

EIP's Legislative Report for 8-11-2025 Membership Meeting

As the 89(1) Special Session goes on for one more week, redistricting bills are holding up the progress of any of the other election-related bills that we are tracking. (See bills we're tracking attachment.) All of the 40 bills that I called attention to last meeting are still in Stage 1 (filed only). (See bill stages attachment.) None of them have anything to do with our mail-in ballot legislation revision priorities.

As you know, Texas House Representatives from the Democrat Party fled to other states to avoid voting on the controversial redistricting bill. The Senate is approaching 2nd and 3rd readings on their bills, just waiting for the House to reach a quorum.

Ken Paxton has filed to have 13 of those who fled removed from office. One of the 13 is John Bucy, Vice Chair of the House Elections Committee. (Bucy's own HB 73 isn't progressing past stage 1, either: regarding doing electronic voter registration, which the EIP doesn't support.)

Back to the redistricting fight: California has an "independent" Redistricting Commission. Texas does not: our elected legislators draw the maps. But HJR 26 by Goodwin, (companion is SJR 3) is proposing a constitutional amendment to establish the Texas Redistricting Commission. Composed of 14 APPOINTED, DIVERSE, members; 5 would be majority party, 5 minority party and 4 independents. If this commission doesn't produce redistricting maps by the deadline, the SoS gets the Tx Supreme Court to appoint MORE "Special Masters" to get it done. More layers of bureaucrats who aren't elected. Thankfully, this is just in stage 1 (filed only).

In case you didn't know it, our own Rep. Hunter authored the redistricting bill, HB 4, and virtually all Republican legislators, including Rep. Villalobos, co-authored it.

There is one exceptional bill in stage 3, SB 11 by Hughes, which has passed the Senate and is on its way to the House State Affairs Committee. This bill calls for the Attorney General to be able to prosecute criminal election offenses. There are duplicate, similar and companion bills, but this one has made it farther than the rest. Our Rep. Villalobos co-authored HJR 1, which proposes a constitutional amendment to do this. (We won't need the constitutional amendment if SB 11 passes.)

We're also following HB 35 by Tepper, which calls for identifying the cost of doing a constitutional amendment prior to an election. That's a good fiscal move, but let's hope they pass bills, but only the right bills, because we don't have much control over whether constitutional amendments pass or not.



Now, for some GOOD NEWS about mail-in ballots!

You might recall that back in 2021, the League of Women Voters (et al) sued Texas to remove the requirement that voters sending in mail-in ballots must provide their TDL or Texas ID number, or their SS last 4 digits, on their mail-in ballot. (This was part of SB 1, the Election Integrity bill of 2021.)

Did you know that Texas didn't even require voter registration applications to have ID numbers until 1-1-2004, after HAVA was passed? That's one good thing that HAVA gave us...so this battle is decades old.

In 2023, Federal Judge Xavier Rodriquez (Bush appointee, San Antonio, TX), ruled that an accurate ID# wasn't "material" to whether a voter is entitled to vote.

But recently, Federal Appeals Court (5th Circuit) Judges unanimously ruled that an ID# is "plainly material" to determine if a person is qualified to vote, overruling the lower court's decision. HAVA was referenced.

SAVE THE DATE: October 14th, from 1-5pm, the EIP has reserved the "Members' Lounge" in the State Capitol in Austin, Texas, where we will educate legislators and their staffs on election-related issues.

On the Federal front, we're still pushing the SAVE Act, so if you get a Call to Action, please call our Representatives and Senators in Washington.



Attorney General Ken Paxton Successfully Defends Texas's Voter ID Requirement for Mail-in-Ballots and Vote-by-Mail Applications

AUSTIN – Attorney General Ken Paxton successfully defeated an attempt to challenge Texas's requirement that voters put their ID number on mail-in ballots and vote-by-mail applications.

As part of S.B. 1, the Texas Election Integrity Act of 2021, Texas voters must list an ID number, such as a driver's license number, on any mail-in ballot or vote-by-mail application. Those challenging the law erroneously argued that efforts to verify voters' identity violate the 1964 Civil Rights Act. After a lower court issued an injunction against the requirement, Attorney General Paxton's office secured a stay of that injunction in 2023, allowing the voter ID requirement to go into effect.

Additionally, the U.S. Fifth Circuit Court of Appeals has now issued an opinion officially defending the legality of the voter ID requirement for mail-in ballots and vote-by-mail applications.

"Voter ID is one of the most crucial tools in the battle against election fraud, and I'm pleased to see the court affirm our fundamental right to defend the integrity of our democratic process," said Attorney General Paxton. "When voting by mail and applying to vote using that method, it's vital that there is a requirement in place that allows us to verify the identity of the voter. We are going to enforce that requirement aggressively and continue to ensure that our state's elections are secure."
