

Also, this year two special grants were given to Children's Protective Services and Springfield Community Mental Health Consortium.

"These are worthwhile organizations

that should be supported," said Mrs Lynch.

The club gives an annual Conservation and Urban Beauty Award to private citizens or groups in recognition of efforts to renovate historical buildings and improve landscapes.

Also, the club's monthly programs bring interesting and informative speakers to the Springfield area.

According to Mrs. Lynch, not all the 422 members actively participate in the club. Potential club members are usually sponsored by two existing members. However, women interested in finding out more about the club may contact any member of the board of directors, or the Springfield Museum of Fine Arts (the club's meeting place since 1956).

"Persons interested in joining could also write a letter to the board showing their interest in the club, and outlining their participation in the community (or outline how they would like to make a contribution to the community) and a guest pass will be issued for a future meeting. "This club doesn't know an age barrier," she said. "Many of the members have

actively participated for over 50 years."
