2025 Legionnaire Membership Renewals

The annual Membership dues for Frank E. Robinson Post 586 will increase by \$5 to \$40 per year on 1 July 2024 for the 2025 membership year (due to a \$5 increase at American Legion National). There is also another possible \$5 dues increase at the beginning of January 2025, because of an expected increase at American Legion, Dept of Ohio. That means our dues at Post 586 will probably increase another \$5 to \$45 per year starting on 1 January 2025 (for the 2025 Membership year).

You can eliminate the yearly hassle of remembering to renew your American Legion membership by taking advantage of the new multi year (3 year) membership which is available to current and potential members. Legionnaires can lock-in a three-year membership at the current rate of \$40 if you do it before 31 December by visiting legion.org/renew . THE 3YR MEMBERSHIP RENEWAL IS ONLY AVAILABLE ONLINE! Our Post Officers cannot renew you for the three years if you decide to send a check to the Post.

If you choose to participate in the 3 yr online membership renewal here is how it will work. In early July, the Adjutant or 1st Vice Commander will pull a Membership renewal report from MyLegion.org of those members who have renewed for the current membership year. The Post will send you the membership card for each of the current membership years, probably in late July or early August.

It's that simple, many of our Post members have taken advantage of this new program already. Sign up today and as always we thank you for being a dedicated member of Frank E. Robinson Post 586. Please contact me if you need help or have any questions or concerns.

Many of you know our long time Judge Advocate, Doug Whitney. Most of you also probably realize that Doug recently relocated to the State of Washington, and is no longer our Judge Advocate. I recently spoke with Doug, and learned some very interesting facts about Doug's life that I wanted to share with everyone.

- Originally from Durango, Colorado. Grew up in Colorado and Arizona.
- Entered the Army Reserve in 1956 shortly after graduation. Stayed in the reserve through college, and received his commission as a 2nd Lieutenant out of the ROTC in 1964.
- Served 2 tours of duty in Vietnam and 1 in Germany. Supported a cavalry squadron on artillery support.
- Retired as a Major in 1983.
- Met his wife Donna in 1957 and they married in 1959.
- Together they had 5 children 4 boys and 1 girl.
- Has 18 grandchildren and 9 great grandchildren, and 2 more on the way as of this writing.
- After separation from the military, moved to Idaho where he had been stationed before, teaching ROTC at the university.
- Went to law school at the University of Idaho, and stayed there as a prosecuting attorney.
- Retired as a prosecuting attorney in 2003 and moved back to Colorado.
- After his 2nd retirement, was contacted by a State Contractor, and accepted a position as an instructor in Afghanistan to teach locals how to become prosecutors under their newly created constitution and laws.
- He moved to Ohio to be closer to his daughter and her family, and chose Tipp City.
- Became active with American Legion Post 586, and became the Judge Advocate for 9 years.
- Was the Judge Advocate for the Department of Ohio for 4 years.
- Was passionate about Buckeye Boys State, and served as a Trustee and Instructor for that program here in Ohio.
- Moved to Pullman Washington in June 2024 to be close to family again. This is the same place he practiced law for 20 years. He has 2 sons there and a bunch of grandchildren there.

Doug's finest military memories:

- Commanding an Artillery Battery while in Vietnam. He considers this the apex of his career.
- Had an assignment at Ft. Bragg as a nuclear weapons specialist. They redesigned and tested the readiness of artillery units with nuclear capabilities.

Doug wanted me to share these words of wisdom with his friends and colleagues at Post 586:

"I hope everyone takes the opportunity to find something that they really love in the American Legion program and see if they can get involved - whether youth programs or the many things that the Legion does for the community. There are lots of things that the Legion does other than having a social room and canteen. I was happy to serve communities and I got a lot of satisfaction out of my service to the Legion. My experience with Buckeye Boys State is one of the highlights of my time in Tipp City."









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VETERANS VISITING THE 9/11 MEMORIAL

During the summer travel season, consider vising the 9/11 Memorial and Museum in New York City, honoring the nearly 3,000 lives lost in the terrorist attacks on September 11, 2001. For veterans, visiting this site is deeply significant, connecting their service and sacrifice to the resilience shown on that day. Veterans, who have defended the nation, find a deep connection at the 9/11 Memorial. The site commemorates not only the victims but also the brave first responders, many of whom served or have since joined the military.

To honor their service, the 9/11 Memorial Museum offers free admission to veterans year-round. This gesture acknowledges the bond between those who defend the nation and those who perished in one of its darkest hours. For veterans, visiting the 9/11 Memorial is a time of reflection. The serene North and South Pools offer a space to contemplate the sacrifice of fellow service members and civilians. The museum's exhibits often evoke a personal connection for veterans who have witnessed or participated in similar acts of resilience and recovery.

I have personally visited the museum, and I can tell you first hand that they really rolled the red carpet out for me. They gave me a badge designating me a veteran guest for the day, and the staff at the museum went out of their way to make our experience special. I highly recommend visiting the memorial site if you ever have the opportunity. It is an amazing experience.

The American Legion's Women's Auxiliary dues will increase for the 2025 membership year. The \$5.00 increase will go into effect July 1, 2024. The annual fee will go from \$30.00 to \$35.00. The dues increase comes at a time when the need for American Legion advocacy, expertise, influence, services, and programs are needed in every corner of our nation. Also, an increase is necessary due to the current membership standings and inflation.

This is a time to continue supporting the American Legion's ability to serve veterans, members of the US armed forces and young people. A national \$5.00 per capita dues increase can prevent National Headquarters from having to cut programs and services. The American Legion's ability to succeed over the next decade depends upon positive cash flow and the ability to invest in the future.

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The American flag was designed to represent the new union of the thirteen original states: it would have thirteen stripes, alternate red and white, and thirteen stars, white on a blue field.

One of the first flags had the stars arranged in a circle, based on the idea that all colonies were equal. The thirteen stripes, resting side by side, represented the struggle for independence; red stood for valor, white signified purity and blue represented loyalty.

In 1818, after a few design changes, the United States Congress decided to retain the flag's original thirteen stripes and add new stars to reflect each new state that entered the union.

Since then, Americans have fought for and died to preserve the ideals of democracy represented by the flag.
