






# Editor's Page

Motor Mounts...

This is about the mounts on V-8 engine equipped cars. The lighter six also can have some of these problems too. Motor mounts that sag may, and do, cause several problems. Most of the time, they become oil-soaked, causing the rubber to turn to mush. The engine settles down lower in the frame When the mounts get weak, the brass fitting that connects the fuel line to the carburetor can hit the frame. This can lead to gas leakage and a fire.

The softened motor mounts will cause misalignment of the transmission, the shift linkage & throttle pressure control on cars with automatic transmissions. The throttle pressure control rod will cause incorrect shift points & a buzzing noise from the transmission. The pressure- regulating valve will be damaged if it continues to be ignored. You can adjust the throttle pressure control rod to eliminate the buzzing noise and to compensate for the sagging mounts. At this point, serious consideration must be given to replacing the worn out motor mounts. Once installed, there will be a need to re-adjust the throttle to transmission linkage rod.

### Signs it is Time to Replace Your Heater Hose(s)

Prevent system contamination and coolant leaks that could cause your engine to overheat by checking for these common signs of **Heater Hose** damage / failure:

#### INTERNAL DAMAGE

Soft / mushy hose ends, usually about 2 inches from the clamp.



Internally Damaged Hose

#### **LEAKAGE**

Moisture, drips or coolant bleed marks on or around the hose clamps, connectors or hose.



Lasking Hoca

#### **HEAT DAMAGE**

Slight swelling, or a hardened, glossy cover that is covered with cracks.



Heat Damaged Hose

#### **OZONE DAMAGE**

Tiny, parallel cracks in the cover, usually at hose bends.



Ozone Damaged Hose

#### **ABRASION DAMAGE**

Rubbing marks on, or damage to the hose cover.



Abrasion Damaged Hose

#### **OIL CONTAMINATION**

Soft or spongy to the touch - bulges and swelling are readily apparent.

### **Carburetor Float Bowl Plugs**

With our Ethanol fuels the problem of the fuel evaporating in the float bowl resulting in slow starts is a well known problem.

On the Stromberg 2 BBL. carburetors used on 259 and 289 Studebaker V/8 engines, fuel loss in the float bowl can also be caused by the two plugs leaking on the bottom of the float bowl.

This can often go unnoticed as it leaks onto the intake manifold and evaporates.

You can remove the carburetor and have it resealed. A simple fix is to clean the area where the plugs are located and use a gas tank repair epoxy to cover the plugs.

J B Weld makes gas tank repair epoxy that works. Make sure it is suitable to stand up to gasoline.

#### **Tech -Tip Roger Hill**

There are thousands of retail-packaged chemicals for sale to help you with your car. Some work ok, and others work outstandingly well. This one is the second kind.

It's called "Fluid Film". Sold at most automotive jobbers, TSC, and Canadian Tire, it is a lubricant, a penetrant and a rust inhibitor. Most often it is sold in a spray can, but it can be purchased in bulk liquid. Because it is lanolin based (sheep's wool), not petroleum based, it will not harm automotive rubber or automotive paint or chrome. It will also not harm wood, or leather such as on work boots and belts. It also has great "capillary action" which means it will "creep" and cover a larger area and into cracks and crevices. That also means a little goes a long way! Not a FAST penetrant, but one of the best if it can be left over night). Water displacing too, and a higher ignition point than many competitors. Used in the marine industry for many years first.

It's a little expensive (about \$15.00 a can) but it does come on sale. There is nothing else exactly like it out there. IT WORKS!

# Whitewall Tire Timeline

Narrow whitewall tires existed **from the late 1950s**, becoming increasingly popular through the 1960s and 1970s as they replaced the wider whitewalls that were phased out in 1962. The white stripes continued to shrink in width, ultimately fading from most tire lines by the 1990s.




### **Timeline of Whitewall Tires**

- 1920s-1930s: Wide whitewalls, 4-5 inches wide, were introduced and became a symbol of luxury.
- 1950s: Whitewalls were still wide but began to get narrower, with the U.S. government banning their production during the Korean War.
- 1960s: Wide whitewalls were replaced by narrower, 1-inch stripes in the early 1960s.
- 1970s: Narrow whitewalls continued to be popular, though the white stripes kept getting smaller, eventually leading to the pinstripe-style tires.
- 1980s-1990s: The popularity of whitewalls declined, and they became rare by the 1990s.
- 2000s: Whitewall stripes completely disappeared from most tire lines.










### Life in the fast lane
