#### **Lingering with Libby**

Throughout this Lenten season, we have been focusing on the book "A Time to Grow: Lenten Lessons from the Garden to the Table" which seems so truly relevant for our times. This is definitely a time when we need to focus more on God than on all we see happening in the world. As we delve deeper into our relationship with God, we are called to remember our connection to the earth and all creation and remember the abundant blessings we have received because of God's grace. Blessing that are multiplied when we gather as community to break bread together and remember Jesus' sacrifice for us.

Gardening season is just beginning, and transitions begin as the first seeds are planted and nurtured have begun to the process of forming plants. We as the church find ourselves in a time of transition where seeds of faith which have been planted and nurtured are being prepared for further growth and harvesting in the coming season. A growth process that is not easy as we let go of what has been our norm and our pastoral leadership to do the groundwork to prepare for our new pastoral leadership.

Unlike plants in a garden when we as human beings face transitions and times of growth, we often experience grief and loss. For some the grief is just a simple acknowledgement of the loss and for others it can be devastating. Since grief is unique in these ways for each person, I invite each of us to be kinder and gentler with one another in this season. I encourage you to take time with God to share what you are feeling about the changes in our congregational community and listen for what God might be speaking. Also, it is important to draw close to this community who shares your experience, so we are walking together. When we are grieving or are fearful of change it is sometimes difficult to remember God is always at work we may just need to pause and be aware of God's presence and faithful friends can help us.

The lessons and messages we have shared this Lenten season in our Time to Grow series can be a real source of healing, remembrance, and strength. We come from the dust from which God created us we, ordering us in a unique way to be the people of God. This ordering that prepared us for the God given breath of life which empowers us through the Holy Spirit to live the life we have been called to. Not just any ordinary life, but life eternal that is fully ours as Jesus Christ offers us life-giving water. It is in the life-giving water that we find our hope, like the woman at the well who knew that even though Jesus knew her whole life which hadn't been the best he welcomed her into relationship. Not just a relationship for a few minutes at the well or a few days in community, but an eternal relationship where she was assured of one day feasting at the heavenly banquet because she drank from the life-giving water Jesus offered her. My prayer is that we will all choose life-giving water and be strengthened and sustained for a deeper relationship with God.



#### **Leadership Team Updates**

Our Leadership Team has already been quite busy this year. We look forward to continuing our conversation with the congregation on Sunday, March 30 following worship. We will focus on how we can align our mission statement with the values we previously expressed.

As we have continued our conversations with Kansas Wesleyan about gifting our building to them, we are now on a pause until next year. While we are on a pause, we will continue to rent KWU the space at the church they have been using for the past few years, and we are now renting them our parsonage for some non-traditional students who are working with the farming program.

We have agreed that to improve our communications we will only allow items to be posted in the elevator once the pastor has approved them.

We also want to remind everyone that if you want to use a space in the church to please reserve the time and location with Tara. You can stop by the office on Monday or Wednesday afternoon, call her at 785-825-9509, or email office@theuumc.org and she will happily get the space reserved if it is available.

We had a great conversation with the Boy Scout Leader, Terry Hill, about continued use of our space and received their request to have ownership of the trailer. Since the trailer is for Boy Scout's use our Leadership Team voted to give the trailer to them. We are in the process of getting a new title in order to complete the gift.

We authorized the consolidation of some of our bank accounts while continuing to separately account for them in our finance system. This allows us to invest funds for a higher return instead of sitting and collecting very minimal interest. In other financial news we also set an amount that can be transferred from the Greater Salina Area Foundation for expenses as needed when giving falls short of expenses. When a transfer is made the Leadership Team will then be notified so we have a clear picture of our finances.

We received estimates for the sanctuary air conditioning repair and our Leadership Team approved a bid and the equipment is being ordered. Our hope is that it will be in place by early to mid-June. Fortunately, from previous giving for the air conditioning we should have enough in our reserve funds to pay the full amount without further fundraising efforts.


