Editor's Remarks

We're on a roll folks with great meetings & good turn outs. Let's keep that momentum up!

This month I will speak to you about our plans for holding the 2026 International Meet in North Texas. I first floated the idea at our Christmas party & was tasked to "explore" the feasibility of holding the venue on our home turf. The last International meet in Texas was waaaaaaaaay back in 1998 down in Austin. I proposed 2025 but it is taken by another chapter.

In Texas, we seem to fall into a chasm caught between east & west coast ventures. It's time to let the rest of the Studebaker world know that we still exist!

We currently have a committee of 4, namely myself, our president Eddie Ranne, Fritz Poppe an old veteran at these types of events & Jim McMeans a newbie like myself.

We have spoken to other clubs, namely Manitowoc from last year, Dubuque from this year & Pittsburg for 2025. They have all been very supportive & offered up any information we needed.

Our committee has come to the conclusion that big cities aren't the way to go. From prohibitive rental costs, union help & simply having strangers in 60 year old cars dealing with Dallas drivers is simply too much. As such, we are looking at fairgrounds with Denton being the current contender. We visited the site & it isn't ideal but can work. We also visited a local hotel to act as host site & also the Denton visitor bureau that can assist in co ordinating overflow hotels, tours & activities in & around Denton.

We would like to have a parade around the town square one evening.

The event with registration fees, surprisingly doesn't contribute to our operation expenses, Revenues go to National & the registrar. Money can be made however such as the \$15,000 profit from last year's event. National guarantees a \$5,000 profit.

We need creative thinking to cover expenses & as of recent times also generate decent profits.

Swap Meet rental spots seemed to be the gold standard in the past but we can't rely on that as much as before. The vendors I spoke with are scaling back with SI for example no longer bringing tractor trailer full of parts but rather going smaller & attending more events. Stephen Allen last year only has a singe table with a computer to enter orders. Maybe virtual events are the future!

Oher areas that generate good revenues & quite frankly are necessary to fill in the gaps are events & tours. A sock hop brings in good \$\$ as do tours. An ice cream social attracts big crowds. Ladies luncheons with a topic & speaker are popular. Wine & beer tasting (Grapevine) all are potential revenue generators. An award ceremony & banquet are also popular. We could offer a tour to the Fort Worth Stockyards . An silent auction night with donated items, sales of souvenir Tee shirts & memorabilia all generate revenue.

This year Dubuque is profitable before even opening their doors as they received a large grant from the local chamber of commerce.

Sponsorships & advertising is where I feel we can generate a profit. Think of the corporate headquarters of Fortune 100 companies located in our metroplex.

We will ask for a vote at our April meeting on whether to proceed with this plan. If accepted, I have to make a formal presentation to the board in Dubuque in June to be accepted. Put on your thinking caps & think of possible past connections that might be interested sponsoring or placing an ad in our guidebook.

Hard Luck Story from Member Ken Bruce

Tough but not Indestructible!

I'm sure you remember the 1961 rust bucket Hawk we couldn't give away. As a reminder, I bought it knowing it was a rust bucket to get the 289 motor and drive train out of it. Since it was a rust bucket my conscience would be clear stripping it. When we broke the engine down we found it had a cracked saddle main.



This is where Bob MacLeod supplied me with a 1964 259 block. We decided to bore it out, use the 289 crank and make a 299 out of it. When we started to assemble it, looking at the rods we decided the 289 must have been overheated so we replaced them with new rods. Then we were torquing one of the main bolts (from the 289 engine) and it was "stretching". We backed it out and torqued another one in a vise and it started stretching.





So we put in new main bearing bolts. The engine was Magnafluxed and the builder assured me that the company that did it was one of the best. Then the engine was balanced and assembled. When it was installed in the car I could feel a vibration from 70 to 80 mph. That I never could get rid of. I managed to reduce it but couldn't get rid of it. I thought it was in the clutch or pressure plate. With ~ 2500 miles on it I was cruising ~ 70 mph on George Bush and, bang/wham and the car was vibrating. I pulled over thinking the clutch went, then drove it about a block to get out of traffic and called a wrecker.

In the shop the mechanics were starting and stopping the engine with no problems. Eventually they were looking at the flywheel while one of them was working the clutch. The flywheel moved back and forth about 1/4". I told them to button it up and pull the engine. I took it to the builder. When he broke it down this is what he found.



The builder says the block is ok. I wish I'd known about the crankshafts that Gary has. I found one at Studebaker Parts Online and had it shipped in. Funny thing, Stephen Allen's had a NOS 289 crank but they didn't want to sell it to me because they wanted it to go in a "properly restored" Studebaker. (Who in the hell is going to check to see if the crank is "original"?) I didn't say anything, I didn't want to burn any bridges, they've been a lot of help to me so I moved on. All said and done I can only assume that the crank was affected some way when the engine was overheated. That's the story, thanks for your interest.

*** We often fall into the notion that Studebaker V8's are indestructible with their forged internals and land speed records. What we have to remember at the end if the day, no matter what label is on the part. Is that metal is metal and if over heated or over stressed the end might not be immediate but will ultimately find it's way.

TECH TIPS

Here's How to Find and Stop Oil Leaks

There's nothing more frustrating than having an oil leak that puts greasy, sticky goo all over your chromed and polished aluminum engine parts (or all over your garage floor!)

If you have ever wondered if there was an easy way to seal oil pan, intake manifold, or valve cover leaks, here is a little tip that will help.

For materials, you will need a tube of silicone sealer (the blue stuff or similar oil resistant type), a piece of vacuum hose large enough to go over your dipstick tube (with dipstick removed) and long enough to reach another car (about 8 feet or so should do), some duct tape, carb cleaner, and a stethoscope or reasonable facsimile.

(If you already have a vacuum pump, or decide to purchase one, you can eliminate the 8 feet of vacuum hose, but you will need an appropriate length to go from the pump to the dipstick tube.)

First, drain the oil from the leaking engine. If you forget this, the vacuum source, (i.e. the other car) will soon have five or so extra quarts of oil.

Second, seal the openings on the engine (PVC valve hole, oil breather, etc.) with the duct tape. You might want to start by degreasing the engine first.

Third, remove the dipstick, hook the vacuum hose to the dipstick tube on the leaking engine, and run the other end to the manifold vacuum on the other car (not ported).

Start the engine on the vacuum source car and run it just above idle. Take the stethoscope and listen to all the likely places it could be leaking on the oil pan, intake manifold, and valve covers.

Where there is a leak, you will hear a rush of air (HISS-S-S) being drawn into the engine. If you don't have a stethoscope, you can take carb or brake cleaner and spray it around the gasket areas, then watch and listen for it to be sucked in.

Once you find the leak, take your carb cleaner and spray the area liberally to get rid of the excess oil. Then take the tube of silicone sealer and apply it wherever the engine is hissing. The vacuum will pull the sealer into the opening, sealing the leak. Allow the sealer to completely dry, then trim off any excess, so everything looks nice and neat.

Don't forget to put oil back into your formerly leaking engine before you fire it up, or you may have to clean broken parts off the garage floor that weren't there before!

This little trick also works on new and/or rebuilt engines while on an engine stand, to make sure they don't leak before they go into your car.

STUDE STATISTICS

(Editor's note): Gary Lasb is editor of the Houston SDC newsletter, "The Headliner". He cospiled these statistics from the rester in our last newsletter. North Texas members who attended the Regional Meet in San Antonio had the opportunity of meeting Gary and his wife Janice.

The North Texas Chapter of the Studebaker Driver's Club list in their April 1973 Roster 60 families with 134 club related cars. 37 (27%) of these are Hawks; there are 13 (10%) Avantis listei; they list 12 (3%) Packards in the chapter; 11 (3%) Studebaker trucks; 7 (5%) station wa wagons; 6 (4%) bullet-nosed models;12 (3%) examples in the years '53 and '54; 10 (7%) pre-war cars; 74 (55%) of the vehicles listed are coupes; 34 (24%) are setans; and 6 (4%) are convertibles.

The membership owns 2.23 cars per family. 9 (15%) of these families own 3 club related cars each. There are 9 families who list 2 club cars each and 31 (51%) families list only one car. The chapter's top hearders are Bob and Bobby Helm who list 12 (9%) club-related vehicles. The Pate Museum of Transportation came in third after Siner's Wreck-yard. They list 7 and 8 DDC cars respectively. On the other end of the pencil, 2 (3%) of the families in the chapter did not list any cars be because they merely consider the SDC as a worthy charity.

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



A car stalling after being driven a short distance can be caused by a variety of faults with the engine. Start by checking that there is no debris in the fuel line. If it is clear, check the vacuum pipes and hoses on the intake manifold and also check all grounding wires. If none of these approaches solves the problem, it could be that the fuel pump itself is faulty, causing low delivery pressure to the injectors.
