

WB&A GENERAL BUSINESS Meeting June 4, 2022

I. Call to Order/Certification of Quorum - A guorum being determined, the meeting was called to order by Tom Salen, WB&A President

II. Reports

- A. President's Report Tom Salen opened the meeting by welcoming WB&A members and guests to the General Business Meeting. He noted that the WB&A Board of Directors had been active since our last General Business Meeting in November planning events and activities. Tom introduced Chuck McGinnis, our newest Board member, who will be filling in for Skip Lee until our next elections.
- B. Approval of Minutes from Previous General

Membership Meeting - Copies of the minutes from the November 2021 WB&A General Business Meeting were distributed to the attendees. Club Secretary, Bob Gray, asked for any additions and corrections and a motion was made for approval of the minutes. The motion was seconded and approved unanimously.

- **C. Treasurer's Report** Copies of the Treasurer's Report were distributed. Club Treasurer, Michael Ackerman said that the Club's finances continue to be in good shape. He noted that most of the revenue comes from membership dues. He clarified the accounting process used to document the WB&A's purchase/donation of tables for the Annapolis Show.
- **D. Membership Report** Chairman, Bill Moss, reported that as of June 4, 2022, WB&A membership stands at 225. 185 people have paid for 2021 membership, 126 have paid for 2022, and 3 have paid for 2023. 40 members have not paid their 2021. Bill announced that George Leigh was the winner of the 2021 Train Drawing.
- E. Eastern Division of TCA Report Dave Eadie reported that about 8,000 people attended the April York Show including 370 public attendees. He discussed the upcoming elections for Eastern Division Board officers. Dave noted that the cost to run the York Shows is increasing and increased fees are being contemplated. He also noted that the Purple Hall will be for layouts only in the future. Purple Hall vendors will be moved to the Orange Hall. The Yellow Hall will not be used this coming October. Dave and Carol McGinnis discussed the TCA Directory of TCA members that is now available through the TCA website. York Shows will use a 2½ day format in the future. Dave announced that he will not be running for Eastern Division representative again so we need to identify a person to fill this position. Dave reviewed the responsibilities of the position. The next York Show will be held on October 20-22, 2022. Even though the TCA membership is declining, the percentage of members attending the York Show is increasing. Bob Heine noted that WB&A members, via our survey, expressed a preference for a 3-day York Shows over 2-day shows. The group thanked Dave Eadie for his 6 years of service as our Eastern Division Representative.

III. Ongoing Business

A. Arbutus Show Update - John Buxton reviewed the process of transitioning the Arbutus show to a WB&A endeavor. He reported that the WB&A will host the Arbutus Train Show on October 2, 2022. It will run from 9:00 AM until 1:00 PM. Flyers for the event are available and it is currently featured on the WB&A website. There is a possibility of another show in Arbutus in December. John thanked Carol McGinnis for her role in negotiating the transfer. He also asked all members to take flyers for WB&A events and distribute them in their community. Carol McGinnis noted that the Arbutus Show has a long history, going back to 1993. The cost of tables will be \$15.00 for WB&A members and \$20.00 for non-WB&A members. Hopefully, we will have access to space for running layouts.

B. National Capital Trolley Museum/WB&A Flea Market -

John Buxton reviewed plans for the parking lot show to be held on July 23rd. Flyers have been produced and will be distributed in the Silver Spring area. Exhibitors will bring their own tables and place them near where their vehicles are parked. The Trolley Museum will receive \$10.00 for each vendor spot in the parking lot.

C. Annapolis Show 2023 - The Annapolis Show will take place on Sunday, February 26, 2023. Discussions are ongoing with the venue representative regarding costs for 2023. John Gomoljak will be the WB&A Chairperson for this event with Tom Salen assisting. Tom discussed the increasing costs for venues for events.

D.WB&A Membership Survey - Tom Salen noted that the response to the survey was excellent with over 50% of members responding. A number of members offered to serve on committees. Bob Gray said that the survey was one half of a process to determine where we are as an organization and where we would like to be in the future. We need to look at what other train clubs are doing to attract new and younger members. The survey revealed that the number one interest of WB&A members was Operating Trains. Michael Ackerman noted that the survey showed that members really like train shows, everyone likes the Trolley Newsletter, very few members want to attend meetings or mini meets. Tom Salen suggested that we rename the Mini Meets as a business meeting. The winners of the drawing for gift cards was announced. That drawing was part of the survey process to encourage responses. Dave Eadie suggested that the WB&A should do a member survey about every ten years. Although the comments made by members on the survey were not available at this meeting, they are listed below.

- 14. Have a modeling workshop for children
- 15. Involve more children in the hobby
- 16. Have classes and clinics on ZOOM or the Internet
- 17. Publicize lists off train repair people and dealers
- 18. Present a history of the WB&A Electric Railway
- 19. Present history of railroading through models
- 20. Enhance social networking

- **H. Non-WB&A Event:** Bob Gray announced that WB&A member Karl Taschenberger will host a non-WB&A event on December 11, 2022 in Bowie, MD.
- **I. WB&A Drawings:** A question was raised about future WB&A drawings for a train. Tom Salen said we have tabled our yearly raffle for now.
- J. Elections for three board members will be held this fall. Next WB&A General Business Meeting will be held on December 12, 2022 at the National Capital Trolley Museum.


James Warrington 72-4768

Another lifelong member, Jim joined in 1972. Upon, returning from Germany where he met Clem Clement, they both joined the TCA and were permanent fixtures at York, having tables side by side in the Blue Hall.

Chaplain James M. Warrington stories

It was a nice fall day in Kaiserslautern (Ramstein AB,) Germany. I was "flying" at my ugly gray desk wishing I could go real flying up in the sky. The government grounded many of us when we were too old to fly safe or had too many hours of operational service. We were assigned to shuffle paper and manage flying procedures for the younger/luckier: us with all experience to go again down the runways...

The phone rings in our little office of 8 folk and our wonderful secretary answers: Major CLEM, the Chaplain want to "talk". Well, the group phonies razed innocent



me about attending church more, religious work, hitting the donation plate and being a better person. The voice said "when is the next train meet?" It was Chaplain James, who started a 50-year relationship with me and my family. He baptized my young 2 boys, blessed us for many wonderful years and considered us a part of his family

We couldn't be more honored.

We attended 4 train auctions each year: 2 in the spring and two in the fall. Spring auctions were in a hall on the Rhine River near Dusseldorf, and 2 in the fall at the Darmstadt Castle. A participant was a Swiss Count. When the Count raised his bid card, it never went down till he won.

We had to arrive early to get a space inside the Darmstadt Castles' walled yard. Jim and I were struggling to get a good parking space to vend from, the language and the newness of it all. Then I hear a "PVHTT< PVHHOT POW... A '28 Chevy stumbled in to the courtyard with a flat tire. I tell Chaplain James "We got this" I help fix the tire and we befriend the owner, Charles Becker. His driver was Deter Hass, part owner with Charles of Hobby Haus in Frankfort and collector of antique trains and owner/flyer of wooden aircraft and gliders. Chaplain James, Sandy and I attended a Swiss Train Congress hosted by the Count. one season. 102 attendees in a rented castle nearby and enjoyed a formal 7 course banquet and lots of toy trains and real steam train rides and seeing the Count's collection and those of friends over the week there. Both gone now but fast friends of ours.

James wanted the big "57" Marklin passenger cars. I liked the small simple Marklin's at 10 Mark a car. We met in middle with the medium sized cars. Back home, Both James' European and my European cars and those of 103 others were stolen by NETTE of Hartford, Conn. To steal from a WWII Vet (James), military officers and Fellow Americans... Foo on them.

And then there is the rain, the broken F4, fighter plane, pan cakes and The Chaplain. One cold and rainy night, James had a calling. He got up, put on his collar went for some eggs in the dining hall, grabs a pan-tray of flat cake, his trusty Bible, and rain togs and trudged to the soaked flight line. Under a dripping wing of the broken fighter, he held the flashlight, and the pan cake as he and the wet repair man caught-up on doings of the Lord, HIS guidance and love for a wet, chilly airman and munched stale cake. The airplane flew the next morning as the maintenance guy warmly sleep in his dormitory as Chaplain James came to work a little late and was counseled for lateness. Lead on, Chaplain James.

At baptism time for our dear little baby Joe (Now a PHD) swathed in a little suit, Chaplain James was on scene. The baby was yallering and mom was hanging 2.0 outa ten. The Man walked up the center isle of the base chapel and lovingly picked up Joe. The child instantly snuggled and piped down to the booming voice of Chaplain James. HE was there as of course; it is His House. The gathered crowd was frozen in place. Chaplain James said mighty words and all was good. Baby Joe now has a PHD, and a lovely family. At their wedding, the judge who bride Wendee had clerked

for, had heard that Chaplain James and I had a train collection and ordered that antique trains be brought to the wedding. So, after nuptials, as the ladies in the group were gathered around happy Wendee, the Judge held court and we men played trains. (Gotta do what the judge orders.) HE was there as of course; it is His House. The gathered crowd was frozen in place. Chaplain James said mighty words and all was good.

We came back to new England in the summer of '75. Jim returned to a Texas assignment and DC area duties. He did back-To-back 18-month KIA funeral tours at Arlington National Cemetery (I can't imagine the heart pain he felt. What a champion.) After the ceremony, Chaplain James was beside himself with giggles!! It seems on a recent trip to Israel, I had found a hip flask, washed it out 50 feet on the Jordan River from its terminus in the Dead Sea. Reeds kept me from getting any closer. Baby Joe got his splash from the River Jordan. Chaplain James had asked if for the water back after the ceremony. The priest in the next service had thrown the water, saying he wanted cleansed water. James chuckled as he told the other religion that he had tossed real River Jorden water...

In 1976, he drove to my home in Jersey, met my mother and stayed at my family home. We did the TCA national convention. Mother thought there was hope for me...

After I moved to Virginia, Chaplain James and I were a pair at many train meets. We traveled the highways between our homes and Maurer's auction house in PA, 3.5 hours away, grabbing farm eggs and bacon at the Ridge Restaurant, location of the "Molly, the cow" episode. Next to the Ridge was the local farmer's market. Molly, the plaster cow on wheels, stood guard if the market was open, and went inside if not. The joining pasture was sold for to be housing area. The new rich owner wanted to close the Ridge restaurant but the farmers around there said no, as they all met there for eggs on Saturday and after school the kids walked by, patted Molly and grabbed some ice cream. When Molly came up for auction the rich owner bid her way up. When things slowed down, a doubled strap- buttoned.

One local farmer in overalls stood up as raised the bid. The rich guy raised as did the farmer, the rich guy wacked in a bigger bid and the second farmer stood up. The little kids offered their nickels and dimes and Molly won the Day as all stood cheering. Molly the cow was escorted/pushed up the hill to the middle school and stands today by the flag pole. Hungering for the sacred hand-pats from her kids. Golly, I miss those days.

For years, James was my copilot for parading in old Washington, DC. We were in the spring cherry blossom parade, Memorial Day parade and one time the HOT July 4th celebration. He loved showing my

top-down 1930 MODEL A Cabriolet and letting the pretty parade ladies sit in the seat during pre-parade warmups. One cherry blossom parade, he, protected by a poncho and steel helmet, played General Patton by standing the entire length of the parade. His crowd screamed cheers as he passed. Chaplain James was on duty. James away bought lunch after the parades at the Metro dinner and, when we broke down, he was the step-and-fetch-it tool guy.

At the huge antique car show in Hershey, I had booths in the flea market to buy/sell trains and car parts and provide free advice to the love-lorn. Low and behold one booth had two "Rubber Ducks" for sale. The junker dealer did not know what they were. James misted as he held one. Mine rides on the license of my model A Ford as a tag-topper for those who served in WWII.

As I write, I hear his laugh and feel his warn hand on my shoulder as I plod on in the hands of Chaplain James. He baptized our two boys. He attended our oldest son's wedding to Ms. Wendee in Kansas City and sent prayed to our youngest at his Spanish wedding to Ms. Rebecca.

They, like Chaplain James, don't come along very often and we are eternally blessed by his words.

And thanks again for allowing me to serve as your Chapter's Representative to Eastern Division these past six years. It was a great experience I will treasure.




Membership Moments by Bill Moss

Historian's Corner: Stop that Train!



Air brakes

Let me take you back to before 1873. Trains are across the world. Rails of wood have been found in China dating 2200 years ago, in 1515 a funicular railway was constructed in Austria, and in 1758 the world's oldest operational railway in Leeds, England. Methods of stopping these trains varied with one of the most prevalent being a brakeman on each car. These railroad employees had to listen for and react to a brake whistle coming from the engineer. They would then use a screw and linkage device to individually slow their car.

Along came 1876 and the first automatic air brake was invented by George Westinghouse that revolutionized the railroad industry, making braking a safer venture and thus permitting trains to travel at higher speeds. Westinghouse made many alterations to improve his invention leading to various forms of the automatic brake.

After other improvements in 1893 public outcry lead to the initiation by Congress of **Railroad Safety Appliance Act** which made both of these inventions (Couplers from April, 2022 Trolley article and Air Brakes) mandatory on all trains in the United States.

Doodlebugs By Bob Gray

In the 17th Century people who were a little goofy, were called doodlebugs. Adults who play with model trains might be considered a little bit goofy. But WB&A members all know that "Doodlebugs" are, in fact, self-propelled locomotives. They were used for pulling or, sometimes, pushing individual rail cars.

There really is an insect called a doodlebug that gets its name from another definition of the term that describes a person who likes to draw. As these ant-like creatures move through the sand, their big butts drag behind them, leaving behind scribbly little trails that resemble drawings or doodlings.

In 1840s America, a "doodlebug" referred to Y-shaped branches of trees that were said to be able to locate oil deposits. They were just scams, as miraculous oil detecting technology did not actually exist. Nefarious salesmen who peddled such devices came to be known as "doodlebuggers."

Another form of Doodlebug zoomed into Britain during World War II. They were the V-1 flying bombs, otherwise known as "doodlebugs" that Nazi Germany deployed against Britain with devastating effect before countermeasures were developed that made the bomb planes essentially obsolete. The bombs got their misleadingly whimsical nickname from the sound of their pulsejet engines as they flew overhead.

Finally, we get to the railroad-related "Doodlebugs." In the early 20th century, short rail lines railroads used selfpropelled train cars that were known as "doodlebugs."

Below is the Atchison, Topeka and Santa Fe Railway M160 that ran regular service up until 1967. The service ran from Carlsbad to Clovis by way of Roswell. The consist was normally a passenger car and the engine. The engine was typically a "doodlebug" which was built by the Brill Motorcar Company as a gas-electric 535 HP.



Popular with small railroads, they provided passenger and rail service at lower cost than a train with a locomotive and coaches with larger crews. The name "Doodlebug" is derived from the perceived insect-like appearance of the units, as well as the slow speeds at which they wobbled or doodled down the tracks. Early models were usually powered by a gasoline engine, with either a mechanical drive train or a generator providing

electricity to traction motors.

Due to their compact size, Doodlebug models are attractive to model train fans. They allow us to pack a lot of action in small layouts. I have sprinkled a few pictures of small-scale Doodlebugs throughout this article.

In later years, it was common for the full-sized doodlebugs to be repowered with a diesel engine. Doodlebugs sometimes pulled an unpowered trailer car, but were more often used singly. They were popular with some railroads during the first part of the 20th century to provide passenger and mail service on lightly used branch lines at less expense than with a train consisting of a locomotive and coaches with larger crew. Several railroads, mostly small regional and local networks, provided their main passenger services through doodlebugs in a cost-cutting effort.



MTH 30-2158-0 Pennsylvania Doodlebug The Electro-Motive Company of Cleveland, Ohio made Doodlebugs in the 1920s, but by their very nature they were under-powered for the applications some purchasers chose to use the for. By the early 1930s the railroads had purchased 500 of the doodlebug motorcars, virtually all of them being misused.

The Doodlebug disaster was a railway accident that occurred on July 31, 1940, in Cuyahoga Falls, Ohio, in the United States. A Pennsylvania Railroad, gasoline-powered "doodlebug" passenger rail car collided head-on with a freight train; the impact and resulting fire caused the deaths of all but three of the 46 onboard.

The earliest history of the doodlebug can be traced back to the General Electric in 1904. It was then that the company's engineers realized that there may be a market for self-propelled rail cars in the railroad industry. They were quite different from similar cars used by the interurban and streetcar industry, which were powered by standard electricity.

In Europe, steam powered doodlebugs were built in
Germany, France and Czechoslovakia. They were generally
referred to as a Kittel rail car. Gasoline and diesel-powered
models were also developed. The steam powered Kittel
was put into service in many places throughout Europe.
Marklin currently offers a model of Kittel rail car.



Bachmann 81403 Santa Fe Doodlebug In conclusion, in the early 20th century, short rail lines that were in light use would employ single, self-propelled train cars that were known as "doodlebugs." These autonomous cars were a welcome alternative to large locomotives.




