



















## **Field Trip Benefits**

## In young children at TPDCC

Early literacy and physical development. It's more than just reading, writing and arithmetic. Children learn literacy and numeracy skills through listening to stories, talking about pictures, drawing, singing, playing musical instruments or pouring sand into different-sized containers. Our RECEs and ECA's enhance a child's literacy daily by offering fun, 'play-like' activities.









"Like a sponge, toddlers absorb language and literacy skills at an astonishing rate through various activities and experiences" says toddler infant educator Nusra. Group activities such as collaborative cooperative games provide opportunities for children to practice listening, speaking, and turn-taking.

This toddler activity gave D.S the opportunity to not only observe details of the car, but also observe the design the marker left on the paper. This play-based learning in the early childhood culture is referred to as cause and effect.
