had become a large railroad hub. The City is a commercial center for agri-business, insurance, banking, light manufacturing, and once was for the meat processing and packing industry along with being a natural transportation center.

In the darkest days of the civil war, President Abraham Lincoln and General Grenville Dodge, a native of Council Bluffs, Iowa, and Lincoln's chief engineer during the war, came to "The Bluffs" which derived its name from the fact that several Indian Tribes, the Omahas, Winnebeggoes, Pawnees, and Pottawattamies, who were part of the Sioux Nation except the later which had been driven out of Western Pennsylvania, met to council in these unique bluffs, west and north of the city. Iowa became a state in 1847 while Nebraska's application for statehood was delayed by the war until 1867. During this period, Council Bluffs became the last outpost for official Federal Government business until you reached California, some 1.800 miles further west.

Lincoln and Dodge selected a site high in the bluffs above the Missouri River. [The 'bluffs' are a range of low mountains duplicated only in China.] The Missouri was nicknamed the "Mighty Mo" because of its dangerous undercurrent and prone to flood lowlands while its surface appeared calm.

Before I left Omaha to return to New York City, the corps of Engineers had built several damns along the river's Nebraska-South Dakota border to tame the "Mighty Mo" and create man-made fishing and recreation lakes for all to enjoy. At the time I left, they were stocking these "lakes" with fish for future use. One lake would be designated for motor boat usage while another, for sailboats,

etc. Needless to say, the damns tamed the river and it is now safe for small boats, fishing and recreation pursuits. [We should do more things like this.—Ed.]

The site where Lincoln and Dodge surveyed is a monument today. The two men could view not only the river but Omaha and the flat farmland that stretched west over the horizon. It was at this place that President Lincoln, a true visionary for his time, designated Council Bluffs the Eastern Terminus of a railroad that would reach out to the West Coast while linking the Atlantic and Pacific Oceans by rail to facilitate pioneer settlements, development of farms, ranches and the growth of commerce.

The Union Pacific was chosen as the road that would lay rails westward while the Central Pacific would build from the west. These famous railroads met in Promentory, Utah, where a golden spike was laid to signify and commemorate this significant event. Cecil B. Demille directed the epic movie, "Union Pacific," which commemorated the 70th Anniversary of the UPRR and the historic occasion out in Utah. [Note: The Central would later be divided and "morphed" into the Southern Pacific and the Western Pacific. The Rio Grande may also have had a piece of the action.]

The world Premiere of "Union Pacific" was held in Omaha's Orpheum Theatre when the city designated the month of May, 1939, "Golden Spike Days." Men grew beards, wore top hats and tails while their ladies wore period clothes and bonnets. Downtown store fronts sported log cabin entrances and frontages — and everyone had a great time including the main actors who starred in the movie rode in open convertibles during the celebration.

DeMilles' legendary "cast of thousands" included, all *very young*, Joel McCrea, the RR lawman and Civil War buddy of Robert Preston; Barbara Stanwyck, their love interest and the engineer's daughter; Brian Donlevy, the sleazy tavern owner; and a *very young* Anthony Quinn, as the hired gun to shoot McCrea and help the bad guys to steal the RR workers' payroll!

There was a line in the movie that has stayed with me a long time. Workers were packing up their equipment to move westward and build another leg of the transcontinental railroad. One called out, "Where we goin'?" The reply, "North Platte, Nebraska." "Where the heck is that?" was the next question. The answer, "END OF THE TRACK!" Today, one of the UP's largest "switching yards" is located in North Platte where freight trains and their consists are monitored electronically. [When this flick shows up on TCM or cable, it's worth a look.]

Next in our series, "First Christmas in Omaha, For Me,' then "A Little Boy Meets the Real Thing," followed by "Everyone Should have an Uncle George."

And, yes, Baltimore is home to Charm city Cakes — as seen on the Food Network. History is everywhere in Baltimore: Francis Scott Key wrote the poem from an enemy ship in Baltimore harbor during the War of 1812 that later became our Star Spangled Banner; Baltimore was the site of the first 13 miles of railroad track, and has a long history of being a railroad town; and Edgar Allan Poe is buried at Westminster Burial Grounds..."Quoth the Raven, Nevermore."

A fleet of free shuttle buses carried convention guests between convention hotels, the Convention Center and Baltimore's famous Inner Harbor. The wonderful bus drivers and tour guides from Karen Salomon's Greenspring Tours shared a wealth of information with riders, pointing out important locations, giving Baltimore history lessons, and providing answers to our many questions.

Nearly 100 door prizes were given away!

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

Stan's Trolley Tidbits MY MEMORIES OF STREET CARS AND TRACKLESS TROLLEYS WHEN I WAS GROWING UP!

Growing up in Baltimore City in the 1940 and 1950 was a lot different then the way we live today. I grew up in a section of Baltimore called Canton, one-half block from were I lived was the Number 18 street car line. It had to be a special occasion to be able to take a street car.

My first street car ride that I can remember was when my mother and aunt took me to Montgomery Wards on the No. 18 street car, which was a semi convertible. We took it downtown and then transferred to the No. 27 trackless, which took us to the end of the line in Carroll Park right across the street from Montgomery Wards; this was an all day event.

The two street car rides that I enjoyed the most was when we moved to a section of Baltimore called Highland town, and the whole family took the No. 10 trackless trolley. We would then transfer to the No. 13 PCC street car at Fayette and Howard St. No. 13 took us to Ellicott City, which was the end of the line; where we would get off and go to the drug store. We would take this ride at least twice a week for one reason only, to cool off during the days before there was air conditioning. The favorite street car ride of all was when we had to take the No. 22 bus to Highland town. This bus was called the cross-town line. We would take it from the beginning until the end of the line where we would transfer to the No. 34 street car, which was a PCC. This would take us to the end of this street car line where there was Gwynn Oak Amusement Park. This adventure had to start in the late afternoon and would last until after dark.

As for trackless trolleys, I took the No. 10 to high school, and a couple years later, I took this trolley for two months when I went to the police academy. I remember in the winter of 1955-56 waiting for the trackless trolley when I saw a street car with a snow plow and two large brushes on each side of the street car brushing snow and ice from the tracks.

The only tragedy that I saw was when a child was struck by a Peter Witt street car and the child got struck just before the wheels and I was watching the rescue when my mother grabbed me and took me home; she didn't want me to see such things. Never did I find out how the child was.
