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Dear friends and families of Salmon Creek United Methodist Church,

Here we are about to flip the page on our calendars from June to July! Summer is upon us, and the church is moving into a new season, Kingdomtide! You may be asking, "What is Kingdomtide?"

Throughout the month of June our sanctuary has been clothed in the vibrant colors of Pentecost! Thank you to our wonderful worship committee for all they do to enrich our times of worship! As July arrives, you will see our colors change from red to green altar cloths, and our banners will remind us of our walk of faith.

But what exactly is Kingdomtide? Many people are familiar with the seasons of the church year such as Advent, Christmas, Epiphany, Lent, and Easter that surround major holidays, and Pentecost, during which we celebrate the outpouring of the Holy Spirit that gave birth to the early Christian Church. Yet, Kingdomtide, while it is the longest season, is much less understood, and less recognized than these others. In 1937, the Federal Council of Churches (now known as the National Council of Churches) recommended that the entire part of the Christian calendar between Pentecost and Advent be named Kingdomtide. Yet, how, when, or even if Kingdomtide is observed varies widely between churches. The season is intended to focus on Christian social concerns and the teachings of Jesus concerning the kingdom of God. Green, used during this season, is a color that symbolizes growth, reminding us to take time to nurture our faith through the practices of compassion, justice, worship and devotion.



As Jesus taught throughout his ministry, the kingdom of God often turns our expectations upside down, it is here and yet not fully here. We have a choice each morning when we wake up and put our feet

on the ground concerning how we will live in relationship with others that day. Will we choose to reflect and embody the grace of God's kingdom in what we do and say that day? Will we live in charity and love with our neighbors, friends, and enemies? Will we resist evil, injustice, and oppression in whatever forms they present themselves? Will we pray, "Thy kingdom come, Thy will be done" and mean it?

As we move through summer, enjoying the growth of our gardens and the beauty of blooming flowers all around us, my prayer for you is that you would seek opportunities to grow in your faith by setting aside some time for devotional reading and bible study, that you will find an area to serve in which you can use the gifts God has given you, that you may choose to be more intentional in your prayer life, and that you might make the effort to learn more about even one issue in the world where you can work for justice on behalf of another.

Pledge Income remained close to Budget in May at 99 % of Plan, or (240) unfavorable to Plan. On a YTD basis, we remain above Plan at 120 % of Budget. Your contributions are especially appreciated as we enter the "dog days of summer". Expenses in total were very close to Plan, (2,020) unfavorable for May and (151) unfavorable on a YTD basis.

From a profitability perspective, we realized a profit of ~ 4,800 in May and on a YTD Basis, we have realized a net profit of ~ \$ 23,000, which is ~ \$ 35,000 Favorable to Plan. Praise be to God!

Our Pre-School enrollment has increased but we still continue to operate at a loss as we strive to add more students. YTD Losses approximated (9,300) through May, with May close to break even at a loss of only (405) for the month.

Thank you to everyone for your contributions of time, talent and financial resources as we continue to worship together as disciples of Jesus Christ, united in missions, fellowship and service.

PAY-IT-FORWARD Update 2025—Trustees Update

As head of the Trustees, I want to thank you again for the funds that have been so far provided. We completed most of the critical replacements over the last 5 years. (See list below.) We still have many replacement projects that need to be completed.

I'm happy to announce that we are replacing the Narthex HVAC unit with a new heat pump, and are replacing the failing CPVC plumbing in the Family Ministry Center (FMC). The remaining funds in the old PIF (~\$20,000) campaign will be used, but the remainder of the more than \$60,000 cost will come from other church funds. These projects were needed this year.

The Narthex roof area has many vents and 4 ducts for the HVAC, many of which have leaked over the last 4-5 years. The contractor will reseal them while they are replacing the HVAC. The FMC plumbing has had 4 breaks over the last 3-5 years and needs to be replaced (CPVC is brittle and breaking). Without replacing, more leaks could result in water damage, mold and rot, potentially increasing the cost in the future.

That said, we still need to ask for funds over the near term to build up reserves for future efforts, as they become necessary. We ask that you return a pledge card to help build up this new fund. We are hoping to have all pledge cards returned by the August 15th. The congregation has funded most of the church we have now. This congregation needs to step up and help maintain it. The Trustees will continue to do as much as we can to minimize costs to the congregation, but capital replacement projects can only be deferred so long.

Besides these 2 critical near-term efforts, we have the following list of projects that will need to be funded:

Flat Roof areas. Water damage could include rot as time goes on. We may replace areas as we replace other roof mounted HVAC units and will likely reseal the remainder of the roof rather than replace.

4 HVAC Units nearing 30 years old (in addition to Narthex unit), 2 Sanctuary and 2 FMC.

Main Building Fire alarm panel and required upgrades. The fire alarm panel in the FMC was replaced as it was deemed obsolete. Main building unit is older and has minimal sensors to protect life and property.

Parking lot repaying of areas not repayed in 2016. We will continue with sealing as needed, but will need to replace several areas.

Carpets in offices, St Paul room, hallways and FMC rooms and hallway. Replacement is low priority, but they are quite worn now.

We really appreciate all the funds that have been contributed and all the volunteer hours.

We ask again for help to fund these projects, as you are able. We promise to be good stewards.

I'm very proud to be part of this congregation.

- 2020 Sanctuary and Narthex new carpets, Trustees and volunteers painted Sanctuary and Narthex, revised the altar area, added handicap access, and replaced all lights with LED lights.
- 2020 2 HVAC replacements main building offices and the St Paul/Choir rooms.
- 2022 Reseal Parking Lot and striping. Several areas still need to be repaved eventually.
- 2022 Replace 2 HVAC Units Daycare and Chapel. The chapel unit was failing.
- 2023 Daycare and Fellowship Hall Flooring carpets were really worn, health issue.
- 2023 Parking Lot Lights replacement. Replaced 10 light fixtures, added a new one.
- 2024 Fixed water damage in youth room (FMC 206) and installed new flooring.
- 2024 Replaced 4 HVAC units in the FMC with high efficiency heat pumps.
- 2025 Replaced Fire Alarm panel. It was obsolete, replaced it as part of new heat pumps.



Family Promise Update



Family Promise of Clark County has evolved and changed in many ways since the inception of our local affiliate in 2019. Salmon Creek United Methodist Church has been a hosting congregation since the beginning of the affiliate with Karen Beilsmith serving as Volunteer Coordinator and Doug

Lehrman serving as a member of the Board of Trustees since that time. Many of our members have contributed their time, talent, and volunteer hours on the board, hosting families, preparing meals, and preparing a warm, comfortable, and inviting environment for the families we serve. Many thanks to all who have volunteered and continue to volunteer to support this important organization. It's important that the congregation understand some of the changing dynamics of homelessness in Clark County that have impacted the organization and the churches that serve the families with children experiencing homelessness. First, some facts:

- 3,500 children ages Pre-Kindergarten through 12th grade are experiencing homelessness in our community this past year. The problem continues to increase nationally, as well.
- There are severe shortages of affordable rental housing in our community. The incomes of renters has increased only slightly but costs of housing have risen dramatically and rent increase moratoriums that were in effect during Covid have been lifted, increasing the problem.
- Our guests have many barriers to sustained housing independence, including low income, low credit scores, poor rental histories, eviction histories, criminal histories in some cases, and substance abuse and mental health challenges in some cases.

The goal of FPCC is to assist families in achieving sustainable housing and to help families to reduce the barriers. As the number and severity of barriers have increased, FPCC has had to screen out a number of potential guests because their barriers make them a high risk for housing in church environments. We have the goal of becoming a "Low Barrier Shelter Program" but need to increase our staffing to provide more social work case management to help manage substance abuse, mental health, and other challenges presented by some families. We are in the process of doing just that, having added a Shelter Program Manager position to help sheltered families to navigate their challenges. "Low Barrier" does not mean "No Barrier". We still must assure that safety is paramount for guests and hosting volunteers, that weapons possession and drug use are not on-site, and that violent behavior in any form is not tolerated.

It's important to recognize that the organization is evolving and changing and that we now offer an array of prevention and diversion services that have helped many families to achieve housing independence without needing to be in shelter. Also, we offer follow-up case management services for families that have been in shelter to help them to continue to sustain housing independence, which can include rental on their own, shared housing with others, etc.

Some members of hosting churches, including ours, have questioned why we are not always full with guests and sometimes we have only one, or no, families in shelter when it's our church's turn to host. Some of these reasons are related to the barriers discussion above. Also, there are cycles of families coming into and graduating from or voluntarily leaving shelter before graduation. We would ask that volunteers remain patient with the cycles as they occur and that our church continue its commitment to hosting, despite these cycles.

Another challenge we face is the search for a long-term solution to the problem of having a centrally located, public-transportation accessible, adequate space for our Day Center and office space. We had a potential solution at a church in downtown Vancouver which would have been ideal, but church leadership and FPCC leadership were not able to come to terms that were mutually agreeable. We are able to remain in our Battle Ground location as long as is necessary, but we are actively looking for a better location that meets the above criteria. Please let us know if you have ideas for location that we should explore.

Finally, the long-term vision for FPCC includes expansion of our staff resources to include a development professional, increased social service staff capacity, administrative support, and ultimately a building or buildings that are owned by the organization to house Day Center services, office space, and potentially transitional housing capability like independent apartments that can be used by families as they graduate shelter and as a step toward housing independence. Many mature affiliates throughout our region and the country have such services.

About the Project

This is a new construction project of 32 unattached, single-family cottage homes built on 1.82 acres. All homes are 2BR 1.5BA homes with two stories. Two different layouts will be built, one of which is 1063 sq ft and the other 1167 sq ft.


Each home will be sold to income-qualified homebuyers who fall under 80% of the Area Median Income through affordable mortgages by 3rd party partner lenders.

All 32 cottage units will be permanently affordable and utilize a land-trust model with shared equity, allowing homeowners to gain equity while ensuring this property remains a permanently affordable homeownership community asset.


Total Cost of Project: \$11,209,485


