



About Daylilies and Birdbaths...

Daylilies and birdbaths are great complements of one another. Do you have one in your daylily garden? I have noticed many gardeners using the traditional concrete birdbath in their gardens. A daylily bloom can last all day floating in the shady birdbath. Also, if the bloom has good substance, that helps it last in the water. Darker, saturated daylilies tend to lose their color floating in the water, so avoid floating those. Large, pale, floppy daylilies work the best as they seem to utilize the movement and literal fluidity of the water in the birdbath.

Other birdbaths provide structural interest and a visual break from swaths of grassy daylily foliage. Something you might not have thought to do with your concrete birdbath is to put a concrete cherub or gargoyle in the center of your birdbath.

In general, water in the garden, in any form, is a must. It reflects and refreshes not only the bugs and the birds, but the gardener as well. Refreshing the bloom each day is like adding a new piece of tiny art in an unexpected place. Surprise!

Every day you could float a different bloom in your birdbath, showing off new characteristics or new arrivals in your garden. A popular sales garden floats about 15 blooms in a birdbath at the entrance to the garden. It gives customers a quick glance of what they could buy without walking in the fields. These garden owners told me they always sell out of what they have on display "in the bowl."



An Important Daylily Collectors Resource

In 1999, the American Daylily Society launched a long-range plan to integrate technology and daylilies. Thus, the society has employed procedures and systems to create, maintain and fully fund a database for all registered daylilies for over 20 years. Today, the

database contains the registration details for ALL 93,000+ cultivars along with tens of thousands of images. It is a fast and free resource for all daylily growers and enthusiasts featuring a powerful search tool and printable results. Advanced Search features include the ability to filter the database by specific form, color and show section (among other options.) The database receives regular upgrades and missing photos from previously registered cultivars are uploaded almost daily. This service is provided by the American Daylily Society as a benefit to members and the broader horticultural community and they encourage the use of the database to look up the daylilies you grow to determine expected size, bloom season, height, form and other interesting and important information.




