This is a Shanti mantra from the Brihadaranyaka Upanishad. It is also known as the Pavamana Mantra (pavamāna meaning "being purified, strained", historically a name of Soma).

We all want to go from darkness to light, from untruth to truth and from death to immortality. This is a prayer for total cessation of all attachment and false identifications. A prayer to take us from death to immortality. Immortality cannot be achieved unless one is free from the lower impulses of lust, anger and other such demonic qualities. Unless these devils are destroyed and divinity restored, until evil is annihilated and death is transcended by establishing purity in thought, word and deed, one cannot hope to attain immortality. Thus, the human heart here pours out in prayer.








December month activities at glance






Aparna Teacher's students presented a graceful Bharatanatyam performance at CSPT on 3rd December, reflecting dedication to Indian classical dance in the UK.

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DASHAVATARAM SERIES - 2

The Tortoise – Kurma Avataram



Sri Gurubyoh Namah

Lord Vishnu is believed to have taken nine significant avatars so far. The tenth avatar, i.e. Kalki, we believe is yet to appear. The first was Matsya Avatar, wherein the Lord appeared in the form of a fish to free the Vedas (Rig Veda, Yajur Veda, Sama Veda and Atharva Veda) from the clutches of the Danavas and kill a demon Hayagriva. Centuries later, he appeared once again on the earth as Kurma (tortoise).

Kurma avatara belongs to the Satya Yuga and is explained mainly in the Bhagavad purana, Agni Purana and the Ramayana. Kurma Purana, considered as one of the 18 major puranas, is said been directly stated have by MahaVishnu to sage Narada.

Why Lord Vishnu took the Kurma Avatar?

Lord Vishnu had pledged that he would appear every time someone threatens the existence of humanity. He had vowed that he would take an avatar on earth to restore Dharma by uprooting Adharma. For the uninitiated, the Devas symbolised Dharma while the Danavas represented Adharma.

In one of the battles that took place after Daitya Guru Shukracharya was blessed with the Sanjeevani Mantra (mantra to infuse life into the dead) by Lord Shiva, the Daityas (Danavas) defeated the Devas. Now why did the Devas lose? Indra, the King of Swarga, while riding on the elephant Airavata, came across Sage Durvasa who offered him a special garland given to him. Indra accepted the gift and placed it on the trunk of the elephant as a test to prove that he was not an egoistic Deva. The flowers on it had a scent that attracted some bees. Annoyed by the bees Airavata threw the garland on the ground. This enraged the sage as the garland was a dwelling of Sri (fortune) and was to be treated as a Prasadam. Durvasa cursed Indra and all Devas to be bereft of all strength, energy, and fortune. In battles following the incident, the Devas were defeated and the Asuras, led by Bali, gained control over the universe.





The victory of the Danavas meant the decline of goodness and peace.
Moreover, Lord Vishnu knew that if the Danavas became immortal, then they would overpower the Devas and also cause massive damage to the human race.

Therefore, to save humankind from the Danavas, Lord Vishnu took the avatar of a Kurma. And by doing so, he played a pivotal role in the Samudra Manthan.

Since the Danavas had defeated the Devas in the battle, there arose a need to empower the latter. Therefore, Lord Vishnu suggested Samudra Manthan for extracting the divine nectar that could make the Devas immortal. However, the Devas alone wouldn't have been able to perform the massive task. Hence, Vishnu advised Indra, the King of the Devas to take help from the King of the Danavas.

Subsequently, to churn the ocean, Mandara Mountain was cut from its base and installed in the sea as the churning rod. But, since the base of the mountain couldn't reach the seabed owing to the surging movement of the waves, Lord Vishnu decided to make his presence felt in the form of a Kurma.

Lord Vishnu took the form of a Kurma and went deep inside the sea to carry the Mandara mountain on his back. Thus, by enduring the weight on his back, Lord Vishnu ensured that the churning of the ocean takes place without any hurdles.

Next , to churn something , you will need a rope around the churning rod and people to pull the rope from both ends so that the churning rod rotates in a to and from motion and the churning takes place . Do you all know who was the churning rope that went all around Mount Mandara ? It was none other than the king of serpents – Vasuki!



What happened then? The churning continued. The Samudra Manthan process released a number of things from the Ocean of Milk. One of them the lethal poison was known Halahala. This terrified the gods and demons because the poison was so powerful that it could destroy all of creation. Lord Vishnu also knew that Vasuki would vomit poisonous flames when twisted and pulled, and therefore advised the Devas to hold the tail end of the snake, without telling them the reason. First, the Devas held the head end of the snake, while the Asuras held the tail end.





The Asuras were enraged by this, as the lower part of an animal is impure, than the part that contains the head.

They insisted on holding the head side of the snake. Lord Vishnu had an inkling that his reverse psychology would work. The Asuras demanded to hold the head of the snake, while the Devas, taking advice from Lord Vishnu, agreed to hold its tail. When the mountain was placed in the ocean, it began to sink. Vishnu, in the form of Kurma came to their rescue and supported the mountain on his shell. The Asuras were poisoned by fumes emitted by Vasuki.

Despite this, the Devas and the Asuras pulled back and forth on the snake's body alternately, causing the mountain to rotate, which in turn churned the ocean.

The Devas then approached Lord Shiva for protection. Shiva consumed the poison to protect the three worlds and which in the process gave a blue hue to his throat. Lord Shiva drank the poison, he was suffering intense pain, but could not die, as seen by Parvati, his consort. She immediately places a hand on his throat, stopping the poison to flow any further, and by her Maya, stopped it forever.

As a result, his throat turned blue and he was henceforth called NEELAKANTA

What else appeared from the ocean of milk-wealth, Apsaraas, Varuni, Kamadhenu, Airavatha, Ucchaishravas, Kaustuba, Paarijatha, Shaaranga, Chandra, Dhanvantri, Shankha, Jyeshta, Umbrella taken by Varuna, Earrings taken Aditi(Indra's mother), Kalpavriksha, Nidra. All these were divided between the Devas and the Danavas.



Finally, Dhanvantri, the heavenly physician, emerged with a pot containing the Amrita, the heavenly nectar of immortality. Fierce fighting ensued between the Devas and the Asuras for it. To protect it from the Asuras, Garuda took the pot and flew away from the battlefield.

The Devas appealed to Vishnu, who took the form of Mohini and, as a beautiful and enchanting damsel, distracted the Asuras; then, she took the Amrita and distributed it among the Devas, who drank it.

An Asura names Svarbhanu disguised himself as a deva and drank some nectar. Due to their luminous nature, the Sun god Surya and the moon god Chandra noticed this disguise.





They informed Mohini who before the nectar could pass the Asura's throat, cut off his head with the Sudharshana Chakra. From that day, his head became Rahu and his body Ketu, which both later became planets. The story ends with the rejuvenated Devas defeating the Asuras and that's why the eclipse mode of the moon means Rahu swallows his moon as revenge. Although, Rahu only has a head and no body. So the god moon Chandra comes out from the throat of Rahu and we see the moon again in sky.



Some other interesting facts about Kurma Avatara

 The Kurma avatar played a pivotal role in this whole cosmic episode which took place between the devas and the asuras.

- Kurma is also considered to be the lord of waters. For this, he is depicted as the Varuna. According to the legends, Varuna and Earth are married to each other. Together they sustain a variety of life forms on the planet.
- Legend also has it that it was Lord Vishnu who had advised Devas to seek help from Asuras to reclaim the Amrit. The events that followed along with the rise of the Kurma avatar was all his own divine strategy to regain the cosmic balance.
- It was Lord Vishnu who transported Mandara on his Garuda to the venue, dropping him in the ocean. Mandara was then placed on the back of the Kurma Avatar of the Lord.

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
