

THOMAS EDISON

Thomas Alva Edison (February 11, 1847 – October 18, 1931) was an American inventor and businessman who has been described as America's greatest inventor. He developed many devices in fields such as electric power generation, mass communication, sound recording, and motion pictures. These inventions, which include the phonograph, the motion picture camera, and early versions of the electric light bulb, have had a widespread impact on the modern industrialized world. He was one of the first inventors to apply the principles of organized science and teamwork to the process of invention, working with many researchers and employees. He established the first industrial research laboratory.²

INTERESTING FACTS!

- ❖ Thomas Edison was a sick boy as a child and a slow learner. His mother was a former schoolteacher and thought otherwise; She thought Edison needed proper guidance so that he would be confident and learn easily. His mother pulled him out of the school before he was expelled.⁵
- ❖ Edison is credited for contributing to various inventions, including the phonograph, the kinetoscope, the dictaphone, the electric lamp (in particular the incandescent light bulb), and the autographic printer. He also greatly improved the telephone by inventing the carbon microphone.⁶
- ❖ At thirteen he took a job as a newsboy, selling newspapers and candy on the local railroad that ran through Port Huron to Detroit. He seems to have spent much of his free time reading scientific, and technical books, and also had the opportunity at this time to learn how to operate a telegraph.⁷
- By the time he died on October 18, 1931, Thomas Edison had amassed a record 1,093 patents: 389 for electric light and power, 195 for the phonograph, 150 for the telegraph, 141 for storage batteries and 34 for the telephone.8
- Still life of the first electric light bulb, invented by Thomas Alva Edison in 1879 and patented on January 27, 1880. ... Though he didn't come up with the whole concept, his light bulb was the first that proved practical, and affordable, for home illumination.9



Henry Ford (July 30, 1863 – April 7, 1947) was an American industrialist and business magnate, founder of the Ford Motor Company, and chief developer of the assembly line technique of mass production. By creating the first automobile that middle-class Americans could afford, he converted the automobile from an expensive curiosity into an accessible conveyance that profoundly impacted the landscape of the 20th century.²

INTERESTING FACTS!

- ❖ Henry Ford made extra money as a pocket watch repairman when he was in his early teens. A mechanical genius from a young age, Ford taught himself the craft of watch repair by repeatedly taking apart and putting back together a pocket watch given to him by his father. He even made his own tools to work on watches, including tiny screwdrivers he laboriously filed from old nails, and tweezers made from the spring steel "bones" from a discarded corset.⁵
- Henry Ford was an American automobile manufacturer who created the Model T in 1908 and went on to develop the assembly line mode of production, which revolutionized the automotive industry. As a result, Ford sold millions of cars and became a world-famous business leader.⁶
- ❖ It's no surprise then that, upon his death in 1947, Ford was worth the equivalent of \$200 billion (£142bn) in today's money, and then some.⁷
- A hard work ethic, commitment, compassion for others, and a desire to improve society were among Ford's leadership qualities. Known for being modest in his attire as well as personal interactions, Ford demonstrated true humility as a leader.8
- Henry Ford's assembly-line methods revolutionized factory production. Using his techniques, chassis assembly was reduced from 12.5 man-hours to 93 man-minutes by 1914. Assembly time reduction contributed to the drastic cut in price of the private automobile. This made cars affordable to the growing American middle class.9



MAHATMA GANDHI

Mohandas Karamchand Gandhi (October 1869 – 30 January 1948) was an Indian lawyer, anti-colonial nationalist, and political ethicist, who employed nonviolent resistance to lead the successful campaign for India's independence from British rule, and in turn inspired movements for civil rights and freedom across the world. The honorific Mahātmā (Sanskrit: "great-souled", "venerable"), first applied to him in 1914 in South Africa, is now used throughout the world.²

INTERESTING FACTS!

- ❖ Gandhi fought for much more than independence. His causes included civil rights for women, the abolition of the caste system, and the fair treatment of all people regardless of religion. His mother and father had different religious traditions.⁵
- Gandhi ate fruit, nuts, and seeds for five years but switched back to strict vegetarianism after suffering health problems. He maintained that each person should find their own diet that works best. Gandhi spent decades experimenting with food, logging the results, and tweaking his eating choices. He wrote a book named *The Moral Basis* of Vegetarianism.⁶
- Gandhi established 3 football clubs in South Africa. All of them were called Passive Resisters.⁷
- Mohandas Karamchand Gandhi, popularly known as Mahatma Gandhi or The Father of the Nation in India, undertook 18 fasts during India's freedom movement. His longest fasts lasted 21 days. Fasting was a weapon used by Gandhi as part of his philosophy of Ahinsa (non-violence) as well as satyagraha.⁸

William Henry Gates III (born October 28, 1955) is an American business magnate, software developer, and philanthropist. He is a co-founder of Microsoft Corporation. During his career at Microsoft, Gates held the positions of chairman, chief executive officer (CEO), president, and chief software architect, while also being the largest individual shareholder until May 2014. He is one of the best-known entrepreneurs and pioneers of the microcomputer revolution of the 1970s and 1980s.²

- As a teen at Lakeside Prep School, Gates wrote his first computer program on a General Electric computer. It was a version of tic-tactoe where you could play against the machine.⁵
- ❖ Gates read the entire "World Book Encyclopedia" series during his teenage years.⁶
- Bill Gates bought an operating system in which he renamed, MS-DOS for IBM. He received profit from IBM for every MS-DOS product made, as IBM didn't own the licensing fee, and Gates refused to give it to them. ... At the age of 31, Gates became a billionaire owning 45% of his stock.⁷
- ❖ Bill Gates is a technologist, business leader, and philanthropist. He grew up in Seattle, Washington, with an amazing and supportive family who encouraged his interest in computers at an early age. He dropped out of college to start Microsoft with his childhood friend Paul Allen.⁸

Dson Arantes do Nascimento (Brazilian Portuguese) - born 23 October 1940), known as Pelé, is a Brazilian former professional footballer who played as a forward. Regarded as one of the greatest players of all time and labeled "the greatest" by FIFA, he was among the most successful and popular sports figures of the 20th century. During his playing days, Pelé was for a period the best-paid athlete in the world.²

INTERESTING FACTS!

- Pele was born as Edson Arantes do Nascimento to Dondinho and Dona Celeste Arantes. He was the first child of the couple. ... Struck by poverty, he took up various odd jobs as a child to earn extra money. He received his early lessons in soccer from his father and played for various amateur teams in his youth.⁵
- ❖ As a boy, Pele used to play with a sock stuffed with paper as he could not afford to buy a football to keep in his home. At some point, he played football with mangoes during breaks. As a result little monies he had, Pele had to took up various odd jobs as a child to earn extra money.⁶
- ❖ Pelé's electrifying play and penchant for scoring spectacular goals made him a star around the world. He led Brazil to three World Cup football (soccer) championships (1958, 1962, and 1970). He scored 12 goals in World Cup play and tallied more than 1,000 goals in first-class matches.⁷
- Pele has helped raise millions of pounds for charitable causes including Great Ormond Street and Harlem Street Soccer.8



Sir Isaac Newton PRS (25 December 1642 – 20 March 1726/27) was an English mathematician, physicist, astronomer, theologian, and author (described in his own day as a "natural philosopher") who is widely recognized as one of the most influential scientists of all time and as a key figure in the scientific revolution. His book *Philosophiæ Naturalis Principia Mathematica* (Mathematical Principles of Natural Philosophy), first published in 1687, established classical mechanics. Newton also made seminal contributions to optics, and shares credit with Gottfried Wilhelm Leibniz for developing the infinitesimal calculus.²

INTERESTING FACTS!

- Sometimes called the father of modern science, Isaac Newton revolutionized our understanding of our world. He was a real Renaissance man with accomplishments in several fields, including astronomy, physics and mathematics. Newton gave us new theories on gravity, planetary motion and optics.⁵
- Newton was responsible for building the first practical telescope and developed a theory of color based on the observation that a prism decomposes white light into the many colors that form the visible spectrum. Newton also formulated an empirical law of cooling as well as studied the speed of sound.⁶
- ❖ Isaac Newton changed the way we understand the Universe. Revered in his own lifetime, he discovered the laws of gravity and motion and invented calculus. He helped to shape our rational world view.⁷
- Sir Isaac Newton revolutionized astronomy, mathematics, physics, and natural philosophy. He is recognized as one of the most influential intellectuals of all time and as a key catalyst for the scientific revolution.⁸
- ❖ The famous tree from which the legendary Newton apple fell is still growing at Woolsthorpe Manor today. It is over 350 years old. 9

COCO CHANEL

Gabrielle Bonheur "Coco" Chanel (19 August 1883 – 10 January 1971) was a French fashion designer and businesswoman. The founder and namesake of the Chanel brand, she was credited in the post-World War I era with popularizing a sporty, casual chic as the feminine standard of style, replacing the "corseted silhouette" that was dominant beforehand. A prolific fashion creator, Chanel extended her influence beyond couture clothing, realizing her design aesthetic in jewelry, handbags, and fragrance. Her signature scent, Chanel No. 5, has become an iconic product. She is the only fashion designer listed on Time magazine's list of the 100 most influential people of the 20th century. Chanel herself designed her famed interlocked-CC monogram, which has been in use since the 1920s.²

INTERESTING FACTS!

- Born Gabrielle Chanel on August 19, 1883, the future fashion designer came from humble beginnings. After her mother died when Chanel was around 12, her peddler father put her and her two sisters in a convent-run orphanage. The nuns there taught her to sew, and the stark black and white of their habits began to inform her design aesthetic.5
- What is Coco Chanel known for? Coco Chanel was a fashion designer known for such now-classic innovations as the woman's suit, the quilted purse, costume jewelry, and the "little black dress." She also introduced the phenomenally successful perfume Chanel No. 5.6
- Coco Chanel introduced pants for women. She outraged the fashion world when she wore pants in Venice, to make travelling by gondola easier. Coco Chanel decided that there was no comfortable way to ride a horse while wearing a long skirt. She was always a risk taker which made her go places for sure!7
- ❖ The story behind Chanel's iconic perfume is full of twists and turns. In the early 1920s, Chanel worked with perfumer Ernest Beaux to create the scent. Reportedly, Chanel liked Beaux's fifth sample, leading to the nowfamous name. (Also, five was said to be her lucky number.) But the scent, with notes of jasmine, rose, sandalwood, and vanilla, might have been the result of a laboratory mistake. The formula had an unusually high dose of aldehyde in it—a synthetic component that made the scent "sparkle." The fragrance and its groundbreaking, minimalist bottle design would go on to become one of the best-selling and most recognized perfumes in the world.8

WRIGHT BROTHERS

The airplane stays up because it doesn't have the time to fall.¹









The Wright brothers—Orville (August 19, 1871 – January 30, 1948) and Wilbur (April 16, 1867 – May 30, 1912)—were two American aviation pioneers generally credited with inventing, building, and flying the world's first successful motor-operated airplane. They made the first controlled, sustained flight of a powered, heavier-than-air aircraft with the Wright Flyer on December 17, 1903, 4 mi (6 km) south of Kitty Hawk, North Carolina. In 1904–05, the brothers developed their flying machine to make longer-running and more aerodynamic flights with the Wright Flyer II, followed by the first truly practical fixed-wing aircraft, the Wright Flyer III. The Wright brothers were also the first to invent aircraft controls that made fixed-wing powered flight possible.²

INTERESTING FACTS!

- Orville and Wilbur Wright made the first successful self-propelled sustained flight on December 17, 1903. The flight lasted 12 seconds, and the aircraft flew approximately 20 feet (6 meters) above the ground for 120 feet (36 meters).⁵
- In 1878, when Wilbur was 11 and Orville 7, their father gave them a helicopter-like toy to share. It was based on an invention by Alphonse Pénaud and was made of paper, bamboo and cork with a rubber band to twirl the motor. The brothers later said this toy was the beginning of an obsession with flying machines.6
- The Wright brothers sold the plane for \$30,000. The Wright brothers' extraordinary success led to contracts in both Europe and the United States, and they soon became wealthy business owners. They began building a grand family home in Dayton, where they had spent much of their childhood.7
- Inspired by birds, bats, and the Wright brothers, engineers are building the next breakthrough in aviation. Since at least the myth of Icarus, wings seen in nature have inspired humanity's dreams of flight.8



Being entirely honest with oneself is a good exercise.¹








Sigmund Freud (6 May 1856 – 23 September 1939) was an Austrian neurologist and the founder of psychoanalysis, a clinical method for treating psychopathology through dialogue between a patient and a psychoanalyst. Freud was born to Galician Jewish parents in the Moravian town of Freiberg, in the Austrian Empire. He qualified as a Doctor of Medicine in 1881 at the University of Vienna. Upon completing his habilitation in 1885, he was appointed a docent in neuropathology and became an affiliated professor in 1902. Freud lived and worked in Vienna, having set up his clinical practice there in 1886. In 1938, Freud left Austria to escape Nazi persecution. He died in exile in the United Kingdom in 1939.²

INTERESTING FACTS!

- Freud is famous for inventing and developing the technique of psychoanalysis; for articulating the psychoanalytic theory of motivation, mental illness, and the structure of the subconscious.⁵
- ❖ Between 1915 and 1938, Freud was nominated for the Nobel Prize in Medicine 12 times and the Nobel in Literature once—yet was never awarded any of them. His critics charged that psychoanalysis was an unproven practice.⁶
- * Freud employed hypnotism when he opened his medical practice in Vienna in 1886, and he found it easier to put patients into trances if they were lying down. When he began to employ his "talking cure" in his psychoanalysis, Freud also had his patients recline on a couch while he took notes in a chair out of sight. Freud was using animal companions to soothe anxious patients long before it was common. He sometimes allowed his dogs to sit in with his patients during appointments and noticed that they became measurably more relaxed. When the idea of therapy dogs was explored further in the 1960s, researchers drew support from Freud's writing about his dogs to help establish credibility for the approach.8
- ❖ Although an atheist himself, Freud was born into a Jewish family and became a particular target of the Nazis when they rose to power. His books were among those burned by the Nazis in 1933, which caused him to quip: "What progress we are making. In the Middle Ages they would have burnt me; nowadays they are content with burning my books." 9
- ❖ In 2014, his cremated ashes were nearly snatched by thieves. The urn, which also contained the remains of his wife Martha, was damaged in the attempted theft. Crematorium employees then moved the urn from public display to a more secure location.¹⁰



ALBERT EINSTEIN

Albert Einstein (14 March 1879 – 18 April 1955) was a German-born theoretical physicist who developed the theory of relativity, one of the two pillars of modern physics (alongside quantum mechanics). His work is also known for its influence on the philosophy of science. He is best known to the general public for his mass-energy equivalence formula E = mc2, which has been dubbed "the world's most famous equation". He received the 1921 Nobel Prize in Physics "for his services to theoretical physics, and especially for his discovery of the law of the photoelectric effect", a pivotal step in the development of quantum theory.²

INTERESTING FACTS!

- ❖ Einstein's parents thought he might be mentally retarded because he did not speak until he was four years old. He broke his silence one night at dinner saying, "The soup is too hot." When his parents asked why he had not spoken previously, the young Einstein responded, "Because up to now everything was in order." Still, he spoke only haltingly until he was nine years old, practicing sentences in his head or under his breath until he got them right.⁵
- ❖ Einstein's Big Idea homepage. E = mc². It's the world's most famous equation, but what does it really mean? "Energy equals mass times the speed of light squared." On the most basic level, the equation says that energy and mass (matter) are interchangeable; they are different forms of the same thing.⁶
- * After performing an autopsy on Einstein's body, pathologist Thomas Harvey kept his brain after the rest of the body was cremated. Despite violating Einstein's wishes, Harvey convinced Einstein's son to let him keep it for further study. Although Princeton fired Harvey, he kept Einstein's brain more than forty years, chopping it into pieces and storing it in two mason jars. He occasionally sent pieces of the brain to specialists around the country, some of whom discovered unique attributes to the brain. In one test, the tissue appeared denser than in normal brains and the inferior parietal lobe was larger. Finally, in 1998, Harvey returned the brain to Princeton University saying, "Eventually you get tired of the responsibility of having it."



Abraham Lincoln (February 12, 1809 – April 15, 1865) was an American statesman and lawyer who served as the 16th president of the United States from 1861 until his assassination in 1865. Lincoln led the nation through the American Civil War, the country's greatest moral, cultural, constitutional, and political crisis. He succeeded in preserving the Union, abolishing slavery, bolstering the federal government, and modernizing the U.S. economy.²

INTERESTING FACTS!

- ❖ Lincoln was born into poverty in a log cabin and was raised on the frontier primarily in Indiana. He was self-educated and became a lawyer, Whig Party leader, Illinois state legislator, and U.S. Congressman from Illinois. In 1849, he returned to his law practice but became vexed by the opening of additional lands to slavery as a result of the Kansas-Nebraska Act. He reentered politics in 1854, becoming a leader in the new Republican Party, and he reached a national audience in the 1858 debates against Stephen Douglas. Lincoln ran for President in 1860, sweeping the North in victory.⁸ Abraham Lincoln is famous for the Gettysburg Address, abolishing slavery and being one of the four presidents who have been assassinated.⁵
- ❖ On April 14, 1865, Lincoln signed legislation creating the U.S. Secret Service. That evening, he was shot at Ford's Theatre. Even if the Secret Service had been established earlier, it wouldn't have saved Lincoln: The original mission of the law enforcement agency was to combat widespread currency counterfeiting. It was not until 1901, after the killing of two other presidents, that the Secret Service was formally assigned to protect the commander-in-chief.⁶
- ❖ Lincoln is enshrined in the Wrestling Hall of Fame. The Great Emancipator wasn't quite WWE material, but thanks to his long limbs he was an accomplished wrestler as a young man. Defeated only once in approximately 300 matches, Lincoln reportedly talked a little smack in the ring. According to Carl Sandburg's biography of Lincoln, Honest Abe once challenged an entire crowd of onlookers after dispatching an opponent: "I'm the big buck of this lick. If any of you want to try it, come on and whet your horns." There were no takers. Lincoln's grappling exploits earned him an "Outstanding American" honor in the National Wrestling Hall of Fame.⁷

LOUIS PASTEUR

Louis Pasteur (December 27, 1822 – September 28, 1895) was a French biologist, microbiologist, and chemist renowned for his discoveries of the principles of vaccination, microbial fermentation, and pasteurization. He is remembered for his remarkable breakthroughs in the causes and prevention of diseases, and his discoveries have saved many lives ever since. He reduced mortality from puerperal fever and created the first vaccines for rabies and anthrax.²

INTERESTING FACTS!

- ❖ He pioneered the study of molecular asymmetry; discovered that microorganisms cause fermentation and disease; originated the process of pasteurization; saved the beer, wine, and silk industries in France; and developed vaccines against anthrax and rabies.⁵
- Many scientists continued to believe that simple lifeforms were spontaneously generated; this despite the fact that a number of scientists, such as Theodor Schwann, had carried out work showing that microbes could not simply appear out of nowhere in dirty ponds or decaying meat. When they learned that Pasteur was going to enter the 'life' debate, his scientific friends tried to dissuade him - it was too hot a topic to handle and they didn't want to see their friend burned! However, Pasteur's work in the laboratory had already convinced him that Schwann was correct. In 1860 the French Academy announced a prize of 2,500 Francs to anyone who provided convincing experimental proof for or against spontaneous generation of life. Pasteur was awarded the prize in 1862. He showed that no microbes ever grew in nutrient solutions that had been sterilized by heating, provided the air above the solutions was also sterilized. If unsterilized air was allowed into the space above the solutions, microbes began growing in the solutions. The microbes were present in the unheated air.6
- ❖ To create the vaccine for rabies, Pasteur infected a group of rabbits. He went on to remove some of the infected tissue, dried it out, and then reinserted it into the rabbits. This is the concept behind a vaccine: using the disease to fight itself.⁷

- What Does Warren Buffett Own? Through his holding company Berkshire Hathaway, Warren Buffett owns Stakes in Apple, Bank of America, American Express, Goldman Sachs, Wells Fargo, Coca Cola, Visa, Mastercard, and Kraft Heinz.⁵
- ❖ Warren Buffett made \$53,000 by the age of 16. Even since he was young, Buffett's been not only tactful, but also an extremely hard worker. At age six, Buffett traveled his neighborhood, selling sticks of gun in packs of five for a nickel each. When Buffett's father became a congressman, his family moved from Omaha, Neb. to Washington D.C. Buffett delivered The Washington Post every morning and brought in about \$175 a month (that's more than most teachers made during that time). He also pursued a few side gigs such as selling used golf balls and collector stamps and buffing cars. By the time he turned 16, he had amassed the equivalent of \$53,000.6
- ❖ For breakfast, Buffett often frequents McDonalds for a bacon, egg and cheese biscuit if the market is up, or an austere two sausage patties if the market is down. On most days, Buffett will visit his beloved Dairy Queen for an ice cream dessert.⁷
- When you think of a billionaire, you typically think of mansions, vacation homes and expensive cars. Buffett has lived in the same Omaha house since 1958 that he originally bought for \$31,500. The house is a simple five-bedroom, 2.5-bathroom house.8
- ❖ In June 2006 Buffett announced that he planned to donate more than 80 percent of his wealth to a handful of private charitable foundations.⁹

NAPOLEON BONAPARTE

Napoléon Bonaparte (15 August 1769 – 5 May 1821) was a French military and political leader. He rose to prominence during the French Revolution and led several successful campaigns during the Revolutionary Wars. As Napoleon I, he was Emperor of the French from 1804 until 1814, and again in 1815. Napoleon dominated European and global affairs for more than a decade while leading France against a series of coalitions in the Napoleonic Wars. He won most of these wars and the vast majority of his battles, building a large empire that ruled over continental Europe before its final collapse in 1815. One of the greatest commanders in history, his wars and campaigns are studied at military schools worldwide.²

INTERESTING FACTS!

- Napoleon served as first consul of France from 1799 to 1804. In that time, Napoleon reformed the French educational system, developed a civil code (the Napoleonic Code), and negotiated the Concordat of 1801. He also initiated the Napoleonic Wars (c. 1801–15), a series of wars that carried over into his reign as emperor of France (1804–14/15). As Emperor Napoleon I, he modernized the French military.⁵
- ❖ From 1803 to 1815, France was engaged in the Napoleonic Wars, a series of major conflicts with various coalitions of European nations. In 1803, partly as a means to raise funds for future wars, Napoleon sold France's Louisiana Territory in North America to the newly independent United States for \$15 million, a transaction that later became known as the Louisiana Purchase.⁶
- ❖ Between 1801 and 1857, Napoleon built a fort on the Atlantic Ocean named Fort Boyard. The 68 by 31-meter fortification rises straight out of the Atlantic ocean, standing 20 meters tall. Its original purpose was for defense, though it later housed a prison. Building Boyard was a feat of engineering—the idea was proposed in 1692, but Louis XIV was told, "Your Majesty, it would be easier to seize the moon with your teeth than to attempt such an undertaking in such a place."
- As one of the greatest military commanders in French history, his war tactics are still being studied at military schools globally. This has made him one of the most celebrated and controversial leaders in history. He was respected by his army men for his tactics in the field.8

Billie Jean King (née Moffitt; born November 22, 1943) is an American former World No. 1 professional tennis player. King won 39 Grand Slam titles: 12 in singles, 16 in women's doubles, and 11 in mixed doubles. She often represented the United States in the Federation Cup and the Wightman Cup. She was a member of the victorious United States team in seven Federation Cups and nine Wightman Cups. For three years, she was the United States' captain in the Federation Cup.²

INTERESTING FACTS!

- ❖ Billie Jean King first encountered gender inequality at the age of 12, while participating in a tournament at the Los Angeles Tennis Club. It was 1955, and Billie Jean was barred from a group photo of junior tennis players because she had decided to wear tennis shorts that day, rather than the tennis skirt traditionally worn by female athletes. She soon learned that the unequal treatment that female athletes experienced wasn't only relegated to dress code.⁵
- Recognizing the disparity of pay between men and women, King became an advocate for gender equality in the sport of tennis. ... Additionally, along with her husband, King founded the World Team Tennis co-ed circuit and the Women's Sports Foundation.⁶
- ❖ In the 1960s and 1970s, the tournament payouts for women tennis players were significantly lower than those received by the male players. In 1971, Billie Jean became the first woman athlete to earn over \$100,000 in prize money. Yet when she won the U.S. Open in 1972, she received \$15,000 less than the men's champion. Needless to say, this didn't sit well with the young progressive.⁷
- In 1973, she lobbied for equal prize money for men and women at the U.S. Open, and as a result of her efforts, a sponsor was found to level the playing field. As a result of her advocacy, the U.S. Open became the first major tournament to offer equal prize money to both sexes. All four Grand Slams now offer equal prize money to women and men.8

Ratan Naval Tata (born 28 December 1937) is an Indian industrialist, philanthropist, and a former chairman of Tata Sons. He was also chairman of Tata Group, from 1990 to 2012, and again, as interim chairman, from October 2016 through February 2017, and continues to head its charitable trusts. He is the recipient of two of the highest civilian awards of India, the Padma Vibhushan (2008) and Padma Bhushan (2000).²

- ❖ Tata companies were the first to provide branded salt in India, first to curate branded jewelry in India and the first to sell retail steel in India. The pioneering nature of the brand is well-recognized.⁵
- * Ratan Tata was born on 1937 in Surat, Gujarat. His father's name was Naval Tata while Sooni Tata was his mother. Naval Tata was the adopted grandson of Jamsetji Tata, founder of the Tata Group. He started his career with Tata Group in 1962 at the age of 25. He later went to Harvard Business School to complete his studies. He is also an alumnus of the Cornell University College of Architecture.6
- Why Ratan Tata is not on the list of richest men in India? This is because 65% of the family's and the company's fortune is given away as charity. Hence, any profit made by the company doesn't impact Ratan Tata's personal financial statement and goes straight to charitable organizations.⁷
- There are many important lessons to be learned from Ratan Tata's life story and the Tata Group's concept of a benevolent employer. Caring for its employees' needs and for the wider community has made it a household name for trust and integrity across the Indian subcontinent.8
- ❖ "Getting involved with personal investments as I have been trying to support startups. It's been a learning experience for me. With humility, I have to say that I haven't brought any magic with me, but I have chosen to support enterprises that seem to attract me from a founder's position—what the company is trying to do."9



THURGOOD MARSHALL

Thurgood Marshall (July 2, 1908 – January 24, 1993) was an American lawyer and civil rights activist who served as Associate Justice of the Supreme Court of the United States from October 1967 until October 1991. Marshall was the Court's first African American justice. Prior to his judicial service, he successfully argued several cases before the Supreme Court, including Brown v. Board of Education. Numerous memorials have been dedicated to Marshall.²

INTERESTING FACTS!

- His father, William, worked as a steward at an all-white country club. His mother, Norma, was a kindergarten teacher. His grandfather was a slave who gained his freedom by escaping from the South during the Civil War. Marshall was a good student in school, but often got into trouble for misbehaving.⁵
- Thurgood Marshall, who became the first African-American Supreme Court Justice (1967-1991), knocked down legal segregation in America as a civil rights attorney.⁶
- ❖ After founding the NAACP Legal Defense Fund in 1940, Marshall became the key strategist in the effort to end racial segregation, in particular meticulously challenging Plessy v. Ferguson, the Court-sanctioned legal doctrine that called for "separate but equal" structures for white and blacks.⁷
- ❖ Thurgood Marshall—perhaps best known as the first African American Supreme Court justice—played an instrumental role in promoting racial equality during the civil rights movement. As a practicing attorney, Marshall argued a record-breaking 32 cases before the Supreme Court, winning 29 of them.⁸
- ❖ As a child in Baltimore, Marshall developed an interest in the law when his father William, a country club steward, took him to observe legal arguments at local courts. Thurgood and his father then had lengthy discussions around the dinner table during which Thurgood's father fought every statement his son made. Justice Marshall said of his father in 1965, "He never told me to be a lawyer, but he turned me into one."



BENJAMIN FRANKLIN

Benjamin Franklin (January 17, 1706 – April 17, 1790) was one of the Founding Fathers of the United States. A polymath, he was a leading writer, printer, political philosopher, politician, Freemason, postmaster, scientist, inventor, humorist, civic activist, statesman, and diplomat. As a scientist, he was a major figure in the American Enlightenment and the history of physics for his discoveries and theories regarding electricity. As an inventor, he is known for the lightning rod, bifocals, and the Franklin stove, among other inventions. He founded many civic organizations, including the Library Company, Philadelphia's first fire department, and the University of Pennsylvania.²

INTERESTING FACTS!

- The man considered the most brilliant American of his age rarely saw the inside of a classroom. Franklin spent just two years attending Boston Latin School and a private academy before joining the family candle and soap making business. By age 12, he was serving as an indentured apprentice at a printing shop owned by his brother, James. Young Benjamin made up for his lack of schooling by spending what little money he earned on books, often going without food to afford new volumes. He also honed his composition skills by reading essays and articles and then rewriting them from memory.5
- Despite being almost entirely self-taught, Franklin later helped found the school that became the University of Pennsylvania and received honorary degrees from Harvard, Yale, the College of William and Mary, the University of St. Andrews and Oxford.6
- Benjamin Franklin is the only founding father to have signed all four of the key documents establishing the U.S.: the Declaration of Independence (1776), the Treaty of Alliance with France (1778), the Treaty of Paris establishing peace with Great Britain (1783) and the U.S. Constitution (1787). 7
- Benjamin Franklin made important scientific contributions regarding the nature of electricity. Among his findings was the fact that the positive and negative charges, or states of electrification of bodies, had to occur in exactly equal amounts—a crucial scientific principle known today as the law of conservation of charge.8
- ❖ He adopted thirteen virtues (temperance, silence, order, resolution, frugality, industry, sincerity, justice, moderation, cleanliness, tranquility, chastity, and humility), and attempted to improve one per week. He argued that the most difficult one for him was order, because his good memory made it unnecessary.9



STEPHAN HAWKING

Science is not only a disciple of reason but, also, one of romance and passion.¹







Stephen William Hawking (8 January 1942 – 14 March 2018) was an English theoretical physicist, cosmologist, and author who was director of research at the Centre for Theoretical Cosmology at the University of Cambridge at the time of his death. He was the Lucasian Professor of Mathematics at the University of Cambridge between 1979 and 2009. Hawking was diagnosed with an early-onset slow-progressing form of motor neuron disease (also known as amyotrophic lateral sclerosis (ALS) or Lou Gehrig's disease) that gradually paralyzed him over the decades. After the loss of his speech, he was able to communicate through a speech-generating device—initially through use of a handheld switch, and eventually by using a single cheek muscle.²

To confine our attention to terrestrial matters would be to limit the human spirit.³ - Stephen Hawking

INTERESTING FACTS!

- Upon his ALS diagnosis, Hawking was told he only had two-and-a-half years to live. After falling while ice skating during his first year as a grad student at Cambridge University, Hawking was told he had the degenerative motor neuron disease Amyotrophic Lateral Sclerosis (ALS) and had only two-and-a-half years to live.⁵
- ❖ The theory of everything is a proposed notion in the scientific community which states that there is one all-encompassing theory that proposes a framework of understanding of all of physics, combining the quantum mechanics and classical physics into a unified approach which explains the laws of the universe. ⁶
- Stephen Hawking's computer-generated voice was known to millions of people around the world, a robotic drawl that somehow enhanced the profound impact of the cosmological secrets he revealed. ... It was linked to an early speech synthesizer, which turned Hawking's text into spoken language.⁷
- * Hawking believed that developing better technology was imperative for humans' survival. But he was also very concerned about the pursuit of artificial intelligence, or A.I. "Alongside the benefits, A.I. will also bring dangers, like powerful autonomous weapons, or new ways for the few to oppress the many," he said in 2014 at the launch for the Centre for the Future of Intelligence at Cambridge University. "In the future, A.I. could develop a will of its own—a will that is in conflict with ours," he continued. "The rise of powerful A.I. will be either the best, or the worst thing, ever to happen to humanity. We do not yet know which."

NELSON MANDELA

Nelson Rolihlahla Mandela (18 July 1918 – 5 December 2013) was a South African anti-apartheid revolutionary, political leader and philanthropist who served as President of South Africa from 1994 to 1999. He was the country's first black head of state and the first elected in a fully representative democratic election. His government focused on dismantling the legacy of apartheid by tackling institutionalized racism and fostering racial reconciliation. Ideologically an African nationalist and socialist, he served as the president of the African National Congress (ANC) party from 1991 to 1997.²

INTERESTING FACTS!

- Nelson Mandela grew up in poverty. His father died and he went to live with his uncle who wanted to marry him off to one of the village girls. But Nelson had other plans. He ran away to the big city of Johannesburg and it was there that he came into contact with apartheid, which means 'apartness'.5
- Although he was arrested and imprisoned for 27 years for fighting for freedom, Mandela refused to give up the struggle or give in to hate. Mandela was fighting against apartheid, but he was also fighting for something: a better world, in which the freedom, justice and dignity of all were respected.⁵ He showed this while creating a new South Africa, dismantling Apartheid and keeping the peace amongst the people while tackling racism, poverty and inequality. He established the Truth and Reconciliation Commission, providing a safe place to investigate past human rights abuses, avoiding civil war and bloodshed.⁶
- The Norwegian Nobel Committee has decided to award the Nobel Peace Prize for 1993 to Nelson R. Mandela and Frederik Willem de Klerk for their work for the peaceful termination of the apartheid regime, and for laying the foundations for a new democratic South Africa.⁷
- ❖ Nelson Mandela has always believed in the youth as the rock on which the future is built. He has promoted education as a key instrument of liberation. So much of his post-1999 charitable work was directed at the needs of young people in South Africa and around the world − primarily through his legacy organizations. After his release from prison in 1990 he had a particular affinity for children and youth, enjoying their company and finding it easy to engage them with disarming humor and spontaneous delight.⁸

INTERESTING FACTS!

❖ He dropped out of high school. During the first World War, a 16-yearold Walt left school and attempted to enlist in the army. He was rejected for being underage but managed to find employment with the Red Cross as an ambulance driver.⁵

Disney started a small studio of his own in 1922 and acquired a secondhand movie camera with which his company made one and two-minute animated advertising films for distribution to local movie theatres. They also did a series of animated cartoon sketches called Laugh-O-grams and the pilot film for a series of seven-minute fairy tales that combined both live action and animation, Alice in Cartoonland. A New York film distributor cheated the young producer, and Disney was forced to file for bankruptcy in 1923.6

❖ Disney moved to California in the early 1920s and set up the Disney Brothers Studio with his brother Roy. With Ub Iwerks, Walt developed the character Mickey Mouse in 1928, his first highly popular success; he also provided the voice for his creation in the early years. As the studio grew, Disney became more adventurous, introducing synchronized sound, full-color three-strip Technicolor, feature-length cartoons and technical developments in cameras. The results, seen in features such as Snow White and the Seven Dwarfs (1937), Pinocchio, Fantasia (both 1940), Dumbo (1941), and Bambi (1942), furthered the development of animated film. New animated and live-action films followed after World War II, including the critically successful Cinderella (1950) and Mary Poppins (1964), the latter of which received five Academy Awards.⁷

STEVE JOBS

Innovation distinguishes between a leader and a follower.¹








Steven Paul Jobs (February 24, 1955 – October 5, 2011) was an American business magnate, industrial designer, investor, and media proprietor. He was the chairman, chief executive officer (CEO), and co-founder of Apple Inc., the chairman and majority shareholder of Pixar, a member of The Walt Disney Company's board of directors following its acquisition of Pixar, and the founder, chairman, and CEO of NeXT. Jobs is widely recognized as a pioneer of the personal computer revolution of the 1970s and 1980s, along with Apple co-founder Steve Wozniak.² Jobs was born in San Francisco, California, and put up for adoption. He was raised in the San Francisco Bay Area. He attended Reed College in 1972 before dropping out that same year and traveled through India in 1974 seeking enlightenment and studying Zen Buddhism.²

INTERESTING FACTS!

- One of Steve's favorite hobbies growing up was working with electronics in his garage with his dad. They would take apart electronics like radios and then put them back together. Steve was a smart student but got bored with school. He often played pranks on others, getting into trouble.⁵
- Though Jobs had long, unkempt hair and eschewed business garb, he managed to obtain financing, distribution, and publicity for the company, Apple Computer, incorporated in 1977—the same year that the Apple II was completed. The machine was an immediate success, becoming synonymous with the boom in personal computers. In 1981 the company had a record-setting public stock offering, and in 1983 it made the quickest entrance (to that time) into the Fortune 500 list of America's top companies. In 1983 the company recruited PepsiCo, Inc., president John Sculley to be its chief executive officer (CEO) and, implicitly, Jobs's mentor in the fine points of running a large corporation. Jobs had convinced Sculley to accept the position by challenging him: "Do you want to sell sugar water for the rest of your life?" The line was shrewdly effective, but it also revealed Jobs' own near-messianic belief in the computer revolution.
- ❖ In 2001 Jobs started reinventing Apple for the 21st century. That was the year that Apple introduced iTunes, a computer program for playing music and for converting music to the compact MP3 digital format commonly used in computers and other digital devices. Later the same year, Apple began selling the iPod, a portable MP3 player, which quickly became the market leader. In 2003 Apple began selling downloadable copies of major record company songs in MP3 format over the Internet. By 2006 more than one billion songs and videos had been sold through Apple's online iTunes Store. In recognition of the growing shift in the company's business, Jobs officially changed the name of the company to Apple Inc. on January 9, 2007.⁷

A. P. J. ABDUL KALAM

Avul Pakir Jainulabdeen Abdul Kalam; 15 (October 1931 – 27 July 2015) was an Indian aerospace scientist and politician who served as the 11th President of India from 2002 to 2007. He was born and raised in Rameswaram, Tamil Nadu and studied physics and aerospace engineering. He spent the next four decades as a scientist and science administrator, mainly at the Defense Research and Development Organization (DRDO) and Indian Space Research Organization (ISRO) and was intimately involved in India's civilian space program and military missile development efforts. He thus came to be known as the Missile Man of India for his work on the development of ballistic missile and launch vehicle technology. He also played a pivotal organizational, technical, and political role in India's Pokhran-II nuclear tests in 1998, the first since the original nuclear test by India in 1974.

INTERESTING FACTS!

- ❖ The problems faced by Kalam are: As he was a son of a boatman he was facing many difficulties with his studies. He wasn't having money to continue his studies, so he sold newspapers and earns money. There were no electricity in his home so he used to read under the street light.⁵
- Kalam was a hardworking boy right from the beginning. At the tender age of five, he started selling newspapers to help his father support the family. He did this job in the evenings after school. He also spent a great deal of time on his studies.⁶
- Kalam missed an opportunity to become a fighter pilot for the Indian Air force. He was on the ninth spot on the list, and there were only eight openings. The first eight shortlisted candidates were recruited.⁷
- ❖ He was once asked by a journalist how would he like to be remembered: as a scientist, a president or a teacher. And he replied smilingly "I want to be remembered as a teacher first and then as any other person."
- A.P.J. Abdul Kalam won many awards, both from the Indian government and from the international community. His most notable awards were the Padma Vibhushan and Bharat Ratna for his contributions to science.⁹

REINHOLD MESSNER

A tourist follows a trail; mountaineer finds one.1







Reinhold Andreas (born 17 September 1944) is an Italian mountaineer, explorer, and author. He made the first solo ascent of Mount Everest and, along with Peter Habeler, the first ascent of Everest without supplemental oxygen. He was the first climber to ascend all fourteen peaks over 8,000 meters (26,000 ft) above sea level. Messner was the first to cross Antarctica and Greenland with neither snowmobiles nor dog sleds. He also crossed the Gobi Desert alone. Messner has published more than 80 books (only a quarter of which have been translated into English) about his experiences as a climber and explorer. In 2018, he received jointly with Krzysztof Wielicki the Princess of Asturias Award in the category of Sports.²

I was the first man to climb the world's 14 tallest peaks without supplementary oxygen, but I never asked how high I would go, just how I would do it.³ - Reinhold Messner

INTERESTING FACTS!

- Sometime between 1 and 2 in the afternoon on May 8, 1978, Messner and Habeler achieved what was believed to be impossible—the first ascent of Mt. Everest without oxygen.⁵
- * Messner's landmark solo ascent of Everest in 1980 was remarkable. After three days of exhausting climbing on the north side of the mountain (which included a fall into a crevasse), on August 20 he stood on the summit. As he described it later, "I was in continual agony; I have never in my whole life been so tired as on the summit of Everest that day. I just sat and sat there, oblivious to everything....I knew I was physically at the end of my tether."
- ❖ In 1989–90 Messner and German Arved Fuchs became the first people to traverse Antarctica via the South Pole by foot without either animals or machines. Their journey, which covered some 1,740 miles (2,800 km), was accomplished in 92 days. Another notable adventure was Messner's 1,250-mile (2,000-km) solo trek across the Gobi (desert) in Mongolia in 2004. He also established a series of mountain-themed museums in the Alps of northern Italy, beginning with one near Bolzano in 2006.⁷
- ❖ During all his life, even after the end of his political career, he has been a strong supporter of green and environmentalist policies and an activist in the fight against global warming.⁸

FRANK EARLE SHANKWITZ

Frank Earle Shankwitz (March 8, 1943 – January 24, 2021) was an American philanthropist who was a co-founder of the Make-A-Wish Foundation. He has received the President's Call to Service Award, the Making a Difference in the World, the Making a World of Difference and the Ellis Island Medal of Honor awards. In 2019, a documentary film was made, telling the story of Shankwitz, his life and his foundation.²

- Frank Shankwitz, an Arizona Highway Patrol officer who, after helping a terminally ill boy realize his dream of becoming a motorcycle cop, cofounded the Make-a-Wish Foundation and served as its first president.⁵
- Shankwitz, along with his wife Kitty and several others, founded the Make-A-Wish Foundation in 1980, with Shankwitz being the first president/CEO until 1984. Thirty-four years later, in 2014, the Make-A-Wish Foundation has grown to 64 chapters in the United States, 36 international chapters, covering five continents, and has granted over 500,000 wishes worldwide. 6
- Nearly 40,000 volunteers generously give their time and energy to fulfill the Make-A-Wish mission. 7
- Once the child is deemed medically eligible, Make-A-Wish Foundation sends "wish granters" to learn the child's one true wish. These passionate volunteers help children explore their imaginations to come up with the wish that will be the most impactful for them. Wishes generally would fall into one of these categories:8

I wish to have... I wish to be... I wish to go... I wish to meet... I wish to give...

A wish come true helps children feel stronger, more energetic, more willing and able to battle their critical illnesses. For many, the wish marks a turning point in the fight against their illnesses. Doctors, nurses and other health professionals say the wish experience works

MILKHA SINGH

Milkha Singh (birthdate uncertain, between 1929 and 1935),[a] also known as The Flying Sikh, is an Indian former track and field sprinter who was introduced to the sport while serving in the Indian Army. He was the only Indian athlete to win an individual athletics gold medal at a Commonwealth Games until Krishna Poonia won the discus gold medal at the 2010 Commonwealth Games. He also won gold medals in the 1958 and 1962 Asian Games. He represented India in the 1956 Summer Olympics in Melbourne, the 1960 Summer Olympics in Rome and the 1964 Summer Olympics in Tokyo. He was awarded the Padma Shri, India's fourth-highest civilian honor, in recognition of his sporting achievements.²

INTERESTING FACTS!

- * Born into a Sikh Rathore family in Govindpura, Muzaffargarh in West Punjab, Milkha Singh is widely regarded as one of the world's greatest athletes. His forefathers, who were originally from Rajasthan, were ironsmiths. His father was a farmer with a small land holding. Partition separated Mr. Singh from both his family and home, forcing him to forge his own path.'. He eked out a living by working in a roadside restaurant before joining the Indian army. It was in the army that Singh realized his abilities as a sprinter. After winning the national trials in the 200-metre and 400-metre sprints, he was eliminated during the preliminary heats for those events at the 1956 Olympic Games in Melbourne.⁵
- Due to the harrowing and traumatic experience of partition in his childhood, Milkha was inclined to become a dacoit. Milkha was once sent to Tihar jail for travelling without a ticket by train. He was bailed after his sister sold off her jewelry.⁶
- Milkha Singh created the record at the 1958 British Empire and Commonwealth Games after clocking 46.6 seconds, which was a new national record back then. His story is also captured in the film 'Bhaag Milkha Bhaag." It has been decades since Milkha Singh retired but till today, very few Indian sprinters have come close to matching his caliber and the rich legacy that he left behind.
- Pakistan's General Ayub Khan bestowed the title 'Flying Sikh of India' to Milkha Singh after his brilliant performance at the Asian Games. The then Prime Minister Jawaharlal Nehru declared a holiday for a day to reward him for making the country proud, after Milkha asked for it.8

- * Reagan wanted to get involved in the entertainment industry. So, following his graduation from college in 1932, he auditioned for jobs at many different radio stations. He was hired by the University of Iowa to broadcast football games. Although he didn't make a lot at the University of Iowa job, other individuals recognized his talent. He was hired by another radio station in Davenport for a staff announcer's job. He quickly found another job as an announcer for the Chicago Cubs baseball team.⁵
- Ronald Reagan rose to prominence initially as a film actor, appearing in more than 50 films, notably including Knute Rockne—All American (1940), Kings Row (1942), and The Hasty Heart (1950). Reagan later served as governor of California from 1967 to 1975, before being elected the 40th president of the United States in 1980.6
- ❖ After his acting career began to decline in the 1950s, Reagan became the host of a television drama series, General Electric Theater, as well as spokesman for the General Electric Company. In the latter capacity he toured GE plants around the country, delivering inspirational speeches with a generally conservative, pro-business message.⁷
- ❖ Ronald Reagan is largely credited with the demise of Soviet communism during the 1980s. As president, he worked to reduce the threat of war between the U.S. and the U.S.S.R., to convince Soviet leaders that cooperation with the U.S. would serve Soviet interests, and to encourage openness and democracy in the U.S.S.R.⁸

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

EDMUND HILLARY

Sir Edmund Percival Hillary KG ONZ KBE (20 July 1919 – 11 January 2008) was a New Zealand mountaineer, explorer, and philanthropist. On 29 May 1953, Hillary and Sherpa mountaineer Tenzing Norgay became the first climbers confirmed to have reached the summit of Mount Everest. They were part of the ninth British expedition to Everest, led by John Hunt. From 1985 to 1988 he served as New Zealand's High Commissioner to India and Bangladesh and concurrently as Ambassador to Nepal.²

INTERESTING FACTS!

- ❖ Edmund Hillary began climbing in New Zealand's Southern Alps while in high school, before working as a beekeeper during the summers and climbing mountains during the winters. After military service in World War II, he joined a party to the central Himalayas in 1951 and later joined a mountaineering team planning to climb Mount Everest.⁵
- ❖ Edmund Hillary never anticipated the acclaim that would follow the historic ascent. Throughout his experience of celebrity, he maintained a high level of humility. His main interest came to be the welfare of Nepal's Himalayan peoples, especially the Sherpas. He was knighted in 1953. In 2003 Hillary was made an honorary citizen of Nepal.⁶ Following his ascent of Everest he devoted himself to assisting the Sherpa people of Nepal through the Himalayan Trust, which he established in 1960 and led until his death in 2008. His efforts are credited with the construction of many schools and hospitals in this remote region of the Himalayas. He was the Honorary President of the American Himalayan Foundation, a United States non-profit body that helps improve the ecology and living conditions in the Himalayas. He was also the Honorary President of Mountain Wilderness, an international NGO dedicated to the worldwide protection of mountains.⁶

I believe that of all the things I have done, exciting though many of them have been, there's no doubt in my mind that the most worthwhile have been the establishing of schools and hospitals, and the rebuilding of monasteries in the mountains.⁷ - Edmund Hillary

DALE CARNEGIE

Dale Carnegie (November 24, 1888 – November 1, 1955) was an American writer and lecturer, and the developer of courses in self-improvement, salesmanship, corporate training, public speaking, and interpersonal skills. Born into poverty on a farm in Missouri, he was the author of How to Win Friends and Influence People (1936), a bestseller that remains popular today. He also wrote How to Stop Worrying and Start Living (1948), Lincoln the Unknown (1932), and several other books. One of the core ideas in his books is that it is possible to change other people's behavior by changing one's behavior towards them.²

INTERESTING FACTS!

- ❖ Famed author and lecturer Dale Carnegie was born as Dale Carnagey on November 24, 1888, in Maryville, Missouri. His parents, James William and Amanda Elizabeth Carnagey, were impoverished farmers. When Carnegie was in middle school, his family moved to Warrensburg, Missouri. As a boy, Carnegie was unskilled in athletics but learned that he could still make friends and earn respect because he had a way with words.⁵
- ❖ Carnegie was born into poverty on a farm in Missouri. In high school and college he was active in debating clubs. After graduating he was a salesman in Nebraska and an actor in New York City and finally taught public speaking at the YMCA. His classes became extremely successful, and Carnegie began lecturing to packed houses. To standardize his teaching methods he began publishing pamphlets, which he collected into book form as Public Speaking.⁶
- ❖ In 1936, after years of intense research that included reading hundreds biographies to learn how the world's greatest leaders achieved their success, Carnegie published just such a book: How to Win Friends and Influence People. Despite its modest initial print run of 5,000 copies, the book became a mammoth best-seller. Carnegie's book, like his classes, struck a chord with a population hungry for self-improvement, selling nearly 5 million copies during his lifetime while being translated into every major language.⁷
- Carnegie gave \$30 million, the bulk of his remaining fortune, to the Carnegie Corporation, which he hoped would help establish international laws and foster world peace.

CLARA BARTON

Clarissa Harlowe Barton (December 25, 1821 – April 12, 1912) was a pioneering American nurse who founded the American Red Cross. She was a hospital nurse in the American Civil War, a teacher, and a patent clerk. Since nursing education was not then very formalized and she did not attend nursing school, she provided self-taught nursing care. Barton is noteworthy for doing humanitarian work and civil rights advocacy at a time before women had the right to vote. She was inducted into the National Women's Hall of Fame in 1973.²

INTERESTING FACTS!

- ❖ The youngest child, with four much older siblings, Clara did not have an easy childhood. Her mother was not kind to her. ... When she was eleven, Clara's older brother David fell off a barn roof and was bedridden for the following two years. Young Clara helped nurse him back to health.⁵
- When Miss Barton joined as nurse, she was out in charge of helping the wounded soldiers from the Union Army also to scout for missing soldiers.
 ... She helped to heal many wounded soldiers, making her a hero, and earning the nickname, "The Angel on the Battlefield." 6
- ❖ When the Civil War began, she worked as a battlefield nurse. One of the soldiers to whom she tended told her, "This is the second time you saved my life." He then explained that she had been his teacher in New Jersey. Clara risked her own life by being on the battlefield. Once, a bullet went through her sleeve and killed the soldier behind her.⁷
- Clara Barton, 1904. Even in her later years, Barton was an advocate for women's rights. Barton very publicly spoke in favor of equal rights for women. During Barton's time, gender discrimination was intense. Women were regarded lower than male counterparts. Barton experienced discrimination in a major way twice when she was replaced with a male principal in a school she founded and when she was terminated in the US Patent Office because she was a woman. These experiences made Barton firm about the equality of men and women especially in employment.



James Cleveland "Jesse" Owens (September 12, 1913 – March 31, 1980) was an American track and field athlete and four-time gold medalist in the 1936 Olympic Games. Owens specialized in the sprints and the long jump and was recognized in his lifetime as "perhaps the greatest and most famous athlete in track and field history". He set three world records and tied another, all in less than an hour at the 1935 Big Ten track meet in Ann Arbor, Michigan — a feat that has never been equaled and has been called "the greatest 45 minutes ever in sport".²

INTERESTING FACTS!

- ❖ Jesse Owens, the son of a sharecropper and grandson of a slave, achieved what no Olympian before him had accomplished. His stunning achievement of four gold medals at the 1936 Olympic games in Berlin has made him the best remembered athlete in Olympic history.⁸ After developing into a track and field star at a Cleveland high school, Owens enrolled at The Ohio State University. While smashing records for the Ohio State Buckeyes track team, he became known as the "Buckeye Bullet." Although he was the first black man elected captain of an Ohio State varsity team, Owens was barred from living in the on-campus dormitory because of the color of his skin.⁵
- Jesse Owens was an American athlete. He is best remembered for his performance at the 1936 Berlin Olympics, where he won gold medals in the long jump, the 100- and 200-metre dashes, and the 4 x 100-metre relay. He was the first American track and field athlete to win four gold medals at a single Olympic Games. Iesse won the gold medal in Nazi Germany with thousands of spectators rooting for his defeat. They believed that the Aryan race was superior and thus win the gold medal. After he won the gold medal. Roosevelt never publicly acknowledged Owens's triumphs—or the triumphs of any of the 18 African Americans who competed at the Berlin Olympics. Only white Olympians were invited to the White House in 1936. A number of explanations have been offered for the president's actions. The black Olympians who competed in Berlin were not recognized by the White House until 2016, when Pres. Barack Obama invited the athletes' relatives to an event in celebration of their lives and accomplishments.6
- Jesse Owens struggled to find work after the Olympics. He raced against horses for money and worked as a gas station attendant and a playground janitor. Using his fame to his advantage, Owens began working in public relations in the 1950s, traveling the country and making paid appearances at public events.⁷

- ❖ Activism and social justice causes were all part of Bono's life where he assisted African nations by co-founding DATA, EDUN, the ONE Campaign and Product Red. He performed benefit concerts and was praised for his philanthropic efforts, where he was granted honorary knighthood by Elizabeth II of the United Kingdom for his services to the music industry and humanitarian work. Bono utilized his successes in music to uplift people in various countries.⁵
- * The singer once had a near-death experience, but he won't share exactly what happened. Whatever it was, though, helped—if you can call it that—in the writing process for U2's album "Songs of Experience," which was released in December 2017. "It's just a thing that . . . people have these extinction events in their lives; it could be psychological or it could be physical," he told Rolling Stone. "And, yes, it was physical for me, but I think I have spared myself all that soap opera." What's even weirder is that this album specifically was going to have a mortality theme about it. How odd is that timing?
- Bono is very socially conscious, dabbling in a lot of different causes. He, his wife Ali, and fashion designer Rogan created a line of clothing called EDUN, which is just nude spelled backward, and helps to support developing countries. He also created a children's book in 2003 with two of his children called "Peter and the Wolf," with proceeds going to the Irish Hospice Foundation.⁷
- He actually goes to the countries he's fighting to help. in 1985, Bono and his wife spent almost two months in Ethiopia along with many other humanitarians in an effort to make the housing and sanitary situations better in an over-populated camp of refugees. He also spent some time in El Salvador where he actually witnessed an attack on a village by the military.⁸

LeBron Raymone James Sr. (born December 30, 1984) is an American professional basketball player for the Los Angeles Lakers of the National Basketball Association (NBA). Widely considered one of the greatest NBA players in history, His accomplishments include four NBA championships, four NBA Most Valuable Player (MVP) Awards, four Finals MVP Awards, and two Olympic gold medals. During his 17-year career, James holds the record for all-time playoffs points, is third in all-time points, and eighth in career assists. James has been selected to the All-NBA First Team a record 13 times, made the All-Defensive First Team five times, and has been named an All-Star 17 times, including three All-Star MVP selections.²

- ❖ During fourth grade, LeBron and his mother moved houses around 6 times. James was worn out by the constant movement between houses which made him miss around 100 school days. LeBron had a difficult childhood. His family was poor, and his father was in jail.⁵
- ❖ James played both basketball and football in high school. Some have speculated that he could have easily gone pro with football. Earlier in his senior year, he broke his wrist during a game. Because of the two-month recovery time, he decided to forego the football season to be fully healed for the senior basketball season.⁶
- ❖ A locally known basketball prodigy since elementary school, James was named Ohio's Mr. Basketball (high-school player of the year) three times while leading Akron's St. Vincent−St. Mary High School to three Ohio state championships in his four years on the team. He became a national media sensation in his junior year after appearing on the cover of Sports Illustrated, where he was billed by the magazine as "The Chosen One." James was the consensus national high-school player of the year in his senior season, and he was selected by the Cleveland Cavaliers with the first overall selection of the 2003 NBA draft. Additionally, he signed an unprecedented \$90 million endorsement contract with the Nike shoe company before he ever played a professional game.⁶
- Lebron has never let his fame go to his head. He set up the Lebron James Family Foundation. The foundation raises and donates money for several charities. These include Boys and Girls Clubs of America, After-School All-Stars, the Children's Defense Fund, Gabriel's Angle Foundation and ONEXONE.⁷

Christopher D'Olier Reeve (September 25, 1952 – October 10, 2004) was an American actor, director, and activist, best known for playing the main character and title role in the film Superman (1978) and its three sequels. After his acclaimed performances in Superman and Superman II, Reeve declined many roles in action movies, choosing instead to work in small films and plays with more complex characters. He later appeared in critically successful films such as The Bostonians (1984), Street Smart (1987), and The Remains of the Day (1993), and in the plays Fifth of July on Broadway.²

INTERESTING FACTS!

- ❖ The actor catapulted to stardom when, following a two-year casting search, he was selected to play the titular superhero of Superman (1978). The popularity of the film, and Reeve's winning portrayals of the Man of Steel and his alter ego, Clark Kent, spawned the release of Superman sequels in 1980, 1983 and 1987.⁵
- ❖ In preparation for his role in the movie "Superman," he had to undergo an intense bodybuilding regime supervised by David Prowse, who played Darth Vader in the original "Star Wars" trilogy, for two months. He doubled his food intake and adopted a high protein diet for his role.⁶
- ❖ In May 1995 Reeve became paralyzed from the neck down when he sustained a severe cervical spinal injury in a horse-riding accident. Despite being confined to a wheelchair and needing a respirator to assist with his breathing, he became heavily involved in campaigns supporting handicapped children and paraplegics, testifying before a Senate subcommittee in favor of federal funding for stem cell research. Reeve tirelessly sought to overcome the limitations of his condition, undergoing an experimental operation in 2003 that enabled him to breathe for hours without use of his respirator.⁷
- * Reeve continued to work after ongoing rehabilitation. He returned to acting in a television production of Rear Window (1998), for which he picked up a Golden Globe nomination, and directed two television films with health themes, In the Gloaming (1997) and The Brooke Ellison Story (2004). Reeve also penned two autobiographical books, Still Me (1998) and Nothing is Impossible: Reflections on a New Life (2002).8

INTERESTING FACTS!

- ❖ Astronaut, military pilot, educator. Born on August 5, 1930, near Wapakoneta, Ohio. On July 20, 1969, Neil Armstrong made history by becoming the first man to walk on the moon. He developed a fascination with flight at an early age and earned his student pilot's license when he was 16. In 1947, Armstrong began his studies in aeronautical engineering at Purdue University on a U.S. Navy scholarship.⁵
- ❖ At 10:56 PM, Armstrong exited the Lunar Module. He said, "That's one small step for man, one giant leap for mankind," as he made his famous first step on the moon. For about two and a half hours, Armstrong and Aldrin collected samples and conducted experiments. They also took photographs, including their own footprints.
- ❖ Before long, the three Apollo 11 astronauts were given a warm welcome home. Crowds lined the streets of New York City to cheer on the famous heroes who were honored in a ticker-tape parade. Armstrong received numerous awards for his efforts, including the Medal of Freedom and the Congressional Space Medal of Honor.⁷
- Neil Armstrong net worth: Neil Armstrong was an American Astronaut, public speaker and corporate board member who had a net worth of \$8 million dollars at the time of his death in 2012 (adjusted for inflation). Neil Armstrong is most famous for being the first human being to walk on the moon.8
- Six hundred million people watched the first moon walk on TV. The footprints made by Armstrong and Buzz Aldrin are still on the Moon.⁹

At an early age, Montessori enrolled in classes at an all-boys technical school, with hopes of becoming an engineer. She soon had a change of heart and began medical school at the Sapienza University of Rome, where she graduated with honors in 1896. Her educational method is in use today in many public and private schools globally.²

- Maria Montessori, Italian educator and originator of the educational system that bears her name. The Montessori system is based on belief in the creative potential of children, their drive to learn, and the right of each child to be treated as an individual.⁵
- Montessori scorned conventional classrooms, where "children, like butterflies mounted on pins, are fastened each to his place." She sought, instead, to teach children by supplying concrete materials and organizing situations conducive to learning with these materials.⁶

❖ Montessori methods encourage students to engage with education through their own devices; a recent study shows that this educational approach leads to significantly higher levels of motivation, interest, and importance in schoolwork and school-related tasks.⁸ In the Montessori system biological and mental growth are linked. "Periods of sensitivity," corresponding to certain ages, exist when a child's interest and mental capacity are best suited to the acquisition of certain specialized knowledge.⁸

STEVEN SPIELBERG

Steven Allan Spielberg (born December 18, 1946) is an American film director, producer, and screenwriter. He began his career in the New Hollywood era, and is one of the most commercially successful directors in history. Spielberg is the recipient of various accolades, including two Academy Awards for Best Director, a Kennedy Center honor, and a Cecil B. DeMille Award. Spielberg was born in Cincinnati, Ohio, and grew up in Phoenix, Arizona. He later moved to California and studied film in college. After directing television episodes and several minor films for Universal Studios, he became a household name for directing 1975's summer blockbuster Jaws. He then directed box office hits Close Encounters of the Third Kind (1977), E.T. the Extra-Terrestrial (1982), and the adventure films in the Indiana Jones series. Spielberg later explored drama in The Color Purple (1985), and Empire of the Sun (1987).

INTERESTING FACTS!

- Spielberg developed an interest in filmmaking as a child, and during his teens his Escape to Nowhere (1962), a 40-minute war movie, won first prize at a film festival. He next directed Firelight (1964), a feature-length science-fiction yarn, which was followed by an accomplished short about hitchhikers called Amblin' (1968).⁵
- Like all pioneers, Spielberg was an original. He spurned the obvious and constantly broke new creative ground. Directing a film is a huge enterprise. From a black and white screenplay emerges a CinemaScope, technicolor product of light, sound, drama and spectacle based on just one man's or woman's searing vision. All organizational leaders and pioneers need such extraordinary vision to turn their ideas into sustainable enterprises.⁶
- ❖ In 1994 Spielberg joined with multimedia moguls Jeffrey Katzenberg and David Geffen to found a new studio, DreamWorks, which was particularly successful as a creator of such popular animated films as Antz (1998), the Shrek series (2001, 2004, 2007, and 2010), and Puss in Boots (2011). In 2006 the partners sold the company to Viacom for \$1.6 billion.⁷
- ❖ After some of his films such as *Gremlins* and *Indiana Jones* came under fire for scenes considered to be too scary for children, Spielberg suggested to Motion Picture Association of America president Jack Valenti that there be a rating falling between PG and R. In an interview with *Vanity Fair*, Spielberg said, "I suggested, 'Let's call it PG-13 or PG-14, depending on how you want to design the slide rule,' and Jack came back to me and said, 'We've determined that PG-13 would be the right age for that temperature of movie.'⁸

MOTHER THERESA

Mother Mary Teresa Bojaxhiu (26 August 1910 – 5 September 1997), honored in the Catholic Church as Saint Teresa of Calcutta, was an Albanian-Indian Roman Catholic nun and missionary. She was born in Skopje (now the capital of North Macedonia), then part of the Kosovo Vilayet of the Ottoman Empire. After living in Skopje for eighteen years, she moved to Ireland and then to India where she lived for most of her life.²

INTERESTING FACTS!

- Mother Teresa was born Agnes Gonxha Bojaxhiu, the daughter of an ethnic Albanian grocer. She went to Ireland in 1928 to join the Sisters of Loretto at the Institute of the Blessed Virgin Mary and sailed six weeks later to India, where she taught for 17 years at the order's school in Calcutta (Kolkata).⁵
- ❖ In 1928, At the age of 18 Teresa, left home with the aim of becoming a Catholic missionary. She went first to the Loretto sisters in Ireland. She never saw her family again. In 1929, she travelled to India, where she learnt Bengali. She arrived with the equivalent of 5 Rupees. Mother Teresa learned and spoke five languages fluently. She spoke English, Albanian, Serbo-Croat, Bengali, and Hindi.⁶
- * Mother Teresa founded the Order of the Missionaries of Charity, a Roman Catholic congregation of women dedicated to the poor, particularly to those in India, that opened numerous centers serving the blind, the aged, and the disabled. In 1952 she established *Nirmal Hriday* ("Place for the Pure of Heart"), a hospice for the terminally ill.⁷
- ❖ Distressed by the sight of poverty and suffering, in 1946, she felt an inner call to serve the poor. Mother Teresa gave up her traditional nun habit and adopted an Indian Sari − white with a blue edge. The symbolism of her sari was that it was practical and in harmony with Indian culture. The color blue is associated with the Mother Mary. White is associated with truth and purity. The three blue bands represent the three main vows of the order. 8

Lee is considered by commentators, critics, media, and other martial artists to be the most influential martial artist of all time and a pop culture icon of the 20th century, who bridged the gap between East and West. He is credited with helping to change the way Asians were presented in American films.²

- ❖ Lee was born while his father, a Chinese opera star, was on tour in America. The Lee family moved back to Hong Kong in 1941. Growing up, Lee was a child actor who appeared in some 20 Chinese films; he also studied dancing and trained in the Wing Chun style of gung fu (also known as kung fu).⁵
- ❖ Back when cola cans weren't made of soft, beaten sheets of aluminum, Bruce Lee punctured holes through them with two-fingers!⁶
- He introduced ancient martial arts to the modern world with a style that he developed called Jeet Kune Do, and with just five mainstream films under his belt subsequently went on to influence popular culture all over the world.⁷
- His insatiable quest for knowledge and learning, prompted him to have a library of his own, housing over 2000 books.⁸
- Camp Bruce Lee provides a program that is a place for kids to learn about Bruce Lee and discover his messages on building confidence and unlimited potential. Camp Bruce Lee is inspired by the life and eternal energy of Bruce Lee; campers will discover things about themselves they never knew existed.⁹
- ❖ Bruce Lee was not only respected for his skills as a martial artist, but also for his level of fitness. He single-handedly changed the landscape of strength and physical development during his time, inspiring many athletes, bodybuilders, and even average men to adopt his approach to training.¹⁰

- ❖ As a young girl, Malala Yousafzai defied the Taliban in Pakistan and demanded that girls be allowed to receive an education. She was shot in the head at age 14 by a Taliban gunman in 2012 but survived and continued her work and became the youngest person ever to win the world-famous Nobel Peace Prize.^{5,7} Malala Yousufzai is a campaigner for girls' education from Pakistan.
- ❖ Using the pseudonym Gul Makai, Malala Yousafzai was only 11 when she started blogging about what life was like under the Taliban for the BBC. Because of the violent assassination attempt on Malala, Pakistan announced the creation of the very first Right to Education Bill.⁸
- Among her many awards, in 2013 Yousafzai won the United Nations Human Rights Prize, awarded every five years. She was named one of Time magazine's most influential people in 2013 and appeared on one of the seven covers that were printed for that issue.⁹
- ❖ After winning the Nobel Prize, Yousafzai continued to attend school in England while using her enhanced public profile to bring attention to human rights issues around the world. In July 2015, with support from the Malala Fund, she opened a girls' school in Lebanon for refugees from the Syrian Civil War. She discussed her work with refugees as well as her own displacement in We Are Displaced (2019).¹⁰



WILLIAM SHAKESPEARE

William Shakespeare (26 April 1564 – 23 April 1616) was an English playwright, poet, and actor, widely regarded as the greatest writer in the English language and the world's greatest dramatist. He is often called England's national poet and the "Bard of Avon" (or simply "the Bard"). His extant works, including collaborations, consist of some 39 plays, 154 sonnets, three long narrative poems, and a few other verses, some of uncertain authorship. His plays have been translated into every major living language and are performed more often than those of any other playwright. They also continue to be studied and reinterpreted.²

INTERESTING FACTS!

- ❖ Shakespeare's parents were probably illiterate, and his children almost certainly were. During his lifetime, William Shakespeare wrote around 37 plays for the theatre and over 150 poems! No one can say the exact number, because some of his work may have been lost over time − and some may have been written with the help of other people. ⁵
- Come 1585, the mysterious William Shakespeare disappeared from records for around seven years! Historians often refer to this part of the writer's life as 'the lost years'...⁶
- Shakespeare's plays were immediately big hits! He wrote different kinds of plays, all of which could be divided into three categories:
 - a) Tragedy including Hamlet, Othello, King Lear and Romeo and Juliet
 - b) Comedy including Twelfth Night and The Taming of the Shrew
 - c) History including Henry IV, Henry V and Richard III.⁷
- * William Shakespeare died on April 23, 1616, at the age of 52—not bad for an era when the average life expectancy ranged between 30 and 40 years. Shakespeare supposedly had the wherewithal to pen the epitaph over his tomb, which is located inside a Stratford church. Intended to thwart the numerous grave robbers who plundered England's cemeteries at the time, the verse reads: "Good friend, for Jesus' sake forbeare, / To dig the dust enclosed here. Blessed be the man that spares these stones, / And cursed be he that moves my bones." It must have done the trick since Shakespeare's remains have yet to be disturbed.8

A member of the Democratic Party, Obama was the first African-American president of the United States. He previously served as a U.S. senator from Illinois from 2005 to 2008 and as an Illinois state senator from 1997 to 2004.²

INTERESTING FACTS!

- Barack means 'one who is blessed' in Swahili. 10 From age six through ten, Obama lived with his mother and stepfather in Indonesia, where he attended Catholic and Muslim schools. "I was raised as an Indonesian child and a Hawaiian child and as a black child and as a white child," Obama later recalled. "And so, what I benefited from is a multiplicity of cultures that all fed me."5
- ❖ On the 44th president's desk sat a carving of an egg held by a wooden hand. This Kenyan symbol signifies the fragility of life. Even when he is not in the office, Barack also carries significant items for good luck. One is a tiny statue of Madonna and child and another is a bracelet bore by an Iraqi soldier.⁶
- ❖ Obama goes by the codename 'Renegade' to the Secret Service Agents who guard him. Each of his family members also has associated code names. All of them start with the same letter. Michelle, the wife, is 'Renaissance.' Malia is 'Radiance' while Sasha is 'Rosebud.' 6
- ❖ Obama is also a published author. He has written three books: Dreams From My Father in 1995, The Audacity of Hope in 2006, and Of Thee I Sing in 2010. In 2006, Obama won a Grammy for best spoken word album for the audiobook of Dreams From My Father. In October 2009, Obama won the Nobel Peace prize.⁷
- Obama holds the record for the tweet with the most likes of all time. In response to the Charlottesville tragedy in August 2017, Obama tweeted the beginning of a Nelson Mandela quote. The inspirational tweet was retweeted 1.7 million times and liked a whopping 4.5 million times. Obama's real-life heroes include: Martin Luther King Jr., Gandhi, Pablo Picasso, and John Coltrane.8

Sir Charles Spencer Chaplin KBE (16 April 1889 – 25 December 1977) was an English comic actor, filmmaker, and composer who rose to fame in the era of silent film. He became a worldwide icon through his screen persona, The Tramp, and is considered one of the most important figures in the history of the film industry. His career spanned more than 75 years, from childhood in the Victorian era until a year before his death in 1977, and encompassed both adulation and controversy.²

INTERESTING FACTS!

- Chaplin's childhood in London was one of poverty and hardship, as his father was absent and his mother struggled financially, and he was sent to a workhouse twice before the age of nine. When he was 14, his mother was committed to a mental asylum. Both Chaplin's parents were in the entertainment industry. 4.1.,4.2 In 1896 Chaplin and his older half-brother were sent to a public boarding school for "orphans and destitute children." Chaplin spent about 18 months in the orphanage.5
- Chaplin composed the music for many of his own movies, despite never having had proper music training. In 1972, Chaplin actually won an Oscar for the music in Limelight (1952), which he helped compose.⁶
- Chaplin's comedic explorations into the human condition transformed cinema, mostly comedies, from a mere novelty into an art form, because his films were able to address real issues with dimensional characters in a way that made them easier to talk about.⁷ Chaplin played the same character in all but a few movies.⁸
- Grave robbers made off with Chaplin's remains. Just a few months after Chaplin's death, two robbers stole his coffin from a Swiss cemetery and sent his wife a \$600,000 ransom demand. When she refused to pay, they allegedly threatened her kids. The bungling robbers were soon caught, however, and the coffin was recovered. It was then reburied in a theft-proof concrete vault.⁹



RUTH BADER GINSBURG

Joan Ruth Bader Ginsburg (March 15, 1933 – September 18, 2020) was an American lawyer and jurist who served as an associate justice of the Supreme Court of the United States from 1993 until her death in September 2020. She was nominated by President Bill Clinton, replacing retiring justice Byron White, and at the time was generally viewed as a moderate consensus-builder. She eventually became part of the liberal wing of the Court as the Court shifted to the right over time. Ginsburg was the first Jewish woman and the second woman to serve on the Court, after Sandra Day O'Connor. During her tenure, Ginsburg wrote notable majority opinions.²

INTERESTING FACTS!

- ❖ In the fall of 1956, Ginsburg enrolled at Harvard Law School, where she was one of only 9 women in a class of about 500 men, and was also taking care of her 14-month-old baby at the time. The dean of Harvard Law reportedly invited all the female law students to dinner at his family home and asked the female law students, including Ginsburg, "Why are you at Harvard Law School, taking the place of a man?" When her husband took a job in New York City, that same dean denied Ginsburg's request to complete her third year towards a Harvard law degree at Columbia Law School, so Ginsburg transferred to Columbia and became the first woman to be on two major law reviews: the Harvard Law Review and Columbia Law Review. In 1959, she earned her law degree at Columbia and tied for first in her class. ^{5,6}
- Ginsburg won five landmark cases on gender equality in the US Supreme Court, based on the protections of the Equal Protection Clause of the 14th Amendment. Justice Ruth Bader Ginsburg became the first Jewish female U.S. Supreme Court justice, and only the second woman appointed ever, in 1993. She is known as a champion of abortion and gay rights, the poor, and basically, all marginalized people. ^{7,8}
- Ginsburg paved the way for the Equal Credit Opportunity Act, which passed in 1974 and allowed women to apply for credit cards and mortgages without a male co-signer.⁹
- ❖ Early in her tenure on the Court, Ginsburg wrote the majority's opinion in United States v. Virginia (1996), which held that the men-only admission policy of a state-run university, the Virginia Military Institute (VMI), violated the equal protection clause.¹⁰

LEONARDO DA VINCI

Leonardo da Vinci (14/15 April 1452[b] – 2 May 1519) was an Italian polymath of the High Renaissance who is widely considered one of the most diversely talented individuals ever to have lived. While his fame initially rested on his achievements as a painter, he also became known for his notebooks, in which he made drawings and notes on science and invention; these involve a variety of subjects including anatomy, astronomy, botany, cartography, painting, and paleontology. Leonardo's genius epitomized the Renaissance humanist idea, and his collective works compose a contribution to later generations of artists rivaled only by that of his contemporary Michelangelo.²

INTERESTING FACTS!

- ❖ Da Vinci received no formal education beyond basic reading, writing, and math.⁵ Growing up in rural Tuscany, da Vinci spent much of his time outdoors, where he marveled at the natural world. His journals indicate that he had an especially ardent interest in the properties of water, as well as the movements of birds of prey. In fact, the artist recorded that his earliest memory was of a dream in which a bird of prey landed on his face and pushed its tail feathers between his lips.⁵
- ❖ Leonardo da Vinci was an artist and engineer who is best known for his paintings, notably the Mona Lisa (c. 1503–19) and the Last Supper (1495–98). His drawing of the Vitruvian Man (c. 1490) has also become a cultural icon. Leonardo is sometimes credited as the inventor of the tank, helicopter, parachute, and flying machine, among other vehicles and devices, but later scholarship has disputed such claims. Nonetheless, Leonardo's notebooks reveal a sharp intellect, and his contributions to art, including methods of representing space, three-dimensional objects, and the human figure, cannot be overstated.⁶
- ❖ He was ambidextrous he could draw forward and backward with opposing hands simultaneously. Leonardo da Vinci wrote most of his work from right to left. The result of this writing was a mirror script, which was difficult to read. Some historians explain the many backwards-written texts among Leonardo's papers as the artist's effort to encode his ideas against theft, but others speculate that when writing with his left hand, Leonardo da Vinci reversed direction as a means of avoiding inevitable smears of the wet ink, charcoal or chalk he was using.⁷
- When da Vinci was 24 years old, he was arrested along with several male companions on charges of sodomy. When no witnesses came forward to testify against the artist and his friends, the charges were dropped. But da Vinci's journals suggest that the allegations were somewhat devastating to a man who liked to keep his private life private.8

Oprah Gail Winfrey (January 29, 1954) is an American talk show host, television producer, actress, author, and philanthropist. She is best known for her talk show, The Oprah Winfrey Show, broadcast from Chicago, which was the highest-rated television program of its kind in history and ran in national syndication for 25 years, from 1986 to 2011. Dubbed the "Queen of All Media," she was the richest African American of the 20th century and North America's first black multibillionaire, and she has been ranked the greatest black philanthropist in American history. By 2007, she was sometimes ranked as the most influential woman in the world.²

INTERESTING FACTS!

- ❖ Winfrey was born into poverty in rural Mississippi to a single teenage mother and later raised in inner-city Milwaukee. She has stated that she was molested during her childhood and early teens and became pregnant at 14; her son was born prematurely and died in infancy. By 19, she was a co-anchor for the local evening news. Winfrey's often emotional, extemporaneous delivery eventually led to her transfer to the daytime talk show arena, and after boosting a third-rated local Chicago talk show to first place, she launched her own production company.⁵
- Winfrey was named "Orpah" after the biblical character in the Book of Ruth on her birth certificate, but people mispronounced it regularly and "Oprah" stuck. As a child, Oprah Winfrey was nicknamed "The Preacher" for her ability to recite the Bible verses as her grandmother often took her to church.⁶
- ❖ At the end of the 20th century, Life listed Winfrey as both the most influential woman and the most influential black person of her generation, and in a cover story profile the magazine called her "America's most powerful woman." In 2013, Winfrey was awarded the Presidential Medal of Freedom (the nation's highest civilian honor) by President Barack Obama.⁷
- ❖ Wearing bib No. 40 to match her age, Winfrey finished the 1994 Marine Corps Marathon in Washington, DC, in 4 hours, 29 minutes, and 20 seconds. "This is better than an Emmy," Winfrey said after fulfilling a promise she made to herself eight years prior. Winfrey trained for 20 weeks leading up to the race.¹¹¹

LE CORBUSIER

The home should be the treasure chest of living.¹







Charles-Édouard Jeanneret (6 October 1887 – 27 August 1965), known as Le Corbusier was a Swiss-French architect, designer, painter, urban planner, writer, and one of the pioneers of what is now regarded as modern architecture. He was born in Switzerland and became a French citizen in 1930. His career spanned five decades, and he designed buildings in Europe, Japan, India, and North and South America. Dedicated to providing better living conditions for the residents of crowded cities, Le Corbusier was influential in urban planning, and was a founding member of the Congrès International d'Architecture Moderne (CIAM). Le Corbusier prepared the master plan for the city of Chandigarh in India, and contributed specific designs for several buildings there, especially the government buildings.²

Architecture is the masterly, correct, and magnificent play of masses brought together in light. Our eyes are made to see forms in light: light and shade reveal these forms.³ – Le Corbusier

INTERESTING FACTS!

- ❖ Le Corbusier began teaching himself by going to the library to read about architecture and philosophy, by visiting museums, by sketching buildings, and by constructing them Le Corbusier designed the first planned city in India − Chandigarh. The layout was based on the plans he conceptualized in his book La Ville Radieuse (The Radiant City), which itself was an update on ideas for Ville Contemporaine.^{5,6}
- ❖ Le Corbusier defined the principles of his new architecture in Les cinq points de l'architecture moderne, published in 1927. The five points⁷ are:

<u>The Pilotis, or pylon</u>. The building is raised up on reinforced concrete pylons, which allows for free circulation on the ground level, and eliminates dark and damp parts of the house.

The Roof Terrace. The sloping roof is replaced by a flat roof; the roof can be used as a garden, for promenades, sports or a swimming pool.

The Free Plan. Load-bearing walls are replaced by steel or reinforced concrete columns, so the interior can be freely designed, and interior walls can be put anywhere, or left out entirely. The structure of the building is not visible from the outside.

The Ribbon Window. Since the walls do not support the house, the windows can run the entire length of the house, so all rooms can get equal light. The Free Façade. Since the building is supported by columns in the interior, the façade can be much lighter and more open, or made entirely of glass. There is no need for lintels or other structure around the windows.

Le Corbusier's design philosophy was heavily inspired by mathematical concepts used by Leonard daVinci, such as the golden ratio and the Fibonacci series, which he used as the basis for his architectural proportions.8

Confucius (/kənˈfjuːʃəs/ kən-FEW-shəs; Chinese: 孔夫子; pinyin: Kŏng Fūzǐ, "Master Kŏng"; 551-479 BCE) was a Chinese philosopher and politician of the Spring and Autumn period who was traditionally considered the paragon of Chinese sages. The philosophy of Confucius—Confucianism—emphasized personal and governmental morality, correctness of social relationships, justice, kindness, and sincerity. Confucianism was part of the Chinese social fabric and way of life; to Confucians, everyday life was the arena of religion.²

INTERESTING FACTS!

- Confucius's ancestors were probably members of the aristocracy who had become poverty-stricken commoners by the time of his birth. His father died when Confucius was only three years old. Instructed first by his mother, Confucius distinguished himself as an indefatigable learner in his teens.⁵
- There are six main groups of beliefs in Confucianism, these include:6

Yi - Righteousness

Xin - Honesty and Trustworthiness

Chung - Loyalty to the state, etc.

Li - includes ritual, propriety, etiquette, etc.

Hsiao - love within the family, love of parents for their children, and love of children for their parents

Jen - benevolence, humanness towards one another (the most important Confucianism virtue)

- Confucius's disciples were considerably younger than him. He did not actively recruit them. He did not found any school or academy. Young men from a wide range of backgrounds—sons of aristocrats, children of common gentlemen, merchants, farmers, artisans, and even criminals and sons of criminals—chose to attach themselves to him in order to learn from him skills that might get them started on a path toward an official career.⁷
- There is no god in Confucianism, but rather a force called the Tao, also known as the Great Ultimate. Confucius believed that the Tao was the impetus for creation and that this force flows through all life, enabling change and betterment.8

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

Muhammad Ali (born Cassius Marcellus Clay Jr.; January 17, 1942 – June 3, 2016) was an American professional boxer, activist, entertainer and philanthropist. Nicknamed "The Greatest", he is widely regarded as one of the most significant and celebrated figures of the 20th century and as one of the greatest boxers of all time.<sup>2</sup>

## **INTERESTING FACTS!**

- ❖ Cassius Marcellus Clay, Jr., (Muhammad Ali) grew up in the American South in a time of segregated public facilities. His father, Cassius Marcellus Clay, Sr., supported a wife and two sons by painting billboards and signs. His mother, Odessa Grady Clay, worked as a household domestic. When Clay was 12 years old, he took up boxing under the tutelage of Louisville policeman Joe Martin. After advancing through the amateur ranks, he won a gold medal in the 175-pound division at the 1960 Olympic Games in Rome and began a professional career under the guidance of the Louisville Sponsoring Group, a syndicate composed of 11 wealthy white men.<sup>5</sup>
- Outside the ring, Ali attained success as a musician, where he received two Grammy nominations. He also featured as an actor and writer, releasing two autobiographies. Ali retired from boxing in 1981 and focused on religion, philanthropism and activism.<sup>6</sup>
- Muhammad Ali achieved renown as a boxer through his speed, superb footwork, ability to take a punch, and tremendous courage. His final record of 56 wins and 5 losses with 37 knockouts has been matched by others, but the quality of his opponents and his overwhelming success during his prime placed him among boxing's immortals.<sup>7</sup>
- ❖ In 1996 Ali was chosen to light the Olympic flame at the start of the Games of the XXVI Olympiad in Atlanta, Georgia. The outpouring of goodwill that accompanied his appearance confirmed his status as one of the most-beloved athletes in the world. The dramatic period of his life from 1964 to 1974 was the subject of the film Ali (2001), in which Will Smith starred as Ali.<sup>8</sup>
