{President's Message Cont'd} and it made me very happy and honored to read it and to have had someone put into words their "why." While these may not be your "why's," I believe that some of it may be part of your "why" and because of this, it has now given me some things to work on so that the "why" are ones we fulfill most, if not all, of the times for this member and for other members.

Why? 4 reasons:

- Buy train stuff,
- learn about trains,
- meet people; and

- give \$ to an organization that you believe can and will use it for the right things.

Buy train stuff (different WB&A venues) - A swap meet is wording from years ago of when members use to get together and swap stories, have a beer, talk train stuff, and check out what the others had gotten. I also assume they swapped and sold some items. The swap meet was not a "show" where tables are sold and the table holders are expecting to sell their items. At our semi-annual business meetings, we have usually about 10-15 tables that are available for any member to put items on at no cost to them. Some are hoping to sell them, some are interested in discussing their items, some bring stuff to show and tell to others and some are looking for interaction of some sort. The meeting is usually attended by 30-40 WB&A members out of an average 300 membership. Some say they don't want to come because the business meeting is too boring/long for them and they have no interest, some don't want to socialize, some don't want to take the time out of their life, some say it's too far to travel to, etc. We tried splitting it up to have just a business meeting at a restaurant for an 60-90 minutes, we didn't get enough folks for a quorum at these meetings. The swap meet was then separate where we get maybe 20 folks to show up. We recombined the event. The business meeting is about 60-90 minutes of the 9-12 (or 1) business/swap meeting according to how long folks talk/interact in the discussion.

As for the WB&A toy train shows (Annapolis and Vienna), we strive to sell all tables available so that the show is full of merchandise for our members and the general public. One should be made to feel welcomed the minute they step up to the table to pay their admission fee or announce they are a WB&A member. We strive to do so and it's important to me that folks do feel welcomed. Table holders should take the time to make anyone feel welcomed at their table and answer questions. As the table holders consist of WB&A members they should take the "extra" effort to be sociable and approachable to all that come to the show.

Learning - The eblasts started as we were having some issues and our Trolley was not being published so I thought I needed to find a way to let our membership know we were here and not forsaking them and taking their dues as a given. When **{Continued}**

{President's Message Cont'd} the Trolley started back up and running under our new editor, Paul Pullen, I attempted to stop the eblast, but I was asked by so many not to stop it, so hence the eblast. I have taken proprietorship of it and I hope I am capturing the essence of the WB&A. Also, there are many knowledgeable folks in the WB&A who are more than willing to teach and to share their knowledge, just ask and you'll be introduced to some of these folks. While some folks are leery about discussing what they may or may not have due to fear of being robbed, most will share their knowledge.

Open Houses and Meeting People: Our open house is open to all and an invite is sent out to all. Clem and Sandy Clement have been holding open houses for years and they have all sorts of folks/ hobbyists attending from their car folks to train folks, all are welcome. There is also Dan and Hope Danielson's open house which an invite goes out for. Phil Graves opened his home for folks to go by to see his collection after our business/swap meet. Bruce Greenberg just conducted a series of get togethers and is now publishing a book on the findings. A few other folks open their homes up but it's on a smaller scale due to the size of their home and/or parking limitations in their neighborhood. I have never heard one word that someone was not made to feel welcomed.

Give \$ - The WB&A is fortunate to be financially strong and we strive to stay that way, but it, as anything else, can change in a instant. Lawsuits are the biggest reasons clubs lose money. So we do not take anyone's dues or gifts to the Club for granted. We look for ways to make that money go further for the best possible reasons. We strive never to forget that this Club belongs to the members and we work very hard to find ways to involve them in activities they will enjoy and in ways we can get the public aware and interested in the hobby.

Lastly, September will be here before you know it and I hope you will be renting a table at the September 13, 2013 WB&A Vienna Firehouse Toy Train Show and/or coming out to support the Show. Last year was our first event and it was a success and we believe with your continued support it will continue to be so, so spread the word and help be part of the success. I have heard from a few members concerning the parking at the Vienna Firehouse and while we strive to have the parking available, due to the location of the firehouse, we cannot control other activities going on around the Firehouse. We hope this will not keep you away and that you will have a little patience when looking for a spot and/or needing to walk a few blocks to the show.

As a continued reminder, I invite you all to send us your comments/suggestions. Also, if you find yourself with a bit of free time, we can always use a hand or two with things like working on the layouts used at events, looking for new locations for meets, chairing a meet, taking photos at events, etc. Let it not be

said that this Club is run by the BoD! It takes us all to make it run like a well-oiled train. It takes us all to make it a Club we want to be part of. It takes us all to partake in events to make them doable and it takes communication to make it a better Club that you want to continue to be part of.

Colleen called the meeting to order, welcomed the new members and asked each member to introduce themselves.

- 1. Update on Facebook page by Tom
- 2. Art/Glenn to update on Annapolis Meet
- 3. Bob Heine to update on trailer/layout status
- Colleen to reach out to Clem to see if he wants to contact the "volunteers" from the survey regarding

- writing for the Trolley
- 5. BoD members to provide update on results of contact with members who expressed interest in volunteering for various tasks.
- Nada to report on requests for tables at BSM event and members requesting paper Trolley.
- 7. Dan to update BoD on June 1 meet.

OLD BUSINESS

The September 7, 2013 Minutes were distributed and read. There was a motion to accept the minutes made by Glenn which was seconded by Dan and was voted to be unanimously accepted.

Treasurer's Report was given by Glenn. Line items in the report were discussed as to recurring and non recurring costs to maintain healthy balances in the account. Record keeping was discussed since there are many old records, it was decided that unnecessary old records could be destroyed after 7 years, but tax returns and historical items were to be retained. A motion was made by Dan and seconded by Tom to accept the report and was voted unanimously to be accepted.

Membership Report was given by Dave. By 12/31/2013, 113 members had paid for 2014 and an additional 24 have paid since then. 21 new members have joined. Dave will follow up at the Annapolis meet to collect dues and send out mailings after that meet to any remaining outstanding. It was suggested that the TCA new Eastern region members from our area be sent an invite to join WB&A with the offer of free attendance at the Annapolis meet. Dave will get the list and make up a flyer to send.

Communications report was given by Colleen. Facebook is up and photos, etc. are being posted. Members are using and responding well so far to the site. Some work still needs to be done and our members need to be encouraged to use the site to share photos and information. The website still needs work - must have a place for members to "Like" us on Facebook which will encourage use of both sites. A Liaison is needed to work with the web person or Colleen will continue to do so. It was noted that having a "private" section would allow us to post the Trolley and other members' only information. That may require using an outside person to set up with Joe maintaining thereafter. John Buxton indicated he may know someone that could do this so follow up will be needed to decide if we should move forward on expanding the site. At this time all 2013 information is posted and goal is to update at least every 6 months. It was suggested that a copy of the very first Trolley be posted to the web site as an item that may interest members, it will be scanned and uploaded.

The Trolley continues to be one of the major expenses each year so it was suggested that it be switched to electronic distribution via email. The prior survey indicated members were agreeable so it was decided that all future Trolley publications will be sent by email to as many members as possible. The benefit to the members is quick receipt, color photos

and keeping dues low. Colleen will put a notice in the next Eblast indicating the change. Members will be able to "opt out" if they still wish to receive a hard copy. Colleen will create the email list from Dave's database and the list of those that must be mailed will be given to Glenn.

Dan presented the Eastern Division report indicating that there continues to be a problem with the correct numbers for York. A lot of money has been spent on this issue but there continue to be issues as well as the fact that attendance numbers have been declining. It is hoped that the Eastern Board will take steps to keep costs in line. Sam Geiser will be the Nominating Committee Chairman for the upcoming elections (2015-2016 term) if anyone is interested in running for a spot on the board – see TCA Eastern Division website for more info.

Dan would like to see the York meet promoted in Classic Toy Trains and O Gauge Railroading by having photos taken inside the Orange Hall and of the major dealer booths however that violates the no photo rules which would require a change by the Board. It was noted that it could create an issue with sales tax required by dealers so further research would be needed to see if it might be possible. John Buxton agreed that at a closed meet the only way to get people in is by marketing TCA and York is the prime meet to show the benefits of membership. Thoughts of possibly being an open meet on Saturday, however that again raises the sales tax issue.

National Capitol Trackers will be set up in the Black Hall at York with new layout with a total of 280 feet of track including a lot of new features. Everyone is encouraged to check it out in April.

Dan reported that the Catoctin Mountain Trip was enjoyed by those able to attend. Paul and Marcia were pleased with the turnout and were gracious hosts providing food and drinks. Local Hardware Store owner, Mike Hobbs invited all to his home to see his impressive layout, pictures are on Facebook.

NEW BUSINESS

Art reported that the Annapolis Meet is progressing well. So far 25 tables have been sold for a total of \$590. Last year 70 tables were sold but if needed more tables could be added at a cost of \$8 each. There is an issue with catering, the prior company cannot do it this year so Art is working to find someone else to cover that. He will keep us informed on the status so other plans can be made if needed. Help will be needed on Friday for set up so all BoD are asked to see who could assist and the Secretary will work with Art to coordinate.

The drawing was held for the Southern set and the 2-\$100 gift certificates. Dave, with the assistance of Stephen Salem drew the winning names:

John Gomoljak of Crownsville, MD won the New Member gift certificate

Jack Clifford of Olney, MD won the existing mem-

ber certificate

A new Logo for the trailer was briefly discussed, Bob Heine provided his idea and it will be looked into further.

Drawing items 2014, door prizes, etc. were discussed. Catoctin Mountain has supplied previously and we hope they will do so this year. Dan's new store would do it the following year. Dan will supply the Grand Prize for Vienna and could do gift certificates this year. A motion was made by Colleen and seconded by Tom that there be a cap of \$1,500 to \$2000 for the prizes and drawing items which was approved unanimously. Dan and Glenn will work to secure the items and advise the BoD.

We broke for lunch from 1:00 -1:35

Days for the next Train Store open house would include Catoctin Mountain on a Saturday in March and then one for Dan later in the year.

Upcoming member open houses are James and Colleen on May 3, 2014. John Buxton would like to hold an open house with his Dorfan trains, he will explore using a local store –Weber Farms in Parkton, MD, and try for a date of 12/28/2014. He will advise when firm plans are in place.

BSM: John Buxton presented his information on the Baltimore Streetcar Museum (BSM) for a WB&A Appreciation Event which will be at no cost to the members to attend The proposal is for WB&A to use the visitor's center for a swap meet from 8am to 2pm with 20 tables. Set up would be 8-9, tables open 9-11, streetcar rides 11-1 and then tear down until 2. A donation of \$300 would be made to the BSM. The Museum would be closed to the public with only our members and BSM volunteers that would provided setup/tear down assistance. This would be free to our members however reservations would be needed for a table. A date of May 17, 2014 was selected and Colleen signed to agree to the proposal, as a few minor changes were indicated as well as a date selection, John will present to BSM for final approval. Colleen moved that we proceed with this project, Arne seconded and it passed with unanimous approval. John also suggested we could do some marketing with the BSM through car cards or "take one" fliers in the streetcars, further discussion and creation of the materials will be needed, Colleen will explore the possible marketing ideas.

John Buxton presented the idea for a WB&A members auction at Robert Wilson Auction in Myersville, MD. Members would be able to take their unneeded inventory to the auction. John will explore a reduced commission to the Auction House, possibly a small "commission" to WB&A for sponsoring the event as a fund raiser. John will see what the commission might be and the topic can be put in the Eblast and Trolley to gauge member interest in participating.

The Trolley (presented by Colleen) Paul Pullen indicated that not all ads for the Trolley have been paid as yet. He will follow up with the advertisers but it was agreed that they will be dropped if not paid by

3/1/2014. It was agreed that prices will remain the same since we hope to save money with the electronic delivery of the Trolley.

Dan made a quick update on the project in Georgetown to build a layout for a man who is suffering from early stage dementia. The couple has been traveling but will be back soon with the trains, Dan will contact them and advise us when the project can move forward.

Trailer: The WB&A trailer and layouts were brought up. The layouts need work to be able to function properly, however there is no available space to do the work. Colleen and James have generously allowed us to store the trailer at their home, however due to the distance and space constraints no one has volunteered to go out there to perform the needed work. It would be nice to have at the Annapolis meet, however it is not in condition to be used at this point. Bob Heine agreed to pursue this matter but it is questionable whether the trailer should be kept due to the cost of licensing, insurance and storage issues. Bob will report back to the BoD on his findings.

Glenn provided a list of members who had volunteered to assist in various projects and planning areas which he took from last year's survey to the WB&A members. Board members were assigned to contact those members and get them involved where needed.

Dan motioned that the meeting be adjourned, Colleen seconded and it was unanimously approved. Meeting was adjourned at 3:00 pm.

In short, this was a six month effort by several folks leading up to a commitment from my modular club, the National Capital Trackers. The last column ended with the statement, "If you enjoy the layout then all of the effort will have been worth it!" Well after the fact and based upon the evidence; it was worth it!


We had over thirty members at setup between Tuesday and Thursday morning. We were operational by Wednesday afternoon and experienced minimal technical issues, due in part to upgraded modules, wiring harnesses, and power cabinets (housing prewired transformers, MTH TIUs, and Lionel Legacy equipment). There was a three-track main for digital command with 52 running slots over the course of York plus 10 running slots for the conventional-only loop. At the end of York (2:00pm Saturday) we stopped and were packed and on the road by 4:30pm. Teamwork!

What happened in the middle between setup and takedown was a very successful layout with 340'+ outside main, yard with interlocking and an over and under with wide radius corners. Lot of smiling faces both inside and outside the layout. It was a huge success and the "buzz" of the York show!

Many of you visiting the Black Hall and around the fairground expressed your delight with the layout. If you didn't visit the layout.....shame on you! You can view the attached pictures for a sense of what fun you missed.





Help Wanted!

Our member, Jon Lillard <jonlillard@gmail.com>, has asked for help in getting information about the history of the abandoned railroad whose locomotives are pictured above. He writes "I have been asked to give a talk about The Rails To Oxford this Fall at the Oxford Museum (www.oxfordmuseum.net), especially the abandoned ones on the Eastern Shore. The most important one to Oxfordians is the old Clayton -Oxford Line."

The route of the railroad is shown below. If anyone has any information about this railroad, please contact Jon directly.



What little is know is as follows:

This abandoned railway passed through mostly farming areas of Delaware and Maryland's eastern shore. It was a branch off of the Pennsylvania RR's Delmarva peninsula line. It survived the Penn Central years but was later sold off as part of the Maryland & Delaware (MDDE) instead of becoming part of Conrail. The Clayton, DE to Easton, MD segment was in turn spun off by the MDDE to the Chesapeake RR (CHRR).

Heading southwest from Clayton, DE, the line passed through Kenton, Hartly, and Slaughter, DE and then through Marydel, Henderson, Goldsboro, Greensboro, Ridgely, Hillsboro, Queen Anne, Cordova, Chapel, and Easton, MD. At some point the line extended beyond Easton through Landaff and Trappe to Oxford on the eastern shore of Chesapeake Bay.

Though this line is out of service, it is listed on the official Maryland state map as "MDOT" (Maryland Department of Transportation) as the line is 'rail-banked' for possible future use.

Another line of interest is from St. Michael's, the McDaniel-Ocean City line that passed through Easton and Hurlock on the way to Ocean City. My guess is that the train from Oxford ran to Easton, then people who wanted to go to the beach jumped aboard the McDaniel-OC line. OR, if they were on business they could continue to Clayton, then Dover, Phily, and New York. Does anyone have information on it?





Memorial Day Parade 2014; the Parade in Washington, DC

Three years after the Civil War ended, on May 5, 1868, the head of an organization of Union veterans - the Grand Army of the Republic (GAR) - established Decoration Day as a time for the nation to decorate the graves of the war dead with flowers. Maj. Gen. John A. Logan declared that Decoration Day should be observed on May 30, because flowers would be in bloom all over the country. The first large observance was held that year at Arlington National Cemetery. By the end of the 19th century, Memorial Day ceremonies were being held on May 30 throughout the nation.

It was not until after World War I, however, that the day was expanded to honor those who have died in all American wars. In 1966, Congress and President Lyndon Johnson declared Waterloo, N.Y., the "birthplace" of Memorial Day. In 1971, Memorial Day was declared a national holiday by an act of Congress, though it is still often called Decoration Day. It was then also placed on the last Monday in May.

Memorial Day was May 26 this year, and several members of the club accepted the invitation to join the National Parade to help commemorate it. Paul Gauthier led the group. 
