



- I. Call to Order/Certification of Quorum A quorum being determined, the meeting was called to order by John Buxton, WB&A President.
- II. President's Welcome Comments President John Buxton welcomed the Board members and guests.
 - **III. Reports**
- A. November 07 in toy train history: Jody Thomas Redman (2024)

Josephine Thomas was born in Knox, Pennsylvania one hundred years ago on November 7, 1924. After graduating from Knox High School, she moved to Pittsburgh, where she attended Duffs Business School. Jody then went to work as a secretary at Allis Chalmers. There, she met the dashing Louis J. Redman, recently discharged from the United States Army Air Force. They were married in 1949.

As we all know, Lou was instrumental in founding the Train Collectors Association in 1954. Almost immediately, his wife became the club's unsung work force, helping to create many of TCA's processes and practices. It was Jody who worked hard behind the scenes to print the fledgling association's newsletters, trading lists, and Train Collectors Quarterly. Four times a year, she and Lou would bring groups into their home as they cranked mimeographs, collated pages, and put together mailings for the organization. Over the years she increased the capacity in the simple mimeograph to a hand-cranked multilith and then to an electric multilith! She also entertained TCA members and other friends during the holidays when their home was opened for their annual train layout.

Daughter Carol (McGinnis) served as national president of the Train Collectors Association (2012-2013) and edited E-Train, TCA's online magazine, from 2016-2024.

Carol wrote:

"Mom was the woman behind the man. (As a woman and her daughter I can say that!) She worked hard so that Lou's hopes and dreams would come true. She typed, printed, and collated. She cooked, entertained, and cleaned up. She gave up her first floor rooms for layouts each Christmas, and her basement for train shelves, and her attic for storage."

Judging from this photo taken during the 1999 holiday season, Jody also surrendered most of the space in her display case which was bought to house the 1979 Gold/ Silver standard gauge Anniversary set created by George Sirus, and various other special items in their collection!



Carol continued:

"(Mom) enjoyed the travel and meeting other people. She enjoyed being able to take her family all throughout this country every summer. She enjoyed riding by train, and by road. She loved her family and loved Dad. So I guess in her own way she loved TCA. She saw, and foresaw, the benefits of being a TCA member and a TCA spouse."

Jody held no elected position in TCA. She did not even officially join the club until after Lou passed away. She applied for and received the TCA Membership number "03 -55985". She was voted an Honorary Member in 2003. She was the next to the last living Honorary Member, outlived only by Betty Kimball (1912-2010)




Greenberg's Guide to Lionel Trains, O Gauge, Volume 3: 1937-1942

What an achievement. Dr. Greenberg has spent the last 12 years creating four elaborate volumes covering Lionel prewar "O" and Standard gauge trains through all years of production. He has spent thousands of hours

working with hundreds of collectors to produce tens of thousands of pictures.
Volume 3, the final O-Gauge volume is now available. I recommend you purchase it. If you do not have Volumes 1 and 2 as well as his 2014 Guide to Standard and 2 &7/8 Gauges, I recommend you obtain all four. You will enjoy our hobby more and make more informed purchases. These are going to be the permanent core



reference books for all current and future collectors. Don't be the person scrounging for them on-line when they are all sold. As with the previous books, the pages of Volume 3 are visually attractive and compelling reading. The amount of detail is impressive.

Chapters 1 and 2 explain why Lionel changed their products from toy-like to realistic in appearance and operation and how advances in casting technology and the introduction of polymers for injection molding made it possible. Jim Kinder's list of items made from polymers is interesting. Many detailed pictures of couplers, underside stampings, motors, pickup plates, trucks, and sealing tapes answer so many questions of how, why and when. The discussions and accompanying pictures of the Ives and Lionel reverse units and the amazing whistle are the best I have seen.

Chapters 3 -7 review Lionel's use of their multiple new realistic engines in passenger and freight cataloged and promotional sets. Dave McEntarfer, Jim Kinder and Bruce Young list of sets with detailed contents in Chapters 3 - 7 are immensely helpful. These sets demonstrate how Lionel used their colorful toy-like cars with the new realistic engines. Dr. Greenberg shows how features were combined or omitted to make sets available at all price points to meet the demands of the local hobby shops as well as the national retailers. The report on the 1940 905-B outfit that was sold without cars or track is an extreme example of pricing efficiency.

Chapter 8 describes the large and elaborate Hudsons and how Lionel overcame early casting issues to produce some of their finest locomotives. Christopher DiCianna's history of the evolution of the zinc alloy, Zamak, made by New Jersey Zinc Inc. from 1922 into the 1960s reveals the constant struggle to combat Zinc-Pest and produce products with fine detail. Zinc-Pest probably damaged the majority of the 1937 production of Hudsons. Many fine

freight sets with 700 series engines are pictured. In 1941 Lionel finally replaced the Hiawatha based Rail Chief cars with the all-new Manhattan coaches specifically for the 700 series.

"Switchers made easy" could be the title of Chapter 9. If you have ever tried to sort out the seemingly endless number of switchers and their outfits, you will appreciate Rob English's fine charts solving that problem.

The promotional streamliner made attractive lowpriced outfits nicely pictured in Chapter 10. These quite popular sets are generally available today.

Chapters 11, 12 and 13 start with the smaller 4 and 8 wheel freights. These cars are often overlooked because of their size and low value. They are, however, quite attractive and can be an inexpensive way to ease into collecting. The larger 800 and 2800 freights are my personal favorites because I inherited many as a child and played with them for years. Extensive pictures and detailed charts present them well. The pictures and description of the merchandise car got my immediate attention. Wow.

Chapter 14 expands some on the Chapter 8 descriptions of scale, scale detailed, and semi-scale freight cars.

Chapters 15, 16 and 17 cover the popular and colorful passenger cars used in endless sets. This is, again, an example of mostly inexpensive and available items that are a great way to start a collection. The charts are helpful.

The rest of the book features the many lithographed cars that were sold from 1931-1942. There is a good discussion of Ives and the transition to Lionel-Ives and finally the dropping of the Ives name. A once proud name was eliminated from the manufacture of toy trains.

These informative books are enjoyable to peruse from cover to cover as I have done or to look up an item of current interest. Just looking at the pictures is fun. I recommend you spend enough time to understand how they interconnect. With a little effort, they will be your most useful resource on Lionel's wonderful prewar trains.

Scan reveals inner workings of oldest model loco


The once fully working locomotive replica was used to woo potential investors.

A 3D scan of the world's oldest model locomotive has revealed its hidden inner workings for the first time in more than 200 years.

Using a CT X-Ray, experts have been able to get a glimpse of the impressive engineering design of the mini prototype of a pioneering early steam locomotive.

The images show how the once working model replicated the revolutionary mechanics of its full-sized counterparts, which revolutionised the railway industry.

John McGoldrick, Leeds Museums and Galleries' curator of industrial history, said "short of cutting it open" experts would have never got to examine its inner workings in such a way.



The model was made for the engineer Matthew Murray in 1811 and used as a sales tool to demonstrate the viability of the design to potential investors.

His efforts were successful, with each full-sized engine selling for £350.

Full-sized Murray designs, such as the famous Salamanca, became the very first commercially viable steam locomotives.

They revolutionised the transportation of coal in Leeds, enabling a small and relatively lightweight engine to haul more than 20 times its own weight, powered by steam from a cast iron boiler with a single flue.





In order to gain a greater understanding of Murray's designs, museum staff worked with a railway historian and experts from the University of Leeds in order to carry out a technical and mechanical survey of the model.

Before the scan, experts had relied on written designs and sketches to get an understanding of its intricate makeup.

Although scanning metal objects can create distortions in the resulting images, Mr McGoldrick said they were able to see the locomotive's main structures including the pestons, flue and boiler.

"It's a strange scene to see this little model going on a CT scanner - the kind of thing used for human bodies - but it's a great way of seeing right through the locomotive from a number of different angles so we can understand properly how it was constructed.

"We're able to see how this was a viable working model. It wasn't just a toy for kind of sitting there looking pretty on a mantle piece."





John McGoldrick said the model was very important because the full-size locomotives were no longer in existence

A detailed historical account of the model together with an assessment of its design and components will now be produced and feature in a future exhibit at Leeds Industrial Museum.

Councillor Salma Arif, executive member for adult social care, active lifestyles and culture, said: "The status Leeds has as a centre for engineering excellence over the centuries is incredible, and this extraordinary model really encapsulates that spirit invention and ingenuity."

The Washington, Baltimore & Annapolis Northern Virginia Toy Train Show

The Washington, Baltimore & Annapolis (WB&A) Chapter of the Train Collectors Association Eastern Division revived its Northern Virginia toy train show after a six-year hiatus on September 21, 2024. The WB&A's first toy train show since 2018 was held at the Greater Springfield Volunteer Fire Department in Springfield, Virginia and by all measures, it was an overwhelmingly successful restart of this show. The WB&A filled the hall with 22 vendors who covered 46 tables with collectables and "can't live without" temptations. Three of the WB&A members brought their personal mini-layout to the show. The young engineers were thrilled to ring the bell and blow the whistle on the trains running on Tom Salen's Lionel inspired track. The kids were mesmerized as they watched Bob Gray's N-gauge Thomas the Train



roll through the English countryside and village. John Buxton, WB&A President with his 100-year-old Standard gauge loop of track and trains was a real draw as the crowd marveled at this classic antique in operation. A big hit with the 5-year and younger kids' group was the floor carpet layout of wooden trains. The kids assembled, disassembled and rebuilt new versions of the layout continually throughout the show. A number of older kids (parents) were also seen on their hands and knees enjoying train play.



The WB&A show was generously supported by the Lionel Car Collectors Association (LCCA) with donations of four fantastic door prizes and club billboard insert giveaways. Bill Moss, Al Moore and Ron Edwards manned the LCCA information table throughout the show and spoke with dozens of model railroad hobbyist and acquainted them with the benefits and advantages of being LCCA members. WB&A members who are not LCCA members should certainly consider joining this group. And the next time you see them at York, by all means speak to them and let them know how much the WB&A appreciated their support of our show.

As the curtain came down on the show, the word circulating on the hall floor was, "We are looking forward to next year's show." With such an enjoyable event

where treasures were sought and found, friendships rekindled or newly formed, and train stories were spread with great enthusiasm, the WB&A will certainly keep the show rolling. The leadership is now laying plans for the next show – 20 September 2025. Put it on your calendars.
