

order by Tom Salen, WB&A President.

OPENING COMMENTS BY PRESIDENT OLD BUSINESS

1. President's Report - Tom Salen

Tom Salen welcomed everyone to the meeting and reviewed activities including establishment of the WB&A Land's End Store. Ron Edwards shared information on how to purchase items with the WB&A logo from Land's End. The group expressed their gratitude for Ron's efforts to get this service available to WB&A members.

2. Secretary's Report - Bob Gray

The minutes from the May 17, 2023 Board Meeting were reviewed by BOD members. A request was made for additions or corrections to the minutes. A motion to accept the minutes as written was made, seconded and unanimously approved.

3. Treasurer's Report – Michael Ackerman

Michael reported that the Club's financial position is strong. He called attention to the expense of the most recent General Business Meeting. Tom Salen agreed that the

costs were too high and spoke about efforts to seek another venue and reduce the cost of the event. Mike also suggested that the WB&A should have benefitted to a greater extent from the Kid's Show. Tom Salen mentioned that we supporting the mission of the NCTM as a fellow organization. Chuck McGinnis suggested that we ask to use the NCTM Board room BOD meetings as a form of recompense for the profits NCTM gained from the WB&A Kid's Show. Bill Moss noted that we support other organizations. The Treasurer's Report for January 1, 2023 thru July 15, 2023 was distributed and reviewed and approved by the BOD.

4. Membership Report -Bob Gray

Bob reported that we currently have 228 people on our official membership list, including 11 people who have not paid in almost 2 years that we are about to cut from our Membership list in November, leaving our active membership at 217. Of those 217, 178 have paid their 2023 dues, leaving 39 unpaid for 2023. Bob said that on September 1, he would send a mailing to the unpaid members from 2022 telling them they would be removed from our Membership list on November 1, 2023. Bob will also do a mailing to those who have not paid their 2023 dues. The BOD agreed to change the "cut-off" date from November 1 of the following year to March 1 of the year. We will publish this change in Trolley. Bob Gray share an example of a possible new format for WB&A membership cards that might streamline the responsibilities of the Membership Chairperson. He will come up with some cost information on this idea and some advantages and disadvantages of going to a new format.

5. Social Committee – Carol McGinnis

Carol reviewed the updated WB&A Calendar, including our first Start Your Afternoon with WB&A at

A question was asked about the WB&A table at the October 2023 Timonium show. John Buxton said we have a table but no one to staff it at this time. We do put up signs and provide handouts. John suggest a Start Your Day w/ WB&A at Union Station in DC. Bob shared dates and sites for Start Your Day w/ WB&A through the end of the year. Carol spoke about details for the Anniversary Banquet to be held in Annapolis Saturday May 4, 2024 at 1:00 PM. She noted that 103 WB&A Anniversary Boxcars have been ordered. Carol will produce a budget for the banquet for next BOD meeting. John Buxton shared that VRE is offering free train rides. Finally, Carol will be sending out 200 postcards to people who have been attendees at the Arbutus.

Tom Salen recommended stepping up advertising and that we do have the ability to take a loss on this show. Deposit for show needs to go to Arbutus FH by August 15. Bob Gray will get insurance certificate for the show asap. Food truck for the Arbutus Show is being sought. Mike A will bring megaphone John B will do vendor nametags and Facebook advertising, and signage. Bob Gray will take care of

the membership table. Parts person will be there.

Historian's Corner, September, 2023 Historic WB&A Logo



Back in 1899 the WB&A was incorporated as The Potomac and Severn Electric Railway. It became the Washington, Baltimore, and Annapolis Electric Railway in 1900 and connected Baltimore to Washington DC. It served the area for 27 years, and continued the Baltimore to Annapolis piece for an additional 20 years.

Parts of the right-of-way are being used today by the **Baltimore LightRail RailLink** from Odenton to Baltimore, and the line continues north to Hunt Valley. There's currently a **WB&A Bike Trail** from Lanham to Odenton, Maryland running from Prince George's County through Anne Arundel County.

Much of this information has been shared before, but I want you to look at and think about the **Historic WB&A Logo**. It brings to mind the energy and speed of lightning, the initials of the name of the railway, together with a non-traditional symmetry of a logo.

The directional arrow sticks out on both sides of the logo. And what does the arrow represent? Does it represent the trolley going in the right direction? Does it mean that the trolley gets you where you want to be? Does it mean that the trolley is the best way to travel? Or, is it related to a mathematical material logical implication or half of an if-and-only-if statement?

And then look at the lightning bolt. It provides power and direction as well as a representation of the electricity of the Electric Railway!

And what about the white spaces? Are they just the cast-off left overs behind the symbols, or do they stand for something else? A puzzle that needs the pieces put together? A shape that can only be discovered over time?

Whatever you decide keep your eyes open. This symbol will be back soon!

'I can be Walt Disney': Meet the new owner of Strasburg's Choo Choo Barn

It all started with a chance meeting at a model train auction.

Linda Groff, then owner of the Choo Choo Barn, Strasburg's famous model train layout, was at a February auction at the Horst Auction Center in Ephrata to buy merchandise for the Barn's accompanying hobby store.

It was there that she met model train enthusiast Gary Russell. Their meeting couldn't have come at a more opportune time. Since her husband Tom Groff's death in 2019 at age 69, Linda Groff and her daughter, Kristi Largoza, had been struggling to maintain the layout, and they were searching for someone who could carry on Tom's legacy.

Tom had built the Choo Choo Barn, which opened in 1961, into a multi-generational must-see in a town that is a magnet for railroading fans as the home of the historic Strasburg Rail Road, which brings in as many as 250,000 passengers annually, making it a top draw in the county's \$2.9 billion tourism sector.

Groff noticed Russell kept outbidding her, so she went over and struck up a conversation with him. The topic of the Choo Choo Barn sale came up, and she gave him one of Largoza's business cards, not expecting anything to actually come of it.

Hours later, however, Russell sent Largoza an email:

"Interested in info for the business. Saw you at the auction today. Gary Russell."

He met with them at the Choo Choo Barn, 226 Gap Road, less than two weeks later, where he impressed them with his knowledge of electronics, a key skill for the owner of a 1,700 square foot model train layout with 22 running trains and more than 150 animated displays. They let him look underneath the layout, expecting him to be intimidated by the tangles of wires. But to him it was no big deal.

"It's crazy under there when it's not what you do," Largoza said. "But I could tell that's what he does."

Two months later, in late April of this year, the Choo Choo Barn, a labor of love for three generations of the Groff family, had a new owner.

A family legacy

What would become the Choo Choo Barn started back in 1945, when Tom Groff's father, George Groff, returned from World War II and purchased a model train set as a present for his eldest son, 2-year-old Gary Groff. George Groff kept expanding the layout, which eventually moved to the basement of the family's home. Word began circulating about the setup, and that drew school and church groups to come to see it in action.

In 1961, two years after Strasburg Rail Road was revived as a tourist attraction, George Groff opened the Choo Choo Barn — at that point actually located in a little red barn — where he charged 25 cents for children and 50 cents for adults to see the layout.

Tom and Linda Groff took over the Choo Choo Barn in 1979, and Tom used his artistic abilities to triple its size. He'd spend hours at night working on it, adding around four or five new animated scenes each year.

"My husband's philosophy was he wanted younger generations to appreciate the artistry of model railroading," Linda Groff said. "That way you bring the

whole family in. Dad's not just there running the trains. The whole family can help build layouts."

The Choo Choo Barn drew almost 47,000 visitors last year. Much of the layout depicts iconic Lancaster County sites, like Dutch Wonderland and the Strasburg Rail Road. The layout is famous for its level of detail — the miniature Turkey Hill Market even has up-to-date gas prices.

Search for a new owner

After Tom Groff died in 2019, his wife and daughter tried their best to maintain the Choo Choo Barn. But neither of them could do what Tom did.

"It was his baby," Largoza said. "He was the one who put all of the time into the layout."

When a key employee told them he was leaving in September of last year, they knew they'd have to find a new owner to keep it going.

"There was absolutely, under God's shining sun, no way that we could let this be torn apart," Linda Groff said.

They put an advertisement for a new owner on a model train forum, hoping they'd get at least one person to say yes. They ended up getting almost 20 offers.

"(We had) people who were like, 'I will figure this out just so that it doesn't close,'" Largoza said. "It was emotionally overwhelming to know that that many people care that it continue."

But they knew they needed to find someone who could do more than just keep the Choo Choo Barn open. They needed someone who was knowledgeable about electronics who could maintain the layout and add to it. They needed someone who could carry on Tom's legacy.

The new Tom

Russell grew up in Limerick Township in Montgomery County, Pennsylvania, where his father worked as a senior nuclear operator at the Limerick Generating Station. It was Russell's father who first got Russell interested in electronics. He would watch as his father repaired household appliances in his home workshop.

Russell's father had a model train layout that he would bring down from the attic during Christmas. When he was 12 years old, Russell asked his father to keep the layout down year-round so he could work on it.

As he got older, Russell continued to work with electronics. In high school, he went to a vocational technical school and studied data processing before going on to the DeVry Institute of Technology in Woodbridge Township, New Jersey.

Now 55, Russell has four children and one grandchild, with another on the way. He lives in Stevens with his wife and two sons, and he owns a pool installation and repair company called Aqua-Docs. As hobbies, he enjoys collecting model trains as well as collecting and repairing pinball machines and other arcade games.

"One of the things I like the most (about working with electronics) is the learning," Russell said. "Technology is always changing. You can {x a problem using many different types of solutions. You just need to use your imagination."

Russell described owning the Choo Choo Barn as "a fantastic retirement."

"Most people's definition of retirement is that they're going to stop working, and they're going to sit at home and watch TV for the rest of their lives," Russell said. "My de{nition of retirement is I want to do something that I love."

In the Choo Choo Barn, Russell has found that something.

"I can be Walt Disney," he said. "I can try different things. I can be creative. I can put something together that doesn't exist."

Russell purchased the Choo Choo Barn in late April for an undisclosed amount. The sale did not include the real estate. The Groffs previously owned the Shops at Traintown, the shopping center where the Choo Choo Barn is located, but Linda Groff sold it in November 2021 for \$1.6 million. It was subsequently purchased in April by Ryan and Janae Dagen for \$2.2 million. The Dagens own Speckled Hen coffee shop and Bespoke Brewing in Strasburg, and they're making plans to open a Bespoke Brewing brewpub in the space in the shopping center previously occupied by Isaac's Restaurant.

Since purchasing the Choo Choo Barn, Russell has been hard at work. The {rst thing he did was set about completing the repairs that had been piling up since Tom's death.

Now he's working on adding new animated scenes. He asks visitors if there's anything they'd like to see added to the layout. One mother wrote a letter saying her daughter would like them to add a hospital.

Russell's biggest struggle has been deciding if he

should update the layout with modern technology.

"Now we have computers and other types of electronic components that we can use that would make it better, make it more seamless, make it so you can just do so much more with it," Russell said. "But the struggle is, do we want to really modernize the layout to get it to that level? Or do we want to keep the layout the way that

it is now because that's the way it was designed?"

Russell plans to get the staff together to decide the direction the Choo Choo Barn should go in. A lot of the major renovations are going to happen next January when the Choo Choo Barn closes for a few weeks after Christmas.

"We know it's going to get better," Russell said. "It's going to be a lot more awesome than it is now. But I don't know exactly the road I'm going to take to get to that point yet.

As part of a whirlwind week visiting railroad-related sites in the Keystone State, Kathie and Bob Gray spent a wonderful afternoon at the Rockhill Trolley Museum located in Rockhill, Pennsylvania. Located a little over one-hour due north of Hagerstown, MD. As an added bonus for making the drive, Rockhill is also the home of the East Broad Top Railroad.

Started in 1960, the Rockhill Trolley Museum collects, restores, and operates electric streetcars, or trolleys. The Museum uses the term museum very loosely. Instead of being somewhere with fancy signage and well-tended artifacts behind glass, it is instead a living history museum. Here, you can see trolleys in all states of restoration and ride some of the more well-preserved items in their collection.

For myself, the highlight of our Rockhill Trolley Museum was the interpretative presentation of our museum guide J. C. Gerhard, pictured with WB&A member Bob Gray. Mr. Gerhard "knows his stuff," In addition to telling the story of the enterprise, he is the Operations Department Head of the Museum. His insights in to the history of the museum revealed the heroic efforts of the folks responsible for



Pennsylvania's oldest operating trolley museum.

We began our visit with a ride through the Huntington County countryside on a rare curved-side trolley built in 1924 by the J. G. Brill Company. Oddly, this car has been in service at the Rockhill Museum for more years than it was in service on the streets of York, PA. York Railways stopped all streetcar operations on February 4, 1939, and car #163 was sold to be used as a summer home along Conewago Creek north of York. The body of car #163 survived there until 1972, when Hurricane Agnes completely flooded the car, knocking it off its foundation. The owners no longer wanted the car and donated the body to the museum.





the Rockhill Trolley Museum's excursions was built as a railroad line for the Rock Hill Iron Furnace, which operated from the 1860s through 1908. The remains of the furnace lay along the museum's tracks. It's hard to believe that at one time the Rockhill was the home of hundreds of iron workers and railroad workers. Between 1876 and 1893, the Rockhill Iron and Coal Company was a completely self-sufficient pig iron company, making pig iron for sale on the open market.

By the way, should you wish to ride the trolley again, tickets are good for unlimited rides during regular operating days, so we hopped back on and experience the excitement of riding the trolley all over again!

From an idea and concept of a few trolley aficionados in 1960, the Rockhill Trolley Museum has gone from one to over 20 trolleys, with 50% of them in operable condition. The first car acquired by Rockhill Trolley Museum was car #311. This car is a double truck "Birney Safety Car" built by Wason Manufacturing Co. of Springfield, MA. It was part of an order of cars for the city of Bangor, Maine, where it operated as number 14. It was



sold to the Johnstown Traction Co. and went there in 1941. It served that city well, running until the end of service in 1960. Car #311 was the last Birney type car to be operated in any United States city on a regular schedule.

As Pennsylvania's oldest operating trolley museum, the Rockhill Trolley Museum checks all the boxes for serious rail fans. Following our trolley ride, we headed for the Car Barns where Mr. Gerhard's fascinating commentary on the Museum's high-speed interurban cars, a Philadelphia PCC, and fascinating maintenance-of-way cars like a huge snowplow and a 106-year-old snow sweeper.



The museum is open from May through October and for special holiday events. For the latter—including Easter, Pumpkin Festival in October, and Christmas in Coal Country—the museum partners with the East Broad Top Railroad, which is across the street. While the two organizations are not formally affiliated and do not cross-honor tickets, the railroad sells tickets for the combined events with the trolley museum, and the two organizations share volunteers and labor expertise.

An excursion by the WB&A to Rockhill sounds like a lot of fun to me. If it appeals to you too, contact me (Bob Gray at bgray5002@yahoo.com) and I will bring it up to our Social Committee.

Addendum: I mentioned that our visit to the Rockhill Trolley Museum was part of our week-long Pennsylvania Rail Adventure that included visits to East Broad Top Railroad also in Rockhill, the Lehigh Goerge Scenic Railroad in Jim Thorpe, PA, Don and Mary Jane Carver's Model Train Shop in Gettysburg, the AACA Transportation Museum in Hershey and the Railroad Museum of Pennsylvania, the National Toy Train Museum, and the Choo Choo Barn, all in Strasburg. Our headquarters for the week was a lovely cabin in the woods in Wrightsville, PA. along the shores of the beautiful

Susquehanna River.

Finally, a special thanks to WB&A member Doug Campbell for tips on places to visit in PA and especially for leading us to the wonderful Hickory Bridge Farm Restaurant in Orrtanna, PA.


