Prologue to the History of St. Hubert Catholic High School for Girls

St. Hubert Catholic High School for Girls had a unique beginning that dates back many years. Its history is a long, interesting one, but of necessity in writing, must be abbreviated. The hand of God was ever present.

One could say that it had its origin in the nineteenth century and is closely related to Saint Vincent Orphanage, down the hill on Milnor Street and the Delaware River. Around 1865, about the same time as the founding of the Sisters of St. Francis at St. Peter Church at Fifth and Girard Avenue, a priest from Holy Trinity parish founded Saint Vincent Orphanage. The priest requested the newly established Community to take charge of the orphanage, which they did. However, no arrangement had been made for the sisters as far as any means of fulfilling their religious obligations were concerned. They had to walk to daily Mass over dirt roads and fields to the nearest church, several miles away. It was probably to St. Dominic Church which was the only one in the vicinity at that time. By the time they returned from Mass the day was half over, and in rainy and snowy weather it became almost impossible. The sisters were becoming ill and their health suffering. Mother Francis pledged their help for the year and so withdrew them at the end of the year.

The orphanage was then taken over by parishioners of St. Peter Parish for the children of German immigrants who had died en route to America and others in the parish. Priests of German heritage frequently came to America and took up the chaplaincy at the Home.

In the early twenties, a big, strong, well-built priest came from Germany to the orphanage. He was Reverend John P. Ludwig, later to have been discovered to be a Baron. Father became quite a familiar figure in Tacony. He was accustomed to make his almost daily walk up the hill on Princeton Avenue to Frankford Avenue and sometimes farther. Children of the neighborhood would see him and his huge German shepherd

dog a block away and would run for cover until they passed. Everyone knew Father Ludwig and his dog.

A small group of German people from the area began to go to the orphanage chapel for Mass. It was not a large group, but it was for years a very faithful group. Eventually Father Ludwig saw in the group a nucleus for a German parish. He decided to build a church and school for them. In 1924 he broke ground on what was known to the locals as Mommy McGraw's old farm at Cottman and Torresdale Avenue. He built, supposedly with his own money, the lovely, granite stone structure with the church on the first floor and the school on the second floor south, with a convent for the Sisters on the second floor north. He named it St. Hubert Parish. Father secured five Sisters of St. Francis in Glen Riddle to teach in his school. The school opened September 1, 1926.

But there were hidden problems.

Tacony was a lovely little town built, one might say, by Henry Disston who built his saw mill, homes, schools and playgrounds, and gave generously to the churches in the area. The working conditions particularly enticed immigrants to the town. Many German and Irish immigrants landed in America on boats that came up the Delaware River to the marina area of Kensington. They soon heard about Tacony and made their way to the town. Henry Disston's spirit aroused a like spirit among the two groups. Even during the First World War the two groups seemed to support each other and St. Leo Church. The second problem for Father Ludwig was the fact that the Diocese was already planning and building a church just a few blocks away, St. Bernard parish, which opened in 1927.

Father Ludwig maintained his church and school as a strictly German parish. One woman of Irish descent left her baby son in his coach in the care of a woman who had come out of the church from confession. The woman too wanted to go to confession. In minutes the woman came out the front door laughing – Father would not hear her



confession because she was not a German. But Father's attitude did not cause any differences among the people.

Many young relatives of the founder of the Sisters of St. Francis, the Belfields and the Leppings, attended the parish school. One of the boys was the first and only vocation to the priesthood from the parish school. Father George Lepping, a Marist, offered his First Mass in the Church on Corpus Christi Sunday, June, 1937. His aunt, Sister Marie Francis, and Mother Francis, the Mother General of the Buffalo Franciscans, attended the ceremony, as did practically all of Tacony. The Church was packed to the doors for possibly the first time in its history.

So many of the German people had become so much a part of St. Leo Parish, having been baptized, made their First Confession and Communion, and been married there that they had no desire to change parishes. Their ties to St. Leo priests and sisters were too strong. Only a comparatively few families had gone to St. Hubert Parish to join those who had come up from the orphanage. The upkeep of the parish must have been very hard on Father.

It was Father Ludwig's custom almost every year to visit his homeland and leave the parish in the hands of a priest-friend. In the summer of 1940 Father took his usual trip home and left Father Otterbein in charge. The summer wore on to its end and Father did not return. Some people always start rumors of course, and this case was ripe for rumor. It was felt that Father was discouraged at not getting a large group for his

church. Others had him transferred to St. Peter and Paul parish in Lehighton. It seems more likely that since the shadow of the Second World War was looming heavily over his country, Father was forced to stay in his homeland for other reasons.

On October 1, 1940, the Holy See rescripted the parish. The Diocese took over the parish and its debts. Father Otterbein left on October 5, 1940. A letter from Cardinal Dougherty was read at all the Masses on October 6, 1940 informing the people of the closing of the church and school. The Sisters of St. Francis closed the second floor building on October 11, 1940 and left for Glen Riddle.

At the time, St. Bernard School had an annex to Little Flower High School and did not have room to take in one hundred eighty-eight St. Hubert Elementary School children. Cardinal Dougherty decided that the annex should move to the second floor of St. Hubert's building so that the St. Hubert children could be taken in. Cardinal Dougherty had the St. Hubert Church dismantled and renovated into classrooms and offices. At the end of the school year the Cardinal declared the school would reopen in September, 1941, as St. Hubert Catholic Girls High School. The school opened on September 8, 1941 with an enrollment of 631.

Sister Mary Ruperta, O.S.F. received her appointment as Prefect of the new high school June 9, 1941. The convent on Cottman Avenue was opened as a faculty house for the Sisters of St. Francis and renamed Portiuncula.

St. Hubert Catholic High School for Girls opened its doors for the first time on September 8, 1941. On that day World War II was raging in Europe, Bernard Samuel was the Mayor of Philadelphia, Cardinal Dennis Dougherty was in his 23rd year as Ordinary of the Archdiocese, the Phillies and Athletics were both mired in last place, a gallon of gas cost 19 cents, and the most popular song in the nation was "Green Eyes" by Jimmy Dorsey, Bob Eberly, and Helen O'Connell. Throughout

the decade of the 1940s, the girls at St. Hubert listened to songs such as "White Christmas," "Take the A Train," "Sentimental Journey," "I'll Be Seeing You," "I'll Never Smile Again," and "I Love you (For Sentimental Reasons)" and many others over such radio stations as WIP (the Dawn Patrol with Joe McCauley), WPEN (the 950 Club with JoeGrady and Ed Hurst), and WIBG ("Danceland" with Doug Arthur).



September 8, 1941: A new high school opens in the Mayfair section of Philadelphia. St. Hubert's, a former German-Catholic parish, opens its doors to 631 girls as an annex to Little Flower Catholic High School for Girls. The school uniform was maroon, the same one worn by Little Flower. A small "SH" replaced the "LF" over the heart. The faculty consisted of six Sisters of St. Francis, who taught English, stenography, and typing; four sisters of the Sisters, Servants of the Immaculate Heart of Mary, who taught biology, chemistry, mathematics, and home economics; four Sisters of St. Joseph, who taught music, history, National Problems, bookkeeping, secretarial studies, and office practice; two Sisters of the Holy Family of Nazareth, who taught algebra and world history. Sr. Mary Ruperta, O.S.F. served as Prefect of St. Hubert's.

September 19, 1941: Bishop Hugh Lamb paid a visit to St. Hubert's since it became a high school. Mass was offered by Monsignor John J. Bonner.


October 10, 1941: In what would become an annual tradition, the first Student Council Installation was held. The school officers were Marie Clark (President), Alice Magrath (VP), and Louise Simbalch (Secretary). Twenty-one other girls would also be inducted.

October 13, 1941: "Flag of the Brave" hung at St. Hubert's. The beautiful new flag was blessed by Reverend Joseph A. Gorham, S.T.L. After the reading of the Constitution by Rebecca McLaughlin, Louise and Jenny Simbalch raised the flag. In sincere and stirring tones the students pledged their allegiance.

October 31, 1941: A Halloween party was held at all of the lunch periods. Pretty colored table cloths and paper plates adorned the tables. Shining red apples, nuts, Halloween candies, pretzels, ice cream, and cake were among the refreshments served.

October/November 1941: The senior class selected its ring. The students voted for an Annapolis style, intermediate size, with an oval green stone, and the school seal on the stone. Also, the Athletic Association was established. The first president was Virginia Clark, and Helen Haag was appointed secretary.

November 3, 1941: The feast day of St. Hubert was commemorated. The seniors presented a short play, St. Hubert's Arrows, in his honor. Monsignor Bonner addressed the students and commended them for their enthusiasm and spirit.



November 25, 1941: The first issue of the school newspaper, Tally-Ho, debuted. The first editor was Mary Corkery. The name Tally-Ho is a call used by hunters, and is a tribute to St. Hubert, the patron saint of hunters.

December 21, 1941: St. Hubert's Yuletide Festival was held in Little Flower's auditorium. The program consisted of Christmas music and a play.

January 1, 1942: Three St. Hubert students competed with boys from Roman Catholic High School for spelling honors and prizes in Geuting's Shoe Store's spelling bee broadcast over radio station KYW.

January 23, 1942: The first senior prom, "Patriotic Promenade," was held at the Bellevue-Stratford Hotel.

February 23, 1942: The St. Hubert Marching Band, under the direction of Sr. Joseph Cecila, made its debut. The American Legion presented the school with an American flag, and the band played "Symbol of Honor" and "The Star Spangled Banner."

Winter 1942: After much thought and discussion, the official seal of St. Hubert's Catholic High School was designed. The insignia is regarded as a student's personal guide in living the Catholic principles they are being taught.

March 3, 1942: Mary Rowley selected as editor of Calling Echo, the school yearbook.

June 5, 1942: The Alumnae Association of St. Hubert's was founded. The membership consisted of all 134 graduates of the class of 1942. Marie Clark was chosen as the first president.

June 6, 1942: The first graduation is held at Municipal Auditorium.

1942-1943


September 1942: Spanish was added to the school curriculum. The class was taught by Sr. Mary Frances, S.N.D., who also planned to create a Spanish club. Faculty increases to 22 religious and two lay teachers.

October 8, 1942: His Eminence, Dennis Cardinal Dougherty presented St. Hubert's with a 1938 edition of the Douay Bible. The Bible was displayed in the school library.

October 11, 1942: The Alumnae Association held its first meeting.

October 25, 1942: Student Council president Barbara Wenstrup portrayed the Queen of Peace in a Navy Day parade in downtown Philadelphia.

October 26, 1942: Patriotic drive launched at St. Hubert's to purchase a bomber for the U.S. Army.



Summer 1943: Twenty-six St. Hubert's juniors sacrificed their summer vacation by taking the Accelerated Course, which enabled them to complete their senior year studies in 10 weeks. The classes were held at West Philadelphia Catholic Girls' High School from June 20 to August 27. Students from all of the diocesan high schools attended. The girls graduated with their class in June.

1943-1944

September 1, 1943: The largest class of freshmen since the opening of St. Hubert's entered the school. The 209 freshmen represented an 8 percent increase over the previous year's class.

October 1, 1943: Msgr. Bonner presided at the Installation ceremony in the school auditorium.

October 19, 1943: A Mass for all of the boys in the service was held at St. Hubert's.

November 3, 1943: The Freshman Day program ended with a grand surprise: Reverend Mother Veronica, Superior of the Franciscan Sisters, presented an oil painting of St. Hubert to the school. The canvas, 60" x 50" and framed in dull gold, portraying the *Vision of St. Hubert*, was painted by Sr. Waltridus, O.S.F.

November 24, 1943: The St. Hubert's Senior Prom held at the Barclay Hotel the night before Thanksgiving.

Fall 1943: St. Hubert's students raised over \$17,000 in war bonds to purchase a jeep for the U.S. Armed Forces.

January 18, 1944: The basketball team and Bambie mascot made their debuts. The basketball team, led by captain Gertrude Clark and coach Adele Smith, played their first game against St. Leonard's Academy, and lost 52-14. Bambie was selected as a mascot because it was the deer that appeared to St. Hubert in a vision that caused him to convert to Christianity. Jeanne Howell portrayed Bambie at the basketball games.

February 3, 1944: The varsity basketball team won the first game in its history, 32-19 over Melrose Academy.

March 8, 1944: Sophomore Jean Boyle received an award for selling \$2,700 in War Bonds and Stamps in the Fourth War Loan Drive. Jean received her award from Commander Clyde Rankin in the Mayfair movie theater. Jean remarked that "St. Hubert's played a great part in the Fourth War Loan Drive."

1944-1945

September 1944: Enrollment reached 708 students. Due to the increase in enrollment, St. Bartholomew's School opened classrooms as an annex for 91 freshmen. It was the second time that St. Bartholomew's was used as an annex. The school came to the aid of John W. Hallahan High School in 1939.

St. Hubert's welcomed eight new teachers, bringing the total faculty to 26.



September 27, 1944: For the first time the student body heard the "Alma Mater" played by the school orchestra in its debut for the season at the annual Installation ceremony.

April 13, 1945: In a spirit of reverent patriotism and sorrow, the entire St. Hubert's student body assembled in the school auditorium to offer sincere prayers for President Franklin D. Roosevelt, who died the day before. While the Reverend Edward M. Reilly led the recitation of the Rosary, 600 voices responded in earnest supplication to God that he would grant eternal rest to Roosevelt, whose patriotism during the past 12 years has caused his name to go down in history as a great American leader.

On that same day, St. Hubert's was presented with the Monsignor John J. Bonner Sportsmanship Award for 1945. The award recognized the unfailing sportsmanship displayed by the students of St. Hubert's High School during the hard and discouraging basketball season. The students cheered and sang a song of dedication to coach Miss Adele Smith.

May 7, 1945: Germany surrendered to the Allies, ending the war in Europe. That day, the St. Hubert's community paid honor to the Blessed Virgin Mary. Kathryn Boyce was selected as May Queen, and the entire student body marched in procession through the grounds to Our Lady's shrine. As the statue was crowned, the students sang "Immaculate Mary." After the ceremony, Benediction was given in the auditorium by Reverend Joseph J. Blanchfield.

May 26, 1945: Baccalaureate Mass held at St. Bernard's Church.

June 3, 1945: Graduation held at Convention Hall.

1945-1946

September 6, 1945: The nation and St. Hubert's celebrated the end of World War II. Enrollment climbed to 741, with 623 girls in the main building and 118 occupying the St. Bartholomew annex.

November 20-24, 1945: The class of '46 presented Harriet, a three act play about the life of Harriet Beecher Stowe, in the Little Flower auditorium.

November 27, 1945: The St. Hubert's community mourned the death of Right Reverend Monsignor John J. Bonner. He was a frequent visitor and friend to the school in the early years.

December 14, 1945: The junior prom was held in the St. Hubert's auditorium.

January 30, 1946: The class of '46 received its rings.

February 21, 1946: The senior prom was held at the Barclay Hotel in Philadelphia.



March 28, 1946: "Personality" was the theme for the all-for-fun Junior Day. The special event was coordinated by Miss Ethel McGurik and Sr. Maria Virgine. Some of the events included a one-act play, musical selections by the Orchestra and Glee Club, and a game of Truth or Consequences. The day ended with an early dismissal at 2:15 pm.

May 6, 1946: The annual May Procession began at St. Bernard's Church. The entire student body, in uniform, and wearing white communion veils, marched to the church. The May Queen was Elizabeth Green, arrayed in bridal attire.

May 9, 1946: The senior class traveled by train for their trip to New York City. The girls visited Mother Cabrini's Shrine, Fort Tryon Park, and the Home of the Cloisters. Later, the class enjoyed a show at Radio City Music Hall and visited the Empire State Building.

June 9, 1946: Approximately 2,200 from the diocesan Catholic Girls' High Schools participated in the fourth combined commencement ceremony at Convention Hall. The participating schools were St. Hubert's, John W. Hallahan, Little Flower, West Philadelphia Catholic, Notre Dame (Moylan), and Notre Dame (Wyncote). The honor of writing and delivering the valedictory speech belonged to Grace Dallas of St. Hubert's.

1946-1947

September 4, 1946: A decrease in enrollment was noted on the opening day of school. Incoming freshmen from St. Bartholomew's and St. Timothy's Schools now attended Little Flower. The freshmen class at St. Hubert's numbered 140, all of whom attended classes in the main building. The total school enrollment was now 651.

September 24, 1946: Student Council Installation was held. The Reverend Father Edward Reilly, Superintendent of Diocesan High Schools, presided at the exercises. Mary Louise Cooney was installed as Student Council President.

September 27, 1946: The St. Hubert's student body observed a Holy Hour of Adoration in recognition of the three early American martyrs who sacrificed their lives for the spread of Christianity among the Iroquois Indians. The girls, under the direction of Fr. Graham, spent an hour in Holy Meditation before the Blessed Sacrament, during which the Rosary was recited. Benediction and a hymn to the Holy Spirit closed the hour of prayer.

November 27, 1946: The Junior Prom was held on Thanksgiving eve in the school auditorium.

February 14, 1947: St. Hubert's Sweetheart Prom was held at the Barclay Hotel.



February 26-28, and March 1, 1947: The Fifth Annual St. Hubert's Musicale, conducted by Mr. Guglielmo Sabatini, was held in the Little Flower Auditorium.

March 8, 1947: Girls from St. Hubert's volunteered to collect funds for Nazareth Hospital.

August 15, 1947: Four members of the class of 1947 entered the novitiate of the Sisters, Servants of the Immaculate Heart of Mary.

1947-1948

September 1947: Registration for the 1947–48 school year showed a slight decrease in enrollment. When school closed in June 1947, St. Hubert's boasted 625 students, while the enrollment for the new school year showed only 613. Nine parishes were represented among the student body – St. Bernard, St. Dominic, St. Katherine of Siena, St. Matthew, St. Leo, Maternity of B.V.M., Our Lady of Consolation, and St. Charles.

October 1947: Freshman day, under the direction of Sr. Walter Marie, S.S.J., is celebrated at St. Hubert's. A music and dance program was performed, and concluded with the freshmen being treated to ice cream.

November 13-14, 1947: The senior class performed Our Hearts were Young and Gay in the Little Flower Auditorium.

November 24, 1947: Radio personality Joe Grady, host of the 950 Club on WPEN, visited St. Hubert's. He gave the girls tickets to the 950 Club show for November 29, in which St Hubert's would be recognized as "School of the Week."

November 26, 1947: The junior prom was held once again on Thanksgiving eve. The theme was "Falling Leaves Social." The students dedicated the prom to the Blessed Mother.

November 27, 1947: Junior Alice Gleason took two orphans, ages 7 and 8, from St. Vincent's Home to her house for Thanksgiving dinner. After dinner, the kids were given gifts. Before returning to St. Vincent's, the little boy said, "I wish I could live here with you forever." This was part of a program called Catholic Action.

January 8, 1948: St. Hubert's student Marguerite McMenamin appeared on KYW radio's Junior Town Meeting of the Air, broadcast from Frankford High School. She gave her opinion as to whether or not young people were practicing good manners.

February 6, 1948: The senior prom was held once again at the Barclay. The theme was "Star Dust." Music was performed by the Mike Donnelly Orchestra. The prom moderators were Sr. Marie Aubert, S.S.J. and Sr. Lucidie, S.N.D.

June 7, 1948: One hundred fifty-two seniors received their diplomas at a combined graduation with Little Flower, Notre Dame Moylan, and Notre Dame Wyncote in Convention Hall.



September 1, 1948: With an entrance of 213 freshmen, the enrollment at St. Hubert's grew to 643, the largest number of students attending the school since its opening in 1941, with the exception of 1944 and 1945, when St. Bartholomew's Annex accommodated over 100 freshmen, and the enrollment soared to 700.

December 1948: St. Hubert's students voted St. Matthew's as the most popular parish dance. Sophomore Grace Cochran said, "An evening spent at St. Matthew's is a pleasant one, indeed. Records, fascinating lighting, and plenty of boys help bring out this atmosphere."

February 11, 1949: The senior prom was held at the Barclay. The theme was "Sweetheart Prom." Music was provided by the Haverfordians orchestra and a male vocalist.

April 28, 1949: The class of 1949 boarded buses outside of St. Hubert's and set out for their senior trip to New York. The class visited Mother Cabrini's Shrine, St. Patrick's Cathedral, saw Bing Crosby in A Connecticut Yankee and the Rockettes at Radio City Music Hall, and toured the NBC studios at Rockefeller Center.

May 19, 1949: May Procession held at St. Bernard's. Joan Bauer was chosen as the May Queen.

June 11, 1949: The senior class gave \$100 to St. Hubert's as a token of appreciation for their Catholic education during the Baccalaureate Mass held at St. Bernard's.

1949-1950

September 1, 1949: Enrollment increased to 686 students, including 221 incoming freshmen. Eighteen different parishes were represented at St. Hubert's, with 178 students coming from St. Bernard's.

October 3, 1949: Freshmen day celebrated at St. Hubert's. The theme was "Good Ship S.H. Study Well."

November 17–18, 1949: The senior play, Smilin' Through, was performed at the Little Flower school auditorium.

November 22, 1949: Six senior class members from the Radio Club defeated boys from Southeast Catholic High School in a famous quotations quiz on WIP radio's weekly *Quiz Kids* program.

The decade of the 1950s was time of growth not only in Northeast Philadelphia but for St. Hubert's as well. Two new additions were added to the "school with a future." Enrollment grew at an amazing pace, the first principal was installed, and new uniforms were introduced. Musically, the decade was one of change. 1954 was the last year without a musical generation gap, as youngsters listened to the same music as their parents. The top songs that year were "Little Things Mean a Lot," "Wanted," "Hey There," "Oh! My Pa-Pa," "Three Coins in the

Fountain," and "That's Amore." But a new sound was on the horizon – rock and roll. By the end of the 1950s St. Hubert's students were swooning over a new generation of singers such as Elvis Presley, Fabian, Frankie Avalon, Sam Cooke, and Buddy Holly. Teens would play these and other hits continuously on jukeboxes in drug stores and luncheonettes, rushed home from school to watch Dick Clark host American Bandstand every afternoon, and by the end of the decade made rock and roll the new popular music in America.



September 1, 1950: The tenth scholastic year of St. Hubert's High School opened. "The School with a Future" boasted an enrollment of 789 students. Two hundred sixty-seven freshmen walked through the doors at Cottman and Torresdale for the first time. The freshmen reported on two shifts. One group began classes at 8 am and left at noon, while the second shift arrived at noon and ended their day at 4 pm. The faculty of St. Hubert's included seven Sisters of St. Joseph, six Sisters, Servants of the Immaculate Heart of Mary, one Notre Dame Sister, seven Sisters of St. Francis, three Sisters of the Holy Family of Nazareth, and three female lay teachers.

December 1950: A first-class relic of St. Maria Goretti was presented to the school for the new chapel by Sr. Marie Aubert, S.S.J.

January 26, 1951: The Barclay Hotel played host to the Senior Prom. The theme was "Stardust Formal," and the entertainment was provided by Jack Gleason and his Orchestra.

Winter 1951: The students of St. Hubert's received instructions in the rules to be observed in air-raid drills. Several drill practices had been given in order to make the students familiar with the regulations of safety.

March 1951: St. Hubert's Commercial department congratulated senior Mary Jane Carboni for conquering the 120-word test in Senior Stenography. Senior Nora Dennehy was the school's speediest typist, at 56 words per minute.

March 31, 1951: St. Hubert's bowling team captured the title for the girls' schools in the city of Philadelphia at the Glenwood Academy alleys. St. Hubert's defeated Simon Gratz 1,992-1,988.

May 8, 1951: St. Hubert's triumphed over the boys of St. Thomas More High School in a spelling bee program broadcast over WIP radio.

May 20, 1951: The Annual Alumnae breakfast was held in the new school auditorium. Mass was celebrated at St. Matthew's by Reverend Edward M. Reilly, Superintendent of schools. The Reverend John J. Haydt, J.C.D., moderator of the St. Hubert's Alumnae, delivered the sermon.

June 10, 1951: Commencement exercises for the 135 members of the class of 1951 took place at Convention Hall. Right Reverend Monsignor Francis J. Furey, D.D., Dean of St. Charles Seminary was the guest speaker.



September 4, 1951: St. Hubert's enrollment increased to 944. The incoming freshmen class was the largest to date – 326.

November 29-30, 1951: The St. Hubert senior play, Little Women is performed in the new school auditorium.

December 13, 1951: The new chapel at St. Hubert's was officially opened with Exposition of the Most Blessed Sacrament. Following Mass in the auditorium, Reverend Edward Reilly, accompanied by the altar boys and the girls' choir, carried the Most Blessed Sacrament in procession through the corridors of the new wing into the newly erected chapel on the second floor of the old building. Girls from the senior class formed a guard of honor along the corridors from the auditorium to the new chapel. Throughout the day, volunteer students were permitted to spend 15 minutes of their study periods in the chapel. Permission was also granted to the school for Exposition of the Blessed Sacrament on each Thursday throughout the school year.

February 8, 1952: St. Hubert's Alumnae Association held its "Sweetheart Festival of 1952" in the new school auditorium. The music was provided by Tommy Varcone and his orchestra.

February 15, 1952: The Crystal Ballroom of the Barclay Hotel was once again the scene of the St. Hubert's Senior Prom. The theme was "Darts and Flowers."

February 18, 1952: Junior Day celebration at St. Hubert's. The day was highlighted by a short play Seven Sisters by the Junior Dramatic Club. The production of Seven Sisters was under the direction of Miss Claire Winkler.

May 15, 1952: KYW radio's "Junior Town Meeting of the Air" is broadcast from the St. Hubert's Auditorium. The topic discussed was "Should the president be elected by direct vote of the people?"

May 31, 1952: Baccalaureate Mass was held in the school auditorium.

June 7, 1952: One hundred fifty-nine seniors received their diplomas at Convention Hall.



September 3, 1952: St. Hubert's welcomed Reverend Richard J. Simons as new school principal. A native Philadelphian, Fr. Simons came to St. Hubert's after spending the previous 12 years teaching English at St. Thomas More High School.

October 20, 1952: "Stairway to the Stars" was theme for the Freshmen Day performance.

February 6, 1953: The senior prom is held at the Barclay. The theme was "Stardust Formal."

April 17, 1953: After a hiatus, the Junior Prom was revived at St. Hubert's. Held in the school auditorium, the theme of the prom was "Spring Frolic."

April 28, 1953: Juniors and seniors witnessed the formal presentation to the school of a RCA Victor Console Combination television set. The set was placed in the library and was awarded to the school in recognition of student Regina McNulty's winning entry in the "I Speak for Democracy" essay contest. The set featured a 21-inch screen, record player, and radio.

1953-1954

Fall 1953: St. Hubert's boasted its largest enrollment since the school opened. The total number of students reached 1,288. The freshmen class reached a new high of 376. Five new teachers were added, increasing the number of faculty to 38. The new freshmen class had a different look sartorially, as they sported a new Air Force blue uniform and powder-blue blouse. Some upperclassmen made the switch as well, but others chose to finish the year in the old maroon uniform. The maroon uniform was traditional since St. Hubert's was once an annex to Little Flower High School. This combination of blues was chosen by the girls and approved by the faculty the previous school year. It was agreed that the monochromatic uniform was not only attractive but also practical. The girls were proud to wear the colors of Our Lady. With the new uniform, the St. Hubert's girls would not be mistaken for Little Flower students.

February 12, 1954: Senior prom was held at the Bala Country Club. The seniors danced to the sounds of Johnny McGee and his orchestra.

March 1-5, 1954: Vocations Week observed at St. Hubert's. The week culminated with a student production Restoring All Things.



April 3-4, 1954: The 12th Annual St. Hubert Music Festival is held. In keeping with the Marion Year of 1954, the concert was dedicated to the Mother of God.

April 1954: St. Hubert's students chose *The Robe* as their favorite movie, beating out *From Here to Eternity*. The most popular television program among the girls was *I Love Lucy*. Their favorite popular songs were "Till Then" by the Hilltoppers and "Wanted" by Perry Como.

June 8, 1954: Baccalaureate Mass celebrated at St. Matthew's.

June 13, 1954: The senior class of St. Hubert's, Little Flower, and Notre Dame Moylan participated in combined graduation exercise at Convention Hall. Mary Jane Campbell of St. Hubert's delivered the salutatory address.

1954-1955

September 1954: Once again St. Hubert's High School reached a new high in enrollment – 1,619. Due to the large enrollment, annexes were opened at St. Matthew's to accommodate 200 freshmen and four teachers, and St. Timothy's, which provided space for 95 freshmen and two teachers. Twenty-five parishes were served by St. Hubert's that fall. The faculty welcomed 15 new members.

September 23, 1954: To the triumphant strains of "High School Cadets," St. Hubert's students filed into the auditorium for the annual Student Council Installation.

November 30, December 1-3, 1954: In recognition of the Marion Year, the St. Hubert Dramatic Club, under the direction of Miss Claire Winkler, performed Song of Bernadette. The lead role was played by Dorothy Hatchell and Maryanne Schirmer.

December 13-17, 1954: St. Hubert's students helped spread Christmas cheer by giving small parcels to the residents of the homes of the Good Sisters of the Poor in West Philadelphia, North Philadelphia, and Germantown. The drive was directed by Sr. Mary Theosetta, C.S.F.N.

January 7, 1955: The senior prom was held in the main ballroom of the Warwick hotel in Center City. The theme was "Snowflake Formal." Music was provided by Johnny McGee and his orchestra. Some of the dances featured included the Bunny Hop and the Mexican Hat Dance. The evening ended with a singing of the alma mater, led by Rosemarie Hedl.



January 30, 1955: KYW radio's Junior Town Meeting of the Air was broadcast from St. Hubert's Auditorium. The topic for discussion was whether United States economic aid to Europe was paying off. Senior Mary Elizabeth Gindhart represented St. Hubert's in the debate, which also featured students from Benjamin Franklin High School, Friends Select, and Lansdale High School.

March 17, 1955: St. Patrick's Day celebrated at St. Hubert's. Eight-eight girls named Patricia graced the halls of the school.

April 26, 1955: Fr. Simons announced that plans for enlarging St. Hubert's High School have been completed. The new addition to the school would extend along Ditman Street to Bleigh Avenue, almost a complete city block in length. The new facility would include 43 new classrooms, two art rooms, two science laboratories, three science lecture rooms, one secretarial, six typing, and four home economics rooms. The new addition also included a large auditorium with a seating capacity of 1,000, a cafeteria that would accommodate 800, and large faculty room. It was also announced that the present cafeteria would be converted into a library, art room, and publications office. Plans also included an enlargement of the chapel. The expected completion date was scheduled for September 1956.

June 12, 1955: Two hundred eighty-five seniors received their diplomas at Convention Hall. It was the first time in the history of St. Hubert's that commencement exercises for the diocesan Catholic Girls' High Schools were held separately.

1955-1956

September 1955: St. Hubert's enrollment climbed to 1,762. Of that number, 1,370 attended classes in the main building, while 187 are educated at St. Matthew's and 205 are at St. Timothy's annexes. There were 27 homerooms at St. Hubert's and the faculty numbered 43.

September 27, 1955: Installation Day at St. Hubert's. Fr. Simons addressed the student body on the necessity of leadership in the modem world.

September 1955: Senior Mary Jo Paglione entered the Seventeen Magazine regional doll contest. Her creation, "Betsy," won the regional contest and was displayed in the window of Gimbel's in Center City. The dolls would be sent to homeless children living in nations behind the Iron Curtain. Mary Jo won luggage, a sterling charm, and a \$50 bond from Gimbel's.

November 29, 30, December 1-3, 1955: St. Hubert's senior class presents *Pride and Prejudice* in the school auditorium.



December 2, 1955: Cortez W. Peters, internationally known typing champion, visited the Commercial department at St. Hubert's and amazed the students with his skills. Mr. Peters won the World's Accuracy Trophy by succeeding to attain a speed of 141 net five-stroke words per minute for one hour with an accuracy of 99 percent.

December 22, 1955: Members of the St. Hubert's Treble Clef Choir sang Christmas Carols in City Hall Courtyard. Among the carols sung were "Hark! The Herald Angels Sing," "Silent Night," "The First Noel," and "It Came Upon A Midnight Clear." A violin solo, "O Holy Night," was performed by Caroline Worton, concertmeister of the school orchestra.

January 6, 1956: The Forest Rooms of the Broadwood Hotel in Center City was the setting for the senior prom. The theme was "Winter Waltz," as the students and their dates danced to the music of the Rhythmaires.

March 6-11, 1956: Pre-Spring Concert, Music in Springtime performed by the St. Hubert Orchestra under the direction of Mr. Guglielmo Sabatini. Mr. Sabatini began conducting the orchestra in 1943.

May 8, 1956: The St. Hubert Radio Club challenged boys from Northeast Catholic High School in a "Patriarchs and Prophets of the Old Testament" quiz over WIP radio.

Spring 1956: St. Hubert's students selected James Dean and Grace Kelly as their favorite movie stars, Perry Como as their favorite television celebrity, and *The 950 Club* as their favorite radio program.

June 9, 1956: The class of 1956 received their diplomas at St. Joseph's College Memorial Fieldhouse. Barbara Benner delivered the valedictory speech and Marilyn Ryan gave the salutatory speech.

1956-1957

September 1956: The new addition to St. Hubert's, Sacred Heart Hall, was completed. Enrollment climbed to 2,295. The incoming freshmen class soared to 800. The number of faculty increased to 65.

Pupils of the new St. Jerome's Elementary School occupied the four second floor classrooms in St. Joseph's Hall. The parish school was under construction and would not be completed until September 1957.

Sr. Maria Virgine, S.S.J. and Sr. Marie Aubert, S.S.J., are the only two faculty members who have been at St. Hubert's since the opening in 1941. Sr. Virgine disclosed that the blue uniform, which debuted in 1953, was desired by faculty and students as far back as 1941.



October 27, 1956: Solemn blessing and dedication of the new addition to St. Hubert's took place. The Most Reverend John F. O'Hara, C.S.C., Archbishop of Philadelphia, officiated. The Archbishop first blessed the outer part of the school, then the classrooms represented in the blessing of Room 123. Directed by Dolores Ferraro, '56, the St. Hubert's choir sang "Ecce Sacerdos," "Veni Creator," "Cor Jesu," "Ave Verum," "Panis Angelicus," "Tantum Ergo," and "Holy God We Praise Thy Name." About 2,000 priests, sisters, parents, and friends attended the dedication. After the ceremony the school building was open for inspection to all visitors. Members of Student Council served as ushers.

January 4, 1957: The main ballroom of the Benjamin Franklin Hotel served as the scene of the senior prom, "The Crystal Sleighride Formal." The couples danced to the music of Chuck Gordon's orchestra.

February 16, 1957: Two St. Hubert's students, Regina McHenry, *Tally-Ho* editor, and Gina Bruno, were chosen to interview Tab Hunter, who was in Philadelphia to promote his new movie, *The Spirit of St. Louis*.

March 28-31, 1957: Selections from My Fair Lady highlighted the 15th Annual Musicale, conducted by Dr. Jeno Donath.

June 8, 1957: Three hundred twenty-eight seniors received their diplomas during graduation exercises at Convention Hall. Presiding at the ceremony was Monsignor Joseph M. Corr, pastor of St. Timothy's Church.

1957-1958

September 1957: Enrollment for the new school year stood at 2,585, which included 715 freshmen, 760 sophomores, 558 juniors, and 522 seniors. Faculty was comprised of 71 sisters and three lay teachers. Two new faculty houses on the school grounds were completed. They were occupied by the Sisters of St. Joseph and the Sisters, Servants of the Immaculate Heart of Mary.

November 21-23, 1957: A taste of the emerald isle came to St. Hubert's with a production of the comedy *Paddy*, the *Next Best Thing*, under the direction of Miss Claire Winkler. Boys from Father Judge had roles in the play.

January 10, 1958: Senior Prom "Stairway to the Stars" held at the Benjamin Franklin Hotel. The seniors and their dates danced to the music of George Sommer and his orchestra.

May 2, 1958: A beautiful new American flag was donated to St. Hubert's by the Tacony American Legion Memorial Post 735. The presentation was made to Fr. Simons and Marie Boland, president of Student Council. The flag was placed in the auditorium.

1958-1959

September 1958: St. Hubert's 1958 edition of Calling Echo was awarded All-Catholic honors by the Catholic School Press Association Critical Service. The All-Catholic rating was also given to Tally-Ho.

October 9, 1958: The St. Hubert's community mourns the death of Pope Pius XII.

November 1958: St. Hubert's library boasted a collection of 4,430 books. The library was run by Sr. Theresa Marie, C.R.S.M.

January 9, 1959: Senior Prom "Crystal Cotillion" held at the Benjamin Franklin Hotel.

May 1, 1959: Annual May Procession held at St. Hubert's. School president Mary Haverstock, dressed in bridal white, was the May Queen. Fr. Simons placed the wreath of flowers on the statue of Our Lady.

June 6, 1959: Graduation exercises held at Convention Hall. The valedictorian for the class of 1959 was Mary Ann Giordano. The guest speaker was Reverend John W. Simons, professor at St. Charles Seminary and Immaculata College.


September 1959: St. Hubert's began its 18th year as 2,475 students returned to school. Eleven new teachers joined the ever-increasing faculty, which now numbered 71 sisters. Twenty-five St. Hubert's graduates entered various religious orders.

School Secretary, Miss Julia Duff, celebrated her silver anniversary at St. Hubert's. When the school opened in 1941, Miss Duff served as mail distributor, typist, file clerk, switchboard operator, stationery salesgirl, and school nurse - all rolled into one!

September 25, 1959: Installation day. Fr. Simons administered the pledge of fidelity to the members of Student Council. Newly installed president Dorothy Gramick echoed a plea to "dare to be different."

November 19-22, 1959: St. Hubert's presented a production of Jane Eyre.

June 12, 1960: Six hundred seventy-two seniors received their diplomas at Convention Hall. Helen Clardy delivered the salutatory speech, and Mary March gave the valedictory speech.

The 1960s was a turbulent decade. The United States was plagued by the war in Vietnam, mourned the loss of the Kennedys and Martin Luther King, and came together as Neil Armstrong took one giant leap for mankind on the moon. St. Hubert's reached its peak enrollment in 1965, and the girls at Cottman and Torresdale went wild over The Beatles, who would change popular music forever. Popular songs of the decade included "California"

Dreamin," "You Lost That Lovin' Feelin'"

"Cherish," "You Can't Hurry Love," "Downtown,"

"My Girl," "Light my Fire," and "You've Made

Me So Very Happy." Hubert girls bought their
favorite songs on 45 RPM records (on such labels
as Colgems, MGM, White Wale, Columbia, RCA,
and Cameo Parkway) and would go with Judge
guys to local dances at Concord, St. Matt's, and
Boulevard Pools.



September 1960: Eight hundred fifty-seven freshmen walk through the doors of St. Hubert's. The freshmen class included four sets of twins. Fifteen new teachers join the faculty.

September 23, 1960: Installation Day at St. Hubert's. Gail Houck, president of Student Council, gave the keynote address.

November 8, 1960: St. Hubert's students elated over the election of John F. Kennedy as president.

November 29-30, December 1-3, 1960: St. Hubert's senior play, *Murder in α Nunnery* was performed in the school auditorium. The play was directed by Miss Claire Winkler.

January 13, 1961: Senior prom held at the Penn-Sheraton Hotel. Theme was "Fountain of Memories." Music was provided by Art Wendell's orchestra.

March 6-12, 1961: The celebrated melodies of Oscar Hammerstein II highlighted the 19th Annual St. Hubert's Musicale in the school auditorium under the direction of Mr. Vito La Monica.

April 21, 1961: The junior class capped off its annual "Junior Day" festivities with their dance in the gym. The girls and their dates danced to the music of Dee Porter and the Redcoats.

May 12, 1961: The sophomore hop is held in the gym. The dance was sponsored by the Coca Cola Bottling Company and radio station WIBG. Popular WIBG air personality Harvey Miller served as disc jockey.

June 10, 1961: The St. Hubert's class of 1961 made history as the first to hold a nighttime graduation. The commencement exercises took place at 8 pm at Convention Hall. Presider was the Most Reverend Francis J. Furey, D.D., auxiliary bishop of Philadelphia. Carol Antal read the valedictory speech and Kathleen Catalano delivered the salutatory speech.

1961-1962

September 1961: Enrollment reached an all-time high of 2,963 girls (992 freshmen, 862 sophomores, 591 juniors, and 520 seniors), most of whom came from St. Timothy's. Of the 25 diocesan high schools, St. Hubert's was ranked eighth in enrollment. The three stained glass windows over the main entrance were installed. Faculty increased to 84 teachers, including seven new lay teachers. Susie Cistone joined the St. Hubert's maintenance staff. She was the aunt of future Bishop Joseph Cistone.



November 30 to December 2, 1961: Annual school play was Family Circle.

January 1962: Senior prom was at the Bellevue-Stratford. Theme was "Moonlight Serenade."

February 1962: Irene Fekete (class of '54) had her first novel, *Zandra*, published.

April 1962: St. Hubert's girls chose Ben Casey as their favorite TV show. Their favorite song was "Soldier Boy" by Shirelles.

June 10, 1962: Five hundred twelve seniors graduated at Convention Hall.

1962-1963

September 6, 1962: St. Hubert's reached a record enrollment of 3,279. The faculty included 91 teachers (78 religious and 19 lay). Trinitarian Sisters began teaching here for the first time. Sr. Paul Marie joined the faculty.

November 29 to December 1, 1962: Annual school play was *Life with Mother.*

January 4, 1963: St. Hubert's clothing class held a fashion show – "Around the Clock Fashion."

January 11, 1963: The Junior Prom was held at the Philadelphia Athletic Club and the theme was "Snowflake Fantasy."

March 8-9 and 15-16, 1963: The 21st annual musical Melodies from Broadway, featured hits from West Side Story. The program was directed by Mr. Vito La Monica. During a PTC strike that winter, St. Hubert's student used ingenuity in getting to school. Some roller skated while others rode bikes or got rides from milkmen, business trucks, and police cars.

April 8-10, 1963: Holy Week retreat.

May 21, 1963: Fr. Simons observed the 25th anniversary of his ordination to the priesthood with a Mass at St. Leo's Church. That same day, the Athletic Association Banquet was held at Four Chefs Restaurant.

June 9, 1963: Five hundred seventy-five seniors graduate at Convention Hall. Elizabeth Gilla delivered the valedictory speech and six seniors received college scholarships. Faculty wears caps and gowns for the first time.

1963-1964

September 1963: The school year opened with an enrollment of 3,600, which ranked St. Hubert's second overall in diocesan high school enrollment behind only Cardinal Dougherty. St. Hubert's was the largest all-girls high school. The faculty consisted of 78 religious and 21 lay teachers. One of the new teachers was Rita Schwartz, who taught English.

October 6, 1963: Open house was held from 2-4:30 pm.



October 1963: Vast majority of students favored the use of the vernacular at Mass.

October 13, 1963: Homecoming Day.

November 22-24, 1963: St. Hubert's senior play *Majority of One.*

November 22, 1963: President John F. Kennedy assassinated. According to Roseann O' Hanlan, a freshman at the time, St. Hubert's students were told of the tragedy during 5th period and were dismissed at the end of the period. That evening's performance of the play was canceled. School was closed on the 25th for Kennedy's funeral.

December 1963: St. Hubert's lead the way in the Catholic Standard Times subscription drive – 1,171 subscriptions sold.

March 1964: St. Hubert's girls were wild about the Beatles. One junior remarked, "We're entitled to the Beatles. Our parents had Frank Sinatra." Another student said, "They are the greatest exports of England since tea."

May 5, 1964: The Blessed Mother was crowned by Fr. Simons. The May Queen was senior class president Catherine McFadden.

June 6, 1964: Eight hundred seven seniors graduated at Convention Hall. The guest speaker was Brother E. Anthony, FSC , and professor at La Salle College.

1964-1965

September 1964: Enrollment reached a new high at 3,707. It was the second year SH was ranked 2nd in overall enrollment behind Cardinal Dougherty. Hubert's had 911 seniors, 860 juniors, 937 sophomores, and 995 freshmen. The faculty consisted of 82 religious and 21 lay.

October 25, 1964: Open House held at St. Hubert's.

December 29, 1964: Senior prom at the Bellevue-Stratford Hotel. The theme was "Camelot."

February 3, 1965: Ring Day held at St. Hubert's.

March 6, 12-13, 1965: St. Hubert's 23rd annual musical featured songs from Showboat.

March 15, 1965: St. Hubert's defeated Notre Dame 37-32 to win the girls' basketball championship. Sue Schwope led the way with 12 points.

March 29-30, 1965: For the first time in its history, St. Hubert's was evaluated by the Middle States Committee.

April 12-14, 1965: Two St. Hubert's students, Terry Miller and Kathy Rites, won an all-expenses paid trip to Hollywood. They visited Grauman's Chinese Theater, the Beverly Hilton, and Disneyland.

June 15, 1965: Nine hundred two seniors graduated at Convention hall. The principal speaker was Reverend William Maloney, SJ, president of St. Joseph's College.



September 1965: St. Hubert's planned for the Silver Jubilee of the school, which took place in April 1966.

Fall 1965: St. Hubert's launched the Jubilee year - peak enrollment of 3,787.

February 21, 1966: The first Ring Dance was held at St. Hubert's.

April 18-24, 1966: St. Hubert's held its Silver Jubilee week.

May 3, 1966: Senior Christine Netter went to Washington D.C. to observe the Poland's Christian Millennium. While there, she shook hands with President Lyndon B. Johnson.

June 11, 1966: Graduation held at Convention Hall.

1966-1967

September 1966: Enrollment dropped to 3,269; the opening of Archbishop Ryan High Schools accounted for the 501 student decrease.

April 27, 1967: Fr. Simons, principal for 15 years, announced his transfer. Father was appointed pastor of St. Mary Magdeline parish in Media, PA.

May 10, 1967: Students bid farewell to Fr. Simons after a Mass and presented him with a new car that cost about \$2,240.

June 8, 1967: Baccalaureate Mass was celebrated in the school auditorium.

June 10, 1967: Graduation at Convention Hall.

1967-1968

September 1967: Reverend James Meehan named the new principal of St. Hubert's, and 19 new teachers, including Miss Carol Pergolino, '63, joined the faculty. Reverend Edward P. Cullen became the new school chaplain.

Fall 1967: Tally-Ho was awarded a first class rating in the 77th All-American Newspaper Critical Service of the National Scholastic Press Association.

November 24, 1967: Harvest dance held at St. Hubert's.

January 5, 1968: The theme of the senior prom was "Snowflakes and Stardust."

Winter 1968: Fr. Meehan awarded "Principal of the Year" by WIBG Radio. Father was presented with an award, a \$1,000 scholarship to be given to a St. Hubert's student, and a new stereo by popular disc jockey Hy Lit. For many years the stereo resided in the school library.

January 12 , 1968: Senior fashion show theme was "Susie's Magical Mirror."



March 14, 1968: St. Hubert's varsity basketball team lost to Cardinal O'Hara in the Catholic girls' basketball championship at the Palestra. Maureen Mooney was high scorer for St. Hubert's with 14 points.

Spring 1968: Senior Mauren Henwood broke the school typing record with the rate of 81 words per minute.

June 7, 1968: Baccalaureate Mass held in the auditorium.

June 8, 1968: St. Hubert's and the nation mourn the death of Senator Robert F. Kennedy, whose funeral was held on this day. 968 seniors received their diplomas at Convention Hall. This was the largest graduating class in the school's history.

1968-1969

September 1968: Fr. James E. Locke was named chaplain of St. Hubert's.

October 25, 1968: The theme of Susie Hubert Day was a tribute to George M. Cohan songs.

October 1968: Career night sponsored by the Guidance Department.

November 15, 16, 22-24, 1968: St. Hubert's presented The King and I.

December 5, 1968: St. Hubert's received accreditation into the Middle Atlantic States association. The evaluation began during the 1966-67 school year.

December 30, 1968: Senior prom at the Bellevue. Theme was "Incense and Peppermints." Music was provided by the orchestra of Art Wendell and Davy Uber.

December 10, 13, 16-17, 1968: African American Literature was presented by four groups of sophomores from Sr. Stephen Mary's 5th period English class. Each group chose a theme and read selections from the literature which exemplified the theme.

March 19, 1969: U.S. History students went to Washington D.C. Miss Martha Shuld, Sr. Patrice McNeal, and Sr. Marcelline organized the trip, which included a tour of the White House and Capitol.

February 20–22, 1969: Sixth annual Science Fair was held in the school cafeteria.

March 10, 1969: "The Mathletes" debut. St. Hubert's hosted a math contest and schools from all over the archdiocese participated. The test consisted of five problems with a maximum of five minutes to complete.



March 1969: The Christus Vincit Chapter of the National Honors Society organized at St. Hubert's. The Outstanding American Foundation named three St Hubert's girls Outstanding Teenagers of America. They are Marie Barren, Margaret Hoepp, and Mary Sharkey.

May 2-4, 1969: The Drama Club presented *Annie Get Your* Gun in the school auditorium.

May 6, 1969: First NHS induction ceremony. Keynote address delivered by the Very Reverend Monsignor Francis B. Schulte, Assistant Superintendent of Schools. Mary Sharkey was the first president of NHS.

May 8-11, 1969: Fifth annual Art Exhibit at St. Hubert's was presented in the gym.

May 16, 1969: Junior prom was held in the gym. Theme was "Time of the Season." Entertainment was provided by the Crestmen and records.

May 24, 1969: The Student Council presented its first annual Variety Show from 8–11 pm. Theme was "Sounds of the Sixties." The event presented the hit songs of the decade.

1969-1970

September 1969: Twenty new faculty members welcomed to St. Hubert's included Miss Christine Lang and Miss Annmarie Timmons.

Fall 1969: For the first time, report cards were printed on an IBM printer.

Fall 1969: Christine Mulholland, a senior, guessed how much money was in the WIP Cash Call Jackpot and won \$259.61.


October 1969: Miss Connie Ban, '63, was named new basketball coach.

October 3, 1969: Songs from Oliver highlight the annual Susie Hubert Day.

October 15, 1969: National Moratorium for Peace held at St Hubert's.







While the United States went through some difficult times in the 1970s, St. Hubert's rolled along. Despite political and national problems, the venerable school at the corner of Cottman and Torresdale continued to offer a quality education to thousands of girls in the Northeast. A new sound was also emerging: disco, thanks to the popularity of the movie "Saturday Night Fever." Suddenly, songs like "Stayin' Alive," "That's the Way I Like It," "Le Freak," "Disco

Inferno," and "Miss You" had everyone dancing. For those who eschewed disco, there were still the rock and pop stars such as The Carpenters ("Close to You"), Linda Ronstadt ("Ooh Baby Baby"), Fleetwood Mac ("Don't Stop"), Eagles ("Hotel California"), Billy Joel ("Just the Way You Are"), Paul McCartney and Wings ("Listen What the Man Says"), and Gary Wright ("Dream Weaver"). Music became portable with the advent of 8-track tapes and cassettes.



September 1970: Twenty-eight new faculty members, including Miss Fernanda Margraff, Miss Judy Belzek, and Mrs. Allison Lewis. Two new chaplains arrived at St. Hubert's. Rev. William Bispels and Rev. Paul Gaggerty.

November 6, 7, 13-15, 1970: St. Hubert's musical *The Sound of Music*.

December 1970: Senior Judy Macatee was selected as The Evening Bulletin's Scholar Athlete.

December 7, 1970: Fifth annual Career Night was held in the auditorium.

December 9, 1970: Eighteen seniors and 51 juniors were inducted into NHS. Chief speaker was Mr. John King, Director of Admissions for the evening and summer sessions at La Salle College.

December 30, 1970: Senior prom held at the Bellevue-Stratford. Music was provided by the Al Raymond Orchestra. The senior's song was "We've Only Just Begun."

February 20, 1971: St. Hubert's students host "The Sounds of '71," a presentation of current pop music. Admission was by donation, and the funds were donated to the school's treasury.

February 26, 1971: Soph-hop in the gym. The theme was "Crystal Blue Persuasion." Entertainment provided by the popular local group The Sound of Dynasty, and records.

Spring 1971: St. Hubert's varsity basketball team wins Northern Division title for the second consecutive year. The team beat Ryan 41-24. Jayne Attanasio placed second in All Catholic bowling.

April 19, 1971: Junior Prom. Theme was "Colour My World." June 11, 1971: Baccalaureate Mass took place at St. Matthew's parish.

June 14, 1971: Graduation at Convention Hall.



Summer 1971: St. Hubert's varsity basketball team claimed summer championship, defeating Cardinal Dougherty 28-21.

September 1971: Fr. Gerald Steffe replaced Fr. Meehan as principal. Twenty-three new teachers joined the SH community.

November 5-7 and 12-14, 1971: St. Hubert's students presented the musical *South Pacific*.

December 10, 1971: National Honor Society inducted 77 new members.

December 1971: Community Service Corps started "Operation Santa Claus" to assist community members. They collected and wrapped toys to distribute to needy families.

February 22, 1972: *Tally-Ho* editors, Loretta Sprissler and Beth Smith interviewed Philadelphia's Mayor Rizzo.

March 1972: Maureen Beaver and Kathleen Kogut won full-tuition scholarships to Temple University and La Salle College, respectively, because of their outstanding academic achievement.

Spring 1972: St. Hubert's bowling team captured the city title.

May 11, 1972: Junior prom held with the theme "Moonshine."

June 9, 1972: Baccalaureate Mass is held at Resurrection Church.

June 10, 1972: Graduation held at Convention Hall.

1972-1973

September 1972: Seventeen new members joined the St. Hubert's faculty.


November 6-8 and 13-15, 1972: Annual musical was "Flower Drum Song."

Fall 1972: St. Hubert's welcomed two new chaplains to its staff - Fr. Ceipliter and Fr. Bielski.

Spring 1973: St. Hubert's bowling team "Keglers" took the Northern Division Title. La Salle College awarded a full scholarship to Alice DeGregorio for outstanding academic achievement.

June 8, 1973: Baccalaureate Mass is held at Resurrection of Our Lord church.

June 9, 1973: Six hundred eight-three seniors graduate at Convention Hall.



Fall 1973: Eleven new electives were added to the curriculum including the Presidents, Earth Science, Spanish Culture, and Comparative Languages. 12 new faculty members were welcomed to St. Hubert's.

October 25, 1973: St. Hubert's held its annual college night.

November 2-11, 1973: St. Hubert's presented its annual play,

Carnival.

November 7, 1973: St. Hubert's sponsored vocation day.

December 28, 1973: Senior prom theme was "Sentimental Journey." Al Raymond and his orchestra provided entertainment and a rock group, The Stylist, provided the post-prom music.

May 10, 1974: Junior class celebrates junior day and prom with the theme "A Time for Us."

May 1974: The archdiocese decided to change the parochial high school uniform for the first time in 62 years. The new uniform features the princess line jumper and the Peter Pan style blouse. Rev. Phillip J. Cribben, principal at St. Hubert's, decided that incoming freshmen would wear a blue uniform and blue blouse, however, upperclassmen on either a blue uniform or brown uniform with a gold blouse. The students voted to keep the blue uniform.

Spring 1974: Three hundred girls tried out for the softball team, coached by Sr. Marie Danielle, S.S.N.D., and Miss Marie Gallagher. 21 girls eventually made the team.

June 9, 1974: Seven hundred seventeen seniors graduated.

1974-1975

Fall 1974: Twenty new faculty members walked through the doors of St. Hubert's, including the first male teachers in the school's history. The men were Mr. Joseph Sanquilli (Social Studies), Mr. Robert Zingle (Theology), Mr. Louis Guiliano (English), Mr. Michael Fidele (English) and Mr. Anthony Inverso (English).

October 4, 1974: Susie Hubert Day theme was "Hello Dolly."
October 11, 1974: Senior ring mass was held at the. The theme of the mass was "Circle of Life."

October 1974: Three St. Hubert's students participated in a Daily News student press conference with Philadelphia Eagles head coach Mike McCormick.

November 13-17, 1974: St. Hubert's held its annual play, "Oklahoma."

March 7, 1975: Soph-hop theme was "Laughter in the Rain" with music provided by DJ Jim Tighe.

March 22, 1975: Student Council sponsored a Fifties Dance in the gym from 8-11 pm. Music was provided by DJ Rich Powers. Activities included a Fonzie lookalike contest.



September 26, 1975: Installation day for Student Council.

November 10, 1975: Miss Helen Chaykowski appointed

Vice Principal of St. Hubert's.

November 14-16, 21-23, 1975: Annual St. Hubert's Show Mame.

February 23, 1976: Senior prom at the Marriott Motor Inn from 9–12. Post prom from 12–3. Theme was "Miracles." Cost of ticket was \$40.

March 1976: By a vote of 408-220, the junior class decided to change the color of St. Hubert's school rings from ruby to topaz. When St. Hubert's was built as an annex to Little Flower, the red stone of Little Flower was adopted as the traditional school rings. The junior class felt that tradition should be changed. The Evening Bulletin designated two St. Hubert's seniors as distinguished Student and Scholar-Athlete. Jaqueline Rosenberg was chosen as The Bulletin's Distinguished Student and Eileen Everling was chosen as Scholar-Athlete.

March 19, 1976: The St. Hubert Spirit Committee sponsors a volleyball marathon from 6 am-midnight. The proceeds benefited Misericordia and Oncologic Hospitals for cancer research.

May 21, 1976: Junior prom. Theme was "Dream On."

1976-1977

October 13, 1976: Fifty-five students inducted into the National Honors Society.

October 15, 1976: Class of 1977 receives their rings at the Cathedral of SS. Peter and Paul.

October 29, 1976: Susie Hubert Day. The theme was "Greenspell."

November 1976: The old locker room on the ground floor is converted into a television studio. St. Hubert's celebrates its 35th anniversary.

1977: From 1941 to 1976, the school was officially known as "St. Hubert's Catholic High School for Girls." In 1977 the name was changed to "St. Hubert Catholic High School for Girls."

April 4-2 1977: Holy Week Retreat.

June 1977: The honors system at St. Hubert was changed for the 1977-78 school year. In order to obtain first honors, a student must have an average of 92 or above, with no grade lower than an 88. Any student with an average of 87 or above with no mark lower than an 84 will receive second honors. The Academic Board believed the new system will be fair to all students.

June 12, 1977: Six hundred forty-two graduates participated in the 35th annual graduation exercises at Convention Hall. Baccalaureate Mass was held on June 10 at St. Bart's Church.



Fall 1977: St. Hubert will be evaluated by the Middle States Association of America from November 8-10.

October 18, 1977: St. Hubert students inducted into National Honors Society.

October 21, 1977: St. Hubert's held its annual Ring Mass at the Cathedral. Theme of the Mass was "Yesterday, Today, and Tomorrow."

November 11–20, 1977: The St. Hubert play was Funny Girl.

December 16, 1977: The annual Jingle Bell Rock hosted by Student Council was held in the school gym.

April 1978: St. Hubert plans to return to an eight period day for the 78-79 school year.

April 14, 1978: Junior prom in the school gym. Theme was "Once Upon A Time."

June 10, 1978: Five hundred ninety-five seniors were awarded diplomas at graduation.

1978-1979

October 17, 1978: Forty-four students participated in the National Honors Society induction in the auditorium. Mr. Thomas Forkin, assistant superintendent of schools, was the guest speaker.

October 27, 1978: The class of 1979 received their rings during a special mass at the Cathedral of SS. Peter and Paul.

November 10-12, 17-19, 1978: The St. Hubert annual show, *The Sound of Music*.

March 1979: Fr. Cribben announces that St. Hubert Day will not be held anymore.

March 16, 1979: Community Service Corps sponsored a dance. WFIL's Kelly McCann was the DJ.

May 11, 1979: Junior prom. Theme was "We Got Tonight." June 8, 1979: Five hundred forty-eight seniors received diplomas at graduation.



Fall 1979: Cindy Kogut received National Merit Scholarship.

October 1979: The school welcomed full-time school minister
Fr. Torn Skindelcski. Judy Haughton merits recognition and
prepares for the national team.

October 11, 1979: Fifty-five students inducted into the National Honors Society.

October 26, 1979: Senior class receives rings at the Cathedral Basilica of SS. Peter and Paul.

November 9-10, 16-18, 1979: The St. Hubert theatre presents How to Succeed in Business Without Really Trying.

December 1979: Six students named to All-City Orchestra. **January 22, 1980:** Students visited Washington D.C. and joined the "Right to Life March."

March 19, 1980: Swimmer Judy Haughton breaks record in the 100-yard butterfly. Haughton's time allowed her to be considered for the All-American team.

June 7, 1980: Five hundred nineteen seniors graduate from Pennsylvania Hall.





The 1980s were a special time at St. Hubert's. The school celebrated its 40th anniversary in 1981 and welcomed its first female principals. The decade was known for its pop culture and prosperous times for the nation. Musically, the 1980s may have been the most diverse, with rock, pop, country, and soul songs occupying spots on the charts. Some of the most memorable songs enjoyed by the girls at St. Hubert's in the 1980s

include "Open Arms," "Tell Her About It," "Billie Jean," "Material Girl," "Start Me Up," "Private Eyes," "Jessie's Girl," "Every Breath You Take," "Flashdance," "Walk Like an Egyptian," "Jack and Diane," "Run to You," and "Dancin' in the Dark." The girls listened to these and other Hot Hits on 98 WCAU-FM and on their boom boxes, which they carried with them everywhere.



March 19, 1980: Judy Haughton, as a freshman, broke the 100 Yd. Butterfly Catholic League record. This record stood for more that 22 years.

September 1980: Sr. Marcus. O.S.F. assumed the position of the first woman Principal of St. Hubert, replacing Fr. Cribben, who became Principal of Cardinal O'Hara High School.

September 25, 1980: Student Council underwent changes such as the installation ceremony taking place at night, only homerooms voted for their representatives, and the executive board was created.

October, 1980: Judy Haughton competed in the U.S. Junior Nationals placing 4th in the 200 Butterfly.

December 1980: Students in the Italian classes wrote letters to prove the power of the pen, and new Italian textbooks were received in result.

March 1981: Discrepancy evident in computing rank. Studies Office created a more fair way of determining rank. Those who took more classes no longer had an advantage.

Basketball captains Gina Tobin and Kathy Razler lead team to the 1981 Girls' Catholic League Basketball Championship.

April 29, 1981: St. Hubert held an All-Star soccer benefit. The proceeds were donated to March of Dimes.

May 1-2, 1981: St. Hubert celebrated its 40th Anniversary. Two-day celebration consisted of Masses and luncheons. Statue of St. Hubert and stag created by Nick Burpulis, husband of faculty member Mrs. Marianne Burpulis, dedicated to the school.

June 1981: Class of '81 prepared to graduate. Cardinal Krol presided over the ceremony.


1981-1982

October 1981: Seniors anticipated their Reception of Rings; the celebration was centered on unity. Junior and sophomore retreat committees prepared for a more personal atmosphere. A new dean of students, Sr. Mary Christie, I.H.M. was assigned to St. Hubert and 10 new teachers joined various departments.

November 12, 1981: Students received Youth of the Month Award and were issued savings bonds.

December 7, 1981: NHS Induction held.

June 1982: First St. Hubert jazz band organized.



October 1982: Student Council members installed and Swenson Representative elected.

December 1982: Community Service Corps officers named Youths of the Month.

March 1983: The St. Hubert senior class attends prom. "Up Where We Belong" was the theme. St. Hubert and North Catholic participated in NHS Student Exchange Day.

April 22, 1983: Juniors attended junior day show and prom.

April 26, 1983: Highest ranking seniors selected to attend Archdiocesan Convocation.

June 1983: Thirty-two seniors merited 49 scholarships. Senior class obtained the privilege of lunching in the rose garden.

1983-1984

November 1983: School presented the annual musical Babes in Arms.

March 16, 1984: Soph-hop was held with theme "I'll be There."

April 1984: Five Bambie alumnae members came back to coach St. Hubert teams.

May 1, 1984: Top five seniors attended convocation at the Philadelphia Museum of Art. John Cardinal Krol, Archbishop of Philadelphia, presided over the ceremony.

May 2, 1984: Juniors received rings at St. Bernard's Church. That same day, World Affairs Club members attended "United Nations" forum at the University of Pennsylvania Museum.





October 19, 1984: Red Cross bloodmobile visited St. Hubert.
October 25, 1984: Open house and activities fair held.

January 1985: Barbara Alexander scored her 1,000th point on the basketball court.

April 30, 1985: Top four seniors attended Archdiocesan Honors Convocation at the Art Museum.

1985-1986

December 19, 1985: Christmas show performed by music department; theme was "Christmas, Our Favorite Time of the Year."

March 14, 1986: The St. Hubert bowling team defeated Bishop Conwell to capture the Catholic League Title.

March 1986: The St. Hubert basketball team captured first place in the regular season, defeating Archbishop Wood 72-52.

1986-1987

October 1986: Sr. Ann Harkins, S.S.J., became the new activities director at St. Hubert.

October 31, 1986: Faculty dressed up in Halloween costumes to perform in Faculty Follies.

January 1987: Sr. Jeannie Marie, Ms. Denuccio, and Mr. Giuliano received the Distinguished Catholic Educator's Award.

1987-1988

September 1987: The incoming freshmen were the first to wear the new brown jumper and gold blouse.

September 24, 1987: Student council installation took place with new moderator, Pearl Chong.

November 3-5, 1987: St. Hubert underwent Middle States evaluation.

November 20-21, 1987: Fall show was Anything Goes.

Winter 1988: Sr. Jean Obermiller, S.S.J., of the science department, became a published author. She wrote a workbook called *Scientific Figures Made Easy*, which explored the mathematics of measurement.

April 15, 1988: Senior Prom was held with theme "This is the Time."



September 1988: Mrs. Joanne Walls became principal of St. Hubert, the first lay principal in the school's history. There were several new teachers added to the faculty, including Ms. Patricia Kubach, Sr. Lisa Breslin, Ms. Deborah Neil, and Mr. James Kelly.

Fall 1988: Varsity soccer went 10-0-1 and won the Catholic League Championship. Bowling went 12-1-0 and also won their championship.

November 11-19, 1988: Fall show was 42nd Street.

December 7, 1988: NHS induction with guest speaker Barbara Killian, '82, LT in the US Army.

June 8, 1989: The graduation ceremony was held at Villanova University for the first time. Valedictorian was Kristie Machemer.

1989-1990

Fall 1989: The senior class was the last to wear the blue jumper uniform. The other three classes wore khaki skirts and yellow blouses. New teachers in the St. Hubert community included Mr. Jeff Taylor, Sr. Bernard Agnes, Ms. Prevosnik, Ms. Catanzaro, Sr. Mary Tate, and Ms. Rita McGovern.







Change was in the air at St. Hubert's in the 1990s. New uniforms were introduced in 1990 and 1999, many new teachers joined the faculty, and enrollment became a greater concern. Still, the one constant at St. Hubert's was the girls' love of music. Compact discs (CDs) were popular, and a new sound was in the air – boy bands such as New Kids on the Block ("Hangin' Tough," "The Right Stuff") and NSync ("Tearin' Up My Heart,"

"Bye Bye Bye"). Other popular songs of the decade included "Wannabe," "Smells Like Teen Spirit," "I Will Always Love You," "Jump," "End of the Road," "Losing My Religion," "Whoomp (There it is)," "Smooth," and "Unbelievable." The most popular radio stations at the time were Eagle 106 and Q102.



Fall 1990: St. Hubert's prepared for its 50th anniversary, which was set to begin on June 6, 1991.

April 12, 1991: Senior prom was held at Kings Caterers.

April 14 and 23, 1991: Marie Haughton and Denise Krenski were chose to represent St. Hubert at the 25th annual KYW news studies program. They each recorded a news segment that was later broadcasted on the radio.

June 6, 1991: The 50th anniversary class received their diplomas that day at Villanova, with 54 girls participating in the ceremony. The first Julia Michael Award presented to Marie Haughten for dedication and service to the St. Hubert school community.

1991-1992

September 1991: St. Hubert opened its 50th anniversary school year by welcoming 331 new freshmen. New faculty members included Sr. Rita Josepha King, Ms. Stephanie Erdman, and Sr. Frances Pallozza. Mrs. Marianne Martin replaced Harry Schwartzer as Studies Director.

September 24, 1991: Student Council installation held. Sr. Lisa Breslin, S.S.J., Student Council moderator, distributed ribbons and pins to all of the 1991–92 Student Council members.

October 31, November 3-4, 11, 1991: A special anniversary show, Over the Rainbow, was performed in the school auditorium. The show was based on The Wizard of Oz and rewritten to focus on the St. Hubert community. The show revolves around a freshman who is excited about her first day of school and is teased by a sophomore, junior, and senior. As she attempts to board the bus, she trips and becomes unconscious. She dreams about Oz, and becomes Dorothy, who meets Susie Hubert and goes along the "Brown and Gold" road. The Wizard was played by Mr. Robert Zingle. The show was produced by Ms. Marianne Burpulis, Ms. Terese Lewis, and Sr. Mary Tate, S.S.J.

November 5, 1991: The St. Hubert 50th anniversary is celebrated. Cardinal Bevilacqua celebrated two liturgies. The freshmen and sophomores attended an 8 am service, while the juniors and seniors were present for a 10 am liturgy. The students lined the corridors to greet the Cardinal so that he could shake their hands. Many dignitaries were invited to share in the festivities, including Monsignor Charles V. Devlin, Vicar of Philadelphia North, Monsignor Thomas Leonard, Secretary for Catholic Education, principals of all the diocesan high



schools, as well as the pastors and principals of the feeder schools.

The alumnae had their liturgy celebration on Saturday, November 3, 1991.

December 6, 1991: The soph-hop was held. The theme was "Moonlight and Mistletoe."

February 8, 15, and 22, 1992: The annual Father-Daughter Dance was held.

February 23, 1992: First Annual "Battle of the Sexes" between St. Hubert and Father Judge was held in the school gym. The Crusaders defeated the Bambies 80-60.

March 14, 1992: The junior prom was held. The theme was "A Night in Heaven."

April 29, 1992: Junior Ring Day and Ring Mass. Mass celebrated at St. Bernard's. The theme was "Women of Faith, Women of Achievement."

May 8, 1992: Senior prom was held.

June 4, 1992: Graduation exercises held at Villanova University.

1992-1993

September 1992: Two new teachers, Mr. Joseph Anhalt and Ms. Mary Slobogin joined the business department. Ms. Susanne Carroll became director of studies.

September 24, 1992: Student Council installation, the guest speaker was Ms. Star Conti.

October 23, 1992: St. Hubert held its annual Career Day.

November 1992: Ghost returns to St. Hubert. The spirit of a deceased St. Hubert student came back to visit and live out her teenage years that were taken away.



December 17, 2000: The St. Hubert Fine Arts Department held the annual *Christmas Concert*.


January 22, 2001: Thirty-six St. Hubert students attended the March for Life in Washington D.C.

November 20, 2008: The Art Room was remodeled and updated with a ribbon cutting ceremony.




September 11, 2009: Members of the softball team got to pose for pictures with the World Series trophy courtesy of the Phillies in a private visit to Citizens Bank Park.

June 4, 2010: The St. Hubert choir sang the "National Anthem" before a Phillies game at Citizens Bank Park.



The 2010s were a tumultuous and challenging time at St. Hubert. In 2012 the school was slated for closure, but due to the hard work and dedication of students, faculty, alumnae, and the community, St. Hubert's was able to remain open. The school greeted new administrations in 2013 and 2017, many longtime teachers retired, and we learned that "Sisterhood cannot be defined, only experienced." The more things changed,

the more they remained the same as the girls still loved listening to music. Popular songs included "Bad Romance," "OMG," "Rolling in the Deep," "Call Me Maybe," "Blurred Lines," "Happy," "Sugar," and "Bad at Love." Technology continued to evolve as the girls now streamed their music from such sources as Spotify and Sirius XM.

September 30, 2010: Student Council Installation was held. The guest speaker was Megan Carey Womelsdorf, '00.

January 8, 2011: "Winter Wonderland" was the theme of the annual Winter Formal.

2011-2012

September 19, 2011: The start of the school year delayed by a teacher's strike. One hundred forty-one members of the Class of 2015 were welcomed to St. Hubert.

April 15, 2012: The Class of 2012, with their mothers, grandmothers, and aunts, celebrated the fourth annual Mother-Daughter Communion Breakfast with Mass at school and brunch at the Belle Voir Manor on the Pen Ryn Estate.



September 23, 2021: The St. Hubert Student Council officers are elected. The election, normally held the previous spring, had been postponed due to the hybrid scheduling.



St. Hubert Art & Design Academy

Today's typical high school classroom should be marked by movable tables, electronic tablets and devices, and predominantly students moving around the room. Teachers coaching a student, guiding a writing exercise, and facilitating a discussion or activity. At St. Hubert there is first-rate, challenging, and imaginative instruction and learning ... and the need for facilities and resources combined to help make that happen.

St. Hubert already stands apart for the recognized excellence of its students in the arts, particularly in music performance, digital arts and fashion. Fashion design is one of the fastest growing industries in Philadelphia and market research reveals an otherwise limited breadth and depth in the arts education offered by archdiocesan and public high schools located in Northeast Philadelphia.

By creating an Arts Academy that captures "design" in its many forms, St. Hubert adopts a portfolio-focused approach that deepens a student's ongoing assessment of her talent, skill and proficiency. The digital arts, ceramics, sound & editing, and media arts will join fashion design and the performing arts in components for students to build their portfolios of creative works, performances and collections.

By embracing an interdisciplinary hands-on STEAM curriculum, St. Hubert assembles science, math, and technology tools in open and adaptable spaces that support student design, building, testing, programming, coding, printing, robotics, and other project-based applications of math and science principles that are relevant today.

This co-curricular approach to teaching and learning expands course offerings into a framework of visual, design, and performing arts with the addition of the digital arts, ceramics, dance and the creation of new opportunities for studio applications of instructional theories and principles.

A particular emphasis for St. Hubert instructional perspective is the application of best practices for teaching young women. A successful STEAM program generally demands a student's ability to immerse herself in individual and team projects, solve real-world problems, demonstrate an independence of thought, collaborate generously, and take risks that push them above their limits and include the prospect of failure.



Saint Hubert High School for Girls currently has agreements with La Salle University, Manor College, Neumann University, and various other institutions. Through La Salle University's LEAP program students are able to earn up to 30 college credits before high school graduation. Manor College is offering two Certificate programs in Entrepreneurship and Allied Health Pre-Professional. Neumann University offers a Public Speaking class to help students better prepare their presentation skills beyond high school. Our students will attend classes taught by the universities faculty. Diocesan Scholars Program


