a note from Pastor John

13th century theologian and mystic Meister Eckhart once said, “If the only prayer you said was thank you, that would be enough.” Eckhart lived in a time of great upheaval in the Roman Catholic Church. The Pope had left Rome and established his residency in Avignon, France. The Dominican and Franciscan orders were fighting with each other, and questions about the legitimacy of the Avignon Popes would eventually lead, after Eckhart’s death, to the Papal Schism. Late in his life, Eckhart was tried for heresy by the Inquisition for expressing non-orthodox views, but he died before a verdict was given. He fell into obscurity for centuries, but with the 20th century revival of Christian mysticism he has been rehabilitated.

Some seek for Christ through the mystical path. Others (St. Thomas Aquinas, for example) seek Christ through learning. Many seek Christ in ritual or in doctrine. Most seek Christ, in one way or another, through scripture. Sometimes, church institutions insist that only one of these models is correct, and the others are in error – heresy. The Protestant Reformation, begun by Luther, tends to place an emphasis on learning at the expense of mysticism, and while placing an emphasis on scripture, sometimes confuses doctrine with gospel. Yet, in spite of all this theological push-me pull-you, Eckhart’s statement remains true. It is a simple utterance that can be spoken by the mystic or the scholar, the theologian or the novice.

If only chaotic times had been confined to the 13th century! Times of harmony and calm are sadly the exception, not the rule. But as we approach Thanksgiving, we must refresh ourselves with the daily knowledge of gratitude towards God. For those moments when you can think of no other prayer, “Thank you” would be enough. In times of joy, it is an acknowledgement of the source of joy. In times of sorrow, it acknowledges the comfort of God’s abiding presence. It’s a prayer that can, and should, be said constantly.

Trustees Update

Here is an update on the work around our church:



HVAC Units replacement – Chapel and Day Care. We have gone over details with Miller's HVAC on replacement of these 2 HVAC units. They hope to submit request to county for permits soon. I expect that work on the chapel will be next spring, no date yet on either. We did have another failure of the Day Care unit, but it was easy to fix this time. Strange, but we had both Day care units out plus the Fellowship Hall unit at the same time – each for a different problem.

Security Cameras – Security cameras were installed in both buildings with greater coverage of the parking lots. Also added new lights on the south side parking area.

Day Care Doors – We signed an agreement to have the Daycare doors resurfaced and painted with commercial paint. Many of these doors had started to peel from previous paint-overs and needed to be resurfaced. The company will remove the doors, resurface, paint, and then reinstall to better fit openings over winter break for the school – Thanks to Jim Roberts for his efforts to find a contractor.

Shrubs – Work has started on pruning the shrubs and removing those that were too far damaged from the extreme heat wave in June. This will be a major effort and my thanks go to Larry Siewert and Richard Beilsmith. They both have been taking care of our landscape except for mowing the main lawns.

Day Care Lights and Ceiling Paint – Trustees will start replacing lights in the Day Care rooms over Christmas break and into the new year. At the same time, the ceilings will be repainted. Volunteers are welcome to help out with the painting.

Covid continues to limit our coming together times, but I wanted to let you know that the Trustees are still here and doing what we can to keep this church your place to worship.

STEWARDSHIP

A disciple's response

Last month, we introduced our Stewardship Campaign to the congregation. This marks one more return to “normalcy”, since last year we did not have a campaign due to Covid. Still, sometimes people jokingly refer to this as the time of year when we start “twisting arms” to get donations from the congregation. While I know this is usually said in jest, I hope no one feels they need to have an arm twisted to give to the church.

“He sat down opposite the treasury, and watched the crowd putting money into the treasury. Many rich people put in large sums. A poor widow came and put in two small copper coins, which are worth a penny. Then he called his disciples and said to them, ‘Truly I tell you, this poor widow has put in more than all those who are contributing to the treasury. For all of them have contributed out of their abundance; but she out of her poverty has put in everything she had, all she had to live on.’ “– Mark 12:41-44

Giving from poverty doesn’t sound logical to us: if you have little, you should hoard whatever you do have to try and get by. Yet Jesus is making the point that giving from abundance is easy – the lives of the rich aren’t particularly changed even when giving a large amount.

Like every church, we need the kind of giving that keeps the lights on and the doors open: it’s just a fact of life, and the church is grateful for those gifts. Jesus was not ungrateful for the gifts of the rich people. But Jesus offers another gift that cannot be bought except by giving all of yourself, as the poor widow did. So, I encourage you, whether giving from abundance or from poverty, to first give all of yourself to Christ.



Safe Sanctuary – Any Questions? We are blessed to have parents who trust us with their children and youth, and in return we honor their trust by doing all we can to ensure their safety. All those who signed up to be a “Sunday Shepherd” for the J.O.Y. Academy and those who work with our youth group undergo a background check. They are also asked to take an online safety training called “Safe Sanctuary.” We have simple, effective policies like “Never Alone” and “The Rule of Threes” that help our volunteers and children remember the basics. **We strive to be transparent** – so, Pastor Vivian will be available to answer questions in the Fellowship Hall at the end of Fellowship on two Sundays: November 14 and 21. Just look for her as you finish your coffee – she’ll be in the corner with her cup of tea and a cookie of her own, just waiting for someone to ask a question.

Hyperlink Bible – It’s common today to read an article on the internet with embedded links to other articles from which the author drew his information or inspiration. Called hyperlinks, one can simply click on the highlighted word or phrase and be automatically taken to that article. While we consider the Bible to be one book, in reality it is comprised of 66 different books, divided into two parts (The Old and New Testaments). For thousands of years the faithful have studied its pages, learning how Isaiah prophesizes the coming of Jesus, the Messiah; or seeing how the New Jerusalem of Revelation 21 resembles the Garden of Eden at creation in Genesis. Recently people tracked the number of cross references contained in our Scripture – ***and were amazed to learn that the Bible has 63,770 cross references contained in its pages!***

In an effort to inspire our children to become interested in the Bible, Pastor Vivian obtained an illustration of “The Hyperlinked Bible” created by Christopher Harisson, in collaboration with Christoph Römhild, a Lutheran pastor. A small version is offered here, but you can view the full sized illustration in the J.O.Y. Academy Worship Center (Room 201 in the FMC). It’s amazing! What is a basket?

Baskets are collections of items, homemade or purchased by church members and combined together with a theme...baking, pampering, movie night, etc.

We encourage individuals, families and groups in the church to put together baskets to be auctioned off at our annual basket auction! There will be a silent auction and an oral auction of baskets by our own Roger Brindle.

Where do auction funds go?

1. **Share Inc.** – Non-profit organization that provides food and shelter to the homeless and low income in Clark county. School food backpacks and summer lunches are provided by Share.
2. **Seafarers Center** – Welcomes and provides services for international mariners while docked at the Port of Vancouver and Portland.
3. **Safe Choice** – Shelter and services for women who are victims of domestic violence.
4. **Friends of the Carpenter** – A ministry that serves the homeless and less fortunate in Vancouver. Projects of 'wood' allows those participating to become friends around a table with Christ at the center.
5. **Open House Ministries** – A ministry that serves families who are in transition. A way for them to 'get back on their feet'. Providing them housing, counseling, goal setting and hope.

How do I donate a basket?





Family Promise[®] of Clark County

A while ago, during worship, Pastor John asked me what percentage of the participants in Family Promise successfully graduate. I was able to get that information the next day.

Family Promise of Clark County has been able to successfully graduate 85% of their participants into housing. One hundred percent of those who have graduated have been able to maintain permanent housing!

I would like to update you regarding the two families that we hosted in September. Our single mother of three has secured a job with UPS getting paid \$27 per hour. She also has secured housing and will be graduating in less than two weeks from entering our program. A third family entered the program Monday night after we hosted.

As for **Give More 24**, a huge THANK YOU! The goal was \$70,000. Since not everyone likes to do online giving, money is still trickling in. We are currently at \$69,400 and they are aware of more money coming in.

I just want to give a huge THANK YOU to everyone who helped. Not all volunteers interact directly with the guests. There is set up, transportation, meal prep, dish washing, hosting, take down, room set up and laundry. I probably left something out, but it takes everyone doing what they feel comfortable with for us to successfully serve these families.


