

A quorum being determined, the meeting was called to order by Tom Salen, WB&A President.

#### **OPENING COMMENTS BY PRESIDENT**

#### **OLD BUSINESS**

1. President's Report - Tom Salen

Tom Salen welcomed everyone to the meeting and reviewed activities including establishment of the WB&A Land's End Store. Ron Edwards shared information on how to purchase items with the WB&A logo from Land's End. The group expressed their gratitude for Ron's efforts to get this service available to WB&A members.

#### 2. Secretary's Report – Bob Gray

The minutes from the May 17, 2023 Board Meeting were reviewed by BOD members. A request was made for additions or corrections to the minutes. A motion to accept the minutes as written was made, seconded and unanimously approved.

3. Treasurer's Report - Michael Ackerman

Michael reported that the Club's financial position is strong. He called attention to the expense of the most recent General Business Meeting. Tom Salen agreed that the costs were too high and spoke about efforts to seek another venue and reduce the cost of the event. Mike also suggested that the WB&A should have benefitted to a greater extent from the Kid's Show. Tom Salen mentioned that we supporting the mission of the NCTM as a fellow organization. Chuck McGinnis suggested that we ask to use the NCTM Board room BOD meetings as a form of recompense for the profits NCTM gained from the WB&A Kid's Show. Bill Moss noted that we support other organizations. The Treasurer's Report for January 1, 2023 thru July 15, 2023 was distributed and reviewed and approved by the BOD.

#### 4. Membership Report –Bob Gray

Bob reported that we currently have 228 people on our official membership list, including 11 people who have not paid in almost 2 years that we are about to cut from our Membership list in November, leaving our active membership at 217. Of those 217, 178 have paid their 2023 dues, leaving 39 unpaid for 2023. Bob said that on September 1, he would send a mailing to the unpaid members from 2022 telling them they would be removed from our Membership list on November 1, 2023. Bob will also do a mailing to those who have not paid their 2023 dues. The BOD agreed to change the "cut-off" date from November 1 of the following year to March 1 of the year. We will publish this change in Trolley. Bob Gray share an example of a possible new format for WB&A membership cards that might streamline the responsibilities of the Membership Chairperson. He will come up with some cost information on this idea and some advantages and disadvantages of going to a new format.

#### 5. Social Committee - Carol McGinnis

Carol reviewed the updated WB&A Calendar, including our first Start Your Afternoon with WB&A at

A question was asked about the WB&A table at the October 2023 Timonium show. John Buxton said we have a table but no one to staff it at this time. We do put up signs and provide handouts. John suggest a Start Your Day

w/ WB&A at Union Station in DC. Bob shared dates and sites for Start Your Day w/ WB&A through the end of the year. Carol spoke about details for the Anniversary Banquet to be held in Annapolis Saturday May 4, 2024 at 1:00 PM. She noted that 103 WB&A Anniversary Boxcars have been ordered. Chuck McGinnis suggested giving door prize cars at the banquet. Chuck will investigate the acquisition of 4 cars costing around a total of \$100. Carol will produce a budget for the banquet for next BOD meeting. She noted that WB&A had another successful Night at the Ball Park in June and Bill Moss said he would set up an unofficial Baysox game in September. John Buxton shared that VRE is offering free train rides. Finally, Carol will be sending out 200 postcards to people who have been attendees at the Arbutus.

6. **Eastern Division** – TCA Report – Bob Heine Bob reported and answered questions related to the upcoming York Show. He shared details of the newly implemented Pre-Show Train-Related Sales Event that will take place early in the week of the actual show. Bob announced that there will be no evening auction at this coming York Show.

#### **ONGOING BOARD BUSINESS**

#### 1. Arbutus Meet - Chuck McGinnis

Chuck reported that we have a Gathering Permit for the Arbutus Show. 67 tables sold for September 43 for December Show. Chuck expressed concern about the low response by vendors to the show. Tom Salen recommended stepping up advertising and that we do have the ability to take a loss on this show. Deposit for show needs to go to Arbutus FH by August 15. Bob Gray will get insurance certificate for the show asap. Food truck for the Arbutus Show is being sought. Mike A will bring megaphone John B will do vendor nametags and Facebook advertising, and signage. Bob Gray will take care of the membership table. Parts person will be there.

- 2. **Annapolis Show** John Gomoljak John suggested we get a Food Truck for the Annapolis Show. Discussion ensued on of how to handle food for this event. John Gomoljak will seek a food truck for the event.
  - 3. WB&A Store at Land's End Ron Edwards Covered in President's Report.
  - 4. Website Update Bob Gray

Bob Gray reported that in the previous 12 months there were about 5000 visitors to the website and for the past 30 days the number was 257.

6. **Kid's Train Show** - Bob Gray Bob had suggested three dates for the 2024 Kid's Train Show at the National Capital Trolley Museum. The group agreed that the show will be held on May 11, 2024. Bob asked for a volunteer to set up the large layout at the show and feedback on content and format as we get closer to the show date.

#### 7. **Elections** – Carol McGinnis

Tom Salen announced that Ron Edwards has agreed to join the BOD. A motion was made, seconded, and approved for Ron to serve on the Board for the balance of the current year. Doug Campbell also expressed an interest in serving on the Board. Carol said that Charles Doring will run for WB&A Vice President.

8. **WB&A Facebook Page** – John Buxton John Buxton has been adding information and pictures to the page. You must join Facebook to access this page.

#### **NEW BUSINESS**

Taking Payment by Credit Card – Michael Ackerman

Michael Ackerman suggests that we get the hardware and software to enable members to pay for membership and registration fees at WB&A Meets/Shows using their credit card. He recommends that we add a \$.50 fee to each transaction to cover the additional costs. Bob Gray added that using this technology would streamline the membership committee's work load. It was moved and seconded that the Treasurer is authorized to arrange to take credit cards for admission and membership payments at all future WB&A Train Meets with the addition of an appropriate convenience fee. The Treasurer is authorized to purchase the necessary hardware and software. Passed unanimously.

# TCA EASTERN DIVISION REPORT - November 2023

From the WB&A Chapter Representative to the E. Div., Bob Heine

The recent semi-annual Eastern Division's Toy Train Meet was again a success at the York, PA Fairgrounds during the 3rd week of October. The tally of show preregistrations was higher than for the prior April York show and higher than last October's show in 2022.

Things went well and the weather all week cooperated. Preliminary accounts show that this train show took in \$18,000 more in revenue when compared to the past April "York" event.

This October YORK Show included a FIRST-EVER change and it was very successful. That experimental change was having a totally open to the public "Pre-Show" train sales event on the 3 days just prior to the official show opening of the TCA on Thursday. The Pre-Show was inside the Purple Hall on a Monday, Tuesday & half a day on Wednesday. The Division sold more than 135 eightfoot sales tables inside the Purple Hall and these tables were available to NON-TCA members as well as TCA members (as long as all sellers proved they had a Pennsylvania certificate to collect the state's sales tax). When it came to potential customers for this 3-day Pre-Show, it was open and free to the public and not just TCA members. This was somewhat in competition to the open "bandit" meets held on those same 3 October days at the nearby motels and the firehouse.

The week's "York" events again included a late Tuesday afternoon "Welcome Party", held in the fairground's Orange Hall lobby with food and drinks (even wine). The charge was \$10 per person and it was a sellout; a few people even had to be turned away. The drinks & warm food was enjoyed by all along with the informal setting.

An official rule change was passed by the Eastern Div. Board in October and it was done in an attempt to get major manufacturers and bigger vendors back to our York Meet. As some of you members know, Lionel & Bachmann (for example), were absent for many years from our semi-annual York, PA show. Beginning in April of 2024, all dealers in the Orange & Purple Hall will be allowed to have their aides & "helpers" attend without being required to be annual TCA members. All Board members voted in favor of this change and it does not change any rules for the 4 other NON-dealer halls.

A PENNSYLVANIA TCA CONVENTION: The TCA has a convention annually in various locations around the nation and in June of 2024 our Eastern Division is joining with the TCA's "Keystone Division" to put on the next TCA convention in downtown Lancaster, PA. As always this annual convention and all of its tours will take place over about 8-9 days.

As I write this article, I think back over the years that WBA has been in existence. We have been active since June, 1964. There have been turntables and tunnels along the way, but we have come through with flying colors and are stronger today.

I have one more challenge. I am handing off the job of Historian for WB&A. I have been doing this job since 2011 when I took over from Nancy Swan (TCA# 73-6084). Nancy was a force to be dealt with. She lived in Kensington, Maryland after growing up in Chicago, IL. She earned a BS Degree in Library Science from the University of Wisconsin, Whitewater in 1941. She taught Basic Electronics to US Naval personnel, at the Great Lakes Naval Air Station in Chicago until her enlistment in the Waves in 1944.

Upon her discharge from Naval Intelligence in 1947, she accepted employment at the United States National Security Agency (NSA) in Washington. While still in the Navy, on March 5, 1946, Nancy married William E. Swan (TCA# 67-1823) in Washington. In 1956 Nancy earned a MS Degree in Library Science at the Catholic University in Washington, DC. Both Bill and Nancy were Civilian Employees, in Washington, until their retirement.

Nancy was an active member of the Lionel Collectors Club of America (LCCA), the Toy Train Operating Society (TTOS) and the Train Collectors Association (TCA).

These were big shoes to fill, and I hope that you have enjoyed all the little details about TCA and WB&A that have come to you through the Trolley articles. Now it's time for new insights and research. I have a complete set of the TCQ (Train Collectors Quarterly) and a rather complete set of the NHN (National Headquarters News) together with a small file cabinet and several Trolley issues. Using these there is a plethora of information at your fingertips. And it can all be yours!

### "Please look after this bear. Thank you."

Paddington Station has been the London terminus of the Great Western Railway since that road opened for business more than 185 years ago. Chief engineer Isambard Kingdom Brunel designed an eight-track station, bounded on the south by Praed Street and on the north by Bishops Bridge Road, which opened in May 1854. Parts of that facility are still used today.


On Christmas Eve in 1956, Michael Bond bought a stuffed teddy bear at Selfridges, a store near Paddington

Station, and took it home as a gift for his wife.

Within days, Bond had written a story about "Pastuso", an anthropomorphized bear "from darkest Peru" who crossed the Atlantic Ocean as a stowaway on a lifeboat, surviving on marmalade. The Brown family discovers him at Paddington Station, sitting on his battered suitcase, with a note pinned to his coat. The Browns take him to their home at 32 Windsor Gardens. Since they cannot understand his Peruvian name, they call him Paddington Bear after the railway station.



So begins A Bear Called Paddington, which was first published by William Collins & Sons sixty-five years ago today.



Paddington has become a beloved children's classic. Bond's twenty-five books have been translated into forty languages and have sold more than 35 million copies worldwide. Adventures of the bear have inspired eight stage plays, four television series, two musicals, and two feature-length motion pictures. A third live-action movie began filming in July of this year; its release date has not yet been announced.

And then there are the toys. Shirley and Eddie Clarkson began marketing stuffed Paddington look-alikes in 1972. The earliest examples wore actual children's boots manufactured by Dunlop; reportedly the boots stiffened the doll's legs and enabled him to stand upright. Untold millions of plush dolls and related toys have been sold worldwide. UK sales spiked last year following the funeral of Queen Elizabeth II.



You can find them on eBay; you can find them on Amazon; but the coolest place to buy a Paddington is at a souvenir shop inside the actual Paddington Station.

While there, you could pose for photos with a life-size bronze statue of Paddington. It was designed by Marcus Cornish and installed in February 2000, underneath the clock on Platform 1, where the bear supposedly first met the Brown family.

When the Chunnel achieved breakthrough in 1994, the first item that passed through the tunnel was a plush Paddington which British construction workers gave to their French counterparts.

Good question. I've often thought that we should have a Zoom on Zoom's. Even after three years of this, I'm still learning.


I'm guessing you are using a computer and wishing to share a video, so I'll base my reply on that. If you are using a pad or other device or want to share photos, let me know.

During the Zoom, when we call on you select the "Share Screen" at the bottom of the page (red arrow).




When the pop-up appears, select the "Advanced" tab, next select "Video", and make sure "share sound" and "optimize video" are selected.

Click the blue "Share" button on the bottom right of the pop-up.



Navigate to the folder where your files are located. I put all my items I wish to share or think I might share in one folder to make it easy for me to find. Double click to get your video queued.



Hit the play button and when done make sure you select the red "Stop Share" at the top of the screen.



That's pretty much the process to share a recorded video. You can talk while your video is play but you will be blending with whatever audio is in the recording.

I have found that most of my video I DO NOT select the share audio since I pick up a lot of running track noise that is quite load and distracting. You will need to make that decision based on your own recording.

We are really looking forward to members sharing Christmas and Holiday layouts next month so I hope these instructions will allow for more people to share their layouts with us.

### Garratt Articulated Locomotives are Totally Cool Bob Gray



There is something about watching mechanical devices in motion that just plain fascinates me.

Mechanical systems represent the best of the human creativity before computers came into being. The complexity of a computer should impress me, and it does, but it just doesn't make me smile. Mechanical things are my nature. When I'm having a bad day or I'm stressed out, just sitting and watching my model trains running makes me feel better.

To watch and marvel at the engineering genius of the designers of a Shay locomotive slowly advancing up a steep incline with its universal joints and square sliding prismatic joints and swiveling trucks is therapeutic.



Recently, I have become captivated by Garratt articulated locomotives.



The Garratt configuration of design (see diagram below) was used to provide a large engine with high performance that could negotiate tight curves that would otherwise be too sharp for multi-axle engines. They provided motive power that avoided the need for multiple locomotives requiring additional engine crews. The Garratts were able to successfully pull trains on winding, steeply inclined valley routes.



One of the primary strengths of the basic Garratt design (which called for the boiler and firebox to be slung between a pair of steam locomotive chassis that were

fitted with a fuel bunker and a water tank) was the locomotive's ability to traverse short, light-weight bridges, without compromising structural integrity. The boiler and cab were mounted on a frame that was supported at the ends by hinge points over each of the engine frames. One engine frame supported the water tank, the other engine frame supported the coal bunker. Employed in Africa, Australia, Mainland Europe (in Russia and Spain), and the United Kingdom; both standard and narrow-gauge versions were available.

So, you may be asking, "Are there any "O-Gauge" models of these engines? The answer is "yes."

In 2006, Trains.com listed the ETS Garratt, which is a South African prototype in 3'6" gauge. It may have been the only Garratt that's ever been available in 0 gauge 3-rail. (Below)

Electric Train Systems (ETS), a small firm located in the Czech Republic, starting with about ten employees, was founded in 1990. They started out making trains in small batches of about 150 to 250 each for locomotives and 300 to 2,000 for cars. ETS trains are made primarily from sheet steel. The imposing Garratt that ETS released towards the end of 2003 is one of the firm's more elaborate steam locomotives.



Heljan, a Danish manufacturer, makes 32 versions of the Beyer Garratt 2-6-0 0-6-2 in OO scale. Originally specializing in scenic products, kits and accessories for model railways, Heljan moved into ready-to-run HO scale models in the 1990s and have since diversified into British outline OO, O and narrow-gauge models.(Below)



Hattons Originals also produces a OO-scale N 2-6-O 0-6 -2T Beyer Garratt locomotive. (Below)



A G-Scale brass model of a Beyer Garratt South African Railway ngg13 steam #60 w/ smoke sounds & lights has been available from LGB. (Picture on next page)



There are other models of commercial produced Garratts in various scales and some scratch-builts available on Internet sites.

I also understand that a full-scale Garratt (a 2-ft gauge 2-6-2+2-6-2), was purchased by a wealthy Texan in 1985 and operated, with authentic rolling stock, on his Hempstead and Northern Railroad located on his property near Houston, Texas.

One of my ideas is to run a ETS Garratt articulated locomotive on a module I plan to build to operate with the National Capital Trackers Club. Watching the main rods moving with the piston and crosshead, the main driver following in its circular path as the crank pin, as the piston force is transmitted to the wheel is the unique beauty of steam locomotives in motion.



### The Spencer Shops By Bob Gray

Recently I spent a day at the North Carolina Transportation Museum in Spencer, North Carolina. This 84-acre museum site, located a few miles northeast of Salisbury, was formerly the steam locomotive repair facility for the Southern Railroad.



Let me take you back to the 1940s and the Age of Steam and ask, "What kind of facility would it take to service 75 steam locomotives on any given day?" The answer is the complex of structures that made up Southern Rail's Spencer Shops."



Now take a look at this building. This cavernous structure, is two football fields long, 80-feet tall and 150 feet wide.

Known as the Back Shop, this huge building is the only preserved erecting shop, utilizing the longitudinal design for locomotive overhaul. Southern Railway officially opened the shops in 1896. In 1905 the Back Shop was opened, enabling the facility to overhaul 10 to 15 locomotives at one time. In 1924, a 37-stall



roundhouse and 100-foot-long electric turntable were opened. A coaling tower was erected in the 1920s.

Throughout the 1940s and early 1950s, Southern Railway used the Spencer Shops as its main repair facility for diesel locomotives on eastern lines operating in the Carolinas, Virginia, and Georgia. The shops ceased working on steam engines in 1953, when the railway company phased them out. In the mid-1950s the railway began terminating some jobs and moving workers to other facilities, and by 1960 only the roundhouse and repair shed were still in use by less than 100 workers.



At the height of its operation, the Spencer Shops employed 2,500 workers including welders, pipefitters, electricians, laborers, helpers, and foremen. The work ranged from complete rebuilds performed in the Back Shop to minor repairs done in the Round house, such as changing wheels, adjusting siderods, and replacing springs.

Workers came to Spencer from all over the country. By 1910, the population of the town had grown to 1900. A YMCA was built to accommodate the numerous train crews that needed overnight lodging. Located at the midway point along Southern Rail's 600-mile route between Washington, D.C. and Atlanta, the Spencer Shops were built in the 1890s and operated until the 1970s.



The Spencer Shops and associated land were donated by the Southern Railway to the state of North Carolina, which established the North Carolina Transportation Museum on the site.

The N.C. Transportation Museum is a museum featuring all types of transportation history – railroading, automotive, aviation, and more. But, take my word for it, this museum is primarily a railroad museum.

So, what can you do at the North Carolina Transportation Museum?

- 1. Roam through what was once Southern Railway's largest steam locomotive servicing facility
- 2. Take a 25-minute train ride to see the 60-acre museum campus
- 3. Take a spin on an operational turntable built in 1924 to turn locomotives for servicing.
- 4. See the largest remaining roundhouse in North America



- 5. Walk through a Railway Post Office (RPO) car and learn how mail used to be delivered
- 6. See a steam locomotive with no firebox
- 7. Climb into the cab of a real steam engine
- 8. See the 200,000th box car built in Bessemer, AL by Pullman-Standard, maybe the most colorful boxcar ever built



- 9. See the world's fastest Shay, Graham County No. 1925
- 10. Operate railroad signals



- 11. Operate a real diesel locomotive with the "At the Throttle Experience"
- 12. Earn a BSA railroad and aviation merit badge

Finally, you can get to this terrific museum via rail. Amtrak runs daily trains to nearby Salisbury, NC.
