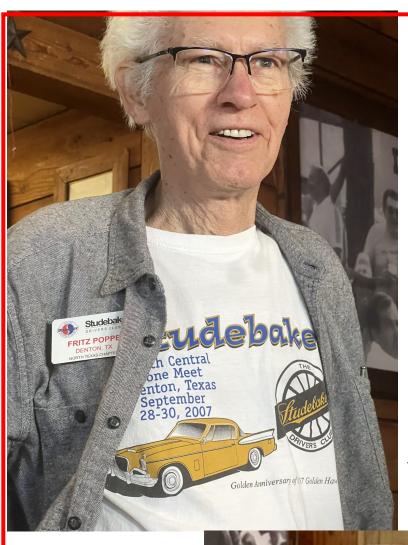

### **B.S. Column** ('bout Studebakers)

#### Studebaker Mechanical Fuel Pumps 1955 -1964 V-8

In my many years of selling Studebaker parts, I have probably sold hundreds of aftermarket replacement fuel pumps. Not that Studebakers are hard on fuel pumps, it's just that they fit a great range of years. Airtex was the most common source. I rarely had an issue. Once in a while one might be extra noisy - but they always did what they were supposed to do...pump fuel. Carter also supplied replacement pumps. These were based on a Carter design and they likewise always worked well.

In recent years, if you have been following various Studebaker forums, you have noticed a lot of discussion about brand new Airtex #4227 replacement fuel pumps not working at all. Unfortunately, this is not general speculation. I talk regularly to the major Studebaker parts wholesaler and he confirms he has returned entire new orders to the manufacturer. Said manufacturer seems to feel the Studebaker market is not worth much trouble. In fact, mechanical fuel pumps for many other older vehicles are being discontinued due to a shrinking market.

So, what do we do? The obvious easy solution is to add an electric fuel pump. These pumps can be installed on the right rear frame area close to the gas tank. These pumps like to push fuel - not pull - so closer to the tank is good.

I have a number of customers that prefer a conventional mechanical fuel pump. Studebaker International is supplying rebuilt, exchange fuel pumps for \$175.00 as of this writing. My personal solution is to sell the Avanti R-1 pump which is a Carter high performance pump intended for Dodge/Plymouth cars, but with the actuating arm modified by heating and reshaping to properly work on a Studebaker. If you try to use this pump without the arm modification, the arm will break at some point. I know of 2 cases where this has happened.

So, to install this properly modified pump on a '55 - '64 Studebaker V-8, you will only need to obtain 2 brass pipe fittings. The Avanti pump has 1/4" pipe thread and the other Studebakers use 1/8" pipe thread. These are readily available. An example would be Ace Hardware 4337887 Hex Head Bushing, 1/4" X 1/8"

I have sold several of these and every customer has been pleased. There was some speculation that a fuel pressure regulator may be needed, but so far it hasn't been an issue.

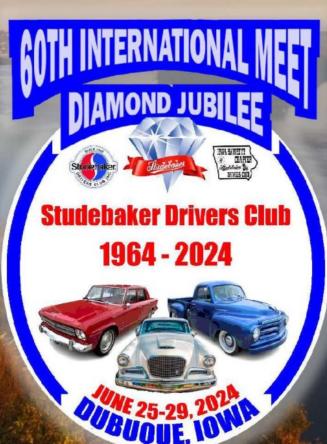

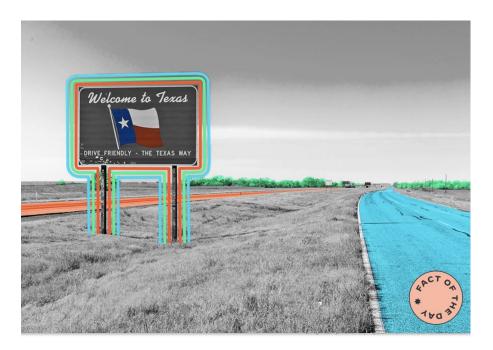

# The phrase "Don't mess with Texas" was created to discourage road littering.

Three decades ago, Texas was facing an enormous problem: trash, as far as the eye could see, piled up along its scenic and city roadways. The cleanup was arduous and costly — by the mid-1980s, the Texas Department of Transportation (aka TxDOT) was spending **nearly \$20 million each year** in rubbish removal along highways alone. To save money (and the environment), leaders of the Lone Star State knew they had to get trash under control, which they decided to do with a series of public service announcements. But little did TxDOT know that its cleanliness campaign would become larger than life.

The iconic line, dreamed up by an Austin-based ad agency, initially launched on bumper stickers deposited at truck stops and fast food restaurants. The first "Don't Mess With Texas" commercial, which aired at the 1986 Cotton Bowl, honed in on Texans' love for their land, telling viewers that littering was not only a crime but "an insult" to the state's landscape. The phrase - spoken in that first commercial by Dallas-born guitarist Stevie Ray Vaughan amid a bluesy version of "The Eyes of Texas" — soon became a rallying cry for Texans. The spot was so popular that TV stations around the state received calls asking for it to be aired again. Within a year, TxDOT estimated that roadside litter had dropped by 29%. The ad campaign continued — featuring celebrities such as Willie Nelson, George Foreman, and LeAnn Rimes — and is credited with **reducing** highway trash by 72% in its first four years. The slogan has become only more popular over time, used at protests, declared by presidential candidates, and chanted at football games — all proof that state pride is held deep in the hearts of Texans.

## Little Known or Forgotten Facts About Studebaker

Before WW1, there was a 100,000 Mile Club for Studebakers that had been driven 100,000 miles or more. In 1918, A Studebaker Big Six Touring car, called "Old Grandaddy," was driven over 500,000 miles in 5 1/2 years.

The first wagons were built in 1852. The first carriage in 1856 and the first car in 1899. It was an electric car.

The first gasoline Studebaker was built in 1904. The first 4- cylinder Studebaker was built in 1905 and had a driveshaft. Many cars still used chain drives at the start of WW1.

In 1925, Studebaker built a \$1,000,000 proving ground. GM had built a smaller one in 1924. Proving ground trees spelled out the Studebaker name and can be clearly seen at 10,000 feet altitude.

In 1926, a Studebaker Commander Six had beaten the transcontinental record by 16 hours and beat the transcontinental trains by 6 hours and 25 minutes.

In 1926, all counties in the desert states of New Mexico and Arizona used Studebaker Commanders exclusively for their Sheriff's cars.

In the teens and twenties and early thirties, Studebaker used more Timken Bearings than any other car maker, even using them on kingpins and spindles. They also used ball bearings in the shackles on some models.

Also, in the teens and twenties, Studebaker exported more high- powered cars than any other makes. There were probably 150 makes at the time. Only 7 brands had more horsepower than the Big Six. In the late 1920's three President Straight Eights were driven on the Atlantic City Speedway continuously, 24 hours a day for 30,000 miles at over 60 MPH. Three Commanders were driven for 25,000 miles at over 60 MPH.

In 1931, Studebaker built a 10 cylinder-in-line experimental engine.

In the 30's the Big Six Commanders were often referred to as the "Bootleggers" being popular with those law breakers of prohibition days. The big luxury cars could outrun anything else on the road at the time. Very handy if the following car was the police in pursuit.

An Avanti in 1964 ran 92 mile plus in a one mile from a standing start and ran 168 plus mile per hour in a flying start. Both runs were made in two directions and then average. In all Studebaker record events, the AAA had strict supervision. In the 20's and 30's, when a company entered a speed of endurance event. the AAA came to the factory and picked the cars off the assembly line, saying, "These are the cars that you will race." There could be no cheating.

In 1964, the Avanti averaged 170.8 MPH for all distances from 1KM to 10 miles.

Studebaker held Indianapolis stock car record in the 500- mile race for 15 years, 1933 to 1948.

Thousands of trucks were built by Studebaker as well as thousands of engines for the B-17 Flying Fortresses for WWII.

Studebaker had introduced a station wagon in 1963 with a sliding roof panel in the rear, an innovative idea but it was costly.

In the Studebaker laboratories, they discovered Molybdenum, and the first to use it in their engines.

With the exception of the Lark Models, Studebaker used heavier gauge metal than used brother American car makers with the exception of Lincoln and some Thunderbirds. The gauge of metal used was 18 gauge while other brands used 20- gauge metal.

The electronic gauge for measuring the thickness of paint on a car was invented by Studebaker. At the time of the invention, the cars had 13 coats of paint which included the primer. The competition used only 3 or 4 coats including the primer

For the 1947 models, it was planned to have the torsion bar suspension but this never came to being used due to the shortage of the type of steel that is necessary for the torsion bars.

## **Electrical Gremlins**



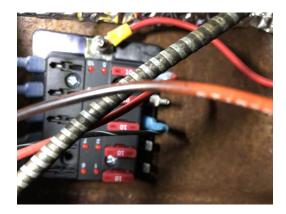


Automotive glass fuses are what most of us are used to dealing with. They provide a visual indication of whether the fuse is good or bad. But what if the fuse on the left that looks good is bad?

I had a random occurrence on my early 80's motorcycle where it would suddenly quit running then resume with a loud backfire. The problem living in Texas is that everyone took it for gunfire and took cover.

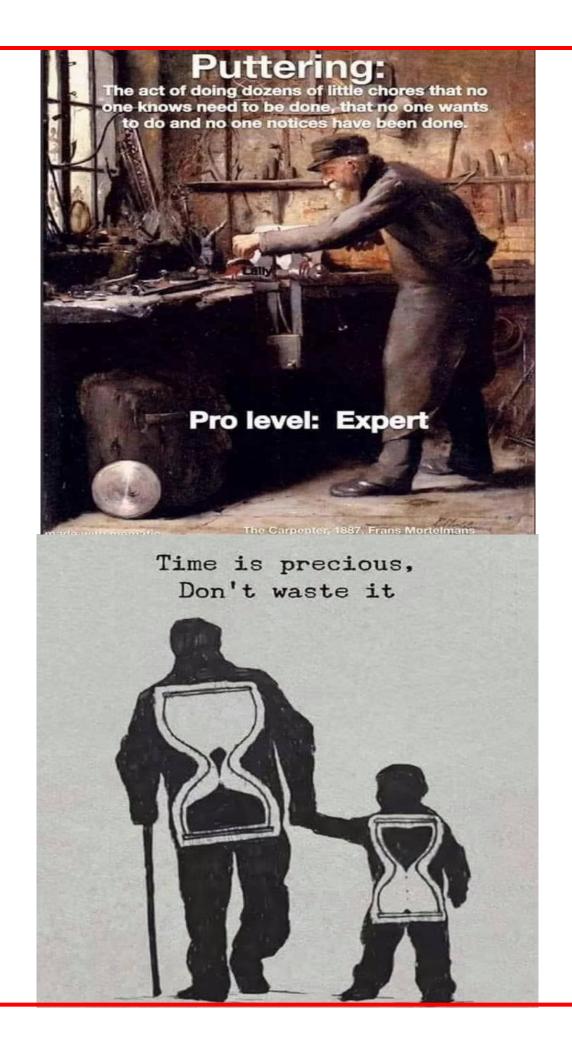
The issue was the glass fuse supplying power to the ignition was fractured inside the metal base so it wasn't visible. I suppose that tension of the fuse in the fuse holder made the continuity but a bump or jolt
would momentarily lessen that bond and no ignition and no run. I also ran into another incident with the
same bike where after replacing all the fuses, I found that the fuse holders had lost some of their tension
& could also cause an intermittent failure. I tried to squeeze them tighter but ended up breaking several.
My solution was to replace them with modern blade type fuses. They are readily available & easy to spot
if a failure occurs.

Having had that issue with the bike, I decided to avert the same problem in my GT Hawk . I bought a 10 circuit fuse panel where an LED beside each fuse is off until the fuse fails in which case it lights to indicate a failure. I wired the supply to this panel from the power on side of the ignition switch. I then took most of the accessories such as electric fuel pump, radio etc. and wired them into this panel. Literally every fused wire could be fed to a separate fuse on this panel. It's compact, inexpensive (CASO) & easy to install



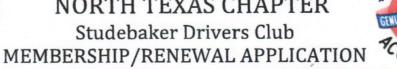
